





Maddox discussed crossbreeding is not always the best practice. It has some disadvantages.

Dr. C. M. Patterson said on Wednesday night that all cattle in Eastland County should be sprayed very soon.

Spraying cattle now will have three advantages. It will help prevent a screwworm out break that is threatening the entire state; it will kill insects lice that usually attack cattle that are spreading anaplasmosis; and it will kill cattle lice that usually attack cattle in the fall and winter.

There were 1,431 cases of screwworms reported in Texas during the last two-week period. This compares to only 835 cases during all of 1967. The first case of screwworms in several years was found in Eastland County last week. Screwworms have also been reported in Brown, Callahan, Taylor, Comanche and Coleman counties. Producers are advised to hold off on all animal surgery until cold weather arrives, to search for and treat all animal wounds and spray all cattle.

Ule Thompon discussed beef cattle feeding on the finnal night of the short course. He suggested a feed ration of 80 percent ground grain sorgum, 10 per cent cotton seed meal and 10 per cent salt for stocker calves that are also grazing small grains or spring pastures. With this ration gain can be put on calves at the cost of about 16 cents per pound. This mixture is fed free choice.

Thompson also discussed feeding urea as a protein supplement. He said cattlemen could cut feed cost by feeding



The Official Texas Historical Marker for City of East land will be erected soon, today announced Charles Woodburn of Amarillo, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee. This is a "State Matching Fund mark-

Mr. Mike Collins of East land, chairman of the Eastland County Historical Sur vey Committee, said the mar ker will be placed at southeast corner of courthouse lawn in Eastland.

The inscription on this 27 by 42-inch marker reads:

County Seat, Eastland County named for William M. Eastland—Texas War for Independence hero who was in mier expedition against Mexico, and was executed in "Black Bean" Lottery at Rancho Salado in 1842.

Most noted early local people were Comanches, who resisted occupation of area by white settlers. The last recorded Indian raid in County was in 1874.

Eastland was named county seat in an election on Aug. 2, Dale Bakker, Harold Price. 1875, With 250 people it was C. W. Hoffmann, Jr., and incorporated on June 6, 1891, Jammie Fry, all of Zeta Pi and was elected W. Q. Connellee as Mayor.

After a discovery in 1917, Pledge Ritual for Mrs. John one of the fabled oil booms of Texas occurred nearby, with Eastland center for legal matters. With oil priced \$2.60 a barrel, many wells flowed at 10,000 barrels a day. The city quickly grew to 25,000 people; 5 banks prospered.

Coming here to seek "Black Gold" were celebrities; including Evangelist Billy Sunday, Circus Owner John Ringling, sports figures Jess Willard, Tex Rickard.

An international wonder story happeed here: The old courthouse cornerstone was opened on this site) in 1928 to reveal survival of "Old Rip". A horned toad placed there with other mememtoes on July 19, 1897.
