

CJC Homecoming Set For Coming Weekend

Cisco Junior College's annual homecoming activities will be held this weekend with special honor being accorded to the classes of '48, '58, and '68, according to an announcement by college officials. Highlight of the affair will be the CJC-Wharton Junior College football game at 8 p.m. Saturday evening.

In the early days, the big oak was a natural stopping place for slow moving wagons that carried freight from the railway depot here to Breckenridge, which had no railroad. Many mules have been tied to the tree for a brief rest or overnight stop. The trip between the two towns used to be a two-day affair by wagon.

The big oak has twin trunks, and the largest measures 18 feet around. A man who lives nearby reports that about two weeks each October the tree is the nesting place for hundreds of migrating sissor-tail birds. They're a sight to behold, he added.

Some years ago, we heard that the old tree was at one time known as The Hanging Tree as somebody was hung by the neck there in the olden days. If anybody knows anything about this, give us a call and we'll report it for the interest of all.

Santa Special Is Slated To Carry Gifts to Vietnam

Tons of St. Nick's gifts will be going to members of the Armed Forces in Vietnam by special ship this year, thanks to a joint Pentagon-Post Office venture.

A fast U. S. cargo ship will be designated the "1968 Santa Claus Special," sailing from Oakland, Calif. next month with Christmas parcels.

To meet the sailing deadline and assure pre-holiday delivery of gifts sent with surface postage, items should be mailed during the Oct. 14-Nov. 9 period. They should be marked "Santa Claus Special" just below the stamps.

The "Santa Claus Special" will sail during the latter half of November and stop at Da-Nang, Qui Nhon, Cam Rahn Bay and Saigon, Vietnam. It takes approximately three weeks for a fast ship to cross the ocean.

All gifts should be packed in strong containers with adequate cushioning and correctly addressed, including APO and FPO numbers.

There are several options available for mailing to the military which can save money. Post offices across the nation have free pamphlets which outline the mailing programs for servicemen and women overseas.

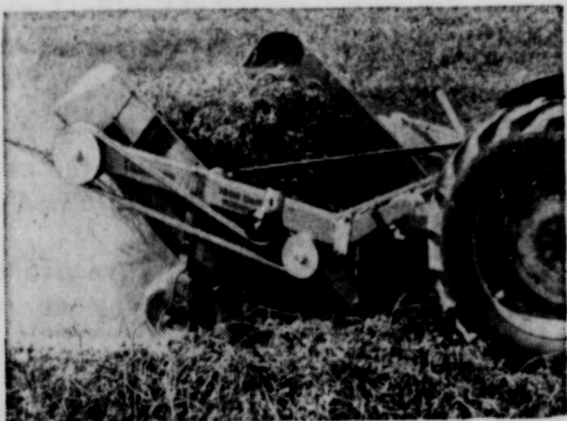

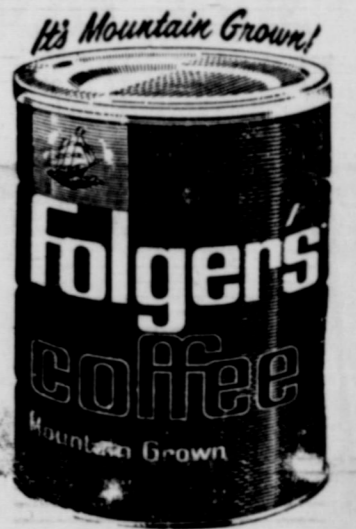

Election Ballot Change May Confuse Some Voters

Two factors may cause some balloting confusion in the November 5 general election, election officials in Texas forecast this week.

The two factors are:

1. A new State law has inserted a new top line on the paper ballots so that persons desiring to vote a "straight party ticket" may do so by making one mark. This new line is expected to confuse not only the "straight ticket" voters, but also the "split ticket" voters.
2. "Split ticket" voters are expected to be more numerous than ever before, especially since there is a third party, the American Party, and it has candidates for only President and Vice-President and no other offices.

Voters are cautioned to be certain that their ballots are properly marked so that their intentions will not be subject to interpretation by election officials.

Eastland County will use paper ballots for the Nov. 5 General Election.

PHONE FRIENDS

One of the greatest needs of older people, especially those who live alone or are alone a large part of the day, is the security of a friendship — a continuing, one-to-one relationship. It is needed for status, for self-respect, for morale; psychiatrists have said friendship is as basic a need as food and shelter. Older people are experienced and have earned the respect and deference due those who have met and battled with life. They have much to give: companionship, understanding, knowledge, history, etc.

PHONE FRIENDS is a program developed for those who would enjoy making new friends, but for one reason or another find it impossible or inconvenient to make personal visits. Its purpose is to make it possible for such volunteers to telephone visit with older people who, more than most of us, have lost contact with other people. It may encourage either or both to maintain or develop, or reawaken interest in such activities as conversation, reading, crafts, sewing community service, or participating in organizations with which they have been associated in the past.

Aging is a process that begins at birth. All of us are aging. Some of us age faster than others, for many and varied reasons — illness, grief, stress, poor food patterns, etc. Chronologically-aged persons are not necessarily physically-aged, mentally-aged, or socially-aged. They can be aged in any of these areas, but not necessarily.

As we get older we all begin to lose some capabilities, such as mobility, hearing, sight, and others — "bounce" for one. We may no longer

come acquainted with. The Adult Services Council will have paved the way and your call will be expected.

2. Your conversations ideally will be an exchange of ideas, information, understanding, etc. In some cases the new friend may have been so isolated she really needs to "talk out" her loneliness. In other words, she may need someone to just listen a while.
- a. Don't press your friend about her situation too much. She may become suspicious of your interest.
- b. Never discuss her confidences with other people.
- c. If she seems to have problems that she cannot cope with, make no promises but

Mohair Industry Is Important In Eastland County
Texas 1966 mohair production totaled 28,770,000 pounds value at \$15,536,000 compared with 31,548,000 pounds valued at \$20,845,000 in 1965. Texas produced 97 per cent of all U. S. mohair. On Jan. 1, 1967, Texas had 4,053,000 goats valued at \$21,076,000 as compared with 4,222,000 and \$27,710,000 in 1966. There is over 400 goat ranchers in Eastland County with a production of over one million pounds of mohair produced in the last two years. The price for mohair now is 35 cents for adults and one dollar per pound for kid. Eastland County has two mohair dealers to serve the ranchers. They are C.P. Cloud and Rippy Brothers and Rattliff Feed and Seed of Ranger. These county buyers sell to two major companies in the United States. The companies that buy the mohair are Fortan, Dupend and Sawyer of Boston, Mass. and Collin and Robath, also of Boston, plus various other smaller organizations. The average adult goat will produce from ten to 12 pounds of mohair per year and from four to seven pounds from kid goats per year. What is the future of mohair. The mohair industry has as grand a future as it has present and past. The mohair is one of the diamond fibers of the world, whose qualities are such that the best clothes cannot be made without it. The preparation of the clip for the market and the system of marketing must be brought up to date to keep pace with the changing demand of manufacturing principles. Given these foundations, mohair can face the future with confidence.

Humphrey Visit Receives Mixed Texas Reaction

Vice President Hubert Humphrey's visit to Texas this week received a hot and cold reception. Oddly enough, the heat came from Republicans and the coolness from Texas Democrats. At a press conference in McAllen, Republican Senator John Tower "welcomed" Humphrey, the Democratic nominee, into Texas, saying he hoped Humphrey would use his Texas visit to discuss such vital issues as the Texas right-to-work law, the oil depletion allowance, and unionization of farm labor. Humphrey has a long record of opposition to right-to-work, and is on record as favoring the unionization of farm labor, even if it takes economic boycotts to force farm labor into unions. "I doubt that the Vice President will discuss these issues while he is in Texas," Tower said, "since he has consistently been on the wrong side of every issue, as far as Texas is concerned."

Mr. Humphrey has a long record of being rather free with words," Tower continued. "He led the filibuster against the Texas Tidelands Act of 1953, when President Eisenhower and Vice President Nixon were pledged to return the tidelands to state ownership. It is with no thanks to Humphrey that we now have control and ownership of our tidelands."

On the other hand Mr. Humphrey's reception from the state's leading Democrats was noticeably cool. Few of the top Democrats travelled with Humphrey on his vote-hunting foray into Texas. With few exceptions, those who did so made it plain to intimates that they did so with little enthusiasm. Rally speakers will include Charles Heathcoat of Mineral Wells, Area chairman for Wallace; and Dr. Irby Fox, M. D. Abilene, Taylor County chairman. Clark said, "A question and answer period will follow the speakers."


