department.

An extensive repair and re-
modeling program has been in
progress during recent months.
Under the supervision of Man-
ager George Kloss, the catalog-
ue order department has been
provided with additional space
and accorded a separate identity.
Flourescent lighting and pan-
eling have added much to the
appearance of the furniture
and appliance departments.

The upstairs area of the tri-
level building is now the bar-
gain floor and also houses the
office and credit department.
The company may well point
with pride to the fact that
there have been 66 store-wide
weekly increases in business
compared to only eight decre-
ases in 74 weeks. The store en-
joyed 35 consecutive weekly
increases with only two decre-
ases since July, 1967.

Manager Kloss attributed the
consistent sales increases to a
determined effort on the part
of the store's 25 employees to
improve facilities, merchandise
and service, nor are they con-
tent with present status. They
plan to continue seeking ways
and means of expanding and
improving the service. Al-
ready there are plans for fur-
ther remodeling as they be-
gin the fifth decade.

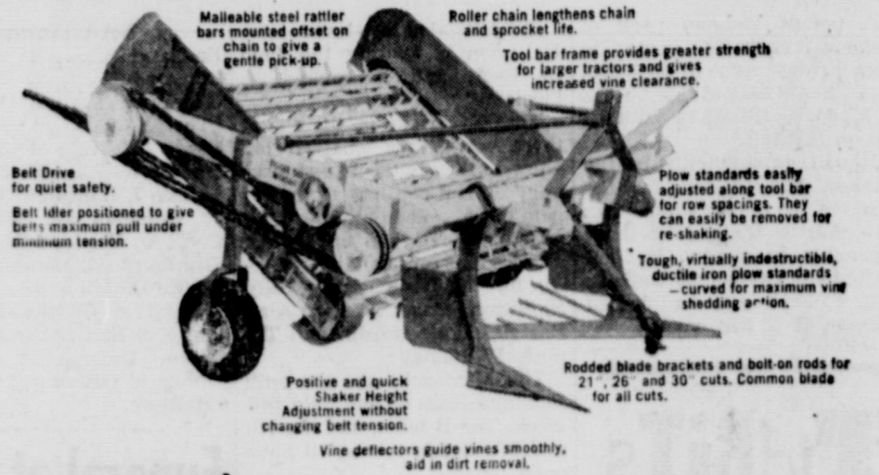

protection both of the volunteer sitters and those they serve:
1. The sitters are not nurses, and cannot be expected to assume responsibility for a critically ill person; nor are they maids and cannot be expected to give more than companionship and protection. This would include small personal services and when absolutely necessary, giving simple medications provided the client gives explicit directions before leaving. Not even the simplest medication should be given at the request of the one being sat with.
2. The Sitter must be given a briefing by the client on the condition, capabilities and needs of her charge. Telephone numbers must be available where the client or other responsible persons can be reached if an emergency develops.
3. The length of time the Sitters are to stay must be agreed upon. If for any unforeseen reason, the client cannot return at the agreed time the Sitter must be notified. Under no circumstances does the Sitter ever leave her charge alone. If a Sitter is needed through the lunch or dinner hour, food for an adequate meal must be available for her and her charge.
Such a program could be developed in Eastland County it is reported by the Committee for Aging.

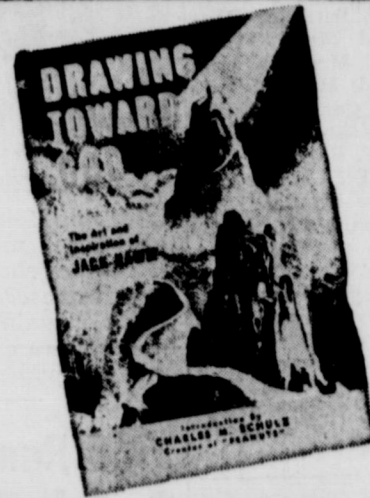

Fire Prevention Week Observance Is Urged

Volunteer Fire Chief Wayne and Jack Cozart, the president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, urge and County citizens to special heed to the observance of National Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 6-12. They ask that everyone develop good fire safety habits during the week. "Fires are killing more than 12,200 persons and cost more than \$1.7 billion in the last year," the chief said. He said that the fall and winter months are the most vulnerable times of the year for fires. "When fire occurs on farm or rural property, the damage is three to six times greater than in the city fire," the Farm Bureau president added. The Farm Bureau has two programs designed to help cur-

tail fire losses. The county Farm Bureau, in cooperation with the Texas Farm Bureau, sponsors the attendance of local volunteer firemen to the annual Firemen's Training School each summer in College Station. More than 600 firemen have attended under Farm Bureau sponsorship during the past six years.

The state and local Farm Bureaus also pay \$75 to fire departments for fighting rural fires on Farm Bureau insured property.

In addition to these programs, county Farm Bureaus sponsor a graphic 45 minute fire prevention demonstration. More than 100 were given before schools, civic clubs and other groups by the TFB Safety Department during the past school year. Also, almost 20,000 fire extinguishers have been sold to Farm Bureau members as a continuing program of rural fire protection.
