

After-School Sandwich...

It is said that John Montagu, the Fourth Earl of Sandwich (1718-1792) was very fond of laying cards and of eating. So he found a way to do both at the same time. He just piled his food onto a piece of bread and put another piece of bread on top of it. Then he held the

whole thing with his left hand while (please may it be so), he drew a fourth ace with his right hand. A man who developed an aid to centuries of housewives deserved some reward and it is to be hoped he got it.

This way of eating became known as "The Sandwich Method." (Note: there is no record of what John's method of card playing became known as.)

The Sandwich Method of Eating spread rapidly, his contemporaries not wishing to leave John alone with the cards long enough to go to the dining room. It was only a matter of time before a wife discovered the Method.

A man may have foolishly demonstrated it to his family to prove he was "in on the latest fashion." More likely, a wife demanded to know how that spot of mustard got on his second-best jacket and the husband had to explain the Sandwich Method to her as best he could. "Oh," his wife said, "so now you like to eat

with your hands, do you? Very well. You shall eat with your hands!"

Three days later, the husband groaned, "Sandwiches AGAIN?" thus shortening the name from "The Sandwich Method of Eating" to "Sandwiches," and also setting into sound two words which still echo in kitchens around the world.

Today, the term sandwich may refer to a fragrant bite on an afternoon tea plate or to a complete meal.

A favorite sandwich is a highly personal thing and it is almost certain that members of the same family will not like the same sandwiches. (Note: this theory was formulated beside a table which held not cards but five different types of sandwiches.)

Any sandwich filling which you do not like is "plain revolting." A friend of mine stirs mayonnaise into peanut butter, but I do not watch while she does this. Neither do I dwell long on the government bulletin on sandwiches. It suggests not only "equal part of peanut butter, raisins, and chopped onions", but also "mashed cold pinto beans, sweet pickles, chopped onions and cucumbers."

The best sandwiches in the world, of course, were those which you eventually outgrew: the ones you raced home from elementary school to make, the french fries between slices of hot buttered toast

that you devoured before the word "calories" became part of your teen-aged vocabulary.

My own favorite was the universal bread-butter-sugar-cold homemade biscuit left from breakfast; cold home-churned butter which, being completely non-spreadable, was jabbed on hard enough to make holes in the biscuit; white sugar piled on and spilling through the holes to stick to fingers until it was removed with the tip of the tongue.

This sandwich was more than an item of food; it was magic and could destroy all the hurts of the day and enhance all the joys. It was a Coming Home From School.

And then one day it wasn't. I do not know which day anymore than I know whether I stopped suddenly or tapered off gradually. The process must have been painless. I did not realize I had quit the sandwiches until once I watched a younger sister making one for herself.

"How can she eat that mess?" I asked mother. "It's plain revolting."

"Oh, yes," Mother said quickly, "Plain revolting."

And how was I to know then that Mother was not referring to the sugar sandwich, but to the fact that her oldest child had outgrown it?

Sandwiches—eaten any time of the year—are honored during August, which is National Sandwich Month.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR61)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day of each Regular Session and each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government not to exceed one round trip per month during such time as the Legislature is in session, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

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PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR41)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services for:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;

"(2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

"(3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years;

"(4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States and who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and to the caretakers of such children."

The Legislature may define

persons; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000).

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-j to read as follows:

"Section 1-j. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this article, the Legislature may provide for the refund of the tax paid on the first sale of cigars and tobacco products in this state which are subsequently sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on

the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide for the refund of the tax paid on the first sale of cigars and tobacco products in this state which are subsequently sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."

Formal registration will be held Sept. 9 and 10 in the registrars office and classes will begin Sept. 12.

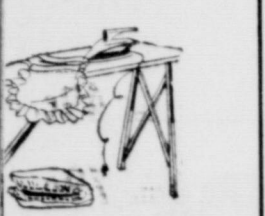

Texas, electors are nominated by the political parties and the political party that receives the majority of popular votes cast in a general election wins the 25 Texas elector votes for their presidential and vice-presidential candidates. These electors from each state meet in the state and cast their vote for their candidates on the first Monday after the second Wednesday in December. The votes are certified and mailed to the Vice-President, who, before a joint session of Congress on Jan. 6, counts the votes.

In order to win, a candidate must receive at least a majority of all the votes authorized (270 votes of the 538 total). If no presidential candidate receives a majority of the electoral votes, the job of choosing the president then goes to the House of Representatives. This phenomenon has occurred only twice in U.S. history, following the election of 1800 and 1824. When the election is transferred to the House, each state is entitled to one vote and if the state's representatives have a tie vote the state loses its vote. When any candidate fails to get a majority of the 538 electoral votes, the House is to choose a president.

Putnam-Native King's Book
'Dirty Stories' Due Out Soon

NEW YORK, N. Y. — The second book of a Texan born in Putnam, nurtured near Cisco, and exposed to "book learning" in the Scranton Schools will be published this month by New American Library-World Publishing Company.

The man is 39-year-old Larry L. King; the book is entitled "And Other Dirty Stories". But King hastens to add that the book is "a clean book with a trick title." gressmen, and many others." "There's a lot of material treating my early life in Callahan and Eastland Counties," King remarked recently as he relaxed in his Washington, D. C. apartment across the street from Vice-President Hubert Humphrey's home. "You know, I was a farm boy from the Dan Horn Community—rode the bus to school at Scranton, walked to Cisco on Saturdays to take in whatever movie the Palace Theater happened to be showing. That's all in the book." Another chapter in the book is devoted to King's early days in Putnam, "Requiem for a West Texas Town". That article appeared in Harper's some two years ago.

Larry King (They'll remember me in Eastland County as Lawrence", he grins) has published more than 200 articles, essays, and book reviews in national publications. His novel of politics, "The One-Eyed Man", was a Literary Guild Book Club Selection two years ago and received critical acclaim. Now a contributing editor of Harper's, King is the nephew of the late Dr. F. E. Clark of Cisco and of Mrs. John Gilbert of that city.

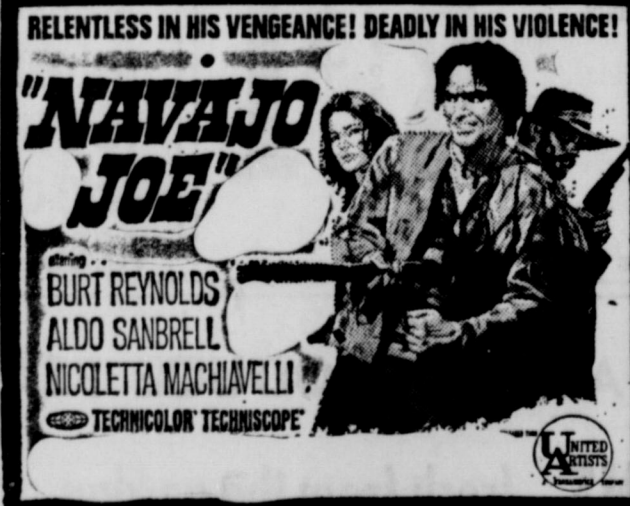

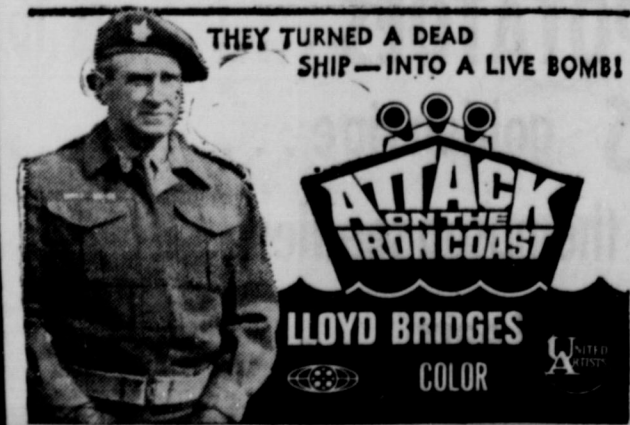

Capital NEWS

With the Republican out of the way, And his Democratic opponent of Wichita Falls, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, his campaign forgot started on a round of

meetings with delegates to the State Democratic Convention to see what they want in the party platform.

Smith's 31 meetings with delegates from each of the 31 senatorial districts is an unusual approach to the party grassroots. He is asking the delegates to tell him how he should campaign to offset the growing Republican threat.

Democrats recall that in 1960, when then Vice-President Richard M. Nixon was the Re-

publican candidate for president, the unknown Republican James M. Steger, got 609,803 votes without even making a campaign. This time Eggers has been campaigning for candidate for governor, Will-months. He has been picking up support from dissident Democrats like Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo and, with Nixon on the top of the ticket again, he is considered a real threat.

Eggers has been making a series of regional bus tours, campaigning in as many as 30 towns in four days, in an effort to duplicate the Smith success with personal campaigning.

During the primary campaign, Smith visited in 225 counties, some of which had never before seen a candidate for governor. This hard work showed up when he won the Democratic nomination easily.

Legislative Conference-Texas House Speaker Ben Barnes will attend the National Legislative Conference in Miami, Florida, Aug. 20-22.

Among the topics to be discussed by the state legislative leaders from all 50 states are bloc grants to states from the

federal government, a annual legislative sessions and others concerning the recent problems in state government.

Barnes is president-elect of the conference.

Ag Opinions: Community Action Agencies handling poverty programs may not be under the direction of county commissioners courts, according to an opinion by Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

Opinion notes that under the Texas Constitution, commissioners courts shall deal only with county business and concludes that poverty programs are not within the constitutional boundaries of commissioners court power.

Of the 55 CAAs in Texas, only five are handled through commissioners courts, so the effect of this ruling is not expected to be major.

In another opinion, Attorney General Martin ruled that the governor may authorize spending of federal funds to build a residence for the superintendent of the Huntsville State Fish Hatchery.

Authorization does not constitute an increase in the appropriation but merely authorizes the expenditure of the funds already allocated by the legislature. Martin said the superintendent's house burned after lightning hit it on May 19.

Governor Connally approved spending \$25,000 in available federal funds to build a new residence.

HemisFair Humphrey—Vice-president Hubert Humphrey toured HemisFair Saturday as the guest of Governor Connally and a number of other state and local officials.

Humphrey was scheduled to tour the United States Pavilion, the Institute of Texan

Cultures and the International sector of the World's Fair. At the U. S. Pavilion, the program included remarks by the vice-president, Connally and Cong. Henry Gonzalez of San Antonio.

Humphrey was to meet with the heads of all international pavilions and to end his visit with a special Western Hemisphere solidarity program between the Mexican and Canadian pavilions.

Student Loans: Texas Opportunity Plan — a state program for making loans available to Texas college and university students — has helped 20,121 students since the program's inception in September, 1966.

Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System reports that 42,000 loans totaling \$14,698,300 have been made, as of May 1, through 104 participating institutions.

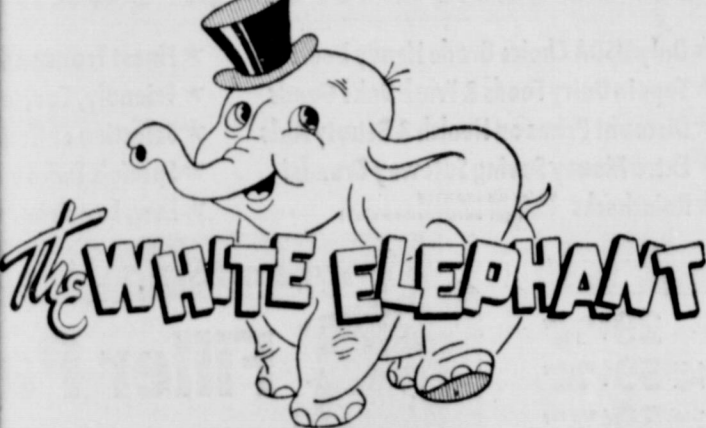

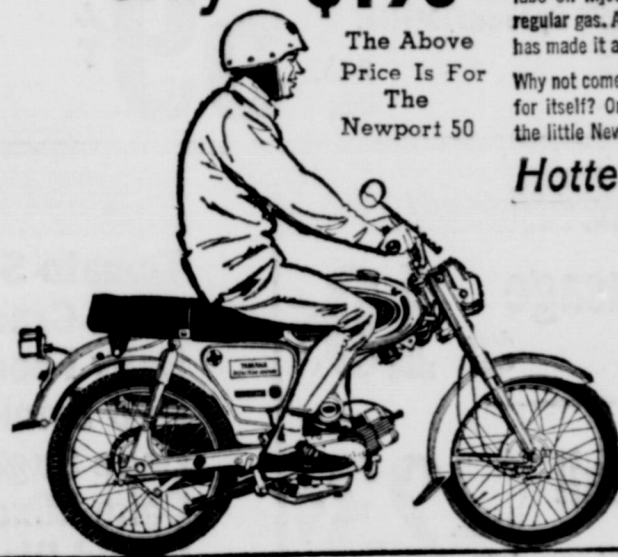

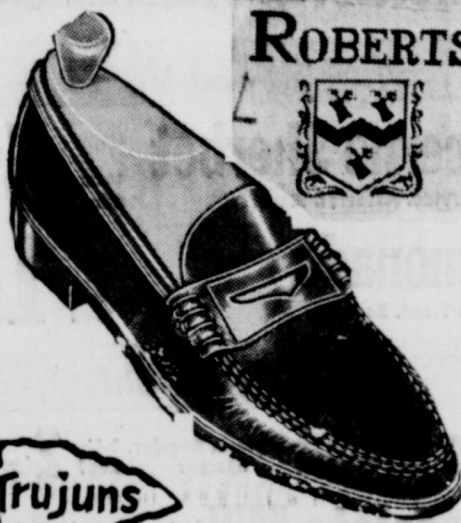
