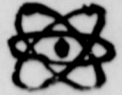

## LAWMEN TO BE HONORED BY MASONS

The program will begin at 8 p.m., and among those to be cited for their dedicated work will be city policemen, sheriff's office personnel, highway patrolmen, district attorneys, judges, and others.

Families are invited to attend, Master Jackson said.

## 'Have Confidence' RJC Grads Told

Taking a timely quote from Charles Dickens, Congressman Omar Burleson Friday night gave a realistic view of the world to Ranger Junior College graduates.

"These are the best of times, and the worst of times."

Making the commencement address at First United Methodist Church, Burleson urged the 40 graduating sophomores "to have confidence - not in circumstances or conditions, which have a way of changing—but in yourselves."

The congressman said he wouldn't tell the students that everything in the world is all good or bad, and he said "It may be somewhat painful for us as individuals to even contemplate that all our problems can't be solved immediately . . . but there are certain problems that we must constantly live with."

**Exploit Opportunities**  
Calling adversity "the progenitor of opportunity," Burleson said "it behooves us to seek and exploit the opportunities that adversity challenges."

He also noted that it is the American system of government which makes possible the affluence of the nation, as he said too many people "do not recognize this fact or choose to ignore it."

"Far too many," he said, "fail to contribute to, as well as receive from, this system of government."

And at the same time, he said "the people of our nation are . . . restive, apprehensive, haunted by a sense of impending danger and, yes, even doom."

One of the worst things that can happen to the nation, Burleson said, is to "take the idealism of youth, with all its ambitions and aspirations, and channel it into something which falsely promises to right wrongs with anarchy—with solutions founded on socialism or some other item."

**Individual Counts**  
"There's no such thing as mass integrity . . . or mass aspirations," he added. "It's the individual that counts." Burleson also said the only

true permanence is that of a "God-governed world," and he called that the "only road to lasting peace."

He said man's greatest problem is himself, and that "the most crying need is for men and women whose inner lives are a part of the solution, instead of part of the problem of our ailing society."

"We cannot continue to be a healthy nation living in frustration and with a feeling of impending catastrophe," he said. "There are many who seem to think democracy is a spectacular sport—and it isn't; you've got to be out there on the playing field."

Burleson concluded his talk with a quote from an inscription on an old English church, which he said applied to the students as they begin to take on a more responsible role in the nation's affairs:

"Blessed is he whose singu-

# Leadership Is Criticized By Senator In Address

U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough urged more responsible explanation of national goals and better leadership in their achievement in an address to the graduating class of Cisco Junior College at Commencement exercises Friday night.

A capacity crowd filled Harrell Fine Arts Building auditorium to hear the Texas senator and to pay tribute to the 120 students who were awarded degrees.

Senator Yarborough was honored at a public reception at the Victor Hotel from 3:30 to 5 p.m. Friday with a good turnout of people from throughout this region. Also attending the event was Congress-

man Omar Burleson, who had returned to his 17th District to be the speaker for Ranger Junior College's commencement Friday night.

Senator Yarborough suggested that at the present time the country was due in a large measure to lack of national goal definition and accomplishment.

He listed national goals as to eliminate hunger and malnutrition, provide good educational opportunities for all young people, aid the elderly, deliver medical care to the people, and provide new homes for slum area residents.

Commenting on these goals, the senator said that 425 of

the nation's 3,098 counties, accept no federal food assistance. Ninety-nine of the 425 counties, he added, are in Texas.

He criticized administration cuts in the federal educational appropriation of over nine billion dollars to only 1.3rd that amount, noting that "we now are spending at the rate of three billions per year on all education programs and at the same time we are pouring three billions per month into Vietnam."

Mr. Yarborough said that "We have plenty of medical skills and services, but we are not delivering them to the people. Fifteen other nations have a lower infant death rate than we do." He said 26 million new homes would be needed in the next decade to clear slums.

"We need administrative talent to match our resources," he said. CJC President Leland Willis introduced Sen. Yarborough and, as he finished speaking, he presented the veteran

lawmaker a plaque of appreciation.

Dean Ralph Glenn presented trophies to Misses Sandra Blaine of Cisco and Susan Jeannette Cook of Breckenridge as the two top honor graduates. Diplomas were presented to the graduates by President Lloyd London of the board of regents.

The program formally concluded the 1968-69 school year for the college.

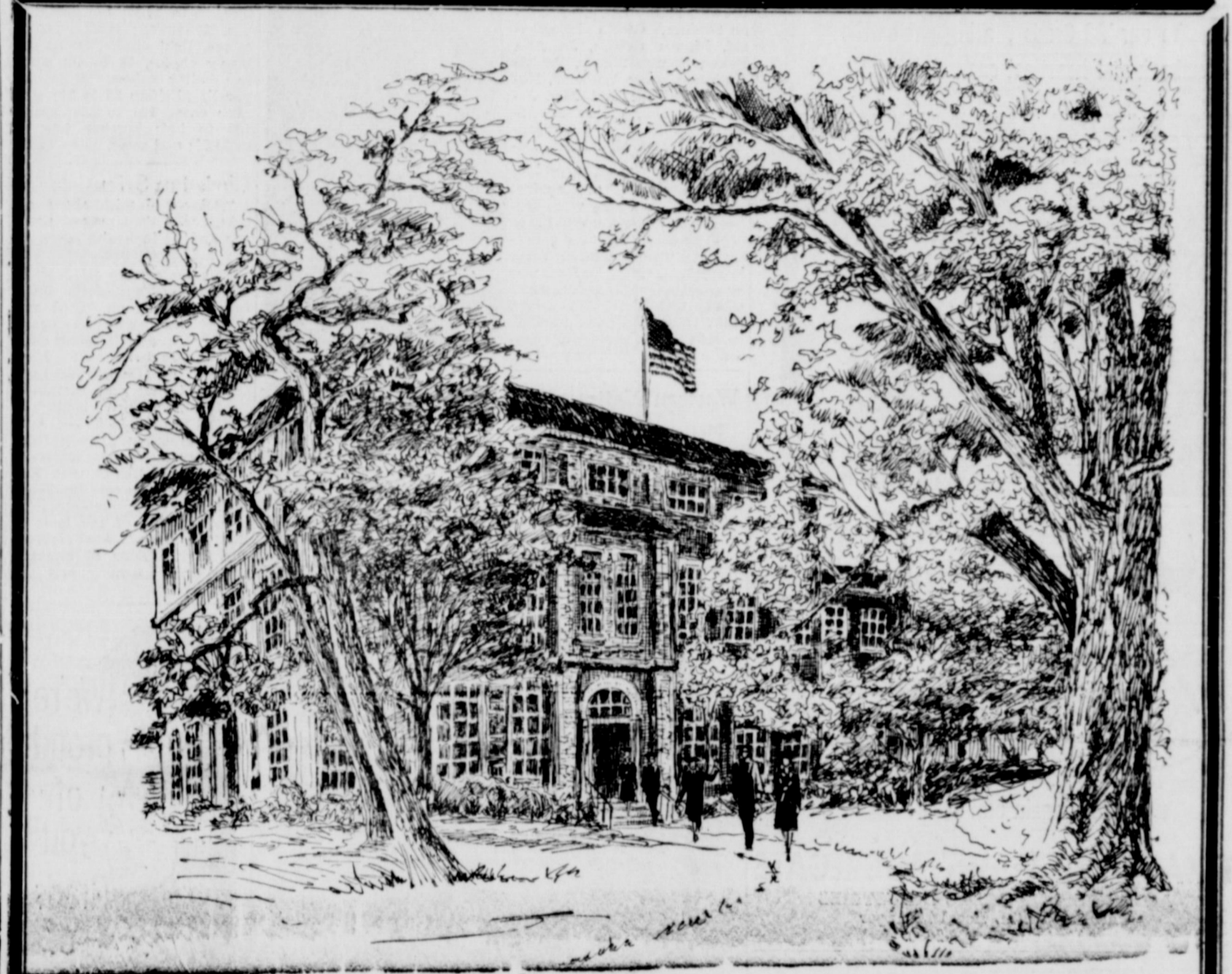

# County Land Owners Begin Fight On Brush

Twenty-five Eastland County land owners voted to begin raising funds for brush control and range improvement research in a meeting May 18th. John Matthews, Abilene area rancher and chairman of the Texas Brush Control and Range Improvement Association, discussed the objectives of the association with the land owners.

County Chairman Jamie Fry of Cisco said the association was formed last November by a group of land owners to raise funds to fight brush invasion of rangelands, one of Texas' major agricultural problems, and study methods of range improvement.

Fry said the plan is to solicit one cent per acre from each Texas landowner each year for five years. He reported that \$158,000 had been contributed during the first

five days of the drive in Eastland County.

Matthews told the landowners that the BARIA is a non-profit organization not directly associated with any university, company or agency. An 18 member board of directors, representing different areas of the state, is directing activities.

Money collected will support expanded research and education on brush control and range improvement. The best research projects submitted by universities and other agencies will be funded by the association.


He said at least 80 per cent of Texas rangelands are infested with brush and weeds, reducing their carrying capacity by 50 per cent or more. Not only is brush control important to ranchers, but the problem also affects the economy of all agricultural communities in the state.

Research by universities and the USDA have done much toward brush control, Matthews stated, but "it is clear that greater financial support of research is needed if we are to solve the problem."

Contributions, which are income tax deductible, can be sent to Jamie Fry, Box 31, Cisco, Texas, or left at any bank in Eastland County. Checks should be made payable to the association. Land owners may contribute one cent per acre each year for the next five years or may contribute the entire amount at one time.

Contributions by every land owner are needed in this campaign to win the brush fight Fry said.
