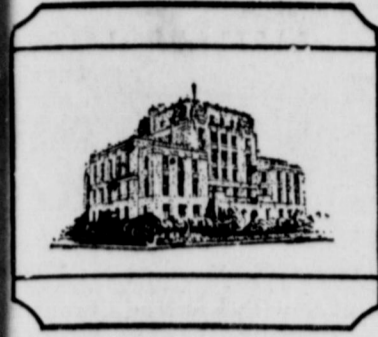

CLASSES BEGIN AFTER DAY HOLIDAY

Public School classes in classes according to Supt. Windell Siebert.

Classes for all students will begin at 8 a. m. Junior High and High School classes will be dismissed at 3:30 and Elementary classes will be dismissed at 3:20.

Total tentative enrollment for this year is 747 students with 380 in Elementary, 132 in Junior High, and 245 in High School.

School buses will be on the regular schedule Tuesday morning and both cafeterias will be open for lunch. Elementary lunch periods will be at different intervals for different age groups. Junior High period will be from 11:30 to 12 and High School lunch period will be from 12 to 12:30.

All High School students will report to the auditorium at 8 a. m. Tuesday to receive schedule cards and then begin regular classes on a seven period schedule. Elementary students will report to the cafeteria and Junior High students will report to the Junior High study hall.

Olden Votes 'No' On Consolidation With Eastland

The proposed consolidation with Eastland School District was vetoed Saturday by voters in the Olden Independent School District.

Eastland voters approved the merger but passage in both districts was needed to effect consolidation.

Voters in the Olden district favoring consolidation numbered 103; those who voted against it numbered 150.

Persons in Eastland who favored joining the districts numbered 336; those opposed to consolidation numbered 50. Had the consolidation measure passed, 150 children in the Olden district would have grandchildren.

The plant was transferred to the Eastland district and Olden School properties would have become part of the newly consolidated district.

Both districts will continue to operate independently since Olden residents turned down the proposal.

Leon Plant History Told In TESCO Roundup Issue

Burl Hulsey started his career there. So did a long list of others around the company.

The Leon plant was a training ground for no telling how many employees during its years of generating electricity. People in the power department put their heads together and could name some 54 present employees who either worked there or ha dorked there at some time. And this doesn't include a number of retired employees who put in a stint at the plant.

Two plant superintendents of today, Larry Kinard at Morgan Creek and Jim Kuykendall at Graham, are past superintendents of Leon. Walter Payne of GO engineering and Paul Chaney of marketing also held down that spot once upon a time.

And now the Leon plant is no more. At least, as a generating unit. The building still stands. The two tall stacks still point skyward. But the last of five generating units is rapidly being dismantled.

Only a handful of employees remain. The others have been transferred to other jobs and plants around the system and those remaining will follow them soon.

The response of Leon plant employees to the necessity of

shutting down the plant has been most gratifying to me," President Hulsey said.

"They have cooperated in excellent spirit and with understanding to closing down the plant, even though a number of them have had to relocate with their families in other areas on our system."

It's rather sad to see the old soldier "fade away." Once the pride of the company's power system, the efficiency of the new generating units of today made it impractical and uneconomical to continue its operation.

The May 8, 1921 issue of the Dallas News carried pictures and an article about the plant and had this to say: "The recently completed master plan of the Oil Cities Power Company at Eastland comprises immense 10,000 horsepower turbine engines. It is said to be the largest engineering project of its kind, so far, in the Southwest, and the fourth largest in the United States. The lake will be known as Lake Leon and will be stocked with game fish and made into a place of recreation and amusement."

The company named in the article was one of the predecessors of Texas Electric Service Company, and the 10,000 horsepower included the two 3900 kilowatt generating units installed first.

The plant was built to supply power for the rapidly growing area around Eastland and Ranger in the midst of the oil boom days. It was later enlarged and had five generating units during its peak. A 7800 kw unit was added in 1923, a 7900 kw unit in 1925, and a 15,600 kw unit in 1928. The first three units were retired and removed in 1966, the fourth unit removed in 1967, and No. 5 shut down the end of May of this year and is being removed.

Ten employees still remain at the plant to see that activities are closed down in orderly fashion. They are M. K. Beazley, plant superintendent, J. L. Owen, L. D. Harris, E. M. Simpson, S. W. Herring, T. M. Alford, W. L. Wright, P. A. Orsco, D. R. Nicholas and W. J. Stone.

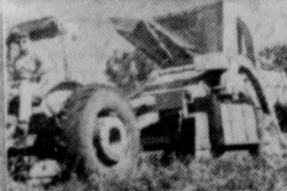

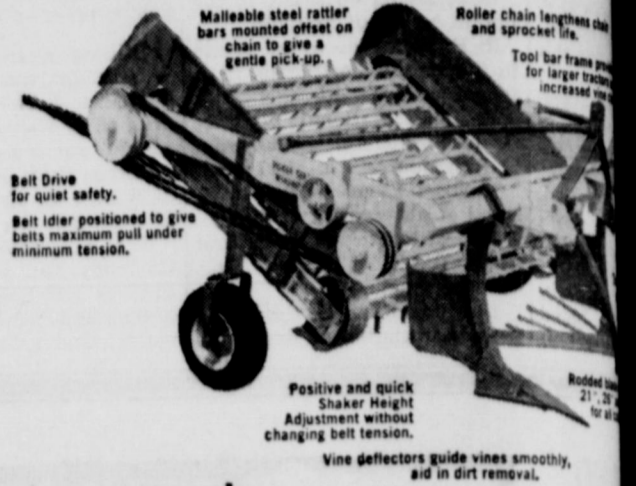

A reception was held at the church fellowship hall with both a bride and groom's table.

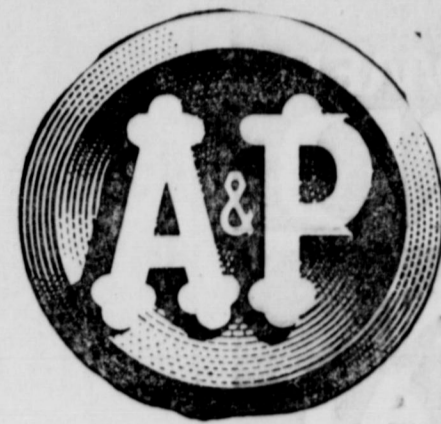

A search that began early Monday for Mike Stuart, 17-year old Scranton resident, centered in the Moran area Wednesday afternoon after authorities received reports that a youth fitting his description had been seen there late Monday.

The youth, who had enrolled last Friday as a junior at Cisco High School, has been missing since around 3:30 p. m. Sunday when he took his two dogs and left the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W B Stuart, to go coon hunting. The search started after he failed to return home Sunday night.

Cisco police were notified about 11:30 a. m. Tuesday that a Moran restaurant owner reported that a youth with the same description and with two dogs stopped at his place Monday afternoon and left after eating. Deputy Sheriff Loy Williams and others left shortly thereafter for Moran to search the area.

Mike, youngest of seven Stuart children, had been working on his car and did not change clothes before he left. He had a hunting knife,

a hand hatchet and a flashlight and left walking with the two dogs. He had planned to hunt north of Scranton in the wooded country between there and Interstate Highway 20. He was believed to have had money with him.

His family reported that Mike liked to hunt and frequently took the dogs for an afternoon's outing. He was a member of the CHS basketball team last year and was born and raised at Scranton.

A searching party was organized Monday morning by a group of Scranton area residents, including L. D. Clemens, Ray Battle, A. W. Harris, Bob Starr, Ples Ray and Lee Starr. Four men on horseback help patrol the wooded country.

Two Cisco airplanes, one with Lloyd McGrew and Don Miller aboard and another carrying James Cotton and Al Anderson, flew over some 200 square miles Monday, looking for the youth. City firemen, including Chief H. L. Ferguson, Odell Rains and Bobby Johnson, joined the search during the afternoon. Highway Patrolman Bob Rivers of Eastland assisted as did Cisco and county police.

Early Tuesday, three helicopters from Wolters Field, Mineral Wells, flew to Cisco. Lee Starr of Scranton met them at the airport and briefed the pilots on the mission. The machines then spent the morning flying over the Scranton area. They moved to the Moran area at noon.

A group of Eastland County National Guardsmen also

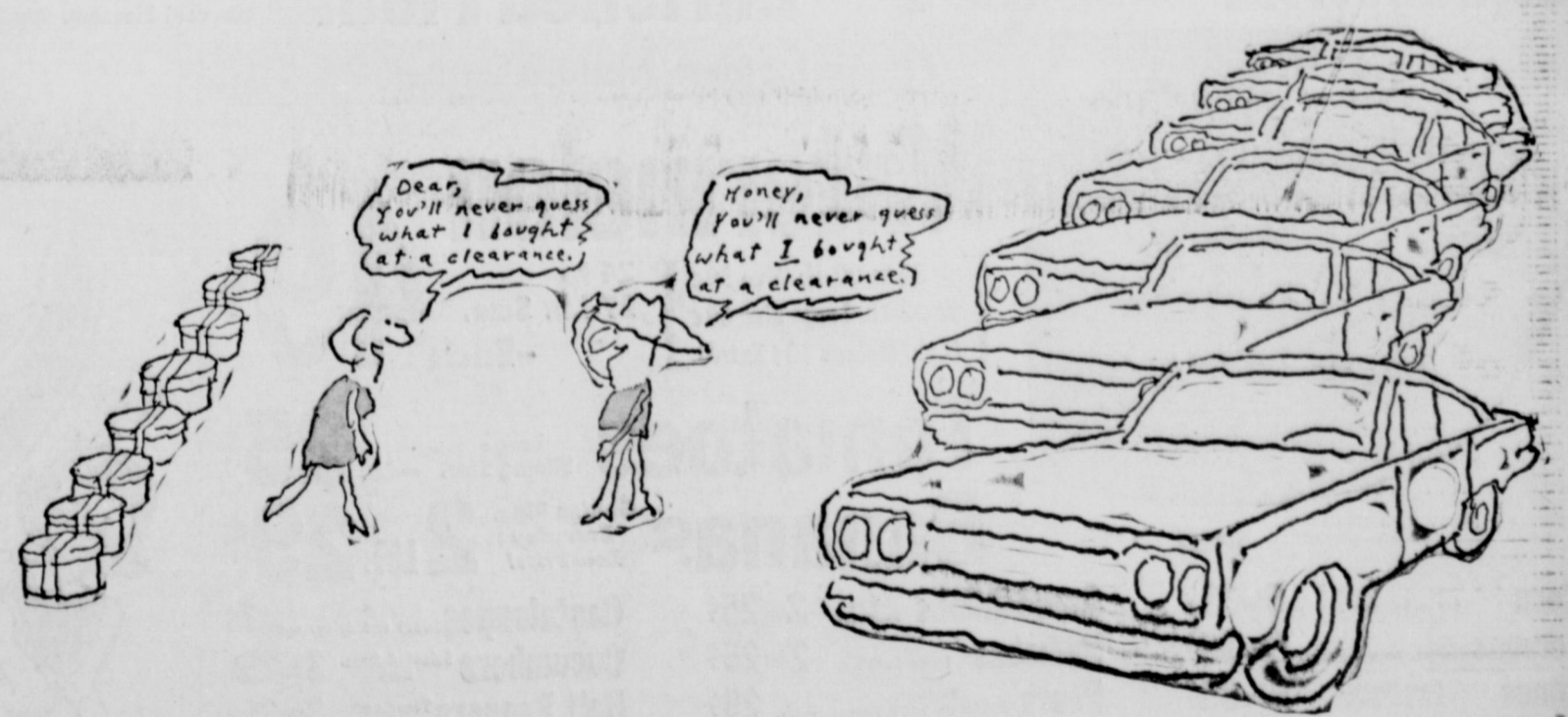
