## LVN Training Applicants Are Being Accepted

Applications for LVN training are being accepted by Mrs. Veneta Mitchell, instructor, of Cisco. Mrs. Mitchell may be called at 442-1449, Cisco, before Monday, June 3.

Classes will be taught at Cisco Junior College and students will work in area hospitals. Women between the ages of 18 and 55 are eligible. A tenth grade education or its equivalent in testing is required. Tuition of \$120 may be paid in monthly installments. Each student will receive training pay to cover the costs of the course, Mrs. Mitchell said.

Sixty-three women have graduated as licensed vocational nurses since the course was originated in this area.

## Good Turnout Expected In Important Saturday Vote

Eastland Countians go back to the polls Saturday, June 1, to help make some decisions left unsettled in the May 4 first primary balloting.

The eight Democratic voting places will open at 8 a. m. The ballot is short and lists only one race: that for gubernatorial nomination.

The May race, the choice for Democratic nominee was narrowed to Preston Smith, and Don Yarborough, both veterans of statewide campaigns who were the top vote-getters in a field of ten.

Absentee balloting has been pretty heavy indicating that the voter turnout Saturday

may be good even in spite of the one-race ballot.

A total of 68 had voted absentee, either in person, or by mail, through noon Tuesday, with deadline at 5 p. m. Tuesday. Almost 5,000 people voted in the May Primary, and 132 had voted absentee for that election.

The winner of the Smith-

Yarborough contest will face Paul Eggers, the Republican nominee, in the November general election.

Yarborough outpolled Smith in the May election, statewide, 407,119 to 369,996, but Smith led in Eastland County, with 1,572 to Yarborough's 746 (second highest in the race).

Polls will remain open until 7 p. m.

(An Editorial)

It is important for every resident of Eastland County to participate in the Democratic Party's second primary election on Saturday, June 1, when a governor of Texas will be elected. Absentee voting ended last Tuesday and only about 100 people cast ballots, indicating little interest in the election. Although only one race appears on the ballot, it is very important for all of us to cast our votes.

Eastland County has approximately 8,500 eligible voters. Only about 4,800 of these people took the time to vote in the first primary. An impartial observer has visited the county and forecasts that no more than 2,500 people will vote in the second primary.

You can use all the fingers on your hands to list countries of the world where the people turn out more than 90 per cent strong in all elections. Voting in all elections is a vital part of the democratic society—an obligation of good citizenship.

Let's make our actions speak on election day by going to the polls in record numbers.

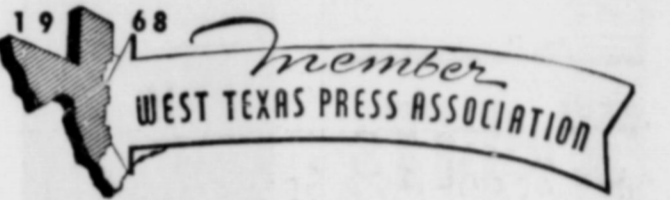

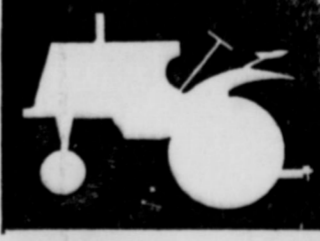

## Sen. Yarborough Puts Okay on Don

U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, making public a declaration of his preference for Don Yarborough for governor by paying a personal visit to Yarborough's campaign headquarters Sunday morning, predicted D. Yarborough will win the runoff "going away."  
The senior senator came down the stairs of D. We were hit last night with recoilless rifle rounds. They were fortunate enough to hit one of our ammunition bunkers and discharge each round. When the ammo started exploding, we had to leave our positions on the guns. Ammo was exploding all night long. We were lucky no one was killed.  
I'm sending a little prayer which I wrote after coming to Viet Nam.

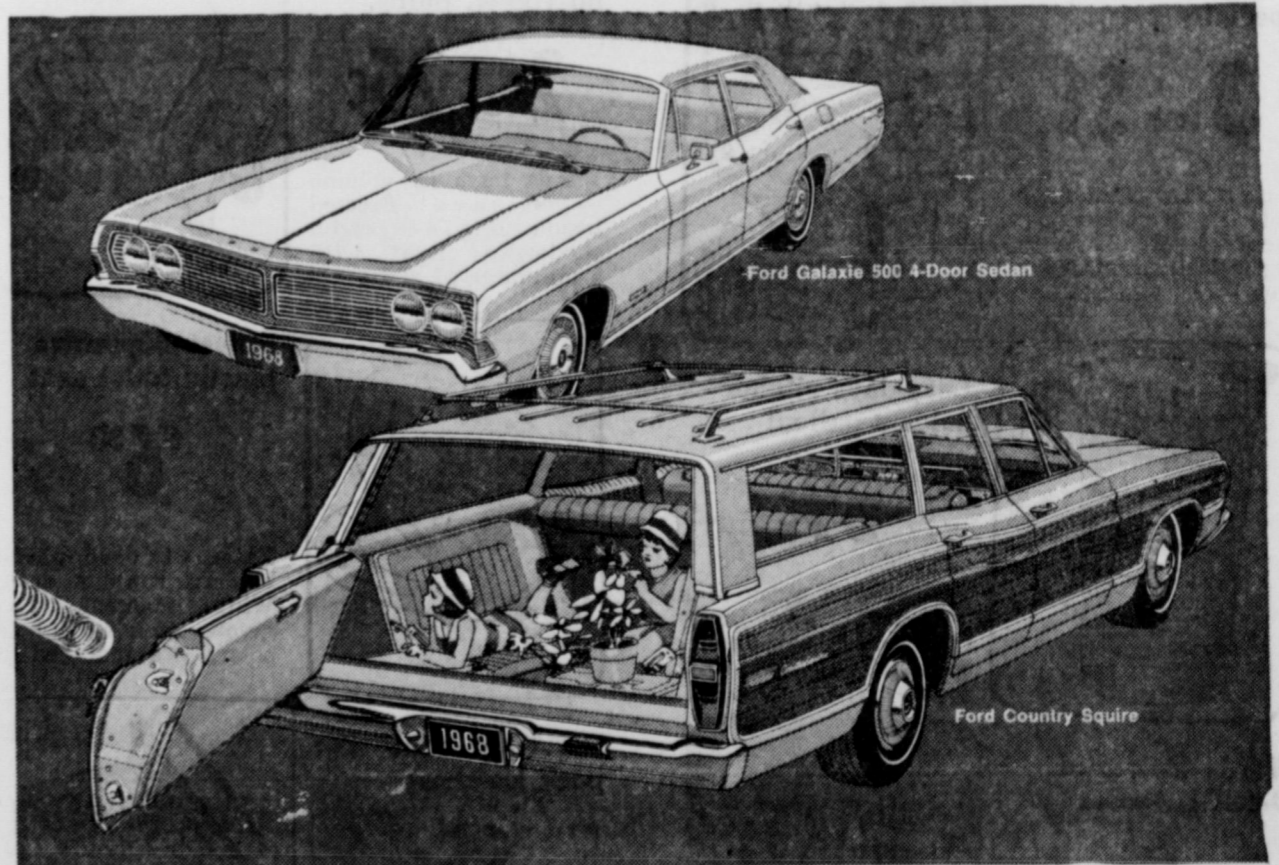

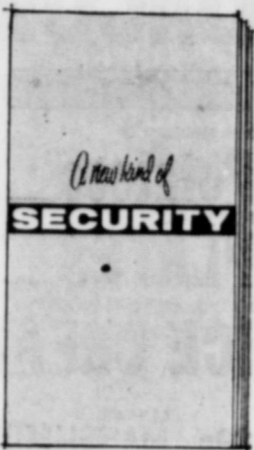

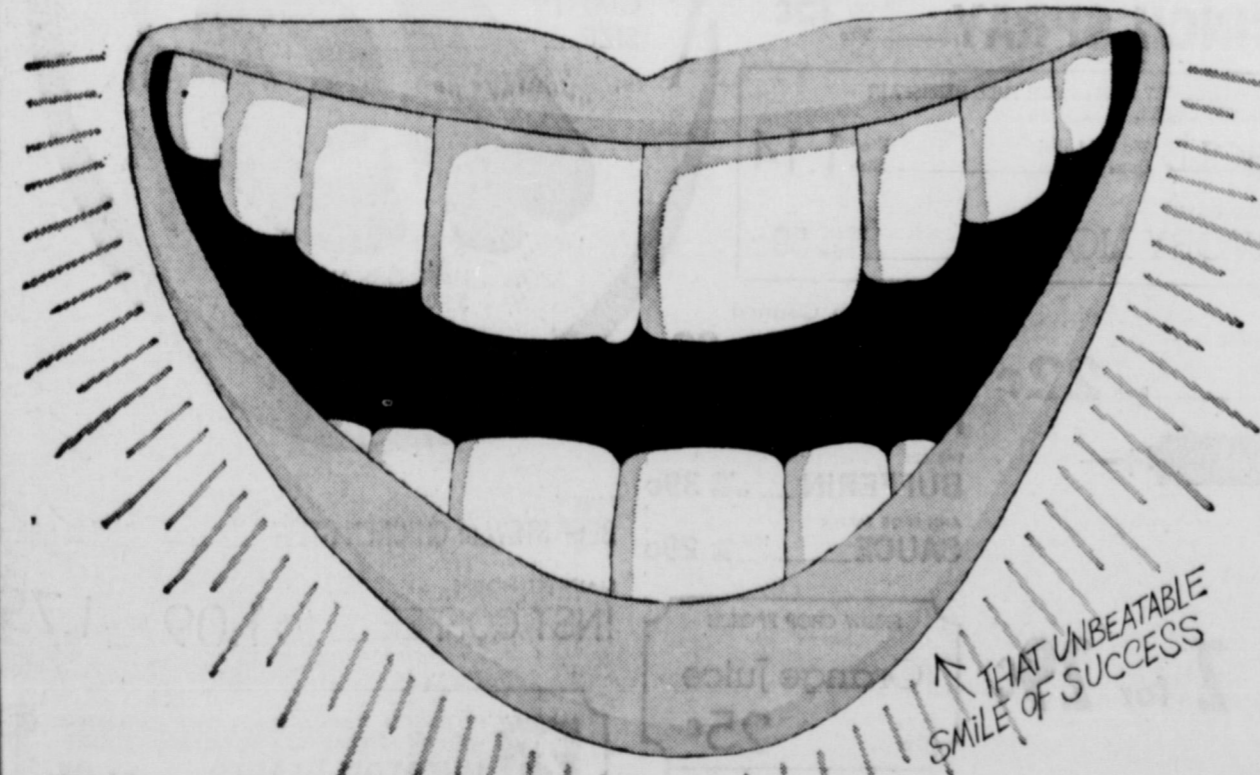
