## Three Cities Bid for County's Pecan Show

Three cities extended invitations to the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association as the 1968 winter show site at a luncheon Friday during the annual fall orchard tour. The meeting was held at Rising Star.

Representatives of the Chambers of Commerce in Cisco, Eastland and Ranger were present to ask pecan men to come to their cities. The Cisco bid was made by CofC, Eastland's by Tom Staggs of the CofC Special Events Committee, and Ranger's by Ben Freeman, veteran pecan man.

Postcard ballots will go out with in a week or ten days to all members of the association whose dues were paid by Sept. 13. The city receiving the most votes will be designated as the show site. The show will be held Dec. 13 and 14.

Anton White of Cisco, presided at the luncheon. County Agent De Gordon is the secretary. He introduced guests, including Dr. J. W. Worthington and Tom Denman of the Stephenville Experiment Station and Jerral D. Johnson, plant pathologist of the Texas A&M Extension Service, and County Agent George Blackburn of Breckenridge.

The tour began Friday morning at the Fred Perkins Orchard, 11 miles south of Cisco. Mr. Perkins, a retired military man, bought the orchard of some 300 trees two years ago. Some of the trees are 30 years old. The orchard had been neglected for 11 years and Perkins at first considered plowing it up.

Besides following proper plowing, fertilizing and insect spraying programs, Perkins has top worked nearly half of the trees and will have a fair crop this year. The experiment station men pointed out that "this is a fine example of what good practices can do in an old orchard."

Perkins, who recently completed college studies, has accepted a position in the leather department at Boss Manufacturing Co., Cisco, to supplement his income while he gets his orchard into good production.

Next, the tour stopped at the C. T. Barton, orchard, near Pioneer, to see his 106 huge improved trees on 15 acres. The trees are 30 years old and Barton has been there since 1944. He uses 10-20-10 fertilizer and drills it in during late winter. He also uses disytion to control aphids and other insect problems. A good crop is in prospect.

Following lunch, the tour went to the 65-acre C. E. Smith orchard at Rising Star. An extension service experiment has been underway there since spring, using four types of fungicides. The results were noted and explained by Mr. Johnson.

Mr. Smith, who has been on the place since 1948, has some 800 trees, mostly Burkets. He uses 13-13-13 fertilizer that is put out in late February. He plows as soon as he can after rains and plants no cover crops. He uses disytion to control honey dew as well as bugs. He has a normal crop.

County Agent Gordon said that the county's over-all pecan crop outlook is above average.

Guests were present from Cisco, Eastland, Abilene, Ranger, College Station, Lubbock, Stephenville, De Leon, Scranton, Cross Plains, Clyde, and Cisco.

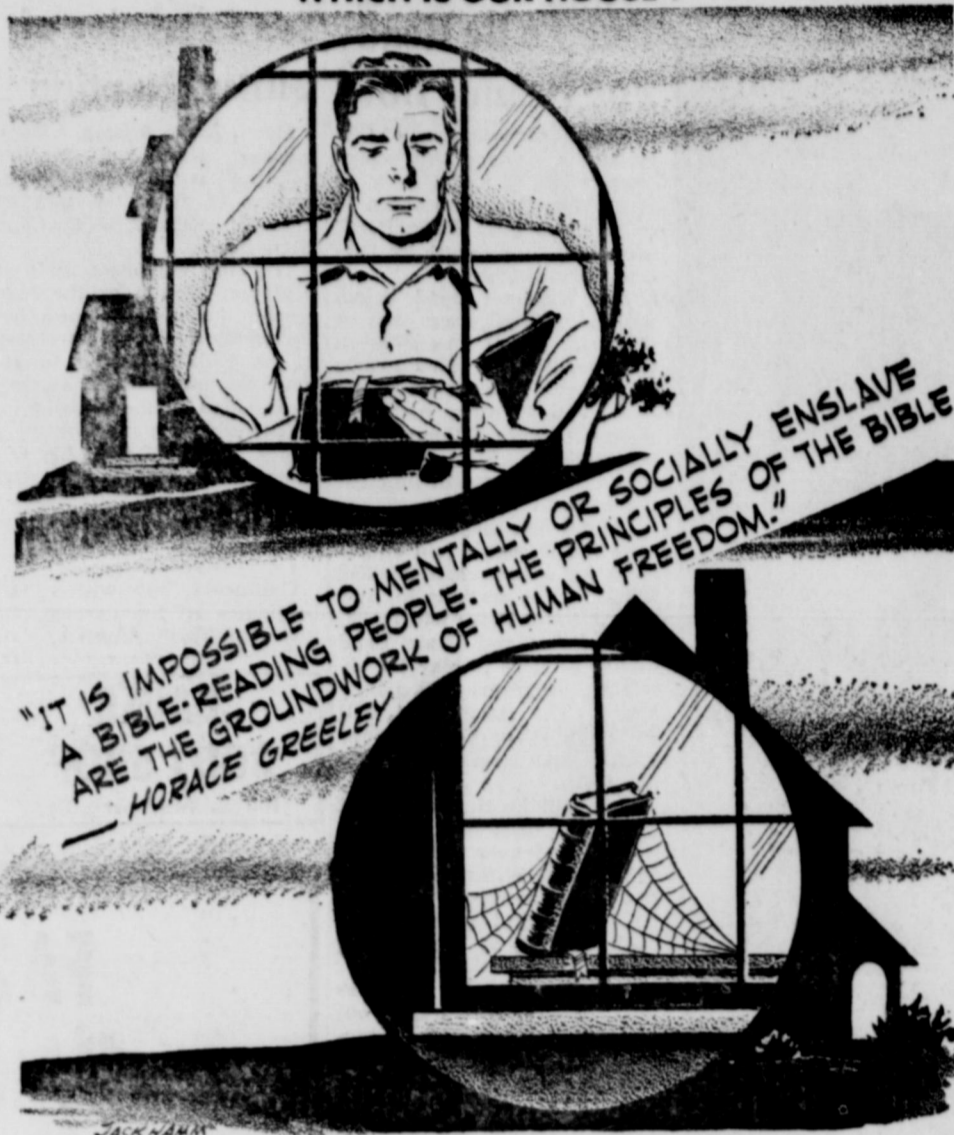

"Be It Proclaimed that the citizens of this city observe the week of Sept. 17-23 as Constitution Week and dedicate themselves to the task of preserving the freedoms that this document guarantees for us all."

## Sept. 18 Is Deadline To Cast Votes In ASC Committee Poll

Farmers have been reminded that Sept. 18 is the last date for turning in a ballot in the election of community ASC committeemen.

Robert G. Lyerla, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, explained that ballots were mailed to eligible voters of record; they must be returned to the county ASCS office — by mail or in person — not later than Sept. 18.

Qualified voters in the election are farmers who are eligible to take part in one or more of the farm programs which the committee administers. Lists of eligible voters in each community are available for public inspection in the ASCS County Office.

Anyone who believes that he is eligible to vote but who has not received a ballot is urged to get in touch with the ASCS office to request a ballot. Eligibility to vote is not restricted by reason of sex, race, color, religion or natural origin.

For each community where an election is being held, three regular committee members and two alternates

will be elected. Members of the elected community ASC committee will serve as delegates to the county convention, where farmers will be elected to fill vacancies on the county ASC committee. The county convention will be held

on Sept. 25, Commissioner's Courtroom.

Mr. Lyerla urged farmers to be sure to sign the statement on the back of the outside envelope containing the plain envelope with the ballot for the community committee election. This statement is a certification that the ballot was marked by the farmer personally without undue influence by any person. The

ballot will not be counted unless the statement is signed. Ballots will be tabulated in the ASCS office on September 19 and is open to the public.
