## Buddy Aaron Is Manager of County Farm Bureau Here

### Gayle Baucum Replaces Floydada

R. (Buddy) Aaron has been appointed Agency Manager for Eastland County Farm Bureau, President Jack ... of Cisco announced. Aaron will replace Gayle

Baucum, who will assume the same position in Floyd County. The Baucums will move to Floydada in the near future.

A native of Eastland, Aaron is a graduate of Eastland High School and attended Abilene Christian College. He has been Special Agent in Sales, Texas Farm Bureau, in Lubbock. He and his daughter Debra, 15, will move to Eastland. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Aaron.

Baucum, a native of Anson, is a graduate of Anson High School and attended Abilene Christian College. He moved to Eastland County in December, 1965, and was named Second Highest Texan in number of new policies sold during

September, 1966. He and his wife were awarded an all-expense-paid trip to Las Vegas in December of that year. The Baucums have one son, Joe Edward, two.

Both Aaron and Baucum were selected as members of the Southern Farm Bureau Round Table in 1966 and received invitations to the special Round Table meeting at The Greenbrier, White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., in March of 1967.

## 5 A.M. FIRE DESTROYS WEBB'S 7-11 GROCERY

Webb's 7-11 Grocery on West Main-St. in Eastland was destroyed in an early morning fire Tuesday.

The interior of the building and virtually all the contents were burned. The south, back part of the exterior was the heaviest damaged of the

building proper. Owners are George and Wanda Webb who opened the store some 12 years ago, have operated it since that time.

The fire was discovered just before 5 a. m. by Police-man Neil Seaburn. Firemen were summoned, and with the

use of the new fire truck were able to douse the blaze before the building burned to the ground Chief Wayne Jackson said.

Mrs. Webb was in Eastland Memorial Hospital where she gave birth to a son last week. Mr. Webb and the couple's young daughter, Carol Ann, were sleep in the Webb's new home, just completed, located directly south of the grocery, but separated by a large trailer house which for many years had been their home.

The fire was believed to have started near the center of the store and burned toward the rear, it was said, by firemen. Estimate of loss was not immediately available but is believed to be in the thousands of dollars.

Mr. Webb said Tuesday afternoon that he will build the store back at the same location.

Reports indicated that Mrs. Webb might be able to be released from the hospital later this week.

Mr. Webb expressed his appreciation to members of the Eastland Volunteer Fire Department, stating that they went far beyond their call of duty in helping get the fire out and then watching and checking to make sure that it didn't re-start.

He also expressed his appreciation to the people of Eastland for their concern in his loss, and stated that he would begin rebuilding within two weeks.

The most disastrous fire to strike Eastland in the last two years, according to Fire Chief Wayne Jackson, destroyed the business, which has been in Eastland about 10 years.

Jackson said that it took the fire department only about 20 minutes to bring it under control, but that the contents and building were a total loss.

Webb said an insurance adjuster in Eastland Tuesday afternoon estimated the total loss at \$30,000, including \$14,000 in stock, \$9,000 in equipment and \$7,000 on the building. Webb said his total insurance was only 12,000, however, he said he would start rebuilding immediately.

"The fire department showed real efficiency in spite of my total loss," Webb said. He also had the dubious honor of having the new \$27,000 fire truck used for the first time at the fire.

## First Federal S&L Sets Building Re-Modeling

First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Ranger, announces plans for complete remodeling and renovation of the old Commercial State Bank Building which they recently acquired.

A construction contract was signed July 3 with McCown Construction Co. of Abilene. Richard Buzard and Associates, Architects and Engineers, of Abilene rendered architectural services, and Yandell and Hiller, Consulting Engineers, of Fort Worth, rendered mechanical and electrical engineering service. About \$100,000 will be spent in the renovation.

The building will be completely revitalized inside and out. The existing windows, and glass block will be removed and replaced with curtain wall construction of dark aluminum frames, gray glass, and red spandrel panels. The interiors of the building will be refinished with new partitions and new ceilings throughout. A completely new heating and air conditioning system and a new plumbing system will be installed.

New facilities on the first floor will include a private office for the Executive Vice President, a Directors' Room, an Auditor's Room, a Coffee and Work Room, plus new toilet facilities, including a lounge for the ladies. The second floor, which has been abandoned for years, will contain a Community Room which will comfortably seat 100 persons. Also included will be a Serving Kitchen and toilet facilities, a room for chair and table storage, another storage room for other supplies, and the Mechanical Equipment Room.

The Entrance Vestibule, containing the night depository, the Main Lobby, the Executive Vice President's Office, and the Directors' Room, will be paneled in walnut with some areas of vinyl wall covering. The columns in the Main Lobby will be covered with travertine marble. New fluorescent lighting throughout the building and new chandeliers will brighten the interior.

The original building, built in the 1900's during the oil boom is built on a reinforced concrete frame. The outside of the building, of Roman architecture, is of Indiana limestone with fluted columns and Corinthian capitals. All of the stonework will be preserved and sandblasted to clean it up. The remodeling will constitute a restoration as much as a renovation.

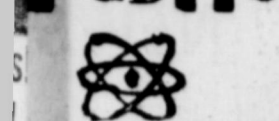

Goates retired June 28 from El Paso Natural Gas Company at Hobbs, N. M. He had worked 16 years for the company.

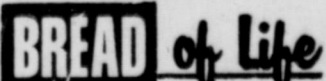

# Antarctic Peaceful But Cold Rising Star Boy Discovers

If it's peace you crave and relief from a daily news diet of mans inhumanity to man, a Rising Star lad can tell you where to go. And he knows of what he speaks for he has been there.

But you had better be prepared to give up most of the comforts of home. For where he has been there are no paved streets or cars, or golf courses, or television or newspapers, not green grass to mow, not even any dirt to dribble between your fingers.

It never rains there; it only snows. And on those clear but hazy days, when the summer sun traces a remote and frosty circle in an all-day sky, its light gleams deceptively from peaks of sheer ice and plains of endless snow.

The boy is Charles Bruce Hubbard, 20-year-old Navy Seabee, who is home with his mother, Mrs. Ruby Nell Hubbard, and his sisters on a 22-day leave after five months of helping to build units of a permanent camp in the Antarctic. He will return to the Antarctic next South Polar summer for another five months of duty at the bottom of the world.

His duty was at McMurdo Station where the great Ross Ice Shelf crumbles its giant icebergs into McMurdo Sound. Two miles away across a narrow peninsula of Ross Island a sister camp maintained by New Zealand is known as Scott Station. All about the two rise glacial peaks and ice sheathed mountains, and to the north, rising from the center of Ross Island, Mount Erebus, the only active volcano in the Antarctic, breathes its Vulcan breath into the polar sky.

Eight hundred miles due south is the South Pole where a permanent American camp is now maintained. Charles hopes to make it to the pole during his next tour of Antarctic duty, which will begin next October. Some of the men who worked with him last summer (our winter, mind you) in building three big warehouses at McMurdo, did go to the pole and do work there. Charles is hoping also to see Little America and Byrd's Camp, an advanced base established by Admiral Richard Byrd, one of the most famous of America, Arctic and Antarctic explorers.

No above ground work is possible during the polar winter. The nether continent lies in constant darkness and the winds howl at rates up to 200 miles an hour across a landscape locked in near absolute cold. The men who remain mostly scientists for whose work the camps are built and

maintained, go underground—or, rather, under-ice—to live and work in tunnelled dwellings insulated by the ice and species of air wrapped around the living quarters like battens of invisible wool.

It was quite an eerie experience, Charles recalls, to leave temperate and tropical zones and suddenly in one of absolute ice and snow—like dropping into a strange new world. But one acclimates.

At first the men could work only ten or fifteen minutes before going inside to warm up, in that frigid latitude even the mere stoppage of a nostril can have serious consequences.

But as the Antarctic summer advanced and the weather grew milder it was possible to stay outside for longer periods and even to go around without the essential coat liner and face mask.

Charles enlisted in the Navy in August 1967, and after basic at San Diego took training in utilities and plumbing construction at a Seabee base in California. He also received survival training under polar conditions. He left for the Antarctic on Oct. 12, going by way of Christ Church, New Zealand, which he left on Oct. 19.

There is no war, cold or hot, in the Antarctic, Charles said. There are no firearms at McMurdo Sound except for one rifle at Scott Station which is used to kill seal meat for the dogs which the New Zealanders use for transportation. There is no need, so far, for such weapons. An unusual atmosphere of comity exists between the stations of all nationalities, even those maintained by Soviet Russia, Charles reported. The purpose of the settlements is scientific—a study of the features and resources of the great polar cap.

There are two laboratories at McMurdo Station—an earth lab concerned with the physical features that lie beneath the ice burden, and a biological lab in which an intensive study of life forms is being made. Both are staffed by civilians.

In his off hours—the Seabees are on 12-hour duty shifts—Bruce divided his interest between photography and fascinating visits to the biology lab. His school interest centered in biology and when he completes his Navy stint he plans to go to college and train himself for a biological career.

Natural life in the frozen Antarctic world consists mostly of seals, killer whales, penguins and occasional

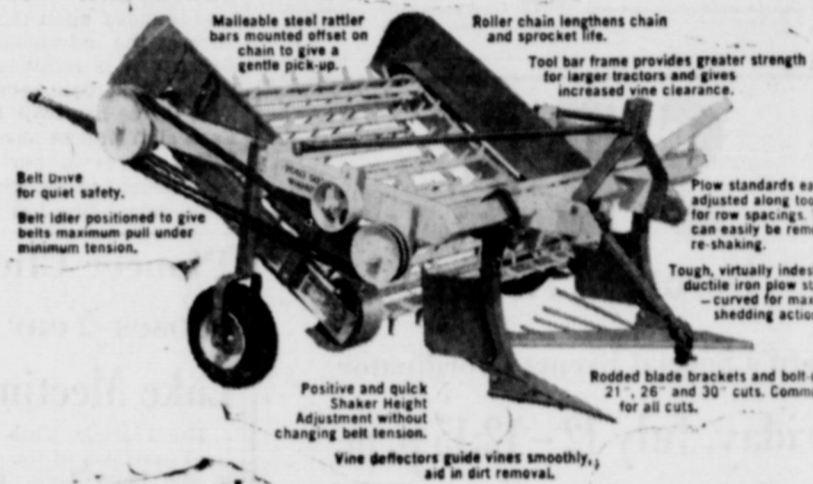

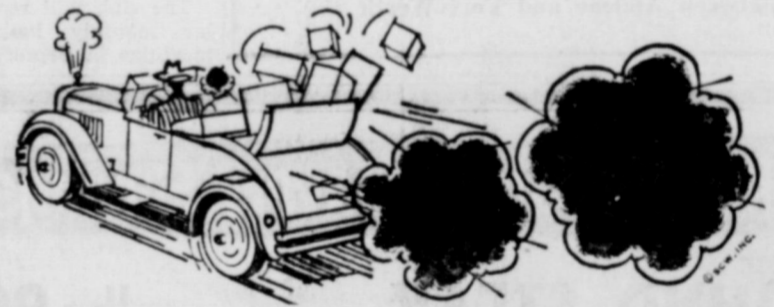

## Advertising Brings 1,208 Inquiries

The Texas Industrial Commission, Austin, revealed this week that the current national advertising program of the Commission has resulted in 1,208 inquiries between September, 1967 and the end of May, 1968, up 93 percent from the same period a year ago.

Inquiries are in the form of clipped coupons or letters mailed to the Commission as direct results of advertising placed in a wide variety of industry trade magazines and general business publications.

The primary objective of the Commission's advertising program is to advise and inform manufacturers and industrialists outside the state about the advantages of locating a plant in Texas. Such points as favorable tax rates, employment practices, high caliber work force, stable government, mild climate, and wide open spaces are stressed in the advertisements.

The central theme for all advertisements is "Turn To Texas." One ad of a current series directed to industry executives pictures a woman at work in a factory, with the headline, "New York's Kay Nesom Won't Clip This Coupon To The Texas Industrial Commission Today, But Her Boss Should!" This series carries a coupon offering three Industrial Commission Source Books: 1968 Texas Plant Location Fact Book, Texas Community Profiles, and Texas Markets 1966-2020.

Another series of ads directed toward executives in specific industries points out the number of new plants in those industries which came into Texas in 1967.

In addition to media advertising, the Industrial Commission conducts periodic direct mailings to a select list of some 9,000 manufacturing executives outside Texas.

Advertising the important advantages and potential that Texas offers industry is a major function of the Industrial Commission. It is also charged with compiling research material to support the state's case for industry and consults with Texas' communities large and small to assist them in setting up programs to attract new industry.

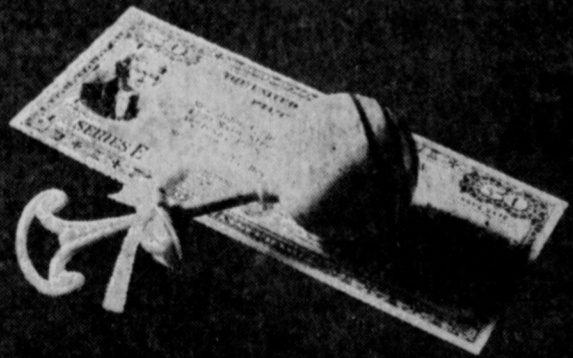

## Rising Star History Marker To Be Erected at City Park

The Official Texas Historical Marker for Rising Star will be erected soon, today announced Mr. Mike Collins of Eastland, chairman of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee. The marker will be placed at City Park, on Hwy. 36, Rising Star. Dedication plans will be announced by Collins. The cast aluminum marker with Swedish steel effect measures 27 by 42 inches and is sponsored by Eastland County H.S.C. This is the fifth Official Texas Historical Marker to be erected in Eastland County. The inscription on the marker reads: First settlers -- Families of Andrew Agnew, Isaac Agnew, Fletcher Fields, David McKinley, Allis Smith and W. W. Smith—arrived in a wagon train from Gregg County, Jan. 6, 1876. Area was known for hardships: Indian Raids, vigilante activities, gunfights. But a stable community developed around log school-church building erected in 1876. First store was founded about 1879 by Thomas W. Anderson and son, William. Post Office established 1880. The most creditable story as to how the town got its name is that the settlers suggested the name "star" for the post office but it was rejected by the U. S. postal Authorities as another Texas town had that name. The settlers argued all night over the name selection, looked up and saw the

morning star as they started home from their meeting and agreed to call it Rising Star. The city was first incorporated in 1891. In a 1905 election, there was a vote to dissolve the corporation but the charter was restored later the same year. Rising Star is the home of Texas (1939-1941) Poet Laureate Lexie Dean Robertson. Unique local structure is City Hall built of stone from buried petrified forest. Economy is based on ranching, farming (a chief crop is Spanish peanuts), commercial pecans, industry, oil." (1968) The marking of local historical sites and landmarks is part of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee's five-year RAMPS Program to Record, Appreciate, Mark, Preserve, and Survey Texas history. More than 3,300 Official Texas Historical Markers have been awarded throughout Texas since the RAMPS Pro-

# National Guardsmen Back Home Sunday

NORTH FORT HOOD — Others were to depart Sunday beginning at 5 a. m. Before noon all military vehicles and civilian convoys of the 72nd were to have left the Central Texas military reservation.

For many of the Texas National Guardsmen, representing 47 cities and towns, this will be a year long remembered, not only because of the reorganization and functioning as a brigade, but also for many other innovations. Thompson concluded.

## Brown County FU Chartering Is Planned At May

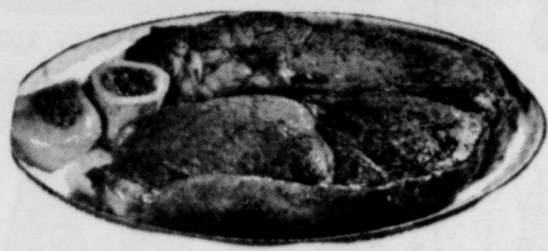

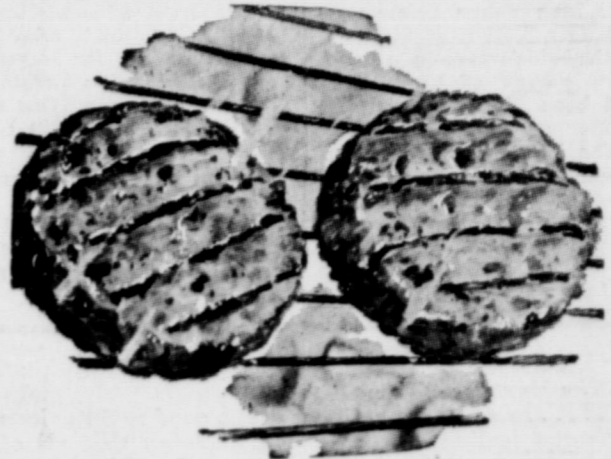

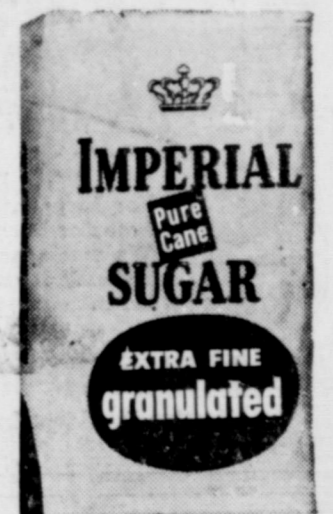

## Pecan Growers Report Successful Meeting

COLLEGE STATION — Demonstration of the latest equipment for pecan production, 16 different information sessions, tours and shows highlighted the 47th annual convention of the Texas Pecan Growers Association in Brownwood, July 8-10.

Dr. Benton Storey, professor in the Soil and Crop Sciences Department at Texas A&M University and secretary-treasurer of the state organization, said that the convention hosted approximately 30 guests from Mexico. All of the sessions were translated into Spanish and the visitors honored at the special Texas Pecan Queen Pageant.

The equipment demonstrations took up one whole afternoon of the convention this year, he said.

"Many growers attended the conference primarily to see these demonstrations—so convinced are they that mechanization is their only answer to the problem of increasing labor costs," Storey said.

Approximately 398 entries were judged during the Texas State Pecan Show scheduled for July 8. These entries have already won at three 1967 regional shows according to the professor. The top county in the show will be recognized

as well as the counties winning all six regional shows for the past two years.

Special talks and sessions were planned to give results of tests and allow discussion of problems in pecan production. Tours of orchards, both commercial operations and the United States Pecan Field Station, were also expected to draw visitors.

County Pecan Queens from Texas competed for the title of Texas State Pecan Queen for 1968. The contestants were honored by a luncheon and style show at the Holiday Inn on July 9th, according to Queen Committee Chairman, Mrs. Aubrey Fife of Junction.

## County's Social Security Benefits Hits New High

The 13 percent increase in Social Security monthly benefits that was effective for February, 1968 brought the total for the 15 county Abilene district to a record high of \$2,970,094 paid to the 40,524 beneficiaries for that month, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager.

Eastland County accounted for 4,902 persons and \$362,703. Of that total, 2,729 were retirees, paid \$227,966; their 823 wives and dependent husbands \$85,102; 359 disabled persons and their dependents, \$29,361; 330 children of retired or deceased parents, \$19,387; and 661 widows, dependent widowers, dependent parents, and younger widows with entitled (children) in their care \$46,540.

The slightly more than 24 million beneficiaries in the nation topped the \$2 billion mark in monthly benefits for the first time.

"Although about 2-3 of those receiving social security checks are past age 62," Tuley stated, "most of the changes made by the 1967 amendments were of greater value to the younger people."

He cited the reduction in credits needed for disability benefits for those disabled before age 31 (as low as 1 1/2 years of social security coverage if disabled before age 24), and the change that benefits children of deceased, disabled, or retired mothers by no longer requiring 1 1/2 years of coverage during the three years just before death, disability, or retirement.

Representatives of the Abilene district office visit Eastland County regularly, on the schedule posted in all post offices hereabouts. Tuley suggests that anyone who believes the 1967 amendments might have made him eligible for benefits should see the social security representative on his next visit.

## Grant Awarded For Peanut Disease Study

COLLEGE STATION—Texas A&M University has received a \$66,488 grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to study how harvesting and handling practices influence development of toxin-producing molds and other fungi in peanuts.

A&M's principal investigator is Dr. Robert E. Pettit of the Plant Sciences Department.

Pettit said some molds, such as those used to make cheese, other food products, and antibiotics, are benefi-

cial. But certain molds produce by-products known as mycotoxins that can be toxic to plants, animals and man.

During the three-year period of the study, peanuts will be harvested at various times and locations to learn how the crop is affected by environmental conditions. Pettit will examine samples, identify any toxin-producing molds and mycotoxins, and then try to correlate their occurrence with production and harvesting conditions.

It is hoped, he said, that findings will help to determine methods to minimize or eliminate mold in peanuts during growing, harvesting, and handling.

The grant will be administered by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Cooperating with Pettit on the project are J. W. Sorenson and Nat Person of the A&M Agricultural Engineering Department; Dr. A. L. Harrison

## Screwworm Danger Is Worse Than In 5 Years

The danger of screwworms in Eastland County is greater now than at any time during the last five years. Eastland County Agent De Gordon reported 144 screwworm cases were reported in Texas last week. This sets a new record for a five-day period.

The county agent said the screwworm situation as of July 1, was worse than in 1963—in the early days of the eradication program. He added there have been no screw-

worm cases reported from Eastland County, but several cases have been reported from near-by counties.

Oscar Schaefer, chairman of the Eastland County Screwworm Eradication Committee, said every livestock producer must do his share to stop the possibility of screwworm cases in the county.

Gordon asked all producers to check their livestock regularly and treat all wounds on animals. On routine livestock spraying programs, use chemicals recommended to kill screwworm flies.

The county agent asked producers to get a sample of all worms found in animals

wounds and send them to Screwworm Laboratory Mission. Vials for mailing samples may be secured from the county agent's office Eastland or from Schaefer who lives in the Cook Community. Mailing vials also be gotten at the F State Bank in Bangor, Sh Implement Co. in Rising S or from Vocational Agriculture teachers in each town.

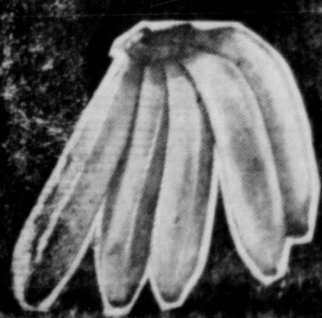
