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Area's Newest Industry To Be Located In Cisco

Announcement of the location of a new industrial facility in Cisco that is expected, in time, to add 100 or more good paying jobs to the industrial roster of this section, was officially made Tuesday.

Bill Bowerman, president of the Oil States Rubber Company at Arlington, said that his company has selected Cisco as the site for a second plant for the manufacture of heavy rubber goods which the company makes for use in oil field and other industrial machines.

Location of the plant will be in the former Humble Pipe Line Company shop district in southeast Cisco, which Oil States, has leased from the Cisco Industrial Foundation.

John Ritchie of Arlington will be superintendent of the new plant. The remainder of the employees are being selected from local applicant lists, made by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

Here to direct the operations in remodeling, equipping and otherwise preparing the site and buildings for the beginning of operations is Jim Haddock, vice-president in charge of plant planning and engineering.

For the initial operation period, Haddock explained the Cisco plant will be an auxiliary plant to the Arlington factory, making the rough rubber parts in the big steam presses which are to be installed here, and sending the casts to Arlington for finishing and marketing. The plant will employ at the outset no more than 10 people, mostly men.

The problems of training the employees and setting up an efficient operation require that the company move with discretion in its program here, Mr. Haddock explained.

If all goes well, as expected, he said, the company expects to build a large and modern factory on the Humble site and to upgrade its manufacturing processes, to do a complete job, including the finishing of products.

The company makes molded rubber fittings for use in the oil fields and other heavy industry, including swab cups, drilling head rubbers, rod guides, pipe line pigs and spears, bridge bearing pads, inflatable packers for off shore drilling, pistons for mud pumps, air tubes for the famed Wichita clutch and other fittings.

Officials of the company are Mr. Bowerman, president; Mr. Haddock, vice-president; Fred Britton, vice-president in charge of sales; Muri Richardson, vice-president in charge of engineering; Dick Kremer, vice-president in charge of production, and Glen Harris, all of Arlington.

Announcement of the location in this area culminated three months of investigation

of various sites, study of the Cisco facilities, and a labor survey conducted through the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

"We were impressed with what Cisco had to offer," Mr. Haddock said, "and with the temporary plant facilities provided by the Cisco Industrial Foundation in the Humble site, and we were particularly impressed with the cooperative spirit of the Cisco people we dealt with."

Negotiations between the company and the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and Industrial Foundation began about three months ago.

Workmen this week were remodeling one of the large shop buildings, installing insulation, and doing other work in preparation for the installation of the big presses with which the company will manufacture its goods.

James McCracken, local banker and president of the Cisco Industrial Foundation, expressed the pleasure of the community over the selection of Cisco as the site for the new plant.

"It will in time represent a big addition to the industrial community of this section and help not only Cisco, but the entire area with the wages and purchasing it will make possible," he said.

"We are proud indeed to welcome the Oil States Rubber Company to our industrial community."

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Lil' Bit of Sweden Visiting Here in Lion Exchange Plan

Two seventeen-year-old Swedish girls have arrived for a month's visit in Eastland County.

Eva Brenner of Uriststad will stay in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Wendell Siebert and Mr. and Mrs. Ed Ethridge in Eastland. Marianne Ohlsson of Hallefors will visit Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Meredith of Olden and Dr. and Mrs. E. W. Mince of Ranger.

Both are Lions Club Exchange Students and have been corresponding with the local families since April. They flew non-stop to Love Field, where they were met by the Sieberts and Merediths.

The girls will leave here July 13 for sight-seeing tours of Washington, D. C. and New York City. They will fly home July 19. While in Texas, they will be taken to Casa Manana, Six Flags, Abilene, Lubbock, Austin, and the LBJ Ranch. Marianne will

Texas is their first view of the United States and they claim it is "much as expected, especially the size and temperature." One of the first questions Marianne asked, "What is your temperature there? Do you have air-conditioning there?" It was fifty degrees in Stockholm when they boarded the plane and both girls found that hot. Average temperature in Sweden is forty in the summer and five in the winter.

Eva said, "Everyone stays at home during the winter. Sometimes the snow is quite deep and there is only four hours of daylight."

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visit Carlsbad Caverns and both girls plan to "at least try to water ski."

Swedish students are required to attend school from ages 7 through 15 and may attend through 19 before entering the University. The grades are about a year ahead of the grades in Texas. Girls are required to take home economics for four years and gym for three hours a week. Girls are allowed more freedom in choice of school dress: shorter skirts, slacks or jeans with shirts, and sandals. Otherwise, the Swedish schools are much more strict.

Eva and Marianne said. Foreign languages are required from the age of ten and English is the one most often chosen. German is the second choice and French the third. Italian, Spanish, and Russian are also taught. The girls are in a grade approximate to the freshman year in an American college, but Marianne has already had five years of chemistry.

Marianne has visited Norway, Denmark, England, Belgium, Poland, France, Germany, Italy, Spain, Greece, Turkey, Austria and Switzerland. Eva is also widely traveled and enjoys travel so much that she plans to work in the tourist field after completing her education.

Marianne wants to become a lawyer or an engineer. Her father is an engineer who is director of two steel factories and her mother is a chemistry, physics, and mathematics teacher.

Eva's father is a Renault dealer and her mother is a housewife. She has two younger sisters who are ten and seven and "quite excited about all this."

Teag homes are as the girls thought they would be in size, but a little different in arrangement. Eva found it unusual for the den and kitchen to be together, since homes in Sweden have a more formal arrangement, including dining room separated from the kitchen.

Another difference here is the way "boys and girls come together to the restaurants and sit and visit together," Eva said. "At home, we date sometimes from the age of 15, but we meet in our homes. Sometimes we go to a movie. But we have not the cars and the freedom to talk together at the restaurants as the young people do here."

Eva had never heard of a watermelon until this week and is looking forward to tasting it. Marianne ate tacos for the first time and liked this new food very much.

Eva spoke to the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday and Marianne will speak next Tuesday.

The girls visited the Eastland livestock Auction Tuesday and are anxious to see a rodeo. Marianne's first purchases were cowboy boots and cowboy hat. They also visited the Eastland County Jail which they found "surprising." The number of prisoners was a shock to them; in Sweden one jail would be sufficient for a town with a population of 150,000. And in Sweden the jails are "good, really much too good." Each cell has its own television and the food is excellent. Marianne said, "Prisoners in Norway will escape just to come and be in a Swedish jail."

If you want your program acres measured after planting, the time for requesting this service is now. This includes cotton, feed grain, diverted acres, and peanuts.

To request this measurement service, a farm producer must do so either by telephone or in person at the county office. Service fees are \$5.00 for the first plot and farm visit plus \$2.00 for each additional plot plus \$0.5 per allotted or base acre. Fees for the service must be paid in advance of a reporter making a farm visit.

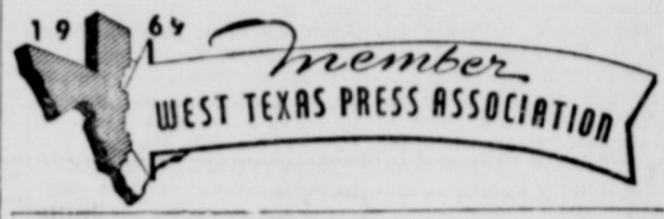

Storm Does Many Thousands In Damage To Orchards And Property

An assessment of the damage caused by the violent windstorm which swept through southern Rising Star and the northern edge of Brown County late Thursday of last week revealed that many thousands of dollars in value was lost in buildings, fruit and pecan orchards, shade trees and other property.

Numbers of residents reported seeing a small tornado form and dip to the earth, but the twister, if such, appeared to remain mostly in the clouds and the greater part of the damage was caused by the high winds, which were so strong that they bent trees to the ground and uprooted many. There was comparatively light hail.

However, sheets of iron roofing torn from a barn belonging to Oscar White in southeast Rising Star where found from three-fourths to a mile away as if they had been carried in the air for that distance. The barn, which has tile walls, was almost demolished.

Heaviest damage appeared to have been done to valuable fruit and pecan orchards in the affected strip.

The largest commercial pecan and peach orchard developed by the late C. E. Smith in southwest Rising Star, suffered extremely heavy damage. Mrs. Smith said.

One of the finest prospects in years for fruit and pecan production in the orchard was partially erased by the high winds which tore limbs from trees in great numbers, destroyed many of the trees, and stripped the young fruit from those left standing.

The Jack Agnew fruit and pecan orchard, a large commercial orchard bordering Highway 183 just south of Rising Star received the full brunt of the high winds and suffered heavy tree damage and fruit loss.

Similar damage was reported by Duck Bailey, another commercial fruit grower who earlier had told this newspaper that fruit and pecan prospects were the finest in years.

The Lee Clark orchard was also badly damaged.

Damage to residential property, shade trees, fences and shrubbery in the affected area was heavy.

Mr. and Mrs. Ray Alexander, who live near the Rising Star Tumbleweed Truck Stop, said that the suction of the storm pulled one wall of their kitchen several inches off the foundation. The kitchen doors were closed when the wind hit, Mr. Alexander said, and the wall was pulled

outward with a loud rending sound. Besides the White Barn, there were reports of heavy damage to barns on E. O. Kizer farm south of town and the Earl Allen farm both of which were unroofed. In the extreme southern edge of Rising Star a rock barn and garage building simply "caved in" under the power of the wind.

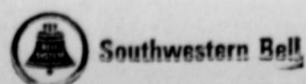

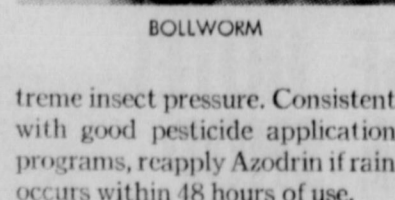

August 1 Deadline For Certifying Crop Acreage

August 1 is the deadline for reporting acreage planted to peanuts, cotton and feed grain by participating farms, Jesse G. Meredith, officer manager for the Eastland County ASC said this week. The ASC will not visit the farms and measure acreage under the new program, and it is the responsibility of the operator of the farm to see that 1969 acreages of crops covered by the ASC are reported in time and accurately, he said. Reporting should be done as soon as crop plantings are completed.

"A participating farmer cannot afford to guess at his acreage," he explained. "He should be sure before he certifies. If he wishes his crop to be measured before he certifies he should file his request at once. June 15 is the final date to file application for this service.

A small fee will be charged for the service, but it could save the farmer money later on."

Meredith suggested that a farmer who is not sure of his acreage or his ability to

measure it properly should request the service as a precaution.

Applications for new grower wheat allotments must be filed at the County ASC office not later than July 1. Meredith said. Eligibility requirements are now available at the office.

The minimum price support for peanuts of the 1969 crop has been announced as \$247.50 per ton. This minimum is subject to possible upward adjustments at the beginning of the marketing year, which is August 1, he said. The preliminary penalty rate for excess peanuts is 93 cents per pound.

June 30 is the final date for reporting Coastal Bermuda sprigging on all acreage under ACP practices. This acreage, as in other crops, must be certified by the producer. Incorrectly certified acreages could result in complete loss of the ACP payment, he warned.

Meredith reminded producers that acreage diverted under the wheat grain and wheat program may not be grazed until October 1, and that oats and rye on diverted acreage must have been destroyed by May 1.



THE GORDON SPOT

When you come by the county agent's office you'll see a new face. Betty McDaniel is working for the county this summer and has been placed in our office. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. McDaniel of Carbon. Betty was valedictorian of the 1969 graduating class at Carbon. I read in the Gorman Progress that she had a 96.84 average—one of the highest ever earned by a graduate of Carbon.

We think she will be a lot of help to us this summer.

There sure are a lot of people using Di Syston to control honey dew aphids in pecan trees. It's not too late to get the granules in the ground since the aphids do not usually get bad until July and August.

Roy Lane, District Clerk in Eastland, said he was sure sold on Di Syston. He has always had trouble with honey

dew, but used Di Syston last year and got one hundred percent control.

You can't be too careful with this insecticide because it is sure dangerous. Don't let the Di Syston come in contact with your skin nor inhale the fumes. It is safe to use if you follow those two rules.

Following directions on the label is important when using any insecticide. Even then you must be careful.

Sam Kimmell of Cisco said he sprayed the ornamentals with Malathion and poisoned his dog in the process. Sam got the dog to Dr. Bill Cardwell in time though and at last report the dog was improving.

I sure have seen some pretty

vegetable gardens all over the county this spring. Mrs. Lloyd Williams, who lives at Lake Leon, came by the office to pick up some publications. She was very enthused over her garden. Th Williams retired about two years ago and moved to Eastland County. They had already harvested tomatoes, okra, and many other vegetables on June 4.

If you are having trouble with insects in your garden you might like to have a copy of bulletin L-642, Insect Control in the Home Garden. Come by or call the county agents office for a copy.

Almost every one was glad to see the rain on June 3. I know some peanut farmers were waiting for rain before they planted.

Harold Dunham was one who was happy over the rain. He had just sprigged 50 A. of coastal bermuda. The rain came just at the right time.

J. D. Griffin Jr. of Carbon sprigged the coastal and said Harold Dunham had his land in excellent condition for sprigging. A good seed bed is usually the key to getting a good stand of coastal bermuda.

Water Claims Must Be Filed By Sept. 1st

Anyone using water from a public stream who does not claim a water right under a certified filing or a permit from the state must record his claim by September 1, the Texas Water Rights Commission has announced.

Failure to do so will "extinguish and bar" the claim of water right, according to Sec-

tion 4 of the Adjudication Act, the commission said.

Users of water for domestic and livestock watering purposes are exempt from this requirement, however.

All affected water users who have not already filed their claim were urged by the Commission to do so as soon as possible.

Valid claims will be recognized to the extent of maximum use of water without waste during any year between 1963 and 1967. Where the user was in the process of constructing a system or had facilities to use a larger amount of water on the effective date of the Act than he had actually used, use from 1968 to 1970 may be recognized.

forms for filing claims under the Water Rights Adjudication Act may be obtained from the Texas Water Rights Commission, P. O. Box 12396, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711, the announcement said.
