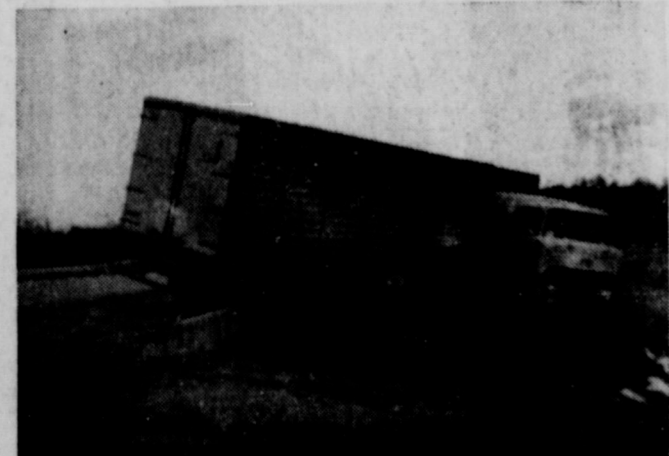

County Officials To 'Swear In' Jan. 1

Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey has announced a special meeting of the Eastland County Commissioners' Court for 11 a. m., Wednesday, Jan. 1st, for considering and approving bonds for newly elected county and precinct officials.

He has notified each of the 10 officers - elect advising them concerning Article 8.43 of the Texas Election Code which provides them on or immediately after January 1st,

1969, each county clerk shall make out and certify to the Secretary of State a statement showing who were elected and to what office and the date of qualification, together with the \$2 statutory fee as provided in Article 3914.

Bailey emphasized that families and friends of the new officers and the general public are invited to witness the proceedings.

The 10 officers include in the group are: Edgar Altom, L. E. Sublett, Emory C. Walton, Danny Woods and Porter Woods, all of Eastland; Ralph W. Veal of Ranger; Albert E. White of Gorman; A. W. Dawson of Cisco; L. J. Collins and W. H. Keregay of Rising Star.

All of these officers are now in office except for Emory C. Walton, County - District Attorney, who will be taking his oath of office for the first time. Mr. Walton has served as assistant county attorney since April 1.

Dr. Caton was born December 27, 1878 in a log cabin in Red River County, the son of James H. Caton and Mary Sue Chambers Caton. The Caton Community near Clarksville was named for his family. He attended a rural school in Caton and then high school at Detroit, Texas.

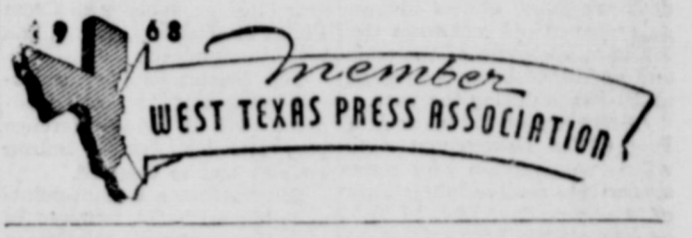

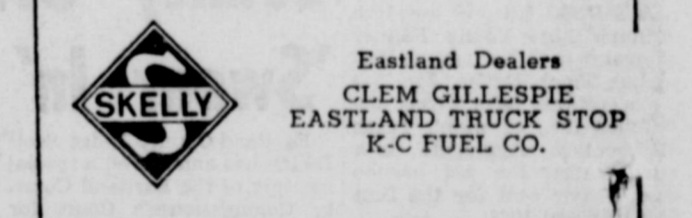

**Postage Increase
 Effective Jan. 1st
 in Second Class**

Postal rates for newspapers, magazines and other mail matter will be increased January 1, the local Postmaster reminded second-class publishers today.

The increase results from the postage rate law enacted December 1967, which raised most second-class rates in the annual steps, the Postmaster pointed out. The January 1, 1969, hike is the second in the increase. The first took effect January 7, 1968, and the third step will go into effect January 1, 1970. The second-class rate increase affects general interest, profit and classroom publications.

Rates also will go up January 1 for controlled circulation publications. These are primarily trade, technical and industrial journals which generally do not charge a subscription fee and are not eligible for second-class rates. The 7 percent postal rate law called for a three-step raise for controlled circulation publications, to effective the same dates as second-class increases.

Except for home county mail, postal rates for newspapers and magazines mailed second-class are based on the weight of the publication, the point of advertising it comes, and the distance it is mailed.

Effective January 1, rates for editorial or non-advertising matter in commercial publications will be increased from 3 to 3.2 cents per pound, and for advertising content from 4.6 to 5.1 cents per pound of advertising content. The new ad-

vertising zone rate range will be 4.9 to 16 cents.

There are special lower second-class rates for classroom publications and publications of nonprofit organizations. These rates also will be increased January 1.

The Postmaster said that second-class or controlled circulation mailers who need more detailed information on the new rates should contact the Post Office where their publications are mailed.

**Poultry Heads
 Plentiful Food
 List for Month**

COLLEGE STATION—What could mean more during December than a good supply of food?

Turkeys and broilers are available in big volume now, according to the Texas Agriculture Extension Service. You'll also find more adequate offerings of fresh oranges and grapefruit, dried prunes, canned tomatoes and tomato products, onions and dry beans.

All are on the December plentiful foods list compiled by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Orange production this season is forecast at 41 per cent above average—and grapefruit production is estimated to be 26 percent more than normal. The Texas early and midseason crop is expected to be the largest in 20 years. Shipments of both oranges and grapefruit are on the upswing, according to market news offices of USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

Volume of canned tomatoes and tomato products on hand should exceed market requirements, due to a record-high production of tomatoes of processing. The last summer onion crop is the second largest on record. And dry bean output is about 14 percent over last year.

Dec. 31 Is Deadline for Certain Claims

Everyone of the some 4,400 Eastland countians covered by the doctor bill insurance part of Medicare since 1966 should spend part of this December reviewing whether the program owes him some

money. That is the advice of R. R. Tuley, Jr., Social Security's Abilene district manager, who added that this is most important for those older people who had medical expenses between Oct. 1, 1966, and Sept. 30, 1967. Any claim for payment of such expenses must be filed by Dec. 31, 1968.

Tuley pointed out that, in the past, some Medicare beneficiaries who were unable to supply evidence of having paid the doctor or the medical supplier, thought they could not file a claim. "These

people are in danger of short-changing themselves," Tuley said. "The 1967 amendments of the Medicare law provide that an itemized bill, showing the services or medical goods received and the charge therefor, even if unpaid, is now sufficient for collecting from Medicare."

He issued a reminder that if the annual \$50 deductible is not met until in the last 3 months in any year, that part can be carried over to the following year as part of the deductible for that year. All social security offices

are now prepared to help people make these last minute claims for doctor bill insurance payments on services and goods received between Oct. 1, 1966, and Sept. 30, 1967, in which no Medicare claim has yet been filed.

The Abilene district office is located in the Federal Building, Room 2321. The phone number is 677-5262. Office hours are 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. weekdays, and each Tuesday evening until 7 p. m. If not convenient to come to Abilene, a representative of that office will be at Eastland County Courthouse at 10 a.m.



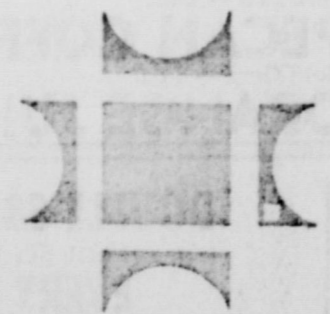

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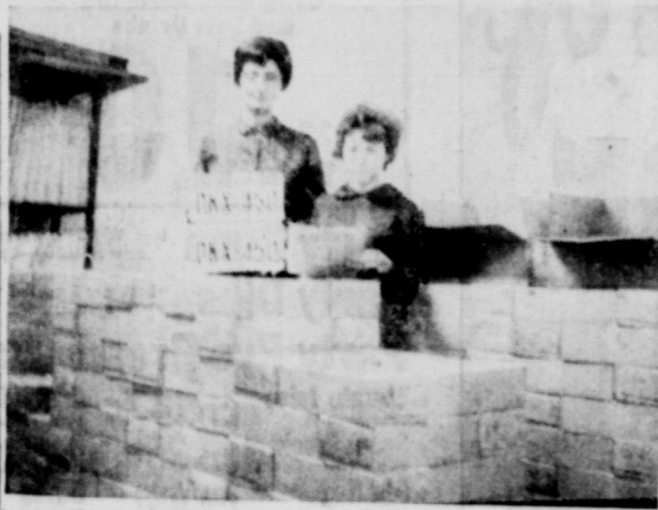

1969 License Plates Offer 'Show and Smell' On Sale Feb. 1

The office not only gets tons of metal plates, but also boxes and boxes of receipts which must match up in number, and so it's a gigantic bookkeeping job, for the employees, seeing that your vehicles are properly registered.

When one stops to realize the complications involved, one can readily understand why "Asking for a special" number is discouraged. For instance, the first passenger number is DKX 450 and while there are nine other "450" in the Eastland County allotment, it's not exactly easy to pinpoint the box in advance, and the receipt, in case that's the number you've got your heart set on because it's your house number, or your otherwise lucky number.

Best advance from the tax collector for those who want a special number — check in the office after the plates go on sale and watch for the numbers coming up. The clerks try to be cooperative, but they have to move awfully fast once the Feb. 1 rush begins.

The county got 9,010 sets of passenger plates — that's some 200 down from last year. Pre-

parations were being made to set up sub-stations in Cisco, Ranger, Rising Star and Gorman on Feb. 1.

The tax office employees will breathe easier after the plates have been distributed — and hopefully once the plates are individually attached to vehicles and exposed to the elements, the noxious quality will be reduced.

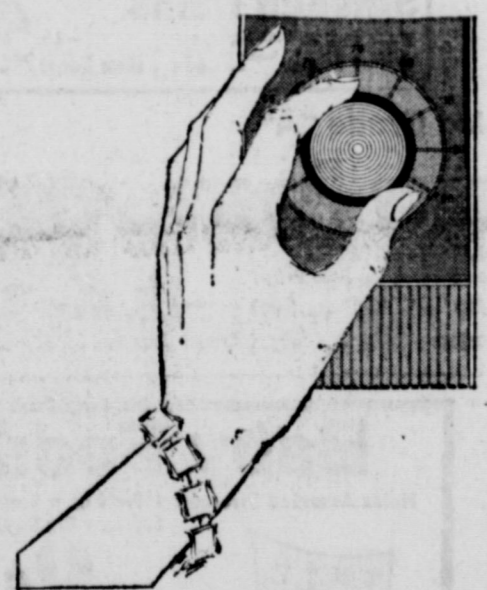

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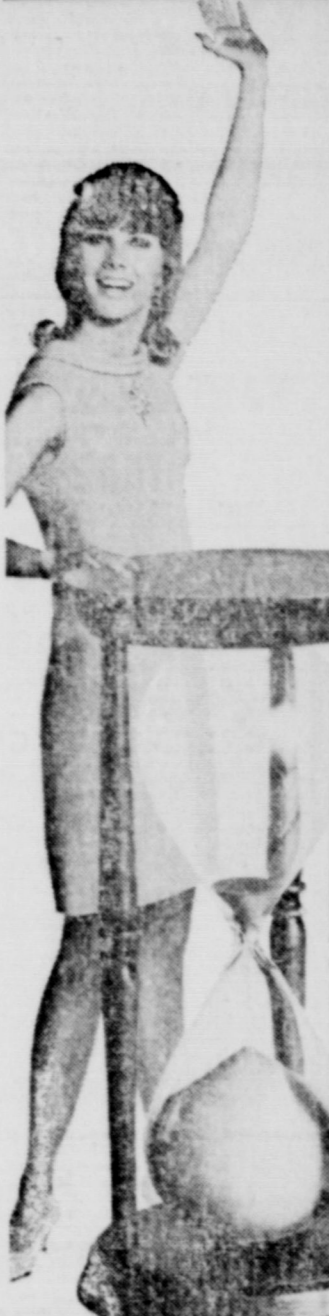

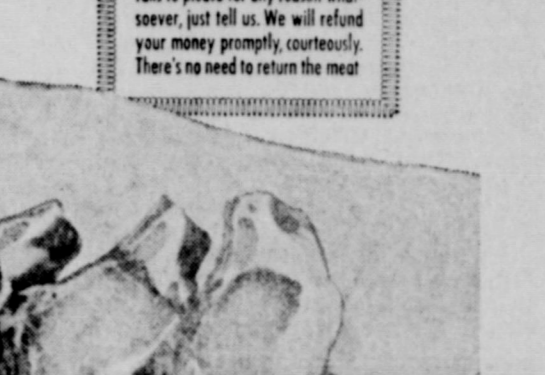
