Surprise Snow Storm Swoops In Suddenly

"Most unusual" was the way the official weather observer and other Eastland Countians described the snow they found early Friday. Apparently Eastland, Cisco and Ranger were in a band that stretched from the New Mexico border into East Texas where snow fell early Friday. Points north (Breckenridge) and south of here had rain, but no snow, it was reported. Measurements ran from an official three (3) inches at Eastland, through 10 a. m., to unofficial four (4) inches at Cisco.

Weather Observer James Dabney reported that rain began at 4:30 a. m. and measured .52 of an inch by 7 a. m., when the snow began to fall. The predicted temperatures of from 42 to 44 degrees, dropped on down and stood at 35 degrees in Eastland at 7. It came on down a degree or two before rising, and melting the extra-wet snow. The temperature was 32 at 10 a. m. Friday, Dabney said. Bridges and culverts were slick in the Cisco area and were sanded by the Highway Department Maintenance Crews. Several auto wrecks were blamed on the winter weather: a bad crash was reported at Gordon Junction, and a minor crash on East Main in Eastland just before noon. Major thawing and melting began around noon, and the snowfall which continued un-

65 Employees Vote 'FOR' Raises Here

When Victor Cornelius polled his employees individually Thursday to see if they felt they deserved a 10 cent hour raise, the vote was almost unanimously affirmative. Cornelius rewarded his 65 employees' self-confidence with just such a raise in Friday's pay check. The raise, the third this year, upped the payroll at the theatrical advertising and menu printing plant by approximately \$14,500 per year. Thursday, Cornelius visited with each employee at his work, asking him (or her) to sign a sheet of paper under one of two headings which stated that he did or did not feel he deserved such a raise. He was not surprised at the result, he said, and evidently concurred with the overwhelming majority.

Mrs. Sally Ellen Hines, 87, died Wednesday in Odessa. Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Friday in Higginbotham Funeral Chapel at Rising Star, with the Rev. Mart Agnew of Cisco officiating, assisted by the Rev. Bill Goff, pastor of Bethel Baptist Church of Eastland. Burial was in the Rising Star Cemetery. Born Aug. 31, 1881 in Coke County, she married Andrew F. Hines in Eastland on Feb. 10, 1910. They lived in Eastland County, north of Rising Star, for several years. He died April 29, 1950. Survivors include three sons, Morgan of Garland, C. P. and Franklin, both of Odessa; five daughters, Mrs. Douglas Burns and Mrs. Jack Kitchens, both of Eastland; Mrs. L. L. Jordan of Odessa, Mrs. Nancy Mshan of Pecos, and Mrs. E. A. Hammer of Kermit; and one sister, Mrs. Minnie West of Flagstaff, Ariz.

Loboes Score 16-0 Victory Over Mavericks In League Grid Action

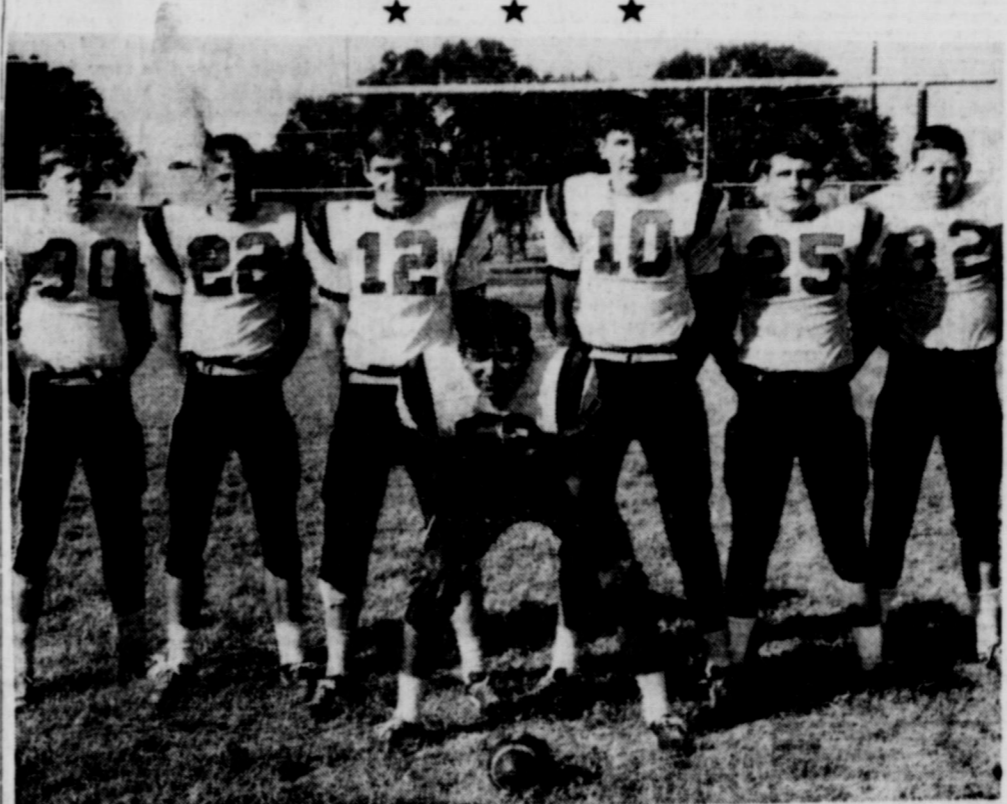
Contest Played In Bad Weather

Playing in freezing weather on a wet field, the Cisco High School Loboes scored a 16-to-0 victory over the Eastland High

School Mavericks in District 8-AA football action at Chesley Field in Cisco Friday night. A good crowd shivered through the contest. The victory left Cisco tied for second place with Comanche after the latter team lost 28-0 to Granbury Friday night.

Cisco and Comanche will settle the second place issue in the season's finals there next Friday night. Granbury, with only a tie to mar their record, finishes this week with winless Hamilton. Eastland concludes the season at home with Clyde.

The Mavericks may have set a record for hard luck as they saw nine fumbles covered by Cisco players. The Loboes lost three fumbles and recovered three more of their own. Several inches of snow had been pushed off the field by a street maintainer a few hours before game time, leaving the ground soggy and cold. The opening period was scoreless with fumbles preventing a threat.



THE MAVERICK OFFENSE — Looking forward to a dry field and non-freezing temperatures when Clyde comes to Eastland next Friday night for the last game of the season are Halfback Randy Boles, End George Simms, Quarterback Eddie Kincaid, Center Alex Jimenez, Quarterback Craig Lund, Tailback Steve Wilson and Fullback Randy Lawrence. The Mavericks played Cisco Friday night in a mud puddle in bone-chilling weather. The Mavericks stand at 6-1-2.

Midway in the second, Cisco got the ball in midfield on a fumble recovery. On fourth down, needing eight yards, Cisco's FB Randy Honea dropped back to punt. The ball was low and Honea picked up the ball and circled left for 28 yards to the Maverick 20. On second down, HB Johnny Hargrave broke through center and raced 19 yards to score. Honea kicked the extra point. As the period ended, Honea recovered an Eastland fumble on the Cisco 18 to end a drive that had gone to the Cisco 10.

Near the end of the third period, Center Steve Linebarger recovered a fumble for Cisco on the Eastland 43. Hargrave drove 12 yards and got 10 more yards in three plays. Early in the fourth, three plays had been stopped and Honea kicked a field goal from the 25-yard line, giving Cisco a 10-0 lead. Late in the final period, Cisco got possession by recovering a fumble on the Eastland 37. Short gains by Sam Fletcher and Honea carried to the 16 and Honea circled right in to the end zone. His PAT try was blocked.

Steve Wilson was a top hand for the Mavericks. He gained 90 yards in 27 line bucks, and he had six unassisted tackles. Craig Lund, the MV QB, connected on eight of 10 passing efforts for 72 yards, despite the numbing cold weather. Other top Maverick defenders were Terry Grimes with eight tackles and a fumble recovery, Randy Lawrence with five tackles and a PAT kick blocked, George Simms with four tackles and a fumble recovery, and Bill Hoffmann, Phillip Smith and Eddie Kincaid with five tackles each.

Hargrave was Cisco's busiest ball carrier. He had 115 yards in 26 times up. Honea, who stood out in all departments, had 58 yards in eight bucks, and QB James Wheat carried 15 times but was hit for losses several times to cut his net gain to 10 yards. Sam Fletcher carried five times for 19 yards. Jack Hailey led Cisco tacklers with 10 unassisted stops. Mike Farnsworth had nine and a fumble recovery. Steve Linebarger had six and a fumble recovery, and John Morris had five and two fumble recoveries. Brock Fiege, Al Haysel and Richard Rutledge also did a fine defensive job.

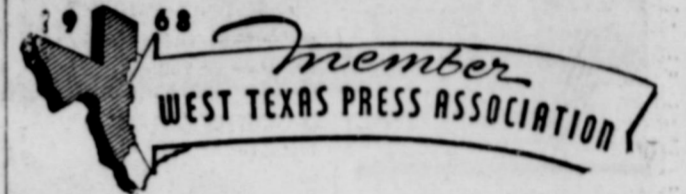

If you are unable to attend please contact Mr. Jack Hall at the El Morocco Motel and make an appointment for a free hearing test in your home.

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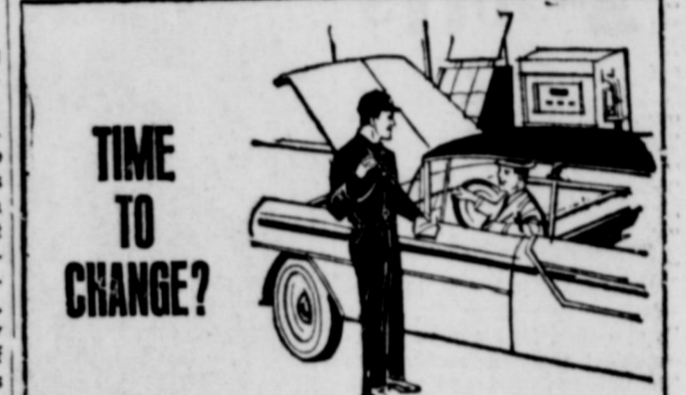

THE GORDON SPOT

 County Agricultural Agent
 It now looks as if our peanut crop will be one of the best ever. We do not yet know if the peanut crop in the county will be as large as the 1966 crop, but several farmers have told me their individual crop is better than it is in 1966. The average peanut yield in 1966 was 41.9 bushels per acre in Eastland county—the best yield on record.
 Many believe that this year's crop will be valued higher than the 1966 crop because the price of peanuts are \$13.25 per ton over the '66 price.
 The County ASCS records show that the average yields of the county were from 17 to 23 bushels per acre, between 1960 and 1964. In 1965 the yield was 23.2 bushels and in 1967 it was 31.2.
 Increased use of irrigation and better production practices are largely responsible for the increase in yields the last few years. However, the weather was very favorable in 1966 as well as this year. While the yields and the prices are up this year, we would also mention that costs of production is up. Many

This year's Christmas Seal originates from an old English folklore. The Seal is "a partridge in a pear tree," a plump partridge and a ripe golden pear on a field of blue and yellow.

Twelve Days of Christmas" is the rollicking old English folksong in which "a partridge in a pear tree" is one of the lines. The origin of the song is unknown. But it was probably a song of the countryside, of wandering minstrels and Christmas fairs. The song honors the 12 days from Christmas, Dec. 25, to Epiphany, Jan. 6, the day the Three Wise Kings arrived from the East to visit the child.

Much of the fun of the song has always been trying to remember its long list of "gifts" that "my true love sent to me," ranging all the way from two turtle doves to 12 drummers drumming. In the old days "The Twelve Days of Christmas" not only was a test of memory but often times of sobriety.

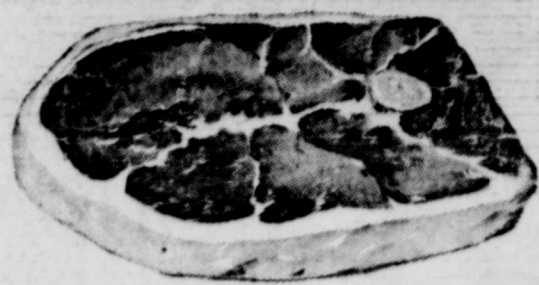

1968 Pecan Show To Be Dedicated To J. M. Cooper

The 1968 Eastland County Pecan Show will be dedicated to the late J. M. Cooper. The officers and directors of the Eastland Pecan Growers Association and the special event committee of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce made the decision in a joint meeting Nov. 4.

Grover Hallmark, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce committee, said this would be the 16th annual Eastland County Pecan Show and the first time for the show to be held in Eastland. He said it would be an appropriate occasion to honor Cooper, the former county agent, who organized the first pecan show in the state.

PEANUT SALE-LEASE

The sale and lease of peanuts may be made within the county through April 1, 1969. The 1968 yields and 1969 allotments are not available in this office at this time but should be within the next few weeks. If you plan to sell or lease peanuts you may file an application now for a yield on your farm. The yield will be established when the information required is available in this office.

1969 WHEAT PROGRAM
Producers who elect to participate in the 1969 wheat program will have several choices:

- (1) They may plant their entire allotment and divert an acreage equal to 15% of the allotment.
 - (2) They may elect to divert up to 50% of their allotment or in the case of small farms with 21.7 acres or less the entire allotment may be diverted.
- A sign up will be held in the spring of 1969 and participation is voluntary. Domestic certificate payment will be based on 43% of the allotted acreage. This is an increase of 3% over 1968.

Important: To be eligible for domestic certificate payment the wheat must be planted by December 31 and must be farmed in workmanship manner. Additional details may be obtained at this office.

Crop approval should be signed and returned when the practice is complete.

Peanut marketing cards should be signed and returned as soon as marketing is completed.
