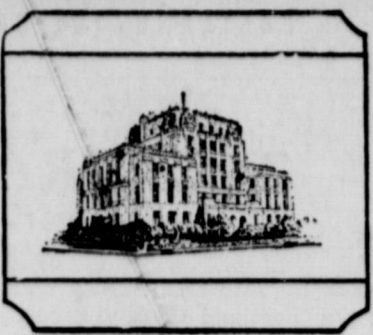

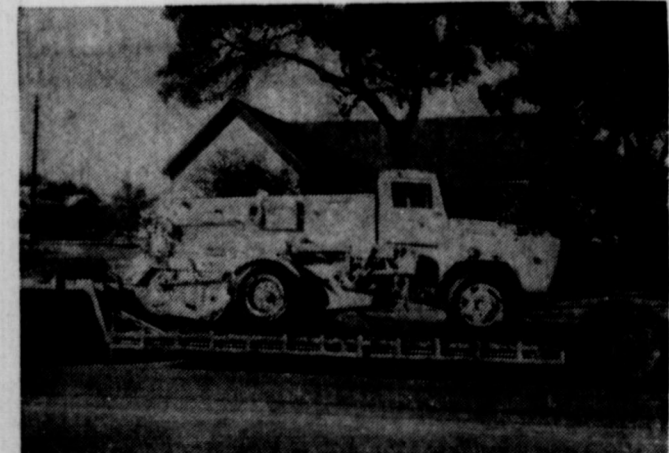

THE PEANUT LINE — When MK and T abandoned its railroad from Stamford to Waco, Gorman Peanuts and other interested shippers purchased the line from Gorman to Dublin. It is known as the Texas Central Railroad and connects with the Santa Fe at Dublin. Gorman Peanuts has spent for over 15,000,000 lbs. of shelled peanuts. These peanuts are shipped by rail and truck all over the United States.

CITY TAX TALKED AGAIN

CITY EMPLOYEES GET 5% PAY INCREASE

Eastland City Commissioners met Monday night and voted to give each city employee a five per cent salary increase, City Manager Lewis Tiner announced.

Appearing before the commission were Pat Moseley of Olden in regard to the main water line east of town which will have to be rerouted be-

cause of Interstate Highway 30 and Sam Kimmell of Cisco, representative of the Eastland County Livestock Grower's Association which joined the city and Lake Side Country Club in buying an unused line northwest of town. Kimmell reported that his group had paid its one-third of the cost.

The possibility of calling an election for voting on whether a city sales tax is desired by the citizens was discussed. Some of the commissioners reported that local citizens had asked them to re-open the tax question considered closed when a mayor-appointed committee reported no immediate need for the income for the city from the tax. No action was taken regarding the sales tax election.

Commissioners discussed extending the water line south of town in the event that Carbon requests such action.

Best Peanut Crop Ever To Top \$5.6 Million Mark

Another bumper peanut crop for Eastland County? Even bigger and better than 1966?

That's the way it looks, according to every index. The U. S. Department of Agriculture offices report all signs up. Businessmen throughout the county report "increased business" as a result of the abundant harvest.

Bank deposits at First National Bank, Gorman, are reported up over a million dollars from the crop, and word is that the bank at Rising Star will show an increase of above a million.

There's good crops, not-so-good crops and less than average crops, but on a whole, the figures are up. (A dry-land farmer in the

Kokomo area reported that for ten days straight he harvested \$2,300 worth of peanuts a day. And that on 170 acres.

Gilbert Meredith, manager of the ASCS office, reports that 32,686.3 acres were planted this year — that's up over a 1,000 acres from previous years. His preliminary estimate of the county's yield is 1,450 pounds per acre (In 1966, it was 1,266). Total estimated production for the county is 4.7 million pounds for a total estimated income at the good grade rate of 12c a pound at \$5.6 million. Peanuts are grading good and high.

A random sampling from 20 farms showed a total of 705.5 acres planted; 1,318,945 pounds; for a yield average of 1,870 pounds per acre. Average yield on these farms is 62.3 bushels.

The average yield for 1967 (county-wide) was 937 pounds with a total value of the 29,814,188 pounds produced, at 11c per pound of \$3,279,560.

Irrigation (in active use since the 1965 crop and fertilization, resulting in increased yields yearly, tied with increased support prices, accounts for the increased income from the county's big cash crop.

Acres are up some 1,000 this year, and preliminary reports indicate that the county's allotment will be up (a little) for next year.

Ideal growing and harvesting weather conditions have certainly been instrumental in producing the bumper crop.

A tractor maintenance short course for adult farmers will be held Dec. 2-5 under the supervision of the Olden High School Vocational Agriculture Department according to Mr. T. M. Dunn, Superintendent, and Mr. Gilbert Copeland, teacher of vocational agriculture.

The short course is being sponsored by the Vocational Agriculture Department of Olden High School.

Mr. Harold T. Wiedemann, tractor maintenance specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

The short course at Olden is scheduled to begin Dec. 2 at 7:30 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held Dec. 3, 4 and 5th.

During the dates the course is in progress Mr. Wiedemann will be available to assist farmers with individual tractor problems and to provide "on-the-farm" instruction according to Copeland.

Farmers interested in attending the course should write or call the Superintendent, Mr. Dunn or the Teacher of Vocational Agriculture at Ranger, Eastland or Olden. An entry fee of \$2 will be charged.

Members of the Eastland Industrial Training Team will meet at 7 p. m. Thursday at the Eastland National Bank where they will go through a rehearsal program in preparation for a "big test" to be held here on Friday morning.

Utilizing all their charts and visual aids, materials, the members will give a run-through of the information and data that they have assembled during the past, recent six-weeks of intensive training program. H. T. Wilson, chairman of the local Industrial Foundation, will serve as quiz Thursday evening.

Two members from the Texas Industrial Commission will be in town Friday morning, posing as industrial prospects,

ganized in 1940 by O. T. Shell and two sons, Melvin and Wilbur. Its first shelling plant was in a building 40 x 60 feet. The Shells pioneered the use of dryers for handling peanuts in 1960 with 20 drying bins. Today they have 120 drying bins in Gorman and a 20 bin dryer and warehouse of 3,000 ton capacity in Fort Cobb, Okla. In 1965 the plant was leased to American Cold Storage Corp., Suffolk, Va. and is now operated under the trade name Gorman Peanuts, A Division of American Cold Storage Corp.

PEANUTS are one of America's basic crops and could be most important in the case of a natural disaster or nuclear attack. The peanut is a most palatable and nutritious food. Calories per ounce for peanuts is 155 compared to some foods such as ham, 75; steak, 68; and pecans, 210. The energy value of 1 pound of peanuts equals that of 4 pounds of beef steak.

The Gorman area consisting of Eastland, Comanche and Erath Counties produce 120,000 acres. Eastland County boasts the second largest peanut acreage in the nation with 39,019.6 acres. Comanche County is first with 60,421.8 acres. Average annual rainfall for the area is 25 inches. Irrigation started in 1964, has contributed to the growth of this area. Wells are shallow and normally produce from 50 to 250 gallon per minute.

The SWPGA administers the CCC price support program for the southwest states. The association also performs other important duties for the peanut industry too numerous to mention.

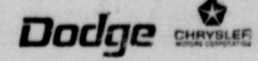
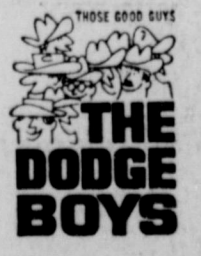

past -- and this does not apply only to football.

One of the finest things about the 1968 Maverick team was the general attitude of the players and fans. We are all proud to have played on the Maverick team and we are very grateful to the people of Eastland for the tremendous spirit they have shown in their overwhelming support of the Mavericks.

I would like to urge any boy who is considering playing football next year to go ahead and try it. It is an experience you will never forget.

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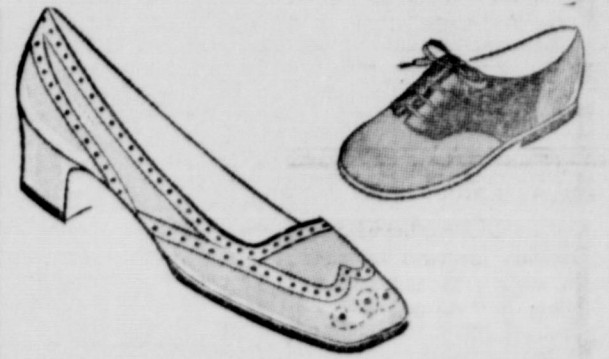

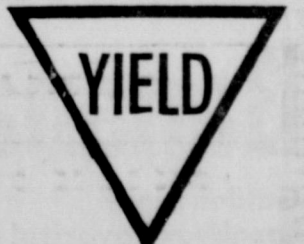
