Music is a keystone for living. Of the many forms of expression music alone can cause all nations to think a single thought at a single moment. Music alone can walk tight-rope fashion each string of an individual life.

Music itself is one of these strings in every human being. It may be the core of a ball of twine; all the other strings revolve around music. For music is a struggle to create or present music. The struggle is not always beautiful; it is seldom easy.

Maybe music is the stretch of twine which knots the core to the outer layers. These people are the serious students of music. They study so that they will be qualified to invite others to share their appreciation of music.

For the majority music is the string which runs quietly through life. These are the people who do not compose play musical instruments sing or study music. These people are an important part worthwhile all that the others do.

We speak of "musical people" when in truth every human being is a "musical perhim something which causes son". Each carries within him to respond to music and connects him to others.

A great composition moves now gathering tempo and the drawing in additional instruments then dropping extras for a quiet passage; now rising and swelling then barely moving. This runs parallel to a life span. Man moves through his world now with others then alone; now struggling then triumphing; now sinking to the depths of silent despair or quiet joy then rising to a climax of disaster or victory.

Nimrod Oil Test Below 3,900 Feet: Discovery Made

Outcome of a wildcat Ellenberger oil test near Nimrod, 10 miles south of Cisco, was expected to be known this weekend as drilling went below 3,900 feet Friday night. The project is the George Mitchell & Associates, Inc., of Houston No. 1 H. H. Harrelson and Kerr-McGee.

Observers reported that oil shows appeared good enough for pipe to be set. Location is a mile north of Nimrod in the southeast quarter of Section 101, Block 3, H&TC Survey. Permit called for 4,100 feet.

Elsewhere in Eastland County, Ivan J. Allen of Ranger has staked his No. 1 N. C. Gailey et al as a wildcat test some eight miles southeast of Ranger. Plans were for a 3,600-foot test on the 640-acre lease. Location was in the James Delaney Survey.

A Mississippi lime discovery well has been completed by Bilhartz Operating Co., Inc., of Dallas as their No. 3 E. H. Layne two miles west of Ranger in Eastland County. Location is in the Mark Haley Survey.

The well had a potential of 95-92 barrels of 42.3 gravity oil with 406 barrels of water. Flow was through a 10-64 inch choke with 540 pounds of pressure on the tubing. Production was from 3,564-88 and 3,595-3,602 feet.

AUSTIN — President Lyndon B. Johnson's decision to step aside is turning the May 4 Democratic precinct conventions from the previous label of "dull" to a new one of "hotly contested".

Gov. John Connally, who had been slated to be the Texas delegation chairman in support of President Johnson, with little objection from anyone, now has a fight on his hands.

Connally's forces launched a favorite son candidacy for Connally at a meeting of the State Democratic Executive committee. Senator Ralph Yarborough objected, and appeared close to a decision to challenge Connally in the county conventions.

At first, the Connally candidacy seemed to be learning toward Vice President Hubert Humphrey, but Connally wiped that out by saying he would not be a stand-in for anyone.

By contrast, Republican conventions on May 4 seem more peacefully inclined. The state Republican organization is united behind Senator John Tower's favorite son candidacy. However, a challenge may be posed by a group trying to win delegates for Gov. Ronald Reagan in California.

County conventions on May 11 and state conventions on June 11 will follow, but the grass-roots decisions will be made in the more than 5,000 precincts in Texas on May 4.

U. S. Supreme Court predictably has extended the one-man-one-vote theory to local governments.

Like legislative bodies, Court said, wherever city, county or other governmental units elect representatives

from single-member districts, the districts must be substantially equal.

Ruling was on a case by Midland Mayor Hank Avery to force Midland County Commissioners Court to reapportion. Dissenting opinion warned of "avalanche of reapportionment cases."

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has predicted the ruling will not disturb local elections already in progress this year, and indicated he feels the problems of unequal representation will be worked out by Texas subdivisions without multiple court suits.

Prior studies have demonstrated, however, that the vast bulk of county commissioners' precincts would be affected by the new ruling. To assume that all will voluntarily correct deficiencies pointed up by the high court appears to be expecting too much of local officials, many of whom will have jobs at stake.

Mrs. John Connally has inaugurated the East Texas Forest Trail—a 780-mile loop passing through four national forests and past the state's only Indian reservation—as the second of ten Texas Travel Trails named by Governor Connally in an effort to promote tourism in Texas.

Texas business activity increased substantially during February, paced by an increase over January of six per cent in retail sales, reports the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

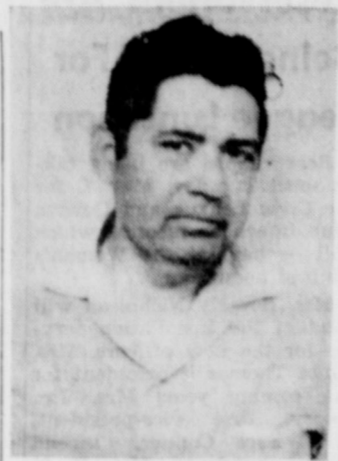
State Board of Insurance has approved an amendment to the general-liability insurance policies of all city and other local governments to exclude coverage of riots.

Post Office Has Booklet on Mail To Men Overseas

An illustrated pamphlet — Mail or Servicemen — outlining the expanded program for airlifting letters, packages and other military mail overseas at low postal rates is now available through local Post Office window clerks, the Postmaster announced.

The Postmaster said that "as a result of new legislation and action by President Johnson we are now airlifting more than 75 per cent of all mail going to the military men and women stationed abroad. We hope this guide will help more American families be familiar with these services and use them."

The eight-page pamphlet illustrates three services for airlifting parcels at rates the average family can afford, the speedy service now available for newspapers and news magazines to most overseas bases, the special rates for books and similar educational materials, and how to mail sound-recorded personnel messages. The guide also provides parcel wrapping instructions, information on the time it takes parcels to reach Viet Nam and other overseas bases from major U. S. cities, and pointers on the correct way to address military mail.

A family sending a 10-pound package to Viet Nam, for example, pays only \$2.75 on a package marked "PAL", while the air parcel rate for the same package is \$6.59, the Postmaster said.

On parcels weighing less than 5 pounds it might be more advantageous for a family to use the older (SAM) Space Available Mail service, which provides surface trans-

portation to the port of embarkation and airlift overseas. A four-pound SAM package to a European military post cost only \$1.10. On packages weighing under two pounds air parcel post is often the patron's "best buy" for through airlift service, the pamphlet suggests.

60 IDEAS FOR BEST EASTLAND

Analysis of the suggestions submitted during the recent Chamber of Commerce Community Improvement Questionnaire, in view of the "scored" section of the extensive questionnaire.

In the section in which citizens were to score each category as to "good," "average," or "below average," the extreme bad weather of the past season undoubtedly prompted an over-all bad view of the city's street maintenance.

In fact, only 24 per cent of those answering this category (248) thought that the street maintenance was good; 43 per cent thought they are average; and 33 per cent (83 people) thought they were below average.

In the same general category, 39 per cent of those scoring on street lighting (252), reported good; 50 per cent, average; and 11 per cent, below average.

However, in the separate section which asked that citizens give suggestion, it is found that 117 people suggested improvements in the "Lighting, streets, general." The discrepancy apparently lies in the fact that the tabulators grouped lighting and streets together in a general roundup.

A run-down of the other suggestions follows, with the number alongside referring to the number of times the item was recommended:

Lighting, streets, general, 117; new industry, 54; eating establishments, 39; vacant lots, 35; traffic control, 32; control of dogs and animals, 28; water system, 29; opportunities for young people, 29; recreation building and center, 26; removal of vacant buildings, 26.

Police protection, 25; blind corners, 23; T.V. cable, better service, cheaper rates, 20; junk yards cleaned, 19; housing unit and rent houses, 18; old cars, 17.

Motel facilities, 17; street drainage, 15; garbage, 15; business establishments, 13; zoning laws, 12; improve city park, 11.

TV service man, 10; sewer, 10; mesquite control, 9; city dump moved, 8; sidewalks to schools and town, 9; improve stock in stores, 8.

Shoe store, 8; obscene literature, 7; news media, 6; city salaries, 5; welcome, 5; community spirit, 4; cemetery care, 4; children's clothing store, 4; men's store, 4; building codes, 4; chamber report progress, 3.

Library, 3; clean up and fix up downtown, 3; improve airport, 2; help poor, 2; upgrade fire department, 2; better schools, 2; bank, 2; drug store open nights and Sundays, 2; taxes (more), 2; and the following each received one recommendation: junior rodeo, politics, north side improvement; telephone service; free parking on Saturday; rest area for tourists; parking permits; build a dragstrip for teenagers; sign for city park; night taxi service; technical training facilities; and make Eastland medical center.

\$2 Million Sabanno Project Hoping To Be 1 of 6 Picked

Supporters should know by the end of this month whether the Sabanno Watershed Project has been picked among the selected half dozen. The \$2 million Sabanno project is one of 24 under consideration by the State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Funds are available for only six, and planning for those selected as top priority will probably take up to some 18 months. The supporters for the Sabanno project made their bid

to the state board Thursday evening in Gorman. The board consists of Arthur Leesch of Boerne, chairman; Albert Roach of Paris, Frank Gray of Lubbock, Ernest Wehman of Pleaston and Henry Turney of Dublin. Sabanno Association President Ro's Wilson of Gorman and other local officials took the board on a tour of the watershed Thursday afternoon. Approximately 700 citizens gathered at the Gorman High School Football Field for a

free barbecue with the board. The large group then moved into the school's auditorium for the official public hearing on the project. It was an out-and-out appeal to the board for top consideration. There was no opposition registered and Chairman Leesch told the audience: "This is one of the outstanding tours and hearings we have held -- you will receive every consideration."

Wilson presided at the hearing and introduced the board and state Soil Conservation Service officials and others. Turney outlined the three points considered in setting priorities: damage, land treatment and the interest of the people. All points had been met in this project, he said.

Entering testimony in the hearing were: County Judge Scott Bailey who stated that the County Commissioners Court had joined as a co-sponsor, and assumed the responsibility of maintenance of the system as provided by law.

H. A. (Pete) Tyrone, Carbon area resident and a longtime advocate of flood control on the Sabanno, explained the devastating damage done by the river, stating that it averages three flood stages a year.

Dean Kirk of Gorman told of the erosion of the once-fertile land in the Sabanno watershed, and said that it is a "pleasure to be a steward of the soil, but that if corrective measures aren't taken, there won't be any soil to be a steward of."

Melvin Shell of Gorman outlined the value of increased peanut crop yields through

irrigation. Irrigation yields from development of the Sabanno could equal income from a factory hiring as many as 100 people, he said, stating that there are some 2,900 acres of peanuts in the watershed.

Eric Arnold, Gorman bank president, stated that his firm is ready and willing to assist the project. Lendale Cole of DeLeon told of livestock losses.

Don Mooney of Gorman of crop damages.

Tom Birdsong of Gorman pointed out the protection to the \$16 million Proctor Reservoir that development of flood control on the Sabanno would give. "Two thirds of the sedimentation at Proctor is coming from the Sabanno," he said, "and money spent on the Sabanno will mean protection for the Proctor investment."

Veteran Conservationist C. M. (Clint) McCain, who lives between Eastland and Carbon, aptly summed up the testimony, and talking without notes, entertained the audience and the board, with his confidence and enthusiasm for the project. "We've got good leadership, and we just believe that five good men like you (the board) will find favorably for us." Quoting back to some of the other talks, he said "We want to keep our tracks above Proctor" -- referring to keeping the soil in this area.

Wilson summed up, telling the board that in no other project could state funds be more wisely spent. "What have you seen in this project?" he asked. "Interest, endorsement, control at work and agricultural challenge."

Hosts for the barbecue were chambers of commerce of Gorman, DeLeon and Rising Star.

The preliminary field survey of the Sabanno calls for 13 major structures (dams) and 20 smaller ones.

Miss Moseley will also attend the district 4-H Leadership Congress to be held in Stephenville on June 11-13.

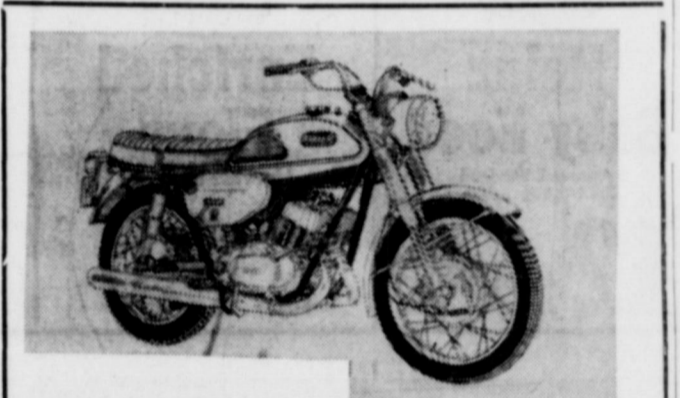
