## New Hours at Post Office for Saturdays

In keeping with the directives issued by Postmaster General W. Marvin Watson, and the recently-enacted tax bill, the Eastland Post Office will implement the following policies and services. Acting Postmaster Marcus S. O'Dell has announced.

Effective Saturday, July 27, 1968, all Saturday window service will be discontinued.

A "Call Window" for the purpose of delivering mail to General Delivery, Left Notice, and Hold mail Patrons will be open for one hour, from 11 to 12 noon.

There will be only one collection, effective July 27, 1968, on Saturdays from the downtown street and building deposit boxes. However, no change is being made in the scheduled arrival or departure of mail from the Eastland Post Office. Anyone desiring to deposit mail will need to place it in the Post Office Lobby drops, Mr. O'Dell said.

No restrictions on the delivery of mail by carriers to any Patron will be implemented at this time.

These restrictions will make possible a sizable saving of man-hours at our Post Office, but the very best service possible will continue to be rendered to all, he said.

## Dist. Governor To Visit Rotary Here Aug. 2

Rotarians will welcome on Friday, Aug. 2 the governor of this Rotary district, Dr. Ike H. Harrison of Fort Worth.

He will address the Rotary Club of Eastland, one of 41 in his district, and will confer with Mr. Joe Culpepper, president of the local Rotary club, and with other club officials to obtain information on the group's plans for its service activities and to offer suggestions on Rotary administrative matters.

Dr. Harrison is one of 288 Rotary governors in all parts of the world who are serving as representatives of Rotary International in districts composed of member clubs. Each district leader is responsible for supervising the clubs in his area. Rotary, an international men's service organization, has more than 633,000 members in some 13,319 clubs in 143 countries.

A member and past president of the Rotary Club of Fort Worth, Dr. Harrison is Dean of the M. J. Neeley School of Business, Texas Christian University. He was elected to office at the Rotary convention in Mexico City in May, 1968 and will serve until June 30, 1969.

Though a seasoned Rotarian before his election to the office of district governor, Dr. Harrison attended an eight-day international assembly last May at Lake Placid, N. Y., U. S. A., at which all Rotary governors for 1968-69 attended in-depth seminars to plan for their jobs. One of his biggest jobs will be to hold a district conference of all Rotary clubs in this area. The conference was held at the Sheraton Texas March 13, 14, 15, 1969, in Fort Worth.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — In 1970 a new census of an estimated 205 million people will be taken in the United States. Pre-test questions are now being tried out in South Carolina and Wisconsin. A certain number of people in the State of Connecticut have already had all or part of the approximately 100 questions submitted to them to test reaction and response.

Some of the questions proposed for the 1970 census are too embarrassing to put in public print. Some of them compare to Dr. Kinsey's Report of a few years ago and definitely invade the privacy of the individual.

Test questions going into the states on a trial basis include:

Do you share your bathtub or shower?  
What is your telephone number?  
How much rent do you pay?  
How many hours did your husband work last week?

How many babies has your wife had?  
Do you walk to work or take a taxicab?  
How much money did you make last year.

Over the last several years some in Congress and others outside Government have proposed that there be established a National Data Center which would use the Census Reports as a basis for a dossier file on every American.

No one argues that there should not be a census and, in fact, there are good and substantial reasons why the right kind of Census should be taken every five years instead of ten. There is a vast difference, however, in accounting for the number of people, their age, sex and occupation, and those which invade privacy, and to which people should not be subjected.

The U. S. Census is authorized by the Constitution and must be conducted for certain necessary purposes. We, of course, must know what our population is and, in fact, this is what the Constitution originally provided. Originally, it was intended for the purpose of apportioning the U. S. House of Representatives. To quote the authority contained in the Constitution suggests he simply intended: "The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such a manner as they shall by law direct." Of course, this leaves room for an expansion of information in accordance with the times, but the times never require people to reveal intimate data about themselves which is not the Government's business. In addition, they want to impose on those who refuse to answer for any reason, a fine of \$100 and a jail term of up to 60 days. The vast majority of people would probably not object to some form of compulsory requirement to respond to essential questions.

For the purpose of identifying the citizens of our Country and to serve the interest of business which needs certain information, it is suggested that seven questions on a simple form, mailed to each household, should meet the requirements. These are: Name and address; relation to head of household; sex; date of birth; race or color; marital status; and visitors in home at the time of Census.

Instead of this simple requirement, the pre-test forms and those which may be submitted unless legislative action prohibits it, will contain more than 100 questions.

A bill now before the Congress would require this basic information on each individual but would permit the answer

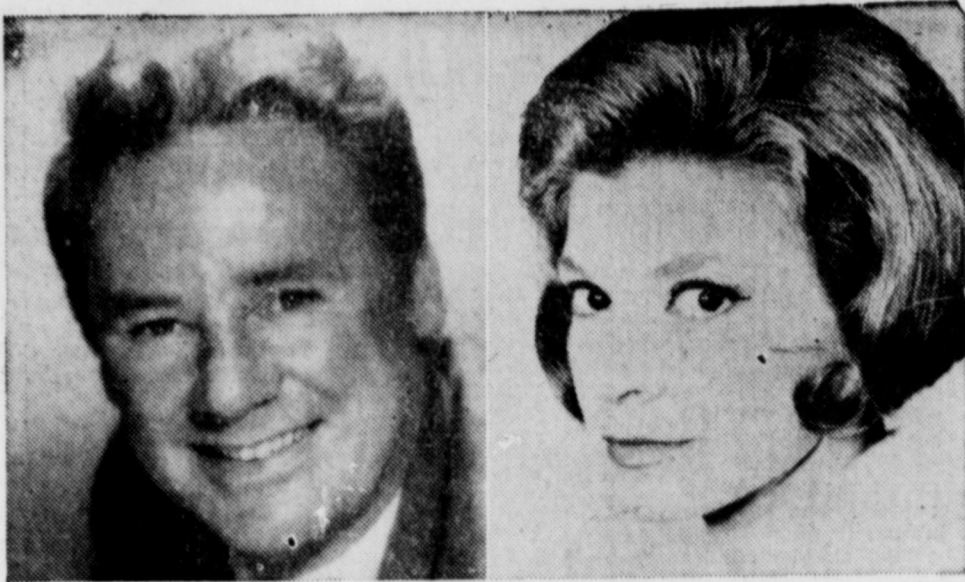

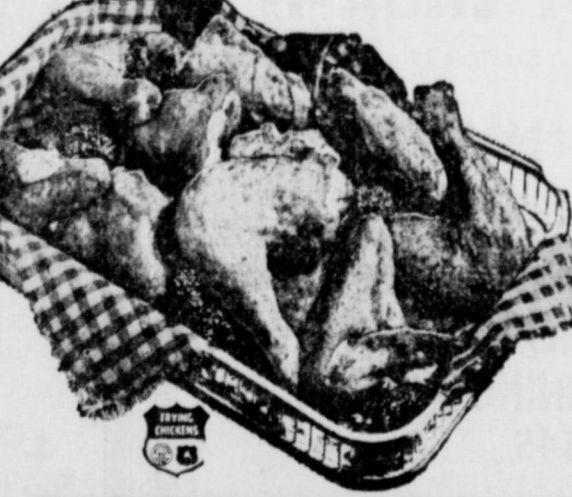
