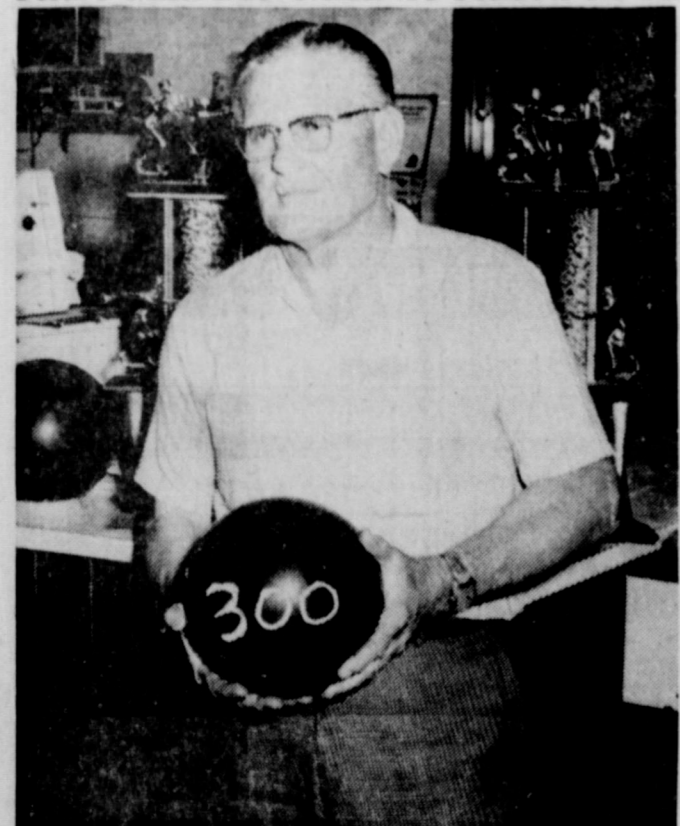
**THE CARTOON IS COMING!**

## Sales Tax Ordinance Due Commission Vote Monday

An ordinance ordering a special local sales and use tax election in Eastland was introduced at a called meeting of city commissioners Friday afternoon.

Final reading is set for 2:30 p.m. Monday, May 5, at the

City Hall. The move is the result of a report from a study committee originally appointed by Mayor Frank Deaton in 1967 and re-activated recently. The committee recommended a local sales and use tax of one per-

cent as a method of increasing the city's income.

Need for additional income was based in part upon the fact that a number of city employees are on the payroll below the minimum wage rate. Rising costs of materials and the need for another policeman position were also stated.

The committee, composed of Chairman Tom Wilson, Don Stoner, Clint Bray, and R. G. Perkins, commended the City Commission for "doing what it can on the limited funds available." The committee report added, "We recognize that proper maintenance and personnel cannot be assured in the near future without additional revenues."

If the ordinance is adopted by commissioners Monday, the election will be called for Thursday, June 5, at the City Hall, with Milton Underwood as presiding judge and Hoover Pittman as alternate. Qualified voters will vote for or against adoption of a one per cent local sales and use tax within the city.

Tiner explained Friday that the city must forward certification of the election and map of the area to the state comptroller before June 30 to be eligible to collect the tax for the last quarter of this year.

Attending the meeting on Friday were Mayor Deaton, Jay Staffs, W. Q. Verner, Curtis Koen, James Reid and Tiner.

## BOARD, SIEBERT STRAIGHTEN RECORD

(ED. NOTE: Supt. Wendell Siebert appeared Tuesday in Austin, defending the University Interscholastic League in a public hearing. Eastland school board members were polled Tuesday night by phone by Rep. Burke Musgrove as to whether Mr. Siebert had permission to be in Austin. The representative also lashed out at Supt. Siebert in an article carried in the Abilene Reporter-News Friday morning. Here is the official reply of the board to Rep. Musgrove and to the public.)

### STATEMENT BY THE BOARD...

"A press report of a statement of State Representative Musgrove made yesterday regarding Superintendent Wendell Siebert has come to the attention of the Board of Trustees of the Eastland Independent School District. If such press report correctly reflects the statement of Mr. Musgrove, the Board unanimously deplores and resents the inaccurate and misleading statements and insinuations contained in such statement. Mr. Siebert is replying to the statement of Mr. Musgrove, and the Board unanimously supports Mr. Siebert in his reply, in his appearance before the Legislature, and in his position regarding Mr. Musgrove's bill affecting the University Interscholastic League."

### SUPT. SIEBERT'S STATEMENT...

EASTLAND — Rep. Burke Musgrove's statement Thursday concerning a budget deficit in the University Interscholastic League and the "active opposition" of UIL officials to a House committee study, drew a sharp rebuttal Friday by Eastland County Superintendent Wendell Siebert.

Siebert, who earlier had testified before the House Committee on Public Education in opposition to Musgrove's bill proposing a House study committee and evaluation, released a statement which called "ridiculous" the claim by Musgrove that Siebert is the "only superintendent in his district that objects" to the investigation.

SIEBERT ALSO said "I am not a member of the UIL legislative council as claimed by Mr. Musgrove, nor have I ever served in this capacity."

He also said he had never been invited to appear on Musgrove's television show to explain to the public why the League apparently exceeded its budget by \$9,982.

"I have no knowledge of the UIL budget, nor do I have any responsibility relating to its administration," Siebert said. Musgrove had said that while the budget had been exceeded executive salaries had been supplemented above the amount authorized in the University (of Texas) budget by drawing additional money from the league's football account.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES of the Eastland Independent School District also issued a statement, saying it "deplores and resents the inaccurate and misleading statements and insinuations contained in such statements."

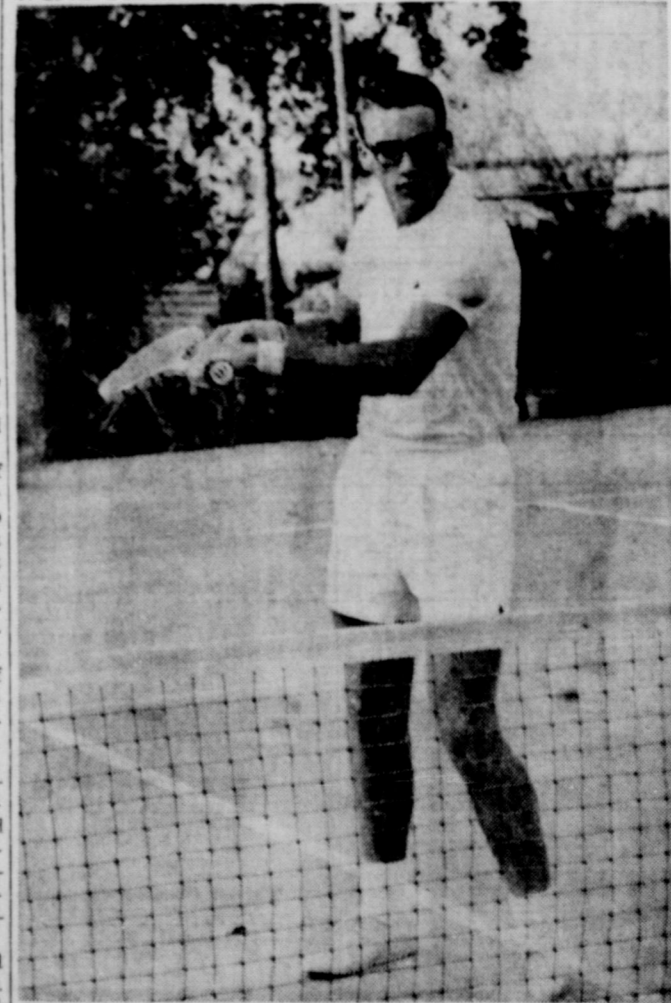
The statement said the board "unanimously supports Mr. Siebert in his reply . . . and in his position to Mr. Musgrove's bill effecting the University Interscholastic League."

 Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
 NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR31)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
 Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:  
 "Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.  
 Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

 NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
 Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:  
 "Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been, and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been, and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."  
 Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:  
 "FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation," and  
 "AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."  
 Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

it to be a waste of time. "As far as I know HB 1093 which he authored was not placed in the hands of school people in his district until I personally secured copies. Prior to the time it was introduced he did not discuss this bill with me other than to indicate that he was displeased with the UIL, and I suspect that he did not discuss it with the other school administrators in this area. AFTER COPIES of HB 1093 were placed in the hands of school administrators in Mr. Musgrove's district, a meeting was called in Cisco on March 27, and at Palo Pinto on March 28 for the purpose of discussing the Musgrove bill and one authored by State Rep. Swanson of Houston that also proposed UIL changes.

**HEARING ON COURT BILL TUESDAY AT 2:30**

A public hearing has been called for Tuesday, May 6, on State Rep. Temple Dickson's bill that would, if passed, permit Eastland's 11th Court of Civil Appeals to sit in Abilene, according to a report by Rep. Burke Musgrove.

The House Judiciary Committee was assigned the bill after Rep. Dickson introduced it recently. Eastland Countians made a trip to Austin in an opposed a Dickson bill then, which would have overtly moved the Appeals Court to Abilene.

So far as is known here, there are no plans to make another expedition to Austin to voice objection to the "submissive" bill, although a token notice might be wist. Indications here are that most are relying on State Sen. Tom Creighton to help protect Eastland County's efforts, in the event the bill is handed out of the committee with a favorable recommendation. It is felt that such a bill might actually be passed by the House as an embarrassment to Rep. Musgrove, but stopped in the State Senate. Indications were that such a measure was seriously considered two years ago, due to Rep. Musgrove's "wheeling and dealing" manner in the House.

This, of course, leaves Eastland Countians, who are naturally concerned about the Court remaining in Eastland, in a quandary — whether to "go forth" and voice themselves again, or to remain calm, assuming that the court-move measure is merely a House political football.

At week's end, Rep. Musgrove appeared to have his hands full of Interscholastic League programs, so most agreed that it's comforting to have a man of Sen. Creighton's stature, looking after things in Austin.

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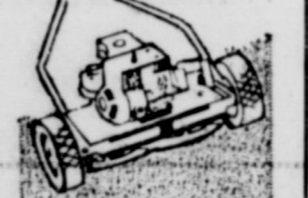
