Bulldogs, Mavs To Clash For 46th Time Friday

The Ranger Bulldogs will be playing the tough rival team of the Eastland Mavericks here in the second non-conference game of the year at 8 p. m. Friday in the Bulldog Stadium.

In last years encounter with the Mavericks, the Bulldogs won by a close margin of 14-6. The Mavericks won their first game of the season last week by defeating the Cross Plains Buffaloes 57-12.

The records show the Bulldogs have defeated the Mavericks 33 times in the last 46 years that the teams have met. El Paso Resident Dies In Auto Collision Sat.

Thomas Tolson, 33, resident of EEl Paso was fatally injured in a two-car collision on rain slick Highway 80 West in Ranger shortly before noon Saturday. Tolson died five minutes after being taken to Ranger General Hospital.

His wife, Janyth, 30, was treated for injuries and released from the hospital. The collision occurred when the westbound 1968 Mustang driven by Tolson went into a spin, colliding with a pick-up truck driven by Larry Dean Hale, 16, of Morton.

Hale's parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Hale of Morton, occupants of the pickup were taken Saturday evening to a Lubbock hospital. Mrs. Hale sustained a fractured pelvis, fractured wrist and dislocated hip. Her husband suffered cuts and bruises. Young Hale was not injured.

Plans for the 9th annual Eastland County Peanut Bowl program were nearing completion today as Jaycees and civic leaders were busy with the finishing touches. Tuesday night's queen contest was the first official event.

The Bowl program will begin with a street parade in downtown Eastland at 3 p. m. Saturday followed by the football bowl battle between the junior colleges of Cisco and Ranger at Maverick Stadium in Eastland. A capacity crowd was expected. Tickets were reported to be selling well in Eastland, Ranger and Cisco.

The parade promised to be unusually interesting this year with the appearance of Diane Huggins of Nacogdoches — Miss Texas of 1968 — in the Saturday parade and at the football game. Rangers Are Ready For Kickoff In Bowl Contest at Eastland Saturday

Although they are an underdog again this year, the Ranger Junior College Rangers expect to give a good account of themselves in the annual Peanut Bowl football battle at 8 p. m. Saturday at Eastland.

Coach Ken Pair who is new to the team reported that his squad was in good condition with only a few injuries. His team will be a little lighter than Cisco's and will depend on speed. A squad roster appears elsewhere in this edition. The team lists 21 sophomores.

The Rangers will use the pro set and wing "T" formations on offense. Gary Chandler 195-pound sophomore from Stephenville, will be the field general and handle the passing and the punting. Tackle Joe Slaton will help with the punting if needed. Kickoffs and PATs will be handled by End Robert Jackson and HB Harry Mathis.

Coach Pair, who played football at Stephen F. Austin College, is assisted by Brod Campbell. They have a 3-man squad. Probable starters were listed as follows: Chandler, quarterback; Bill Cherry and Jack Martin and backups at Greg McCoy at fullback; end Search Anderson and Robe Jackson; tackles, Bill Payne and Joe Slaton; guards, B. Thacker and James Pillar; at center, Joe Sandejar.

Cisco Junior College expects to have a large delegation of fans and students at Eastland for the annual Peanut Bowl football game between their Wranglers and the Rangers of Ranger Junior College, according to President Leland Willis.

This will be the 9th annual meeting of the two teams in the Eastland County Bowl, and Cisco has a 7-to-1 advantage as Ranger won the first game and Cisco has won ever since. The game will start at 8 p. m. Saturday at Maverick Stadium.

Coach Jim Puryear of CJC, who has been the winning coach in all of the Peanut Bowl games (He was at Ranger the first year and has been at Cisco ever since), reported that his Wranglers will be at top speed for the game. His 33-man squad is made up of 14 sophomores and 19 freshmen, and five first-year men are probable starters.

Director Eris Ritchie reported that his 45-man Wrangler Band was ready for the season's opener and expected to wear their brand new uniforms (if they arrived as expected). Drum majors will be Randy Haynes of Burleson and Pat Jenkins of Hamlin. This will be the band's first year as a marching outfit.

The 40-girl drill team — the Wrangler Belles — also are ready to go, according to Mrs. George Owens, director. The Belles are headed by Noree Blanchard of Grand Saline and Jann Cook of Breckenridge. Co-captains, and Janice Allison of Bridgeport, Lynn Glover of Breckenridge and Susie Morgan of Cisco as lieutenants.

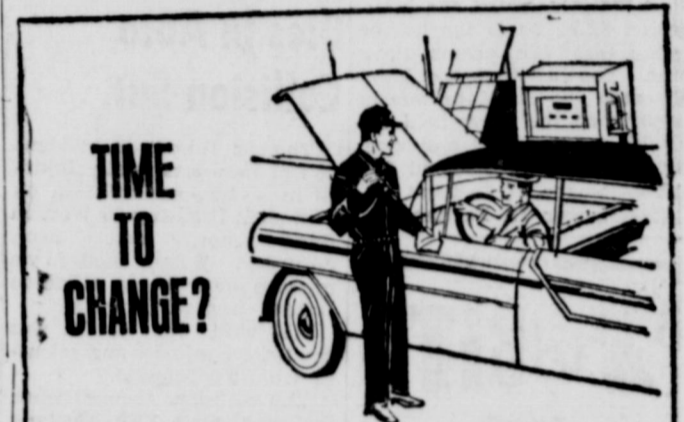

The GARDON SPOT

I had a nice visit with Herman and Dora Schaefer of Nimrod last week. They reminded me that the date of the annual Nimrod barbecue is Sept. 23. This is an event to which people from all parts of Eastland County and adjoining counties look forward. About two or three hundred people usually attend this enjoyable event.

Herman also said he had two border collie-pups to give away. If someone would like to raise a good stock dog, they should see Herman.

A 4-H club beef calf field day is being planned for Saturday, Sept. 14. The field day will be held at the Eastland County show barn. Three speakers will discuss selecting calves, feeding, grooming, showing calves and health of the calves. Families will bring picnic lunches for the noon meal. After lunch the 4-H members will exhibit their calves. This will give the boys and girls an opportunity to learn some techniques of showing their calves.

The critical screwworm situation in Texas has not improved. During a two weeks period from July 28 to Aug. 10 a total of 361 screwworm cases were reported in Texas. This compares to only 25 cases for the same period in 1967 and 4 in 1966. Most of the cases are confined to South Texas, but the destructive insect could hit Eastland County any time.

Tweating all dehorned, sheared or castrated animals with approved screwworm "dope", coupled with close observation of livestock can keep this profit-robbing out of Eastland County.

Ten scholarships of \$500 each are still available to 1968 high school graduates planning to major in range management at any one of five Texas schools.

I would urge any high school graduate interested in a range management career to see me and fill out an application as soon as possible. There are a lot of good jobs offered to college graduates who major in Range Management.

Five colleges are participating in the program. They are Texas A&M, Texas Tech, Sul Ross State College, Abilene Christian College and Southwest Texas State College.

Funds for the scholarships are provided by the Moody Foundation of Galveston. The sponsor is the Texas Section of the American Society of Range Management.

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Jazz Band Concert Is Set At CJC Sept. 24

A quintet of musicians, all born at the turn of the century and with an insight into pre-Dixieland New Orleans

jazz will appear in concert Tuesday, Sept. 24, at 8 p. m. at the Cisco Junior College Harrell Fine Arts Auditorium. They are the Preservation Hall Jazz Band, old-time Negro performers with their roots in the music of the marching funeral band, the days of Jelly Roll Morton and Bix Beiderbeck, and the early New Orleans history of Storyville and the French Quarter.

Featuring Billie and DeDe Pierce on piano and trumpet, the group also includes Jim Robinson on the trombone, or

"sliphorn," William Humphrey Jr. as clarinetist, and drummer Josiah "Cie" Frazier, all musicians who were brought up in the great, warm swinging rhythms of the Delta land. Billie Goodson Pierce, Florida born in 1907, came from a family of pianist-vocalists and learned the blues rhythms almost before she could talk. When Billie was 15, she took Clarence Williams' place for a week as accompanist for the great blues substitute piano player for the silent films, organ player for touring minstrel shows, and pianist for numerous traveling bands of the era. Billie found herself in New Orleans at Popeye's, Charlie Palooka's and the Kingfish. In the latter, she played with George Lewis and DeDe Pierce, whom she married in 1935.

"DeDe" Joseph La Croix Pierce was born in New Orleans, 1904 and grew up with a trumpet which he learned to play from Professor Chaligny, Of Creole roots, De De learned his folk songs early, even before the frequent Brass Band jobs at parities, ball games and funerals. After his marriage to Billie, they sold-

om played except together, in a variety of places from Stell's Wiggling Wagon and the Club Playtime to the dozens of tiny spots in the French Quarter. In spite of failing health for both and DeDe's almost complete loss of eyesight in 1950, both have become two of the greatest leading exponents of the rapidly-becoming-extinct form of New Orleans Jazz.
