Star Are Struck in Wage Dispute 'Unlucky, Lucky' Twins Plan Ranger, were on strike this week as part of a walk-out in a dispute over wage and gasoline plants of the transmission division of the Lone Star Gas Company, according to information Saturday.

James A. Agnew, contact man at the Pueblo plant for Local No. 4-478 OCAW, Ranger, representing the workers, said that 10 of the 15 men at Pueblo were on strike and that a picket line had been es-

tablished. The plant, he said, was being operated by five men, three workers, one of them a union member, and two supervisors, who were crossing the picket line.

During the strike a temporary change in the superintendency of the Pueblo plant has been made with J. D. Smith, recently transferred from Okliahoma, being replaced by Alton Redwine, who has had experience in strike handling, Agnew said.

Mr. Redwine, contacted at the Pueblo office told the Cisco Press, that he was not authorized to make any statement concerning the strike. The extent of the strike a
