THE LOCAL postoffice is accepting application for examinations to fill carrier and clerk positions in offices in the area. Postmaster Marcus O'Dell reports. Pay rate for those who pass the exams and are accepted is \$2.95 per hour, he said. Forms may be secured at the postoffice and the tests will be given in Abilene.

A CLIPPING in our mail follows:

THE FOLLOWING item was "lifted" from the Cross Plains Review:

A lot is heard about the importance of trading at home and now much good is done by a locally-spent dollar.

Money taken out of town has small chance of ever finding its way back to this community, whereas that circulated here may help provide jobs and pay bills for scores of local citizens.

The point is best illustrated by a thing that happened here

during the depression days of the 1930's.

A merchant sold \$10 worth of goods and took a check in payment. The check moved from one store and shop to another. When it finally reached the bank there were 15 endorsements on the back. The check was "hot" and the bank refused payment.

Instead of running the check backward and making each merchant get \$10 from the man who gave it to him, the holder called in the 14 other endorsers and proposed that they split the loss by paying 67 cents each. Every man had made 10 percent or more — at least \$1 — on the goods he'd sold. By paying 67 cents apiece no one lost, in fact each had a minimum of 33 cents profit.

Trading at home turned a \$10 "hot" check into a slight profit for 15 separate business concerns.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SIR)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary of a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition. "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SIR)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places of (of) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages, or such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions; and no purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

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# Screwworm Threat Is Great, Officials Report

All livestock owners are asked to be on the alert for screwworm outbreaks this year. The warning came from Dolph Briscoe, Jr. at an emergency meeting of the Screwworm Eradication officials and livestock men in San Antonio last Wednesday. Briscoe is President of the Southwestern Animal Health Research Foundation Board of Trustees.

Four Eastland County men attended the meeting. They were Oscar Schaefer, County Screwworm Committee Chairman; Doug Fry, President of the County Livestock Raisers Assn.; DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent and Bob Cohen, Asst. County Agent.

Before the screwworm eradication program began in 1962, screwworms caused Texas livestock men to lose 100 million dollars each year. Officials estimated the program has saved farmers and ranchers over 500 million dollars since it began in 1962.

Briscoe said there were 10,000 cases of screwworms reported last year compared to only 800 the previous year. There are indications that there may be even more outbreaks in 1969. There have been 60 screwworm cases in during the first four months of 1969 compared to 49 cases at this date in 1968. Program officials said the large build-up of the costly pests was due

to a mild winter and a wet spring in South Texas and Mexico.

The Screwworm Eradication Program was initiated by livestock owners who contributed money to get the program started. Several ranchers expressed the opinion that stockmen were ready to give again if necessary to continue the eradication program. Briscoe said the program officials were not asking for money at this time, but were asking for stockmen to do their part in keeping screwworm cases to a minimum. Ranchers were asked to observe their livestock closely, treat all wounds, send samples of all larvae collected to the Mission Lab, and spray all livestock.

Schafer said plans were being made to alert all Eastland County livestock owners of the urgency of the screwworm situation.

## Second Phase of I-20 Authorized By State Agency

The Texas Highway Commission has authorized construction of the second phase of an 11.1 mile section of Interstate Highway 20 on new location in Eastland, it was reported here.

The new section will pass south of the main areas of Cisco and Eastland and the present US Highway 80 between the two cities.

Approved was construction of base and surfacing for an expressway facility from 1.0 mile west of Cisco eastward to 0.6 mile east of State Highway 6, southwest of Eastland. Construction of grading and surfacing on the section was authorized previously.

Estimated cost of the work is \$3.2 million.
