Earl Conner Appointed 91st District Court Judge

Earl Conner, Jr., Eastland attorney, was appointed to the judgeship of the 91st Judicial District Friday morning by Governor John Connally.

The position was vacated May 6 by the resignation of Judge Frank Sparks who had been presiding judge since 1965.

Judge Conner was an unopposed candidate for the judgeship in the May 4 Democratic Primary and is the nominee for the November election.

Oath of office was administered Friday by Judge Sparks in the building on the corner of Commerce and Lamar where Judge Conner's father, the late Earl Conner, Sr., practiced law from 1896 to his death in 1956. Judge Conner's private law offices are in this building.

A native of Eastland, Judge Conner started law practice here in 1932. He served as Eastland County Democratic Chairman for about two years prior to 1936. He has served as District Attorney twice, from 1937 to 1947 and from 1958 to 1965.

He is the nephew of the late Judge Truman H. Conner, former District Judge of the old 42nd Judicial District, who was in the Court of Civil Appeals in Fort Worth from 1900 until his death in 1933.

He is married to the former Elna Day and they have two sons, Earl Conner III of Fort Worth and Clark Conner with the U. S. Army Officers Candidate School in Belvoir, Va. Since the resignation of Judge Sparks, the assignment of out-of-district judges to preside in this district was made by Judge Louis Holland presiding judge of the Eighth Administrative District of Texas.


She was preceded in death by her husband.

Baccalaureate On Sunday, Graduation Monday Closes Local Public School Year

Eastland High School Baccalaureate services will be held Sunday evening at Eastland High School Auditorium and Graduation Exercises for the 35 graduates will follow Monday evening in the same hall.

Time for both milestone events will be 8 p. m.

Higher education is the goal for the majority of the 1968 graduates of Eastland High School. Thirty-two of the 35 students plan to enter college or technical schools following Monday's commencement exercises, according to a survey.

The majority — 22 students — plan to enroll at Cisco Junior College for one or two years before going to a four-year school. Only five students intend to go directly to a senior college — one student each to Sul Ross, Rice, Baylor, Hardin-Simmons, and the University of Texas. Temple, Kilgore, and South Plains Junior Colleges will draw one student each as will Draughn's Business College and Scoggins Beauty School.

Ten plan to major in some field of business or accounting and one listed banking and finance. Education and music education drew five, home economics two, and physical education two. Math, science and agriculture education were listed as majors by six students. Other majors listed were psychology, mechanics, journalism, advertising, forestry, industrial arts, commercial art, drama, pharmacy and aerospace engineering.

Chamber, City, School Join To Accept Survey Challenge -- 'Build a Better Eastland'

The challenge for developing a better Eastland was extended and accepted by the Chamber of Commerce, the City of Eastland and the Eastland Public Schools during a chamber board of directors meeting held Friday noon at the White Elephant.

In a report given by Frank Sayre, chairman of a special study committee on the recent survey made in Eastland which asked "What areas need attention?" three categories were listed. Using data taken from the some 300 returned questionnaires the committee recommended that the chamber pursue those areas which particularly come under chamber affairs. This the board agreed to do, and in later statements, officials of the other two bodies stated that the recommendations would be taken to their respective boards for consideration and action.

Mr. Sayre's committee, comprised of Clint Bray, R. P. Hawn, Joe Culppeper, Wendell Siebert and Lewis Tiner, was further given the assignment of appointing committee chairmen for each of the categories in which the chamber would work.

Mayor Frank Deaton stated that he would take to the City Commission the information which was taken from the survey and which pertains to city affairs. City Manager Lewis Tiner agreed that his office would be vitally concerned with the information provided.

Speaking for the school, Supt. Wendell Siebert, and Board President J. T. Gregory stated that they have and would continue to study the area recommended by the survey. The schools got a pretty clean bill in the analysis, and the sole area in which citizens considered "below average" and recommended action was that of expanding the available technical training programs in the schools. (41.2 percent of those answering suggested this category. Supt. Siebert explained that the local school has considered this need for a long time and that he is still gathering information on it. Reasons the school hasn't been able to advance technical programs, he said, are twofold — number of available students and money. "The answer would be to make Eastland an area center for such technical work, with neighboring schools participating," he explained.

Several of the items regarded "sub-standard" on the city's list are and have been alleviated or explainable due to the extremely bad winter. The six "below average" areas for the city are:

Improve roads and streets (37.7 per cent); initiate better street maintenance programs (33.5); improve city recreational facilities (31.9); implement better traffic control programs (30.4); improve local police protection (25.7); and establish and enforce local ordinances and zoning (25.4).

The projects which the chamber adopted for further study and development are:

Create more job opportunities for young people (67.7); obtain new and improve existing restaurant and cafe facilities (66.2) (EDITOR'S NOTE: The survey was made at the time the town's largest restaurant was closed; create more job opportunities for adults, (48.2); expand the local motel-hotel facilities (48.1); improve local transportation service, (32.9); conduct downtown beautification or store front modernization, (28.6); improve commercial service available for the public (28.); encourage local retail outlets to expand the selection of merchandise (27.3); step up local interest in obtaining new industry (23.6); step up local industrial development activity (20.7); and build more interest in local politics (20.7).

In giving the report, Mr. Sayre stressed the committee's hope that the chamber would utilize the talents of the 110 people who indicated on their questionnaires that they would be happy to work to develop Eastland as a better place to live. "We feel," he said, "that the community is looking for action from us, and with the store of talents that is available, we can accomplish things."

A committee was named by C-C President Gregory to pick a name for the chamber's community improvement program, as follows: H. V. O'Brien, Ben McKinnis, Grover Hallmark and Morris Jones.

In other action: Mayor Deaton announced that the Old Rip pins have been ordered and are on their way here.

A report was given on the chamber's "Hire the Young People" Program.

The board voted to sponsor a formal salute to Retiring Postmaster Mrs. Marene Johnson to be rendered at the Flag Raising on the Post Office Lawn Thursday. The Chamber urged a big attendance for the 8:30 a. m. retirement event.

Marcus O'Dell, 49, 20-year postal career man, has been named Acting Postmaster of the Eastland Post Office upon the retirement of Mrs. Marene Johnson, who will retire Thursday, June 6, according to an announcement by Cong. Omar Burleson.

Mr. O'Dell has been serving as Clerk-in-Charge of the Eastland Post Office for some time and has been endorsed by the County Democratic Committee for the post.

Upon appointing Mr. O'Dell, Cong. Burleson stated that this arrangement would cause no disruption to the patrons of the Post Office and gave assurance of a continuation of fine and capable service.

Mr. O'Dell expressed his appreciation for the confidence placed in him and pledged himself to the best possible postal service for the Eastland patrons.

A native of Comanche, he graduated from high school there in 1939 and married Ruth Kinsey July 23, that year. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Kinsey of Eastland. The O'Dells have one son, Michael Don, 14.

Enlisting in the U.S. Army Air Force in 1942, he served until February of 1946 as a member of the military personnel office.

Joining the Post Office Department in June of 1948 as a sub city carrier, he has since served in all assignments including clerk in charge since March 7 of this year. He is a graduate of "Basic Management for Postal Supervisors" school.

The family attends Bethel Baptist Church where he has served as deacon. Sunday School superintendent, adult teacher, departmental director in Training Union and a member and chairman of many committees including chairman of deacons.

He is a member of the American Legion Post 70 and a past member of board of directors and vice president of United Fund. He is presently on the board of directors of the Eastland Goodfellow.

Active in Lionism, which he joined in 1960, O'Dell has served as a director of the Eastland Club, 1961-63; president, 1963-64; zone chairman, 1964-65; deputy district governor, 1965-66; and deputy district governor at large, 1966-67. He has attained perfect attendance records for the years 1963, 1964, 1965, 1966 and 1967-68.

Water Rights Are Asked By City

Eastland is seeking permission from the Texas Water Rights Commission to amend the water rights permit granted to the city in 1920.

The city is now authorized to divert water from a 1,740-acre-foot reservoir on the North Fork of the Leon River for irrigation, municipal and "engine" use.

The application asks that Eastland be allowed to reduce the authorized annual appropriation to 600 acre feet per year and amend authorized uses to include municipal, industrial, mining and recreation.

The application, made out by City Manager Lewis Tiner, was filed Tuesday at the Water Rights Commission in Austin by an Austin attorney, Jay B. Wilkins Jr. No date has been set yet for the hearing on the application.

THE GORDON SPOT

Forty people attended the spring pecan field day held Friday, May 24, in Cisco. Nineteen of these drove from out of the county to attend the field day. Pecan growers came from such places as Hamlin, Coleman, Sweetwater, Colorado City, Abilene, Comanche and Gustine.

Tom Denman, Horticulturist at the West Cross Timber Experiment Station, spoke on pecan insect control. He said the pecan nut casebearer has had a very unusual life cycle this year. About ten per cent of the adult moths had emerged from their pupa cases on May 14 which would indicate the best spray date would be May 24 or 25. For some reason the casebearer moths were not laying eggs by May 24 or

25. In fact very few casebearer eggs were found during the first part of the next week. Because of this, spray applied the last three days of May would have been more effective than an application of spray a week earlier. The spray should be applied after most of the moths have deposited the eggs on the small pecans and before the young worms enter the pecans.

I would suggest that pecan growers spray their trees again during the first week of June. If you sprayed before May 24 much of the insecticide was washed away during the rains on May 24 and 27. Do not spray fruit trees with the same spray you are using on pecan trees. The zinc sul-

fate in the pecan spray will cause fruit tree leaves to fall. Another good reason for not spraying fruit trees is that no insecticide except sevin should be applied to the fruit this late in the season.

Aphids, commonly known as plant lice, are difficult to see and excessive damage to plants may occur before they are noticed. Because they are small, don't move around unless disturbed and are often the same color as the plant part on which they feed, they are hard to see. Too, aphids usually feed on the underside of leaves or in unfolding terminals, and their feeding may cause the leaves to curl around them as is the case on peach trees and other plants.

Homeowners should be particularly suspicious of plants that have flies and wasps flying around them. Aphids excrete a sweet, sticky substance called honeydew that attracts these insects. Lady beetles, green lacewings, or other predators on plants are also good evidence that aphids are at work. These predators feed on aphids. A black sooty mold commonly grows on the honeydew.

There are several effective chemical controls. Some, such as soil applied systemic insecticides, can be used with little harm to lady beetles and other beneficial insects. Both soil applied systemics or contact sprays are available to the home gardener.

Homeowners can use a 2 percent disulfoton (sold under the trade name of Scope or Syston) granular or dry fertilizer mixtures. Sprays which are effective in controlling aphids include dimethoate (Cygon), diazinin, malathion, naled (Dibrom) or lindane.



Some 75 students are expected to enroll in summer classes that CJC will conduct at Graham. Mr. Glenn said the faculty there would include Carroll Scott, Mr. Valek, Mr. Tipton, Mrs. Ola Frasier of Breckenridge and possibly others.

Any other courses not listed above for which at least ten students enroll will be offered, Mr. Glenn added.

Students Social Security Money Is Large Amount

Social Security is now paying more money to students aged 18 through 21 than all the scholarships at all U. S. Colleges and Universities, according to data just received by R. R. Tuley Jr., District Manager for the Social Security Administration in Abilene.

"In the 1968-69 school year," Tuley explained, "the social security program will pay about \$479 million to approximately 466,000 students entitled to payments on the earnings record of a disabled, retired, or deceased parent."

The school year that begins next fall will mark the fourth year of payments under a 1965 change in the law providing for the continued payment of social security benefits past the age of 18 to unmarried, full-time students.

"Nothing in the law prevents the student from receiving his social security benefits while he is still receiving assistance from a scholarship fund," Tuley noted. "Benefits may be paid during vacation periods. If a student works during the summer months or part time during the school year, and earns \$1,680 or less for the year, he can still collect all of his social security benefits. If his earnings go above \$1,680, he gives up some or all his benefits depending upon the amount of his total earnings and how steadily he works."

NEW NIBBLE CER Tuley added that a 1967 change in the dependency requirements for the children of women workers added about 175,000 more young persons to those eligible for payments.

New Nibble Trip Is Discovered By County 4-H Boys

The Nibble Trip is designed to help unhappy fishermen catch "the ones that used to get away."




