

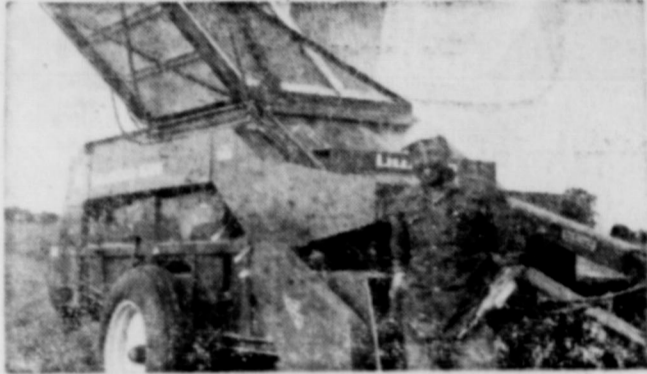

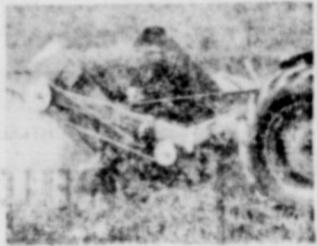

Callahan Constable Shot --Pair Arrested in Cisco

A 27-year-old Dallas man and a 21-year-old woman, said to be his wife, were being held in Cisco City jail Wednesday morning under investigation for the shooting of Night Watchman Byron Richardson of Cross Plains shortly before 5 a.m. Wednesday at Cross Plains.

The pair, driving an International pick-up truck filled with house painting equipment, were arrested by Cisco Police Chief Clyde Brymer and City Patrolman Morgan Fleming at the "Y" where the old Highway 40 joins the present Highway 80 in west Cisco at 8:40 o'clock Wednesday morning.

Chief Brymer said the pair offered no resistance. Mr. Richardson was in Hendricks Memorial Hospital in Abilene in critical condition. According to information available here Wednesday morning he had been shot twice, once in the arm and

again in the left side, the bullet lodging internally.

Mr. Richardson, a veteran law enforcement official, is a former Callahan county judge, deputy sheriff and justice of the peace at Cross Plains. He was a candidate for state representative in 1968 Democratic Primary.

Callahan County Sheriff Grayson Miller came here shortly after the arrest to take custody of the pair and direct the investigation.

According to information available here early Wednesday, Richardson had stopped an International pick-up truck occupied by a man and woman in Cross Plains about 13:40 a.m. Wednesday. He gave the man a warning ticket for lack of a driver's license, informants said.

Just what happened afterwards is not clear, but shortly after the ticket was issued shots were fired and Richardson was struck at least twice. According to reports, the Cross Plains officer fired back and then gave chase in his car for about a block before he was unable to control the car further and ran into a fence.

Deputy Sheriff Claude Cox of Cross Plains, alerted by Richardson's radio call for help, found him in a helpless condition and summoned a Higginbotham ambulance at Cross Plains and also called State Highway Patrolman Hilmer D. Welch who lives there.

The ambulance took Richardson to a Coleman hospital where he was given treatment and then transferred to Hendricks Memorial Hospital in Abilene.

Welch and Cox immediately alerted officers throughout the area and road blocks were set up.

A woman at Putnam, Wednesday morning, noticed an International pick-up truck similar to broadcast descriptions, occupied by a man and woman who seemed to be having trouble starting it.

The truck seemed to have come from a farm to market road leading to Cross Plains. She notified officers.

Chief Brymer and Patrolman Fleming brought the pair, whom they arrested in west Cisco shortly afterward, to the Cisco jail. The man was taken to Eastland Hospital for treatment of injured right hand.

Justice of the Peace W. L. Lewis and Eastland County District Attorney Emory Walton advised the woman of her legal rights before she was questioned. A similar warning was to be given the man.

Officers said that the man, a house painter, and his wife lived in Dallas and had come to Cross Plains only about a month ago. They were living with the woman's parents in Cross Plains, only about a block from the scene of the shooting.

Sheriff Miller said the pair would be taken to Baird for filing of formal charges.

Assisting in the investigation were Texas Ranger Sid Marchant of Abilene, Sheriff L. E. Sublett of Eastland county, and State Highway Patrol officers.

Contract to Ruby For 11-Mi. Int. 20 Job In County

Contract for highway construction in the Brownwood district has been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission. The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer E. M. Pritchard and will be in McCulloch and Eastland Counties. Cecil Ruby Co., Inc., of Aus-

...was awarded a contract for construction of flexible base and hot mix asphaltic concrete pavement on 11 miles of Interstate Highway 20 in Eastland County. Low bid was \$2,456,531.45.

The project extends from 1.0 mile west of Cisco to 0.6 mile east of State Highway 6. R. P. Haun Jr., of Eastland is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 450 working days.

Darco Construction Company of College Station was awarded a contract for construction of grading, structures, flexible

base and two-lane surface treatment of 10.1 miles of US Highway 87 in McCulloch. Low bid was \$1,869,394.50.

The project extends from 1.5 miles south of the San Saba River to 0.2 mile south of Farm to Market Road 2028 in Brady. Ben E. Dillon of Brady is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the work which will take an estimated 360 working days.

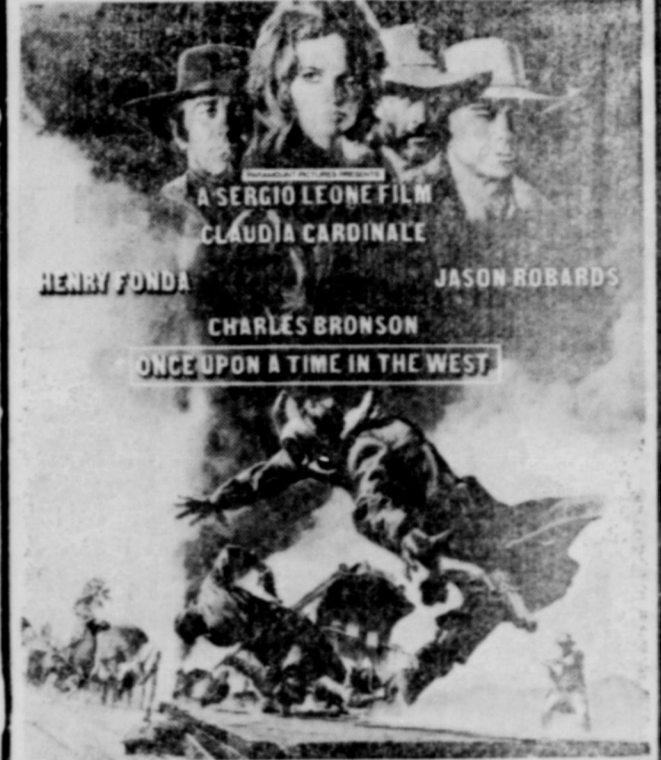

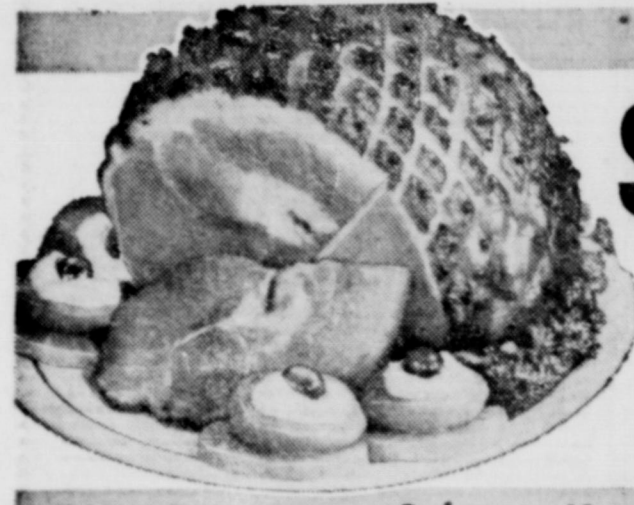
