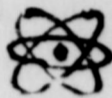

## Locally-Made 'Slip-of-a-Bra' Turns The Fashion World Up Side Down

And the brassiere-manufacturing plant in Eastland is well on its way — no, with one, but two top products on their way to the magic million mark. Both items are relatively new, and one is an outstanding new product that is literally "sweeping the lingerie" world, says Local Plant Manager John Whistler.

## 'MOVING' MAVERICKS



The item is a bra-slip, and Hollywood-Vassarette calls it the "Slip of a Bra". The trade journals are saying of the product: "Some women are hailing the bra-slip as the greatest boom since panty hose. This may seem rather excessive praise, but the bra-slip does alleviate some current fashion problems and offers convenience for the woman who doesn't like to fuss with her undergarments." As its name implies it's a combination of a bra and slip, and the production which began in May at the Eastland plant, is the first for the Vassarette division. Wholesale sales have already exceeded \$300,000. Whistler says, and production at the Eastland plant 7,500 dozen a week, is not keeping up with the demand. The plant has installed a new line and there are already 45 operators performing the some 21 operations necessary in the production of the new bra-slip.

## Scranton Youth Is Returned To Home Thursday

Four days and nights of wandering some 50 miles from Scranton to Woodson in Throckmorton County ended Thursday morning for Mike Stuart, 17-year old junior of Cisco High School, when authorities took him into custody. The youth had left home with two coon dogs last Sunday afternoon and a wide-spread search began Tuesday after he failed to return home. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Stuart of Scranton.

Deputy Sheriff Roy Kirby of Throckmorton took Mike into custody about 11 a. m. Thursday when the boy and his dogs showed up at Woodson. Mike broke loose, ran through a barber shop and out the back door and it was 1:30 before he was found again. He was taken to Throckmorton. Sheriff Jack Moberley of Albany and Mr. Stuart, who had gone there, went to Throckmorton and picked up the boy. Police Chief Clyde Brymer of Cisco met them back at Albany and brought Mr. Stuart and Mike to Moran where they left for their home at Scranton in the Stuart pickup. Mike told officers that he had enjoyed the four days and nights in the woods. He said that he had seen airplanes and helicopters but did not know they were looking for him.

Mike was first seen by Moran Tuesday afternoon when he went into two stores to buy food. He went to a store in Woodson to buy some fish hooks and had planned to return to the woods, and creeks. Deputy Sheriff Emory Morris of Moran assisted with the search for him in that area. Mike told officers that he hadn't meant to cause any trouble — he "was just leaving home." He added that he "might go back to school." He had three dogs instead of two when he went back home.

Mainstay of the local plant's work since its inception has been the bra, and a new style in this line, introduced six months ago and made exclusively in Eastland, has already topped the half-million dollar mark on its way to the million. It's a high-style bra that is selling fast. Overall the Eastland plant has added 77 employees since the first of June, and the trend continues with some 15 persons being added weekly. Right now there's right at 300 people employed and the production is topping 53,000 units (pieces) a week, Mr. Whistler reports.

The company has reached an all-time high payroll figure last week in excess of \$26,000 — that's up some \$7,000 since June. "We foresee this trend continuing," Mr. Whistler says, "and we're expecting 1,000 dozen production a day and 60,000 units a week."

This merchandise moves directly into the Dallas warehouses and finds its way to the consumer counters almost immediately. The company has during the past few weeks had excellent applicants and is well-pleased with the skill and calibre of its workforce. By nature, its employments increase has to be controlled in view of the training required to develop the ability necessary to turn out the quality product for which Hollywood-Vassarette is famous.

Production in the bra-slip line has increased some 60 per cent since July 15 (when the plant returned from vacation) and will be up by 100 per cent in a month, the manager said. Chief Engineer Marvin England and Head Mechanic John Honea were at the company's lingerie facility in Alabama last week to acquire information and techniques in the lingerie field for its expansion here. Several model designs are on the drawing boards in California right now, which will undoubtedly come to the Eastland plant in the future for production.

Vela Foster of Gorman, with the company here since 1952, is in charge of the bra-slip line. A New York fashion writer says this of the bra-slip: "The most obvious advantage" (Continued on page 2)

**Peanut Harvest Begins Already At Some Points**

Peanut harvest has already begun in Eastland County. I saw peanuts being harvested last week in the Kokomo area. The peanuts were being harvested because a disease called southern blight was ruining them. It seems that southern blight is causing much damage to peanuts this year. Some farmers are having to harvest early because the southern blight is causing peanuts to come off the vines.

Several home owners have reported having problems with their fruitless mulberry trees. The leaves have spots, turn yellow and eventually fall off the trees. This is very common to fruitless mulberry throughout the country. It is caused by Septoria leaf spot. This is a fungal disease of mulberry trees which is very damaging to the leaves in certain years.

I have mailed some of these leaves to the Extension Plant Pathologists. They suggest spraying with a Maneb type fungicide to control the leaf spot disease. Some of the trade names of Maneb are Manzate, Dithane M-22, MEB and MnEBD. The trees should be sprayed several times at two week intervals. Avoid wetting leaves on the trees when watering the lawn.

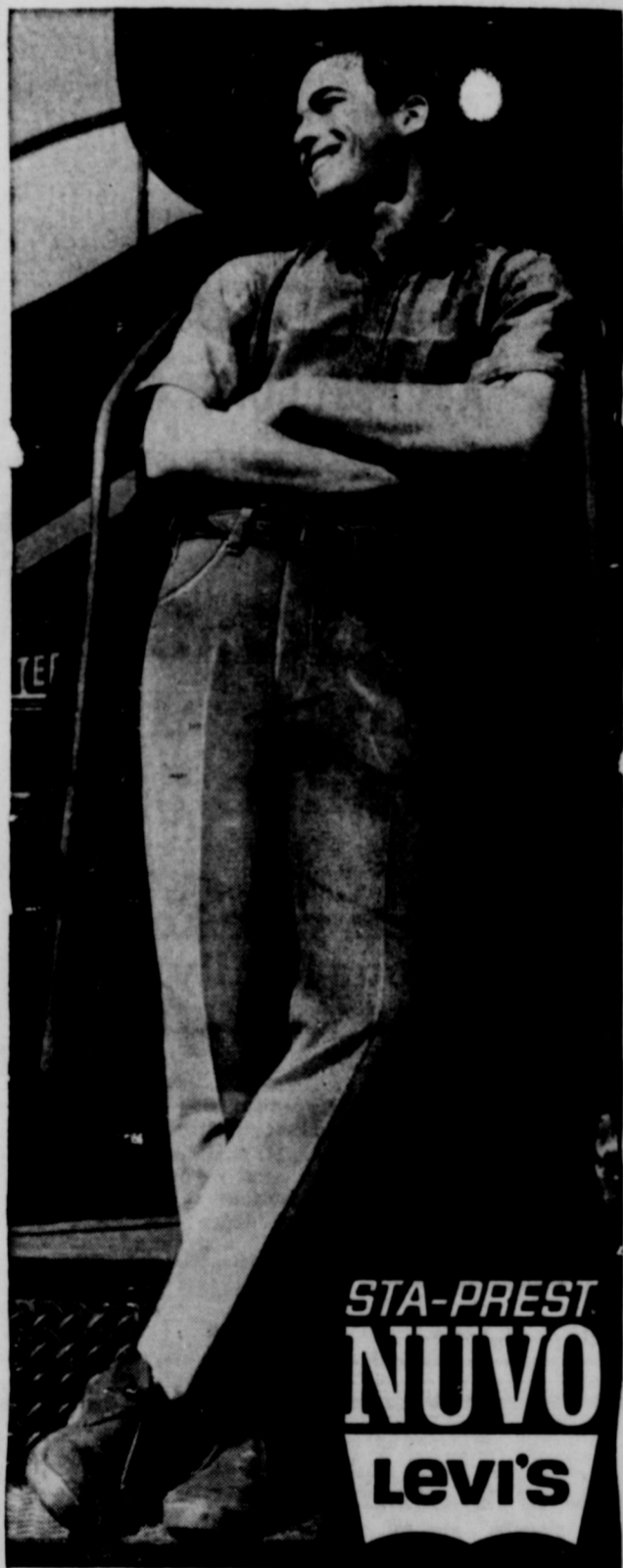

**"WHAT HAVE YOU DONE FOR YOUR TOWN LATELY?"**

"What Have You Done for Your Town Lately?" This was the subject of an address by Jack G. Springer, executive vice president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, at the recent annual convention of the West Texas Press Association in Abilene. This excerpt from his remarks is reprinted today for its general interest:

Cities are built, they don't just grow.

They are built by the people who live in the community. They are built by these people working voluntarily

together. Communities, like individuals, can have diseases. Before treatment can be prescribed for any disease, the disease itself must be recognized and diagnosed. Let me mention just a few of the more common types of these community disorders:

Civic egotism can be a civic disease. The people of the community are so proud of their community that they cannot recognize any of its needs. It's the "greatest little town in the world," with an abundance of everything that

industry needs," and there are no thought of additional paved streets or more water supply or more adequate health ordinances or improved schools in better facilities.

Civic Stagnation can be a civic disease. This ailment attacks the same organs of the community body as civic egotism, but the diagnosis and treatment are different. Here the people in the community who actually make the decisions do not want industry because it would upset their pay scales. They do not want better streets and schools and health conditions because that would mean higher taxes. They give lip service to progress but when it means voting a bond issue or more taxes or digging down into their gray flannel suits to support civic improvements, they look

out of the window. Don't hang a "Do Not Disturb" sign on the entrance of your community and expect it to grow.

Civic Apathy can be a community disease. This is perhaps the most deadly of all the diseases that find their way into the community economic stream. The people know they have problems, but it just isn't worth it to try to do anything about it. They know they have expansion possibilities, but a generation ago their fathers tried it and failed, so there is no use in making another effort. The store fronts are hopelessly out of date. The school buildings are old, inadequate and run-down. The few paved streets are worn out. Water is rationed in summer. The young people are all moving away, and population is declining. These are the marks of an apathetic community.

Civic Factionalism can be a community disease. Here the leadership of the community is split into two or more factions, and one faction opposes everything constructive the other faction initiates. If one faction says it is cloudy, the other will affirm it is clear, if one says a thing is black, the other will insist it is white.

The civic potential is sacrificed on the altar of selfishness. Group Control can be a community disease. Initiative is stifled in a community suffering from group control. By hook or crook, the leadership of the community is tightly held usually to the interest of those holding the leadership. The needs of "preferred customers" or the wills of "sacred cows" rather than the needs and opportunities of the community dictate community

decisions. There are other diseases, but these will illustrate the divisive influences of such forces at work in any community. Individually or in combination, they are mortal enemies of community unity, of community progress.

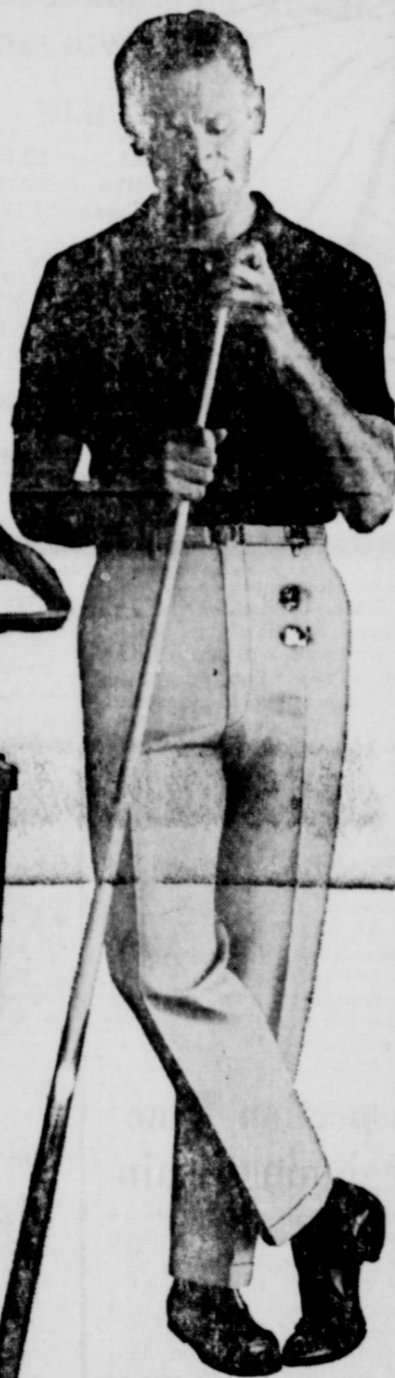

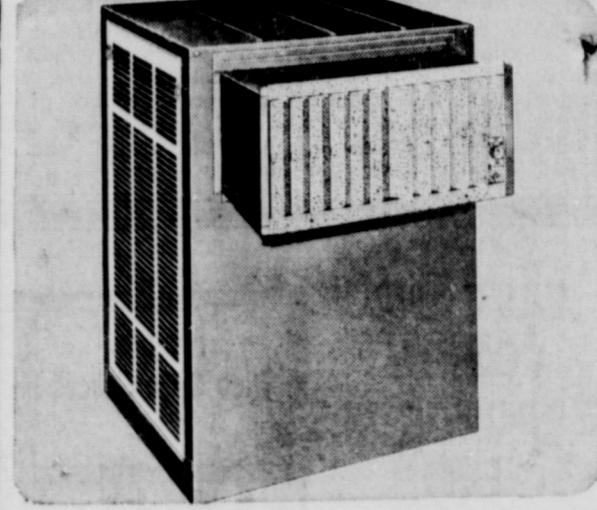

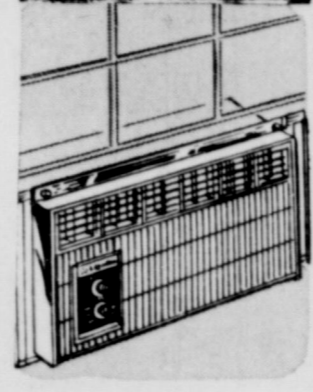

## Back-to-School Days Here Again

AUSTIN — Here it is back-to-school time, but for many children and parent's it's "first time to school." Occasionally, the first-time experience can be nerve-wracking, but it is always important. So says the Texas State Teachers Association (TSTA), which points out that the first few hours, days, and weeks are vital to a child's future in school. TSTA provides the following series of tips and information to help ease the first-time

school experience, and make it more productive.  
**Registrative Procedure**  
 Any child who is 6 years old on or before September 1 of the school year may be admitted to school. The child's birth certificate must be presented at the time of enrollment.  
 Some schools, in the interest of good health, require the child to be vaccinated against smallpox before enrollment. Also required may be immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough, and

tetanus.  
 Other information which may be needed is the name of the father, his occupation, where he works, and his phone number. The name and telephone number of the family doctor and hospital used may also be requested. Also helpful can be the address and the telephone numbers where parents can be reached in an emergency.  
 But such details are only part of the picture, and the parents form an important partnership with teachers in getting the child off to a good start.  
**How Parents Can Help**  
 It will help if the child has opportunities to be away from his mother for short periods before he starts to school.  
 The child should be taught the safest way home from school. Also teach him to go directly home from school without loitering on the way—and remind him not to go with strangers. Children should learn that policemen are their friends and can give them help when needed.  
 A child should have definite duties to perform at home, and it will be helpful if he can learn good listening habits.  
 He should get enough sleep. A good breakfast each morning will help start the school day right. So will making certain that he is happy before he leaves for school.  
 A child should learn to dress himself properly. He should be expected to respect the property rights of others, and should learn to do as much for himself as he is able to do. Habits of promptness, obedience, and respect for authority are also helpful.  
 Parents should show all interest in what the child has to tell about his work and play at school. Children need to be praised frequently, and to be made to feel successful. They should be encouraged to have playmates.  
 It is vital for the child to have confidence in his teacher. Remember that your attitude toward the school will be observed—and copied—by the child. Do not criticize school or teacher in the presence of the child. If there is a difficulty—conflict with another child, a difficult activity, a school rule the child does not understand—take the time to help solve the problem instead of just criticizing the situation.  
 To get a child ready for school, begin broadening his horizons even before that first day. Reading good books to him will help, as will taking him to places such as the zoo, park, and library.  
 Personal belongings of the child should be labelled.  
**Teachers As The Parents Partners**  
 Teachers will help your child experience opportunities for group work and play. They will help him grow in thinking for himself, and becoming interested in the world around him. At school he learns democratic living, and teachers will work to make him feel at ease in his school environment. Early days and weeks help build the foundation for future learning experiences.  
 Teachers want to learn as much as possible about each child. They are interested in his academic progress, relations with others, self-control, ability to concentrate, and response to suggestions.  
 The child's readiness for learning is directly related to varying rates of growth—physical, mental, social, and emotional. The teacher attempts to understand these factors for each child by observing his behavior in the classroom and on the playground. But the parent can also help by supplying teachers with this kind of information.  
 Teachers help develop the child's respect for people and property, self-reliance, dependability, effort, and cooperation. They are interested in his health.  
 The interest of school teachers and administration in your child is a continuing thing. A child with a cold, sore throat, fever, skin rash, or a sick stomach is better off at home than at school. But a written excuse may be needed when your child returns from an absence.  
 Also, if a child cannot take part in outdoor play, a note should be given the teacher.  
 When problems of any kind arise, the parent should feel free to discuss them with the child's teacher. But arrangements should be made in advance.  
**Parents Are Welcome At School**  
 As key partners in building the child's future, parents are

always welcome at school. It's better to stop by the administrative office first, where the principal will be pleased with a visit. You may also want to meet the teachers and the superintendent.  
 When it is necessary to bring a child's lunch or other supplies to school, they can be left with instructions at the school office. Classes should be interrupted while in session except by a call through the school office.  
 Joining the PTA and attending meetings gives a parent opportunities for meeting school personnel and working more closely with him.

### Inspection Time Beginning Again

AUSTIN—The 1969 vehicle inspection period began Sept. 1 in Texas, according to Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.  
 "More than six-million vehicles are expected to receive the compulsory inspection prior to the April 15, 1969 deadline," Speir said. Inspections may be performed at any of the almost 5,500 vehicle inspection stations in Texas, each of which displays the official vehicle inspection station sign. Texas law requires inspection of the brakes, lighting equipment, horns and warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment on the vehicle, steering (including power) not to include removal of the wheel from the vehicle) on all motor vehicles registered in the state. Special inspection provisions apply to trailers, semi-trailers, pole trailers or mobile homes having a loaded gross weight in excess of 4,000 pounds.  
 The minimum fee is \$1.75. This does not include the cost of repairs or adjustments necessary to enable the vehicle to pass inspection.  
 Speir said the new vehicle inspection sticker will be a two and one-half inch square replica of a DPS patrolman's badge with red background. Motorists are urged to have the 1969 inspection performed as soon as possible to insure that their vehicles are mechanically safe for fall and winter driving.

## Dove Season To Open Sept. 1st In This Region

Mourning doves in good supply are expected to be found by hunters as the new season begins for this region on Sunday, Sept. 1. Good rains most of the year produced a good supply for the birds.

Statewide, the dove crop was believed to be about 12 per cent less than normal.

Locally, the birds were more plentiful recently than now due to late feed crops here. The doves have been migrating to areas where fall grain crops are already ripe.

Shooting hours will be from 12 noon (CST) to sunset. Daily bag limit is 12 birds with a possession limit of 24. Shotguns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity and may not be larger than ten gauge. Hunting doves with rifles is prohibited. The season ends Oct. 31.

A hunting license is required unless you hunt in your home county. New hunting and fishing license are required after Aug. 31.

**"WHAT HAVE YOU DONE FOR YOUR TOWN LATELY?"**

"What Have You Done for Your Town Lately?" This was the subject of an address by Jack G. Springer, executive vice president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, at the recent annual convention of the West Texas Press Association in Abilene. This excerpt from his remarks is reprinted today for its general interest:

Cities are built, they don't just grow. They are built by the people who live in the community. They are built by these people working voluntarily together.

Communities, like individuals, can have diseases. Before treatment can be prescribed for any disease, the disease itself must be recognized and diagnosed. Let me mention just a few of the more common types of these community disorders:

Civic egotism can be a civic disease. The people of the community are so proud of

their community that they cannot recognize any of its needs. It's the "greatest little town in the world," with an abundance of everything that industry needs, and there are no thought of additional paved streets or more water supply or more adequate health ordinances or improved schools in better facilities.

Civic Stagnation can be a civic disease. This ailment attacks the same organs of the community body as civic egotism, but the diagnosis and treatment are different. Here the people in the community who actually make the decisions do not want industry because it would upset their pay scales. They do not want better streets and schools and health conditions because that would mean higher taxes. They give lip service to progress but when it means voting a bond issue or more taxes or digging down into their gray flannel suits to support civic improvements, they look

out of the window. Don't hang a "Do Not Disturb" sign on the entrance of your community and expect it to grow. Civic Apathy can be a community disease. This is perhaps the most deadly of all the diseases that find their way into the community economic stream. The people know they have problems, but it just isn't worth it to try to do anything about it. They know they have expansion possibilities, but a generation ago their fathers tried it and failed, so there is no use in making another effort. The store fronts are hopelessly out of date. The school buildings are old, inadequate and run-down. The few paved streets are worn out. Water is rationed in summer. The young people are all moving away, and population is declining. These are the marks of an apathetic community.

Civic Factionalism can be a community disease. Here the leadership of the community is split into two or more factions, and one faction opposes everything constructive the other faction initiates. If one faction says it is cloudy, the other will affirm it is clear, if one says a thing is black, the other will insist it is white. The civic potential is sacrificed on the altar of selfishness.

Group Control can be a community disease. Initiative is stifled in a community suffering from group control. By hook or crook, the leadership of the community is tightly held usually to the interest of those holding the leadership. The needs of "preferred customers" or the wills of "sacred cows" rather than the needs and opportunities of the community dictate community decisions.

There are other diseases, but these will illustrate the divisive influences of such forces at work in any community. Individually or in combination, they are mortal enemies of community unity, of community progress.

**Oil Industry Is Chief Source Of State Tax Money**

DALLAS — Texas' petroleum industry continued to be a chief source of revenue for the state's public education program during 1967. The industry, according to a new publication of Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, in 1967 paid for 29 percent of the state's cost of public education, 57 percent of the state cost of teacher retirement.

The publication — "68 In Informative Facts" — states that the oil and gas industry last year paid \$262 million in state taxes, an \$18 million increase over 1966.

The annual compilation of industry statistics, released Saturday, further states that: Texas production taxes on oil raised \$140.6 million, up \$9.6 million over 1966, while production taxes on gas totaled \$78.3 million, up \$4.3 million over 1966 figures.

The Texas petroleum industry taxes account for 21.8 percent of all state taxes.

The state's petroleum industry pays 30 percent of the state franchise tax; 37 percent of state property taxes.

The Texas Permanent School Fund in 1967 received \$35.4 million from the petroleum industry for lease rentals, bonuses and royalty payments; total since 1932 — \$655 million.

The University of Texas Permanent Fund received \$16.8 million in petroleum lease rentals, bonuses and royalty in 1967; total since 1924 — \$491 million.

The Association's leaflet also points out that Texas became the nation's leading petroleum producer in 1928. It adds that the state has produced 30.9 billion barrels of oil, 36.1 percent of the U. S. total, and Texas has derived

\$69.6 billion from crude oil sales.

Other items of interest in "68 Facts" include the following:

Oil is produced in 199 Texas counties... Texas has 5,600 oil producing firms... Texas has 207,446 producing oil wells in 3,708 fields... To prevent pollution, each day Texas oil men put over 5 million barrels of oil field salt water

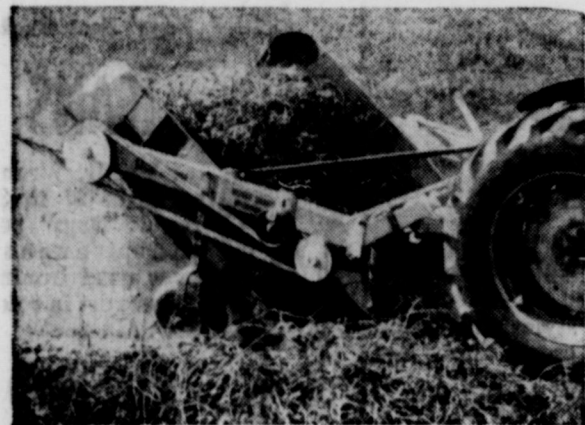

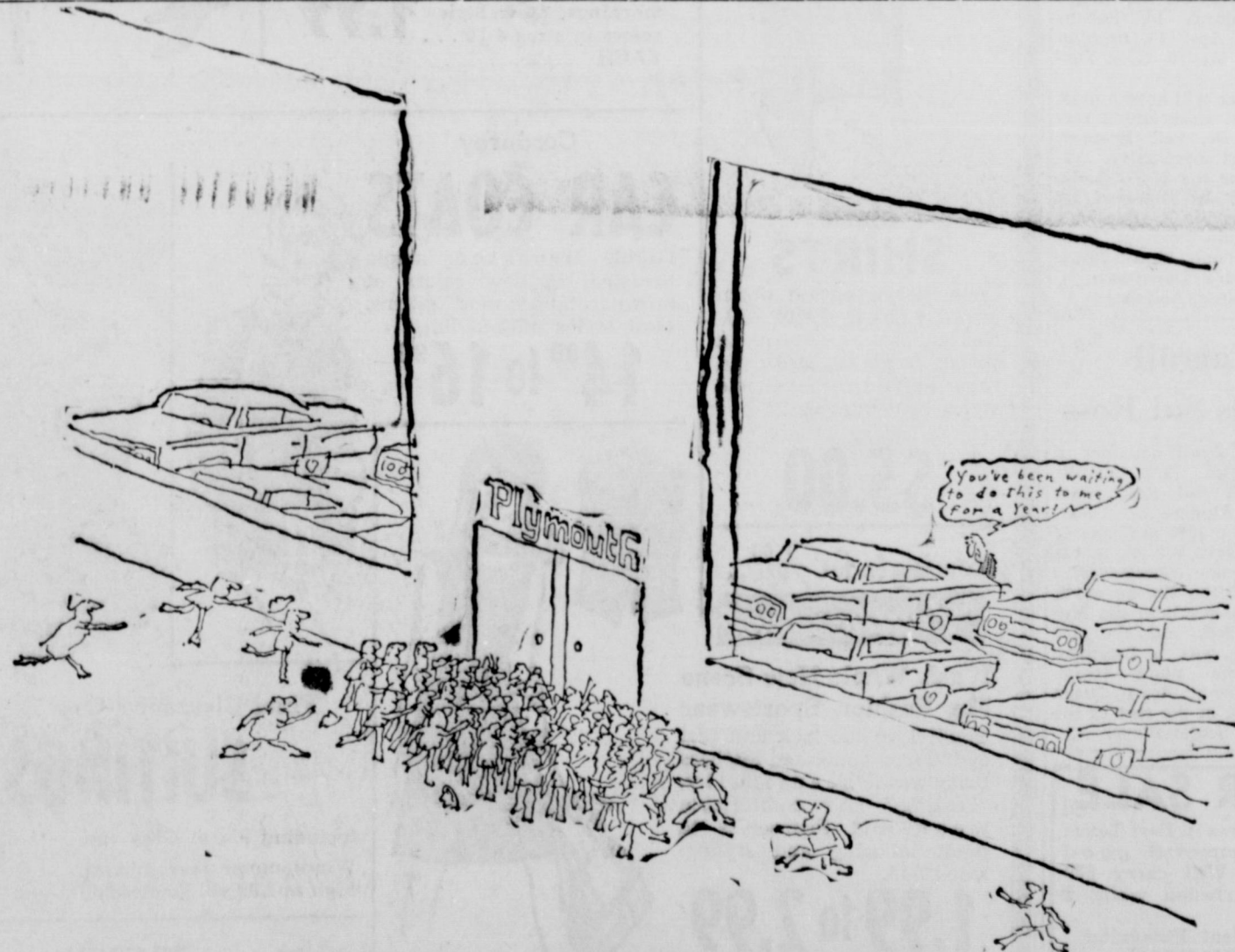

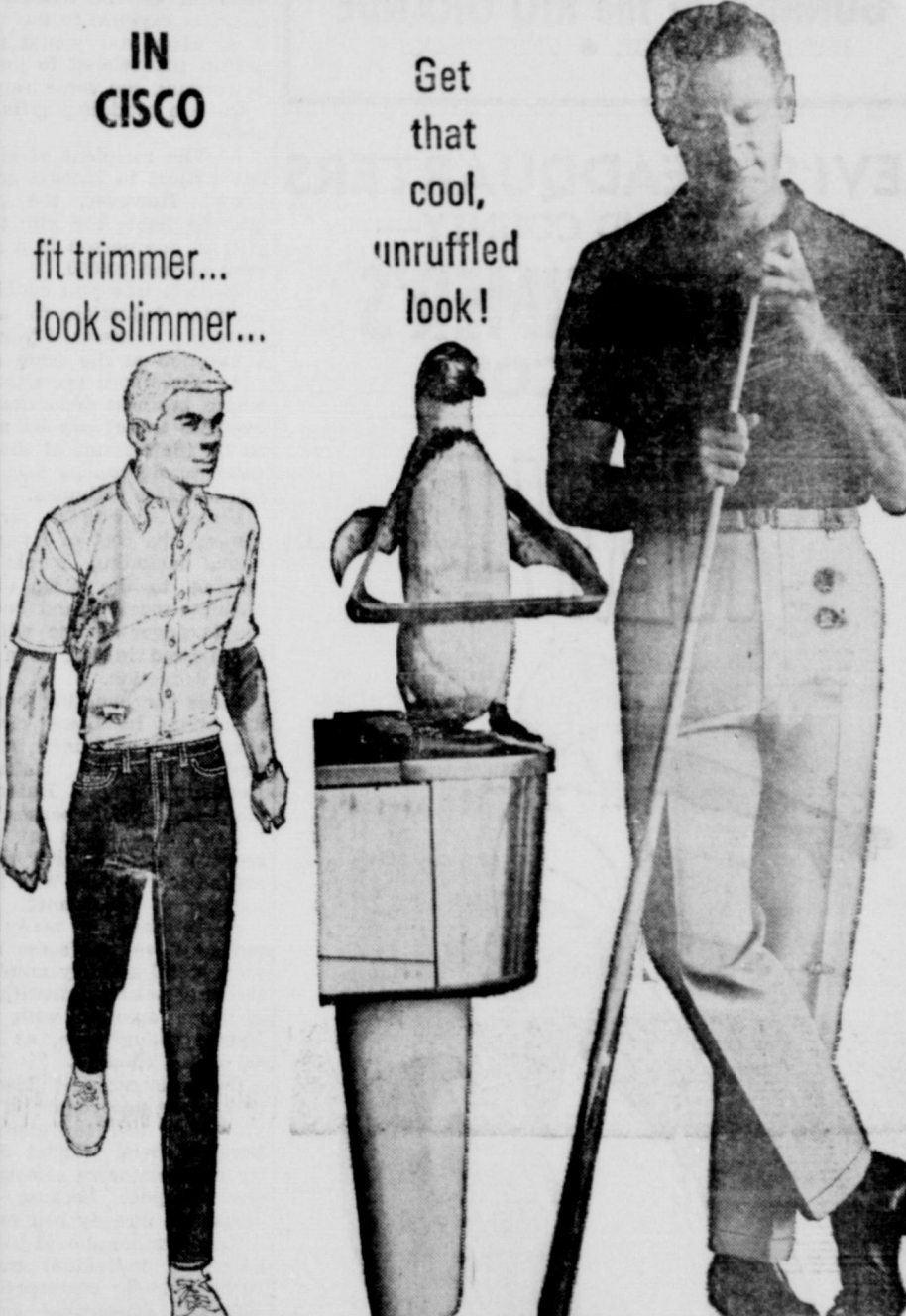

## Blind Dog Poses Real Problem To Cisco Family Leaving For India

What to do with a blind collie dog is one big problem facing the Dennis Johnson family as the young Cisco Church of Christ minister prepares to move to India for missionary work.

The dog, which looks like Lassie of movies and television and answers to that name at the Johnson household, is about 16 months old and was obtained by the family as a puppy. Lassie was a big favorite with the three Johnson children before they determined that she was totally blind.

Mrs. Johnson reported that she and the children — Cecelia, 13, Brett, 5, and Ferah, 2 — have agreed that they will have a veterinary "put Lassie to sleep" if they cannot find a good home for her before Sept. 7, which is the deadline in their planning.

"If we can't be sure that somebody will take Lassie and care for her as we have, we would rather have her dead than mistreated," Mrs. Johnson said.

Mr. Johnson preached his final sermon as minister of the 8th Street Church of Christ in Cisco on Sunday, Aug. 25, and he is busy with plans to take his family to Madaras, India, to attend a language school prior to beginning his missionary work.

Plans call for the family to sail from New York City on October 1. They are hurrying with preparations as India recently decreed that all foreign missionaries must leave that country three years hence.

Mrs. Johnson, who shares her husband's enthusiasm for their India plans, is a native of Clarendon in the Texas Panhandle. She and Mr. Johnson met while they were students at Abilene Christian College. He is 31 years old.

Anyone interested in Lassie was invited to contact the family in Cisco. The dog is normal in all respects except for blindness. She gets around nicely in familiar surroundings but needs time to learn where things are in new places.

"The children love her and would dearly like to have her go with us," Mrs. Johnson said. "But that is impossible. We certainly hope that somebody will take her and love and enjoy her as we have."

## TAXPAYERS ASK?

Q—My daughter is going to help out in my store this summer. Do I treat her as any other employee for tax purposes?

A—Yes, her salary is subject to the same withholding requirements as your other employees if she is 21 or over. If she is under 21, then you withhold just income tax and not social security.

The salary you pay your daughter can be treated as a business expense to the extent it is what you would pay a person not related to you for performing the same services.

Q—Are wedding gifts taxable?

A—The recipient of gifts is not subject to income or gift taxes. However, the giver may be liable for gift tax if gifts to one person in a single year exceed \$3,000.

Q—Is it true you could lose your tax deductions for a business trip overseas if you take a vacation at the same time?

A—Yes, there are situations where business deductions for overseas travel can be affected by the amount of time devoted to sightseeing and other non-business activities.

Under certain circumstances, the cost of transportation, including meals and lodging, to the place of the business meeting and back to the taxpayer's home will not be allowed in full as a business deduction.

Rules for handling business deductions in these circumstances are explained in Publication No. 463, "Rules for Deducting Travel, Entertainment and Gift Expenses."

Q—A mistake in my social security number held up my refund for weeks. Why is this number so important?

A—Because so many taxpayers have the same name, your social security number is the only positive identification of your account with IRS. Names change, too, as marital status changes.

Congress passed a law several years ago requiring individuals to use tax identification numbers. Social Security numbers were selected for this purpose because most taxpayers already had one.

This number should be placed on all individual tax returns filed, correspondence with IRS concerning returns, payments for tax liabilities and similar documents. The number should also be given to corporations and savings institutions to identify dividend and interest payments.

Q—We're going to a benefit dinner for a charitable organization. Won't this cost be deductible?

A—The cost of the tickets will be deductible to the extent it exceeds the value of the food and entertainment you receive. If the value of the meal and entertainment is not indicated on the tickets, the sponsors of the event should be able to tell you.

Q—When do I have to pay Social Security tax for my maid?

A—The quarterly payment for the months of April, May and June is due July 31. Use Form 942, "Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees," a self-mailer, to file and pay this tax. This tax is due when cash wages of \$50 or more are paid to a household employee during a calendar quarter.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—San Antonio's HemisFair is more than just San Antonio's. It is Texas, the Nation's, the Western Hemispheres and the Worlds.

By reason of it having been approved by the International Exposition Headquarters in Paris, it is international.

It is most impressive in all the ways that fairs may impress people but it makes impressions in more simple terms.

Some of those who are not Texans and lacking in bias, which those of us from Texas may have, are quick to comment upon the orderliness, its cleanliness, its courtesy, its lack of ballyhoo, which might otherwise be expected.

There is, however, one critical note. It has come under attack from numerous sources. It is the controversy of the film "Confluence USA" at the United States Pavilion. What does that mean? A

coming together of peoples, a joining of forces—everything, nothing - but officials of the Department of Commerce, the Agency under whose jurisdiction comes exhibitions, fairs and expositions, say that world's fair films are not suppose to mean, they are suppose to be, like laughter or morning dew." When Mrs. Lyndon Johnson saw the film she is quoted as saying "It lacks the element of hope." Former Ambassador Ed Clark, now Commissioner of the United States Pavilion at HemisFair, said they had to pass up a thousand good things in America to fine one of its bad things to show."

Not all officials of our government nor our citizens think it is bad. Some view it as a great film that just sweeps down on you and says Look America—Look what you are doing to yourself." At a bend in the corridor on leaving the theatre, you see yourself on television with the caption "Are you a part of the problem?" and at the next turn another television picture of yourself above which is, "Are you a part of the solution?"

This comes about because after the film has shown many wonders of the United States - its great productive capacity, its beauties of nature, its enterprising people, its great flowing rivers and lakes, majestic peaks waving fields of grain to feed millions in the world, its pulsing industry - comes the seamy side. It shows hunger and want, poor people and the disadvantaged, streams polluted by the refuse of our industrial plants, as well as the air from automobiles and smoke stacks. It shows dead automobiles covering acres in junkyards; a newly married couple spend most of the day and night stuck in a freeway traffic jam in some great city.

The controversy, simply stated, is why show the bad or seamy" side of America and does it mean that to not show it is a denial it exists?

Several years ago, when Edgar R. Murrow was appointed Director of the United States Information Agency for our Government's propaganda overseas, he introduced the idea that we should portray America exactly as it is to foreign peoples. When questioned on this policy his reply was that we must not deny to foreigners that we do not have problems and that to honestly reveal them would be greater

**Crime Rate Is Up In Texas In Past 6 Months**

AUSTIN—Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said this week the Texas crime rate for the first six months of 1968 is running about 15 percent over the rate recorded for the same period in 1967.

Speir said information provided by sheriffs and chiefs of police and compiled by the DPS indicates an increase in each of the seven major crime categories. For example, murders and homicides were up nearly 9 percent; rape, up nearly 14 percent; robbery, up about 14 percent; burglary, up nearly 22 percent; aggravated assault, up nearly 6 percent; theft, up about 12 percent; and auto theft, up nearly 24 percent.

"In the January through June period, major crimes occurred in Texas on the average of one every 1 1-2 minutes," Speir noted. "This generally figures out to be a murder every 7 1 -2 hours, a rape every 4 3-4 hours, a robbery every 1 1-2 hours, a burglary every 5 1-2 minutes, an aggravated assault every 26 minutes, a theft every 2 1-2 minutes, and an auto theft every 18 1/2 minutes," he added.

The overall crime rate increased about 15 percent in the state's urban areas and almost 11 per cent in rural areas. It was up about 17 percent in cities over 100,000 population, up about 7 percent in cities between 50,000 and 100,000, up almost 9 percent in cities between 25,000 and 50,000, up almost 15 percent in cities between 10,000 and 25,000, up 25 percent in cities between 5,000 and 10,000, but up only about 1 percent in cities between 2,500 and 5,000 population.

The largest rural increase came in counties with over 5 rural population per square mile, and was tabulated at almost 34 percent. The overall crime rate decreased by almost 20 percent in counties with from 20 to 35 rural population per square mile and decreased about 3 percent in counties with under five rural population per square mile.

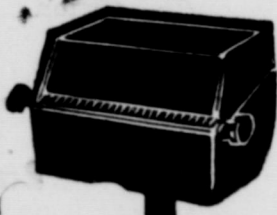

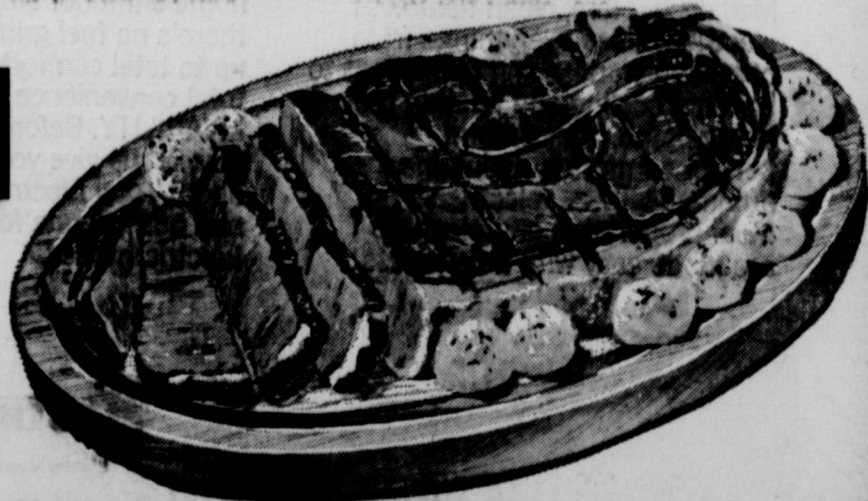

Mrs. Arlin Bint of Cisco has been employed by Project FIND, a community action program designed to locate and serve the elderly in this area.

Mrs. Gordon Griffin of Brownwood is coordinator for the project including Brown, Comanche, Eastland and Callahan counties.

The project encourages and organizes the elderly to give expression to their needs and aspirations, and facilitates their involvement in social action and self-help programs.

Leadership talents are sought out, trained and channelled into service on behalf of the community. Employment opportunities will be created and provided for elderly residents of the community for parttime jobs and unpaid volunteer services from those who wish to help with the program.

When appropriate, the project will refer individuals to existing health, welfare, employment, housing, legal aid, recreation or other services. FIND will also take responsibility for expediting such referrals and for facilitating the relationship between the older person and the agency providing the service.

Project FIND is a pilot program designed to serve senior citizens 60 years or older. The Project is composed of a 16 county area in central Texas which has a percentage of 20.3 percent of the population

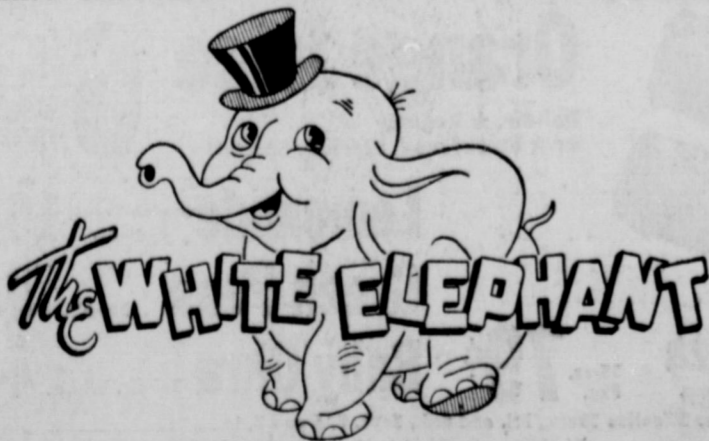
