## Officials, Employees To Get County Pay Boost

Eastland County employees and elected officials will receive a cost-of-living wage adjustment this month. Judge Scott Bailey said the County Commissioners Court has given the required preliminary legal notice and will vote on the matter at the regular meeting at 10 a. m. Monday, August 11. The raise in salary will be set at \$25.00 per month for each employee and will be effective for the first pay period of August. County Auditor Hall O'Brien said the county paid 70 full time employees and officials in July, for a monthly payroll of \$19,367.20. The Commissioners Court has voted to make five constables for the county full time employees and raise their salaries from \$15 per month to \$250 per month. This was effective August 1.

## Grades 1 to 8 To Register Aug. 18 For New Term

### School Sets Sept. 2 Opening

Students in elementary and junior high schools will register from 1 to 7 p. m. Monday, August 18, at the Elementary School. "Letting all students in grades one through eight register the same day, in the same place, makes things

easier and more convenient for the parents," School Superintendent Wendell Siebert said.

Children entering the first grade must present a birth certificate and proof of smallpox vaccination. High school students registered before school closed in May. Any high school student who has moved to Eastland since May is asked to contact Charles Marshall, principal, at his office in the high school building. School will open Tuesday, September 2. Siebert said the first day of school will be a full day, with all buses running, the lunchrooms open, and a regular schedule used.

# County Voters To Decide Fate of Amendments Tues.

## ELECTION ON PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS SAMPLE BALLOT

INSTRUCTION NOTE: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

**No. 1**  FOR  AGAINST  
The constitutional amendment to repeal the obsolete, superfluous and unnecessary sections of the Constitution.

**No. 2**  FOR  AGAINST  
The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board.

**No. 3**  FOR  AGAINST  
The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions.

**No. 4**  FOR  AGAINST  
The constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation.

**No. 5**  FOR  AGAINST  
The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy disabled, and the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount that may be paid per year from state funds for assistance only; allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for assistance grants; and authorizing the legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary in order that federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care.

**No. 6**  FOR  AGAINST  
The constitutional amendment to remove the constitutional interest rate limitations, subject to limits imposed by the Legislature, for bonds issued and pursuant to constitutional authority.

**No. 7**  FOR  AGAINST  
The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties.

**No. 8**  FOR  AGAINST  
The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan.

**No. 9**  FOR  AGAINST  
The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions.

Citizens of Eastland County, in common with those elsewhere in Texas will, many of them at least, go to the polls next Tuesday - August 5 - to determine the fate of nine proposed amendments to the state constitution.

The election will be held as are all state general elections, supervised by judges in the various boxes appointed by the commissioners court, and conducted in accordance with state law regulating the eligibility of the voter.

The voter must have a registration certificate for 1969, which he or she should bring to the polls at the time of voting.

The polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. and the results of the election will be declared for the county after they have been canvassed by the commissioners court.

Unofficially, however, the results will be made known by the various judges in reports to the County Clerk's office at Eastland.

Two judges are appointed for each box. They are in order of their boxes: Eastland, No. 1 - Mr. & Mrs. Jeannette Harris and Mrs. Mertie Richardson.

Olden, No. 2 - C. L. Langlitz and Mrs. S. G. Everett; Ranger, No. 3 - Don Adams and V. V. Cooper.

Desdemona, No. 4 - L. E. Clark and Docie Williams; Gorman, No. 4 - Odie Brigstow and Gler Jordan; Carbon, No. 6 - A. E. Guy and Henry Lovell;

Rising Star, No. 7 - G. A. Dunn Jr. and Fred Price; Cisco, No. 8 - J. V. Heyser and W. R. Huestis.

**23 VOTE ABSENTEE**  
Only 23 persons voted absentee at the County Clerk's Office for the Tuesday Constitutional Amendment Election, Clerk Johnson Smith reports. A light turnout of voters is expected.

# Pros and Cons of Proposed State Constitutional Amendments

Texas voters will be assaulted by what has become the annual confrontation with state constitutional amendments when they go to the polls Tuesday to decide the fate of nine new ones. Drawing the most interest, for local voters and across the state, is No. Two, judging by the amount of publicity that is being generated both for and against the passage of the measure. No. Two, would, if passed, increase water development bonds by \$3.5 billion. Publicity from the Gulf area is against passage (particularly the Houston Committee of 1,000 "against No. Two"); while that publicity from the Panhandle and West Texas area is for passage. The Texas Legislative Council offers the following "for" and "against" arguments on each of the proposed amendments:

**1. Clean-Up Amendment** — This is a mere "clean-up" measure which makes no substantive change in the Texas Constitution.

**2. Increasing Water Development Bonds** —

1. The future economic growth of Texas is dependent on adequate water resources and the passage of the proposed constitutional amendment is necessary to insure that those resources will be available at the time they are needed. Studies made by Texas Water Development Board and by the United States Bureau of Reclamation show conclusively that Texas' present economic growth is far outstripping the state's available water resources. Unless additional water resources are developed, the state's economic growth will be stymied and, in many areas of the state, economic conditions will actually retrogress.

2. The Texas Water Plan offers a means of developing adequate water resources in an orderly, efficient manner over a 50-year period. Although Texas water resources are fairly adequate at the present time, the adoption of the proposed amendment is necessary to implement the Texas Water Plan and avoid extensive water deficiencies in the future since long periods of time are required

necessary for water-resource development and distribution.

**Against:**

1. The burden to the Texas economy of the bond issue and the construction project envisioned under the Texas Water Plan will be made greater even though all the bonds will not be issued at the same time.

2. Although the Water Development Bonds are revenue bonds that will be amortized ultimately by water users, there will be certain interim costs incurred prior to the time water becomes available to the users, and these costs will probably be levied on a statewide basis. Annual outlays over the 50-year period encompassed by the Texas Water Plan will be substantial.

3. Authorizing the Legislature to set its own salary and the salaries of the Speaker of the House and the Lieutenant Governor within certain limits.

**For:**

1. The legislator can no longer be considered a part-time official. The increasing complexity of the problems

facing state government and the increasing amount of time spent on standing and special interim committees meeting between sessions leave him little time to devote to his private business or profession. The \$4,800 annual salary now provided under the constitution is scarcely adequate to meet present-day costs of living.

2. The setting of a specific salary in the constitution requires a popular vote each time the legislature needs a pay increase. Calling a special election and printing ballots and election notices is costly. The fact that a legislator must face the voters for reelection to office provides an adequate check on the legislators in voting to raise their own pay.

3. The present limitation to a 120-day period for payment of the small \$12 per diem allowance, even though expenses continue throughout the full session of 140 days, places an additional hardship on legislators. In view of personal living expenses, the imposition of a time limit on a \$12 per diem allowance is unrealistic. It is unlikely that

any legislator would attempt to extend the length of the session and stay away from his home in order to collect an allowance of \$12 per day.

**Against:**

1. The proposed amendment allows the legislature to raise legislative salaries to not more than the state salary of a district judge, and to raise the pay of the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the house of representatives to not more than one-half of the salary of the governor. However, since the salary of the governor or a district judge may be increased at any time by the legislature, ceiling on the presiding officers' and members' salaries would, in effect, make any salary possible.

2. A substantial pay increase and a longer period during which the per diem allowance would be paid would add still further to the expenses of state government at a time when state finances are already overburdened in meeting the constantly expanding needs of a growing population.

3. A maximum legislative

salary equivalent to that of a district judge, who works the year round, is excessive for what might be termed the part-time job of a legislator, and the legislative salary which would become effective is far in excess of the full-time salary drawn by the average Texan.

4. Exempting non-profit water supply corporations from taxation.

**For:**

1. Nonprofit water supply corporations perform a vital function for many parts of the state that would not otherwise have adequate water supplies. The amendment would encourage the formation of the corporations and the development of water resources.

2. The corporations to be exempted are nonprofit and perform a governmental function; therefore, their property should be like public property and exempt from taxation.

**Against:**

1. There are many privately owned water supply corporations which are run for profit. These corporations

would be put at a competitive disadvantage if the nonprofit corporations were relieved from payment of ad valorem taxes.

2. With rising governmental costs and increasing difficulty in finding sources of revenue, any reduction in the present tax base is unwise.

5. Increasing ceiling on assistance to four classes of needy to maximum of \$80 million from state funds.

**For:**

The proposed Amendment No. 5 allows the legislature to appropriate sufficient funds to again enable the State Department of Public Welfare to make assistance payments to all four classes of welfare recipients in accordance with the minimal standards of need established by the Department. Texas consistently has been among the lowest of the states in terms of average monthly assistance payments per recipient and in terms of per capita cost to taxpayers. It ranks almost at the bottom in Aid to Families with Dependent Children, with its average payment per recipient of aid to Families with

Dependent Children now less than \$19 per month. The failure of the proposed constitutional amendment in 1968 resulted in drastic reductions in public assistance to needy children. The State Department of Public Welfare now is able to pay only 50 percent of what it says should be provided for needy children, and it is powerless to restore benefit payments to the levels it recognizes as minimal unless the proposed Amendment No. 5 is adopted. If the proposed amendment is defeated, it will cause another immediate reduction in assistance to needy children and the Department predicts that it ultimately would have to reduce levels of assistance to needy aged.

**Against:**

The large overall expenditure of state funds which this proposed amendment authorizes would increase each recipient's income only a few dollars a month but would possibly require \$20 million in new funds each year at a time when the state

Amendment cont is already bonded pressed to meet existing financial obligations.

6. Removing constitutional interest rate limitations, subject to limits imposed by Legislature for bonds pursuant to constitutional authority.

For:

1. Adoption of Amendment No. 6 would make it possible for certain state agencies now under constitutional restrictions establishing maximum interest rate limits to provide for higher interest rates on future bond issues thereby allowing the bonds to compete for sale on the open market on even footing with bonds issued by other entities.

2. Failure to adopt Amendment No. 6 would cause many major state programs to be curtailed or discontinued due to a lack of funds. Among these programs are the Texas Opportunity Plan, which provides student loans enabling many young Texans to attend college, and the Texas Water Plan, which is designed to provide Texas with an adequate water supply for the next 50 years.

Against:

1. Removing the constitutional limit on maximum interest rates for bonds issued by certain public agencies would allow those agencies to provide higher interest rates on future bond issues which, in turn, would require increased tax revenues from Texas citizens to pay the added interest.

2. The adopting of Amendment No. 6 would encourage the state through its various agencies to rely even more on creating bonded indebtedness as a means of financing future needs.

7. Providing for payments of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees and agents, including members of organized fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties.

For:

1. The people have already voiced approval of the principle involved—that the public should aid those dependent on public employees who perform hazardous duties for the public benefit. It is logical to extend the eligibility for this assistance to all public employees and volunteers who perform hazardous duties, such as volunteer firemen and policemen, attendants at the Rusk State Hospital for the Criminally Insane, and others.

2. The proposed amendment does not automatically provide assistance. The legislature must specifically name by law the groups to receive the benefits.

Against:

1. The amendment proposed does not place a limitation on the amount of assistance which may be provided. The cost to the electorate, therefore, cannot be determined by them.

2. Many of the employees who are within the scope of this amendment are employed by cities or counties. This cost might more than approximately be borne by local political subdivisions.

8. Authorizing Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under Texas Opportunity Plan.

For:

1. The total amount of funds presently available for student loans will be in use and loaned out before repayments of outstanding loans begin to return a substantial amount of funds available for relending. It is desirable that a certain amount be available every year to insure equal treatment of deserving students and to maintain a stable recycling of funds. The demand and need for student loans is great and, in addition, a cutback is expected in the amount of federal funds available. The federal cutback will increase the states' burden. Therefore the proposed amendment is essential to continuation of the Texas Opportunity Plan.

2. A college education in today's technical world is even more essential now than in 1965 when the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund was created by adoption of Article III, Section 50b, and the Hinson-Hazewood College Student Loan Act. Every deserving and qualified student should be afforded the opportunity to have a college education. It should be emphasized that the passage of H. J. R. No. 50 will authorize only loans and does not authorize gifts or grants to students. All loans are repayable with interest charges set by the coordinating board, and of the 90 thousand loans made thus far, the 23 in default of payments constitute a percentage actually too small to calculate.

3. The single greatest natural resource in the State of Texas is its young people. Each year, thousands of high school graduates with college potential are deterred from continuing their education due to inadequate finances. Adoption of the proposed Amendment No. 8 would assure many of these students of the college education and training they deserve and would assure the State of Texas that future state development will be in the hands of those best qualified for service.

Against:

1. State loans to students take business from private

enterprise. Banks, savings and loan institutions, and private charities have helped students finance their education for years. The Texas Opportunity Plan Fund already has authorized \$85 million, and any more loans would create administrative problems adversely affecting the repayment rate.

2. This amendment continues the practice of making loans to students enrolled in church-supported schools. This is merely a subterfuge to permit state aid for churches.

3. Those able-bodied young people who are serious enough about wanting an education and who are willing to work can finance their own schooling. At a time when violence and disrespect for law and order are evident on our campuses, the state should encourage students to work and build for themselves rather than foster indolence through practically give-away loans.

9. Providing for annual sessions of the Legislature.

For:

1. Economic and effective state government requires minimum time lag between the date budget estimates are actually prepared and the passage of an appropriation bill. State agencies can prepare a more precise and practical budget which takes into consideration only those funding requirements for the succeeding fiscal year instead of incorporating the inadequate guesses of longer-range planning.

2. The actual business of state government has reached such proportions that adequate supervision can no longer be given to the affairs of state by one legislative session every two years. More frequent legislative sessions would insure more considered legislation on budgetary and other matters since fewer items would be considered at each individual session and the legislature as a whole would be more in tune with the progress and activities of state government.

3. Annual sessions continue to gain support; more and more states are abandoning the biennial session as inadequate to serve the legislative needs of a modern, progressive state.

Against:

1. The added regular session is uneconomical in itself in that the cost of the additional session represents a significant increase in the cost of state government.

2. An additional session is unnecessary because of the power of the governor to call a special session in the event that unforeseen circumstances require any new legislation prior to the succeeding regular session. On the basis of existing programs, adequate information is available for budgeting over a biennium. New or changed programs of sufficient importance can be provided for by special session.

3. The increased frequency of regular sessions would make service in the legislature a full-time job and even more economically unattractive than it is at the present time.

### "20,000 GOLD COINS BURIED"

In North Central Texas, eleven miles north of Graham, near Ft. Belknap is buried 20,000 gold (Spanish) or (Mexican) coins. The believed to be doubloons are buried one and a half miles to the north-west near the Brazos River.

Belknap is about 70 miles from Ranger, where I live. Two years ago I was visiting in North Dakota, while I was visiting relatives, I met a neighbor of theirs whom was a full blood Indian, he was feeble with age. He could not remember the exact year he was born. The Indians numbered their years by so many moons instead of months and years as we do. During one of our conversations, I told him I was from Texas. I asked him if he knew where Ranger was. (he didn't). So I proceeded to name the surrounding towns, Desdemona, Cisco, Carbon, Gorman, Thurber, Eastland, Mineral Wells, Breckenridge, Graham. When I said Graham he remembered living there as a child near Ft. Belknap, on the Brazos River bank, two and one half miles from Ft. Belknap on the south bank of the river. They lived there when he was born, he was named Pas pa golla (Singing River)

He didn't remember much of his childhood, they moved when he was seven years old to North Dakota. About all he remembered was the stories his father told. Most of the stories were forgotten years ago. There was one story Pas pa golla never forgot. When he told it to me he spoke with a sad voice, repeating the story his father had told him.

He'd say, "Pas pa golla" Do you remember where we lived in Texas? Pas pa Golla always said yes, although he didn't really remember too much.

Well one day I was on my way to the Fort and I stopped by this little creek to water my horse and while my horse was drinking, I saw a well dressed, tough looking stranger (to these parts of the country) stop up the creek and water his horse. After the horse drank and the stranger had washed his hands and face in the muddy creek, he took the saddle bags off the horse. There was a shovel tied to the saddle, he untied the shovel and took several big steps from the creek, near a peppendular rock he dug a hole, then he took a kettle and emptied the saddle bags in the kettle, he then put the kettle in the hole and filled the dirt in and packed it down. The stranger walked over to the left about 50 or 60 feet and a iron rod about 2 1/2 to 3 foot long and drove it in the ground beside the kettle he buried, he then spread dry grass and sticks over the freshly dug dirt and built a fire, made himself some coffee, let the fire die out while he lay near by on a saddle blanket. When the fire had gone out, he headed north-east looking back only once.

I waited until I was sure he wasn't coming back then the ashes was cold. I dug with a stick and my hands. I found that it was a copper kettle filled with gold money. I emptied the kettle of gold coins on the ground and played with them. Then I counted them and put them all back in the kettle and reburied it.

I didn't want the gold, Indians (at least the Sioux) believe gold belongs to the gods and is sacred, and it's still there. I saw with my own eyes.

Pas pa Golla told me his father taught him gold was evil.

Pas pa golla's father made a map on Buckskin and Pas pa Golla gave it to me it was in good shape even after almost a hundred years old it was rolled in another oil skin to protect it.

As I looked at the map I was determined to search for the gold and when I came back home I had the map. Pas pa golla's gift of the map was a treasure indeed, I have followed the map and it all is translated except for (one) clue that is in Indian.

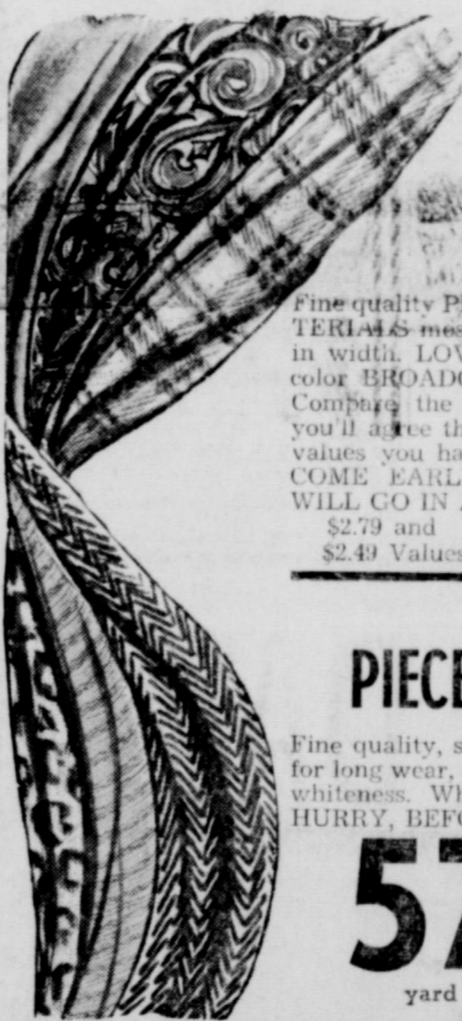

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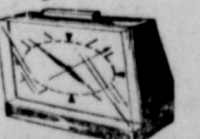

**County Farm Bureau Endorses Nos. 2, 4**

Future irrigation needs for agriculture and drinking water for rural areas are involved in two of the nine proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on in the special election August 5, according to Jack Cozart, of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

Proposed Amendment No. 2 (H. J. R. 9) on the ballot would grant the powers and flexibility of operation to the Texas Water Development Board necessary to develop sufficient water resources for present and future economic development of the state. The proposed amendment contains those constitutional changes necessary to implement the Texas Water plan.

Proposed Amendment No. 4 (S. J. R. 6) on the ballot would exempt non-profit water supply corporations from ad valorem taxation. This would give the many rural water systems that have been set up in recent years the same tax status as municipal government water systems.

The Texas Farm Bureau supported both of these proposals in the recent regular

61st session of the Legislature, Cozart said. In regard to Amendment No. 2, the Farm Bureau policy on the matter states that any water plan for Texas must be "equitable" to all sections of the state, Cozart explained.

Both of these water-related propositions are important to agriculture and rural areas, the county farm leader asserted.

"Therefore, I am urging all voters of Eastland County to go to the polls on August 5 and cast their ballots for both Amendment No. 2 and Amendment No. 4," Cozart said.

# 20s—Were the Days In Ranger

The composer of the recent hit tune "Those Were the Days" might well have been in Ranger in 1920 and attempting to recount the experience. Ranger Daily Times had a payroll of 34, 31 of whom were men. R. B. Waggoner was vice-president and general manager and Larry Smith, managing editor.

Slowly but no less surely, there were changes in the format of the eightpage daily, three-section Sunday paper. Most impressive was the increase in local news.

In 1920 the town of 16,000 population was, according to The Times, a town in turmoil; experiencing simultaneously construction and destruction (sixteen frame buildings were destroyed in one conflagration), battles between law enforcement officers and law offenders, murders, manslaughter, armed robbery, dope peddlers and petty thievery.

Completion of three new school buildings allowed students to return to full day attendance. Blue laws went into effect, plans for 15 blocks of "White Way" (lighted streets) ton, bill of sale.

Guest lists of local hotels were published. Epworth League and BYPU briefly mentioned and a sale offered mesaline and crepe de chine, \$4.00 value for \$1.00 per yard.

The body of Carl Barnes, for whom the local American Legion is named, was buried with honors.

Gen. Alvaro Obregon, President-elect of Mexico, visited Ranger.

There were stories of extreme cruelty and stories of heart-warming benevolence. Barney Google was added to the comic section and Aspirinol was declared to be better than whiskey for colds and flu.

Yes - Those were the Days.
