School Consolidation - - - Questions and Answers

Olden would not be represented on the two school districts consolidate? The present Eastland Board of Trustees will serve as the governing body until the next election on April 5, 1969. At that time two trustees expire. Any person living in the boundaries of the newly created district, eligible, would be eligible to run for a position on the Board of Trustees of the new district. The Board of Trustees of the Olden District and Board operate under the same laws as the Eastland Board of Trustees. A person who is eligible to be a trustee on the board is eligible to select a trustee. The choice that will be open at the time of the election will be open at the time of the election.

Will serving on the Eastland Board of Trustees be a full-time job? No. It will be a part-time job. The Board of Trustees will meet once a month. Will the Eastland Board of Trustees be able to vote in a school consolidation election? Yes. The Board of Trustees of the Olden District and Board operate under the same laws as the Eastland Board of Trustees. A person who is eligible to be a trustee on the board is eligible to select a trustee. The choice that will be open at the time of the election will be open at the time of the election.

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Eastland High School has 358 pupil stations in regular classrooms, plus a study hall with a capacity of 89, a library with a capacity of 50, a chemistry lab with a capacity of 30, a biology lab with a capacity of 30, a Home Economic Department with a sewing laboratory and a completely remodeled Foods laboratory equipped with four modern unit kitchens. In addition to the Main High School Building there are:

1. Air conditioned Band Hall with newly remodeled practice room.
2. Three gymnasiums including one new structure that is the best equipped high school gym in the area.
3. A new vocational agriculture building containing the best vocational agriculture shop in the area, and school-owned feeding pens for animal projects located on school owned property.
4. Two regulation football fields and a new cinder quarter-mile track with corrective curbs.
5. Two asphalt tennis courts.

14. Are taxes higher in Eastland than in Olden? It would be virtually impossible to give a yes or no answer to this question without making a comprehensive survey of both districts and actually comparing property in both districts. Both the Rate and the Property Value must be considered if an accurate comparison is to be made. One of the best ways to make this comparison would be to pick out property in each district that is comparable in value and compare them on the separate tax rolls of the two school districts involved.

15. Would the consolidated district be more expensive on local taxpayers? No. The cost of operating the proposed consolidated district would be less than operating the districts separately as is now done.

16. How would such a consolidation give the average taxpayer in the district any protection against additional tax increases in the future? In 1968 the Texas Legislature passed a law that is commonly referred to as the Incentive Air Law. This law makes a "Bonus" cash payment available to a newly consolidated school district over and above their usual financial allocation as an encouragement to get small districts to merge with larger districts. This incentive aid money is paid to a newly created district over a ten year period. Although these funds can be used only for the purpose of paying for new buildings or facilities, it would simply mean that moneys currently being used to retire bonds could be used in the operation fund for day to day expenses of operation. In short, this means that the State Government would make your debt service payments for ten years, and such moneys as would normally be used by the local districts for this purpose could be used for daily operational expense.

17. How much would the Incentive Air payment be to the newly created district? The Texas Education Agency has estimated that if the Olden and Eastland District merge, the new district would be eligible for an amount in excess of \$26,000.00 per year for ten years. This amount might be more or less depending upon the organization of the new district. The most reliable estimates are that the incentive aid payment to the new District would run as high as \$35,000.00 to \$38,000.00 annually for ten years. This would amount to a total of from \$350,000.00 to \$380,000.00 over the ten year period. All of this would be made in addition to the usual funds the district would be eligible for based on the average daily attendance. This amount could only be reduced if the attendance in the newly created district dropped below the 1967-68 average daily attendance. If this occurred, the Amount of the Incentive Aid for that year would be reduced in proportion to the percent of the drop in attendance. The final amount the district would receive would not be determined until bus routes and vocational teacher teaching units were allocated by the Texas Education Agency during the 1968-69 school year.

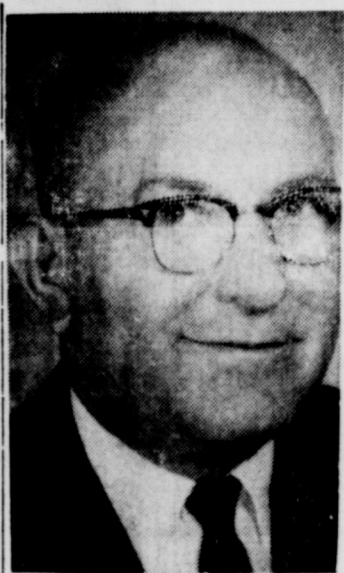
18. If the Districts do not consolidate, are the chances good that both districts will be faced with additional taxes in the near future? Yes. If present plans affecting public education in Texas are carried into law during the next session of the Texas Legislature, there is little doubt that local school districts throughout Texas will be hard pressed for additional moneys. It is highly probable that both the Eastland and Olden Districts will have to make adjustments to meet these increased demands prior to the beginning of the 1969-70 school year unless the Districts are consolidated.

19. What would happen to the Olden teachers and auxiliary employees if the voters decide to consolidate the districts on Aug. 24th? Such teachers and employees would automatically become employees of the newly consolidated district.

20. Is it true that the Olden school property would be sold if the districts consolidate? It is reasonable to assume that some of this property might eventually be disposed off, but it is also reasonable to assume that the Board of the consolidated district would highly favor the retention by the community of Olden (properly organized) to retain any of the present school properties that they felt they had a need for, for community purposes.

21. Would all of the Olden students be eligible for bus transportation? Yes. Any student that lives in two miles or more from the school he attends is eligible for bus transportation. This would mean that any student now living in the Olden District would be eligible for bus service.

They are members of Bethel Baptist Church where O'Dell has served in the capacity as Sunday School superintendent, Sunday School adult department superintendent, department director in Training Union and chairman of several committees, including chairman of deacons. O'Dell is a member of the Chamber of Commerce, American Legion, has served as a director and vice president for United Fund and a member of the board of directors for Goodfellows. He has been a member of the Lion's Club since 1960 and has served that organization as director, first vice president, and president, 1963-64, zone chairman, deputy district governor for two terms. Since 1963 he has maintained 100 per cent attendance record at Lions. O'Dell is a veteran of World War II, having served in the Army Air Corps from December, 1942, until February, 1946. He has been with the Post Office Department in Eastland since 1948, beginning as a sub-city carrier.

2 Sentenced In County Court To Jail Terms

Two men were sentenced to jail terms by Eastland County Court this week. H. C. Cope received a one-year jail sentence on a charge of theft by false pretext and Carl Brattain was convicted on six separate counts of intent to defraud with worthless checks. Brattain was sentenced to a total of six months in county jail. In other action, the County Court fined four, transferred two cases to 91st District Court, and dismissed three charges for lack of sufficient evidence. Paying fines plus court cost for DWI charges were Texa Ileen Russell, \$100.50; Jerry Don Bole, \$150.50; and M. L. McMinn, \$148.50. Dismissed were child desertion charges against two persons, and a theft by false pretext against another. 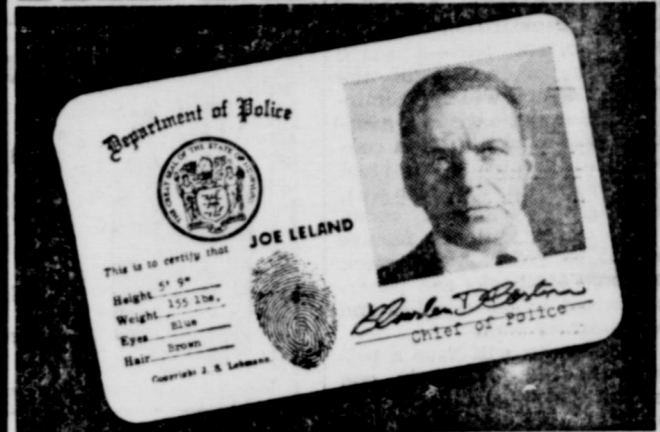

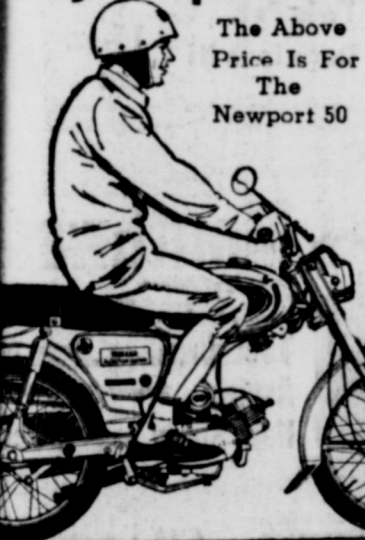

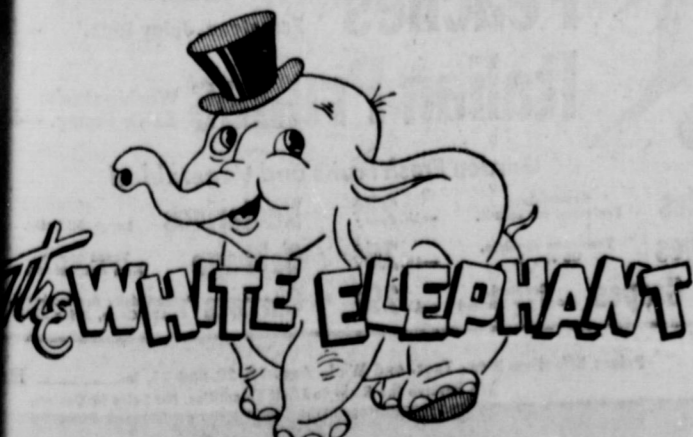
