IN MILES, Los Angeles is a long way from Eastland. In apathy, the distance may not be so great. It was in that West Coast city this week that another assassination attempt was made in the apparent unending stream of lawlessness our nation is experiencing. We're reading the headlines now: Was it a master plot or the work of a single demented individual that shot Sen. and Presidential Hopeful, Robert Kennedy? What's the difference? The plotters are using the demented to accomplish what they don't have to do themselves.

How far removed are we? Do we encourage good law enforcement? Are we putting anything ahead of providing adequate salaries for our policemen? Are we providing enough law enforcement officials to adequately protect life and property in this county? Do we expect and demand swift and thorough prosecution for violators? Do we have any method of keeping firearms and dangerous weapons out of the hands of those who have no business with them? Do we exercise our God-given right to vote?

We might not have liked Sen. Kennedy's haircut or his politics, but for anyone to attempt to deny him his right to seek the highest office in this country is, in our opinion, an unpeakable crime against mankind and every right thing our Democracy offers.

So what can you and I do? Wave a little flag? Why not? We aren't held accountable for what happens in Los Angeles, perhaps -- but you can bet your Dewey button that we are held responsible for what happens in Eastland, Texas. Our Democracy was built on flag waving, not rock throwing and sniping.

Plans are drawn for a patriotic celebration in our town Thursday morning. Time and arrangements were carefully worked out so as to be most convenient to the most number of people. The event will probably last 30 minutes, and that's not a long time for a person to stand up and be counted as a dedicated American.

It's Flag Day and the program starts at 8:30 a. m. Thursday on the Post Office Lawn. YOU AND YOUR FAMILY ARE INVITED.

Who knows? Your feet squarely planted on a foot of lawn in Eastland while you salute the American Flag might be the fuse that would ignite a Revolution -- a revolution of God-fearing, lawful Americanism.

Heaven knows we need it. See you at the Post Office.

More than 100 golfers are expected to tee off Friday in the 8th annual Lone Cedar Country Club Invitation Golf Tournament.

## After 4,000 Meals, 22 Years, Mrs. Parsons Hangs Up Apron

"I've never known a child who didn't prefer good food to anything fancy you could fix," declares Mrs. J. D. (Martha) Parsons, who has retired following 22 years in the local school cafeterias.

Mrs. Parsons, who has helped prepare almost four thousand meals during 18 years in the high school and 4 years in the new elementary school, says that pinto beans, weiners, hamburgers, and homemade hot rolls were favorites with the students.

She was born Martha Kendall in Carbon and her husband was born in Eastland.

They have lived here most of their lives, spending only five years out of the county: two in Glendale, Ariz., in 1929-1931 and three in Mineral Wells during World War II. Mr. Parsons is a retired carpenter.

They have four children, all graduates of Eastland High School. Sons are Henry of Eastland and Hilton of Colorado City and daughters are Mrs. Richard (Gail) Dennis of Eastland and Mrs. Jimmy (Dorothy) Watson of Arlington. They have eight grandsons and four granddaughters, and a prized possession of Mrs. Parsons is a bracelet containing a silhouette charm of each grandchild.

They are Baptists and members of the Eastland County Farm Bureau. J. D. belongs to Eastland County Sheriff's posse.

Mrs. Parsons says she enjoyed cooking "each part of the meal." "Recipes?" she echoes? "We didn't need too many recipes. Mr. Marshall (principal of EHS) used to say I could bake peanut butter cookies in my sleep."

"My husband and I plan to

enjoy our retirement," she says. "We can spend more time with our family and take vacations, things we seem to have been too busy to do before now."

Mr. and Mrs. Parsons also plans to spend time on their farm east of town.

The high school cafeteria fed more than 150 each day and the elementary school between 350 and 400. "And I loved everyone of them," Mrs. Parsons says. "The kids who ate at high school when I was there are now coming to elementary school -- to eat with their children. Many of the Rotarians who ate at the school were boys I cooked for at high school not so long ago."

Mrs. Parsons was named manager of the elementary school cafeteria when the school was opened and says, "The teachers, the ones who worked with me, the students, everyone was just wonderful and I know how much I'll miss them in the fall. But I'll be going to visit them."

And it is quite likely many of them will visit Mrs. Parsons. In her beautiful kitchen, the coffee pot, the cookie jar and the cake plate are always filled, and a welcoming smile is always ready for company.

Edwin M. (Beady) Grimes, 67, died at 3 a. m. Tuesday in Eastland Memorial Hospital, following an extended illness. Funeral services were held at 4 p. m. Wednesday at the First Methodist Church with the Rev. Len Layne, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Eastland Cemetery under direction of Arrington Hamner Funeral Home.

Born September 15, 1900 in Scottsville, Alabama, he married the former Carrie Mae Gillespie in 1924 in Tuscaloosa, Alabama. He moved to Eastland in 1948 from Cleveland, Texas and for five years was a partner with his brother in the Grimes Brothers International Harvesters Company. From 1953 to 1965, he was with the Vencer Manufacturing Co. of Jeannerette, La. At that time, he retired and moved to 709 South Seaman, Eastland.

He was a past member of the Rotary Club, and was a member of First Methodist Church, where he served on the Board of Stewards.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. B. C. Bradley of Dallas; one sister, Mrs. L. S. McGee of Tuscaloosa, Alabama; two brothers, W. E. Grimes of Butler, Alabama and Pearson Grimes of Eastland; and two grandchildren.

## Citizens To Pause For Patriotism -- Thursday at 8:30

What had been planned as a quiet, local observance of Flag Day a week early in order that friends and patrons might say Goodbye to Retiring Postmaster Marene Johnson, has blossomed into a full-blown special event which will attract hundreds from near and far to the Eastland Post Office Thursday morning.

Set at 8:30 a. m., so that one and all could drop by to pay their respects and salute the Flag on their way to work, the event has developed into a full-dress ceremony complete with Army band and color guard.

Mrs. Johnson had asked that the annual Flag Day Observance be moved up to June 6 to coincide with her retirement so that she might raise the flag as her last official act with the post office.

To express appreciation to Mrs. Johnson for her contributions over the years to the chamber and its work, the board of directors voted to honor her at the Flag Raising, and is in charge of the program.

Mayor Frank Deaton has issued a proclamation proclaiming the week of June 3-7 as Marene Johnson Week, and Thursday, June 6, as Marene Johnson Day. H. V. O'Brien was named by the chamber as head of the planning for the Thursday event. Others in charge are Dick Dixon, handling service and social club invitations, and Mike Collins, chairman of the special guests invitation committee.

The chamber membership, the city and school officials have joined in extending invitations to one and all to attend the Thursday morning patriotic event. Beginning at 8:30, it is expected to be completed before 9.

In expression of their appreciation to Mrs. Johnson for her years of active support for servicemen at home and abroad, the U. S. Army has volunteered to assist with the Thursday event, and the Fort Walters Army Band, Color Guard, officials and personnel will be here to assist with the program.

Ben McKinnis was in charge of selection and suitable engraving of a silver loving cup to be presented to Mrs. Johnson by Chamber President J. T. Gregory as a permanent reminder of the chamber's appreciation to her for the many banquets she has personally decorated, the multitude of ideas she has developed to help the chamber and the 1,001 other contributions she has made to the chamber of commerce.

The Band will begin the Ceremony at 8:30 on the East Lawn of the Post Office. The Color Guard will escort Mrs. Johnson and her Freedom Foundation Flag to the flag pole, where she will supervise the official raising.

Darel Reid, accompanied by the Army Band, will lead the crowd in the Star Spangled Banner, and School Supt. Wendell Siebert will lead the Pledge to the Flag.

Master of Ceremonies Virgil T. Seaberry Jr. will introduce guests and announce the brief program. Mrs. Jim Horton will first present Mrs. Johnson an orchid corsage as a symbolic gift from all the people of this city and area. Mayor Frank Deaton will speak briefly expressing the thanks of the city and County Judge Scott Bailey will express thanks from the local county government.

B. M. Myers, regional director of the Post Office Department from Dallas, will speak briefly, and officially thank Mrs. Johnson for her years with the department. Col. Willie H. Casper, Deputy Commander of Fort Walters will present Mrs. Johnson with a plaque from the Army in saluting her contributions to patriotism and the services.

The benediction will be given by the Rev. Len Layne, pastor of First Methodist Church.

The program will be closed with the band playing "Old Soldiers Never Die," and "Auld Lang Syne," during which time visitors and friends will be given the opportunity to shake Mrs. Johnson's hand and thank her personally.

## Rain Totals 23.40 Inches

Eastland has almost attained its average annual rainfall -- already this early in June.

Total today is 23.40 inches and the yearly average is about 26 inches. The city received 1.30 inches in the heavy shower last Saturday which dumped over four inches on Cisco. A trace Sunday and 0.9 Monday, as well as .84 for Friday, brings the June total to 2.23 inches, according to Official U. S. Weather Observer James Dabney.

Totals in excess of 30 inches have been reported by individuals in various other locations in the city and county.

Total for the month of May was 3.63 inches.

The Rev. Tolivar N. Minix, Eastland, died Sunday at his home of an apparent heart attack.

He was born March 8, 1909 in Downing and married the former Miss Hettie Mason in October, 1932, in Oklahoma. He and his wife were directors of Camp Inspiration at Eastland for several years before moving to Abilene in October, 1967.

## Musgrove Put On Drug Abuse Study Group

State Representative Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge has been selected by the U. S. Department of Justice to participate in a nation-wide symposium designed to bring about coordinated efforts for curtailing the nation's growing drug abuse problem.

Approximately 100 leaders in the field of drug legislation and decision-makers in the area of drug controls will participate in the 3-day discussion that began Monday, June 3rd.

The Justice Department has contracted facilities at Rutgers State University in New Jersey for the program. Some 40 medical papers and policy statements will be presented to symposium participants by nationally recognized leaders, doctors and law enforcement officials.

The symposium is one of several steps taken to more effectively deal with the dangerous drug problem. Earlier this year the Bureau of Narcotics was merged with the Federal Bureau of Drug Abuse Control into a single new organization — the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs — under the U. S. Department of Justice and Attorney General Ramsey Clark.

Rep. Musgrove was a leader of recent efforts that stifled Texas' dangerous drug laws and outlawed LSD and other hallucinogenic drugs.

Musgrove, the only Texas participant, will return to Texas after the symposium for the second day of the Special Legislative Session.

One of the youngest members of the Texas House of Rep. Musgrove, 27, is presently serving his first legislative term and was recently re-nominated for a second term over two democratic primary opponents. He represents the 53rd Legislative District that includes primarily the rural area between Abilene and Fort Worth (Shackelford, Callahan, Stephens, Eastland and Palo Pinto Counties).
