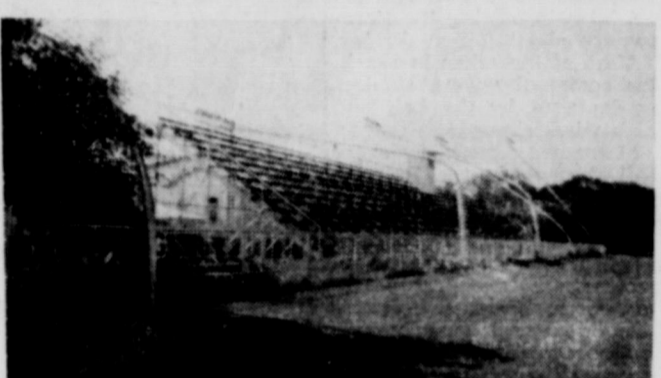
## Gospel Meeting Set June 22-29 at Church of Christ

# Sandler Mfg. Co. Will Become Important Unit Of Growing Burgess Industrial Group

Agreement for the purchase of the Sandler Manufacturing Company of Cisco by Burgess Industries, Inc., was announced Friday by Douglas Mcclay, chairman of the board of the Dallas-based firm. The purchase will be made through a subsidiary, Delta P Incorporated, also of Dallas, of which B. D. Jarvis is president.

Final details of the agreement, involving an undisclosed consideration, were worked out at a conference between the Burgess people and officials, key employees and chief stockholders of the Cisco firm at the First National Bank Friday noon.

The Cisco company, to be known as the Sandler division of the Delta P Inc., will be taken into the Burgess industrial family on July 1, under present plans, Mr. Mcclay said. There will be no change in the employee organization, Mr. Jarvis said. Lawrence Davis, who has been vice-president and general manager of the company since it began as a small 3-employee organization in 1953, will continue in that capacity under the new ownership.

The Cisco company, which began with the manufacture of septic tanks and rapidly broadened its operation into the custom fabrication of sheet steel for a great variety of industrial purposes, has been making products to Burgess designs for the past 11 years.

Burgess Industries, which grew from the old Burgess Battery Company, since 1944

has been specializing in the design and engineering of anti-noise and anti-pollution equipment for industrial uses. Most of its manufacturing was done by contract processing firms such as Sandler here.

"Our purchase of the Sandler plants represent an important step in our program for the integration of all phases of the industry, from design to manufacture and marketing," Mr. Mcclay explained. "In our dealings with the Sandler Manufacturing Company, which has been making equipment to our designs for a number of years, we have

been impressed with the management and technical efficiency of the company. It came naturally to us to acquire it as an important step in our program of integrating all aspects of the industry into our organization.

"We like the community, we like the management of the Sandler company and we are impressed with its skill in the production of the products we design and sell." Mr. Jarvis said that plans are being made for expanding the local production. It is anticipated, he said, that it will add to the number of employees, but if so and to what extent will be determined by economic conditions in the future. It is planned to enlarge the plant facilities, which will remain in their present site just off South D Avenue, at the junction of Tenth street, and to increase their efficiency. "We are pleased to have Sandler Manufacturing Company as a part of our organization," he said. "This acquisition represents a further step toward rounding out our capability in manufacturing our products. "We are acquiring not only an experienced management team and strong facilities, but are also situating ourselves in a good business climate. We look to grow in Cisco both by bringing products here which are currently produced elsewhere and through strong internal expansion of our products sales." He indicated that the Cisco facility would grow in import-

# City Missed By Tornado, Hit By Wind, Hail, Rain

A tornado danced over Eastland Thursday night, escorted by 74-mile-per-hour wind and baseball-sized hail which wreaked havoc with electric power, telephone service, trees, roofs, television antennas, and the nervous systems of Eastland residents.

Apparently there were no injuries resulting from the storm, but citizens spent a sleepless night which brought one ironic note. Electric power, first interrupted about 9:30 p. m., was reinstalled by 3 a. m. and the neon lights at the White Elephant Restaurant came on automatically. The signs had not been damaged by the storm, however, and began to burn when electricity was restored. The fire department sounded three sirens at 3:10 a. m. and most of the citizens who heard them took them to be an "all-clear" signal.

Part of a major storm system created by a combination of high temperature and humidity with low barometer readings, the storm built up and intensified north of Cisco, where a funnel cloud was

sighted by Cisco police. An Eastland man, who lives in the west part of town, reliably reported that he and

his family watched a swirling funnel cloud pass over Eastland. He remembers saying, "If that things comes down, it'll clean out a two-block area." His daughter described the cloud as "looking like a burning slush pit, upside down."

Telephones were out in Eastland and electric power was off from 9:30 until about midnight. Local and out-of-town crews worked through the night. The wind apparently hit hardest east and southeast of Eastland, damaging buildings and homes in the Kokomo Community. Mrs. Joe O'Neal, wife of the Kokomo Baptist Church pastor, said the parsonage was heavily damaged, with north and west windows broken, a door and storm screen blown off, and the roof damaged. The Kokomo Baptist Church had its windows and doors blown out, including the facings.

The Primitive Baptist Church at Kokomo was removed from its foundation and "splintered", according to reports.

In Eastland, the southwest section seemed to be hardest hit, with the school buildings losing many windows and homes in the Valley View addition losing windows, roofs, storage buildings, and fences. The high school library, on the west side of the building, suffered heavy wind and rain damage. There was no estimate of the loss.

John Willen reported that almost all the homes on South Ammerman lost "all the west windows," listing homes of Dale Bakker, Ruben Gaeta, A. G. White, Walter Maynard, Dee Gordon, Jay Staggs, Grover Hallmark and Ed Ethridge.

Mrs. Darwin Miller said their Hillcrest home received hail and wind damage and that an antenna was down at the home of her parents; Mr. and Mrs. Herman Rushing. Mrs. E. S. Lee, 410 N. Dixie, said a falling tree damaged the room of their home.

# New Contract Speeds Interstate 20 Construction

Construction of Interstate Highway 20 through Eastland County is beginning its biggest phase and is expected to be completed by the 1972 target-date, Resident Engineer R. P. (Buddy) Haun reports.

Contract for the 11.2 mile stretch of base and surfacing, from just west of Cisco to just east of Highway 6 (south of Eastland), was let Tuesday, and the Cecil Ruby Construction Co., was named contractor on a bid of \$2,459,000. In view of the amount of material to be needed for the job, Ruby is expected to go into an extensive rock crushing program which could last some six months before he starts putting down base. Grading and structures are complete. A "turn-key" job is expected to be let in January of 1970 for the 3.50 mile strip connecting at just east of State Highway 6, eastward to approximately two miles east of Eastland on what is now Highway 80. The complete job will be for grading and structures, and base and surfacing. This job, when completed, will open Interstate 20 for traffic use from just west of Cisco to just east of Eastland probably September of 1971. Haun said. The Ranger bypass should be completed for traffic by Sept. of 1970. The last stretch of 20 in the county is to be completed

ment of the present four-lane Highway 80 highway between Eastland and Ranger, bringing it up to Interstate 20 standards. This job will consist of construction of new Eastbound traffic and access roads. The present road will be utilized for westbound traffic and access. Right-of-way has been purchased and this section should be completed by 1972.

The newest contract brings to \$7 1/2 million dollars the amount of highway work the Cecil Ruby Co. is doing in this county. The Darco Construction has a \$1,230,000 contract for ten miles on State Highway 183 between Rising Star and Cisco.

The most unusual project perhaps is an experimental job in which the Austin Worth Construction Co. has a \$165,000 contract for experimental purposes in leveling up the four-lanes of Highway 80 between Eastland and Cisco, using synthetic liquified aggregate. Purpose of the test is to determine if the small aggregate will give more skid resistance. The Texas Transportation Institute and Highway Engineers across the state believe that the Eastland County test will have significant bearing on future paving across the country. The Interstate project is some six months behind where it could have been due

to a money freeze of that duration last year, it is reported. However the 1972 target date is still expected to be met.

And the Farm-to-Market projects across the state are presently "in limbo" due to funding on the one-year period by the state legislature.

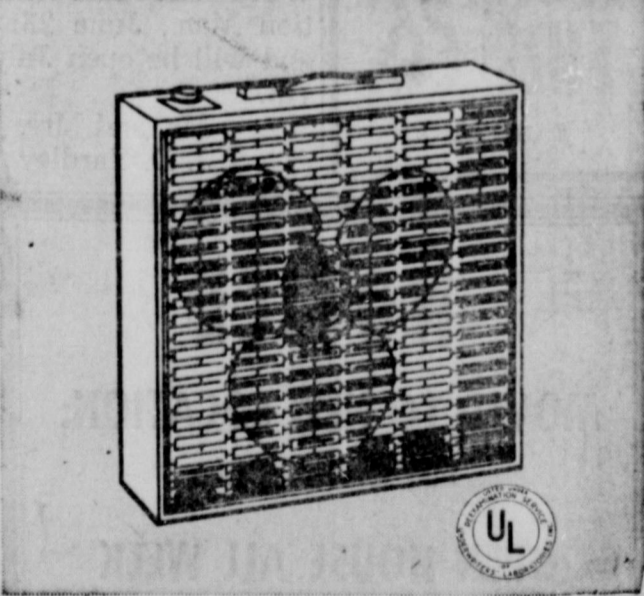

**Just Unhappy**

**Runaway Boy Reunited With Clyde Family Here**

A 15-year-old Clyde youth, missing since May 29, was found and reunited with his foster parents through the efforts of the Cisco Police Department here Thursday night.

The boy, who voluntarily surrendered himself after police went to the home where he had been staying, told the Cisco authorities he had been in Cisco since he left his home, supporting himself by doing yard work and other odd jobs. He said he had walked all the way from Clyde on the Texas and Pacific railroad tracks. When he arrived in Cisco, where a sympathetic family living at 302 Ave. I, took him in on his story that he was a homeless lad, he was without shoes, Charles Moad, dispatcher at the Cisco Police Station told the Press. He gave his name as Jerry Copeland.

There were no violations of any law either in Cisco or Abilene, Moad said. "He was just unhappy."

That unhappiness appeared to have been cleared away in a police station conference between the boy, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Sachsenmeyer, of Clyde, Cisco police officers and the Rev. James Hall, Pastor of the East Cisco Baptist Church, which lasted well into the morning hours Friday.

The boy asked for the minister. In the conference he unbosomed himself of his unhappiness which, officers said, appeared to stem from a youthful notion that he was unwanted. Mr. and Mrs. Sachsenmeyer, a fine couple, told the officers and the minister that they had adopted the boy at eight years of age from the state welfare agency. He was one of a family of seven children whose mother was unable to take care of them. Mr. Sachsenmeyer is employed by the Paymaster company at Abilene and his wife is a sister of M. Kniffen a license and weight inspector with the State Department of Public Safety at Abilene. The Sachsenmeyers have another son, 20.

After the conference the boy appeared content and even happy to be reunited with his adopted family.

The police located the boy when they went to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Andy LeFlores are 302 Ave. I. The LeFlores were not aware that their guests was a runaway, but had taken pity on him and given him a temporary home when he told them he was without family. He stayed with the Cisco couple and supported himself by working at odd jobs.

The LeFlores have five children at home. Members of the family said the Clyde boy was well behaved and did his share of the chores around the house. He was with the Cisco family about two weeks.

Cisco officers said the boy was released to his parents after they had checked with Abilene officers. No wrongdoing was found to be involved, they said.

## County In Second Year For Acreage Certification

Farm acreage certification is in its second year in Eastland county. In 1968 this system was inaugurated in the county. "We are very pleased with the way the farmers received and cooperated with this new concept of reporting acreage," Mr. Jesse G. Meredith, county office manager for Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, stated.

Farm acreage certification covers all acreage reporting through ASCS. It includes the commodity programs - cotton, feed grain, wheat, and peanuts.

Wheat acreage certification was completed May 1 by participating farm. Cotton, feed grain, diverted acres, and peanut participating farms will have until August 1 to make their report in the county ASCS office.

"Caution must be the prime point in reporting acreages," said Mr. Meredith. He continued, "It is not a guessing game. Overstating or understating could cost loss of price support and penalty for violation of federal statutes."

Measurement service is available either before or after planting. Requests are now being taken for both and farmers are urged to file their requests early. No requests for a measurement after planting will be taken after July 15. Fees for these services are posted in the county office.

"The office personnel will be happy to serve you and work with you when you come into the office," Mr. Meredith concluded.

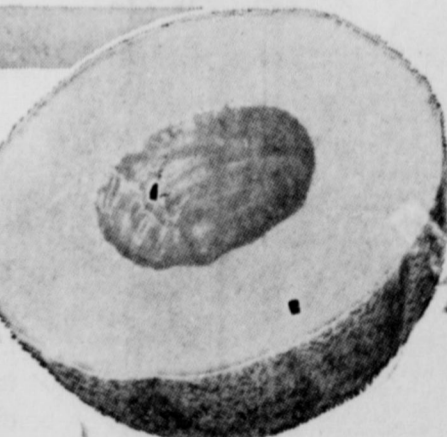
