Shannon Wilson Of Eastland To Compete In State Event

Miss Shannon Wilson, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Wilson of Eastland, will represent Eastland County in the State Peanut Queen Contest to be held in Eastland in September.

The five-foot-five, blue-eyed blonde was selected Peanut Princess of Eastland County in competition Saturday night at Gorman. She was sponsored by Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

First runner-up was Celia Jane Reeves, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Reeves of Gorman, sponsored by the Gorman Chamber of Commerce. Other contestants were Lynn Pippen, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Irven Pippen of Cisco, Eastland County 4-H Club; Mary Beselaar, 19, daughter of Mrs. Gertrude Beselaar of Cisco, Cisco Junior College; Sandy Ingram 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Howard B. Ingram of Cisco, Eastland County Farm Bureau; Teresa Fields, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Fields of Gorman, Kolumbo Home Demonstration Club; and Jean Munn, 19, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. O. Munn of Gorman, Gorman Lions Club.

The contestants appeared in evening gowns and swimsuits. Each performed in talent competition and gave a two-minute talk on the peanut industry. Miss Wilson gave a dramatic monologue. The winner was crowned by Tom Birdsong III of Stephenville, president of the National Peanut Sellers Association. Gorman Mayor Wayne Eaves, master of ceremonies, presented her a bouquet of red roses.

Shannon will be a senior at Eastland High School in the fall. She has been a member of the Maverick Band for three years; Spanish Club, Theatrics, Socialite Club, and is the current president of the Eastland Youth Council. She is in Austin this week, serving as a Junior Counselor at the annual Texas Youth Conference on the campus of St. Edward's University.

She is a member of the First Presbyterian Church and is Rotarian Sweetheart. After graduating from high school, Shannon plans to major in speech and drama at Trinity University in San Antonio.

She is a member of the Eastland Civic Theatre and has appeared in a number of their productions. She has a student pilot's license and lists flying, drama, and water sports as her hobbies. She has recently returned from a trip to Hawaii where she learned to surf.

She will represent the Eastland Chamber of Commerce in the DeLeon Peach and Melon Festival August 6.

Nearly All of Stolen Goats 'Rounded Up'

All but about 100 of 279 goats stolen last week have been "rounded up", according to County Sheriff L. E. Sublett at midweek.

The animals were taken from a farm belonging to W. D. Vawter, located nine and a half miles south of Cisco. Mr. Vawter lives in West Texas and did not discover the missing goats until Saturday, the sheriff said.

All of the goats had been sold, Sublett said.

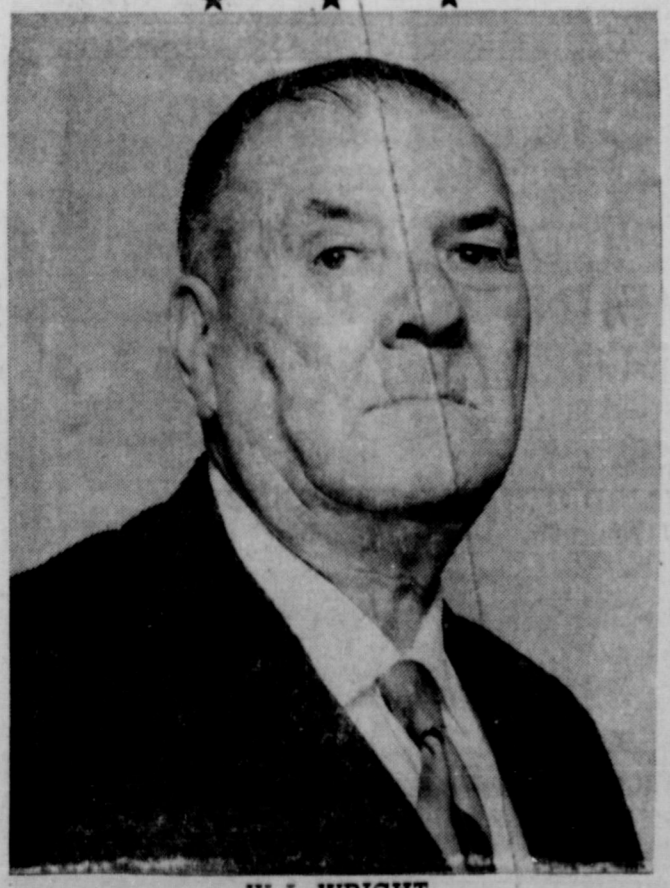
he was promoted to chief system operator in the transmission div. of the co. here.

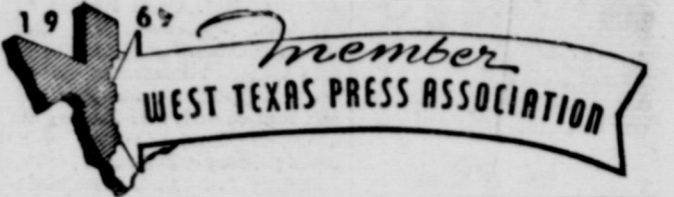

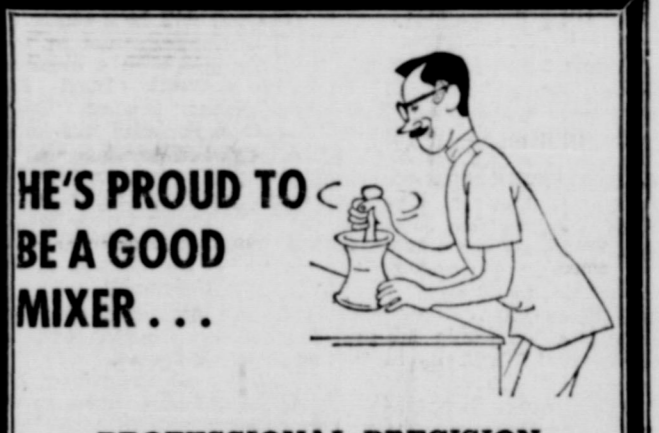

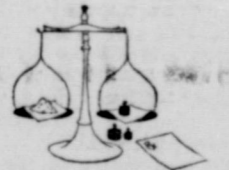

LEGAL NOTICE

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association of Gorman, Texas proposes a referendum election on September 24, 1969, under provisions of House Bill 764, 61st Legislature on the proposition of whether or not peanut producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of \$1.00 per net ton (farmers stock basis) to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members for a 9-man commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of peanuts.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Gorman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced peanuts for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to September 9, 1969, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office.

WARREN, Route 1, Gorman, Texas, 76454 applicant, seeks a permit from the Texas Water Rights Commission to divert and use 90 acre-feet of water per annum from an existing 244 acre-foot capacity reservoir on an unnamed tributary of Leon River, tributary of Little River, tributary of Brazos River, Brazos River Basin, for the irrigation of 90 acres of land out of two tracks totalling 106.7 acres in the Theresa Tyler Original Survey No. 51, Abstract No. 493, Eastland County, Texas. The midpoint of the dam is S 50 degree 58' W, 3170 feet from the northeast corner of said survey and approximately 5 miles north of Gorman, Texas. Applicant proposes to divert by means of two portable pumps located S 48 degree 10' W, 3050 feet, and S 40 degree 15' W, 3705 feet from said northeast corner, said pumps having a combined maximum diversion rate of 630 gpm.

Application No. 2702 was accepted for filing by the Texas Water Rights Commission on July 22, 1969, and a hearing thereon will be held by the Commission, in the Sam Houston State Office Building at Austin, Texas, on September 4, 1969 at 10:00 o'clock a.m.

Those opposing the granting of said application should file written protests with the Commission and the applicant at least five days prior to hearing date, giving their reasons therefor and such other information as is required by Commission Rule 305.2.

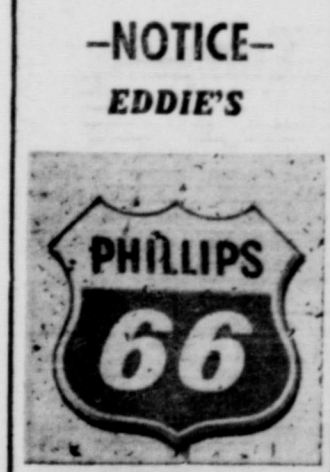

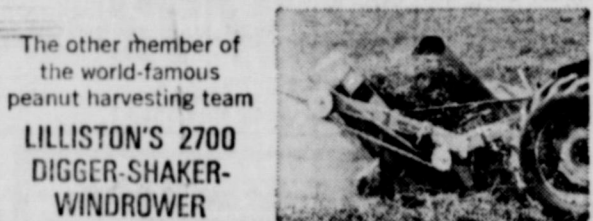

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General Rain Needed to Change Peanut Outlook

Spotted rains in various sections of the peanut growing area, helped, but what is needed now is a good general rain and a period of cloudy skies, County Agent Dee Gordon said.

Less than an inch (.74 in fact) was recorded in Eastland during the month of July, according to Weather Observer James Dabney. Rain came on July 20 with .28 of an inch measured and again on Sunday, July 27, .46 fell. A trace was reported on July 17.

There were 20 days of 100-plus temperatures in July, and three of the hottest days were July 15, 24 and 26 when the mercury stood at 105 degrees.

The Rising Star and Gorman areas received substantial showers and half an inch was recorded at Eastland, but the effects of this moisture were short-lived due to the extreme heat, growers said.

John W. Lee, official Weather Bureau observer, at Rising Star said that his gauge in the city limits recorded .69 of an inch Sunday and .53 of an inch Monday.

The intensity of the show-

ers varied from more than an inch to a mere sprinkle, and the areas covered were not large.

Generally speaking, the outlook for the peanut crop was not too promising in late July, the county agent reported, but "it could, hopefully, change," he said.

There have been many reports of incipient damage by the lesser corn borer, he said, and many farmers are now spraying their crops in defense against this insect. Two chemicals are being used variously over the district — diazinon and parathion, each of which is sprayed directly on the ground and as near the roots of the peanut plant as possible.

Reports indicate that the lesser corn borer pest is as in 1967, the county agent said.

There was only a minor infestation in 1968 when the county produced one of the bumper peanut crops of all time.

The irrigated portion of the county crop, which amounts to between 8,000 and 9,000 acres, is in much better shape both as respects plant condition and borer damage, Mr. Gordon said. Growers of irrigated crops are beginning intensive watering through their sprinkler systems now.

Generally speaking, and except for the presently unfavorable aspect of the peanut crop, the agricultural situation in the county looks very good, reports indicated.

There were indications, however, that pastures and hay crops were beginning to burn and grain sorghum fields were beginning to need moisture.

Juice of two lemons.
Unbaked pie shell.
Beat eggs well and add sugar and flour. Add butter. Add grated lemon rind and lemon juice last. Pour into unbaked pie shell and bake until set in medium oven.

The Jack Mace family also likes lemon chess pie and Mrs. Mace bakes one just a little bit different from the recipe used by Mrs. O'Brien. Mrs. Mace says this is very good to carry on picnics as it is quite firm.

LEMON CHESS PIE
Four eggs.
Two cups sugar.
One-half cup milk.
One-fourth pound margarine
One tablespoon cornmeal.
One tablespoon flour.
Juice of one lemon.
Beat eggs, add sugar, flour, cornmeal, milk, and lemon juice.
Melt the margarine and add last.
Pour into unbaked pie shell and bake for 35 minutes (or until firm) at 375 degrees.
Fried fruit pies are not only good for dessert but also for "in between meal snacks."

Mrs. D. F. Eaves of Kokomo makes twelve to fourteen pies.

FRIED FRUIT PIES
Crust:
Three cups flour.
Three-fourths cup Crisco oil.
Three-fourths cup sweet milk.
Two teaspoons salt.
Dried fruit, which has been cooked and cooled.
Mix and pinch off enough for a small pie. Roll out and fill with cooked, dried fruit which has been cooled. (Pies do better when fruit is cold.) Fry in hot grease until brown. Drain on paper towel.

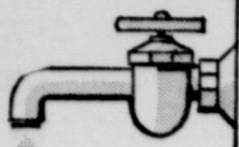

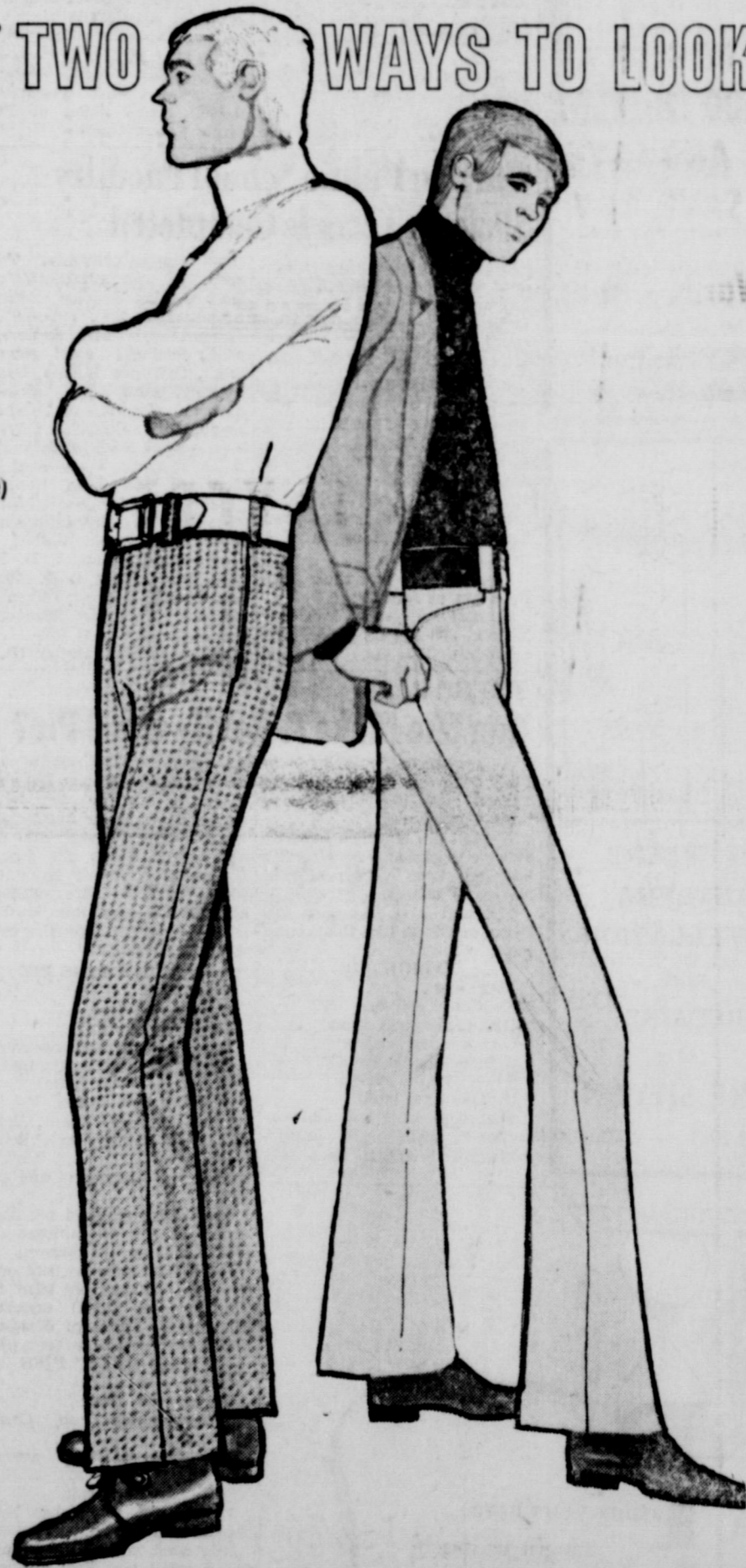
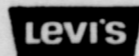

Construction Set to Begin On Carbon's New Water System

Construction is to begin immediately for the installation of the Carbon Water System, with the formal signing this week of a contract for construction.

The new Carbon System authorized \$130,000 in bonds, insured with the Farmers Home Administration and maturing over the next 40 years.

On hand for the formal signing were principals, giving the go-ahead for construction of two pump stations and installation of the water system. Contractor is George M. Amador of San Saba on a bid of \$15,200. Some 110 customers are to be served initially, with potential of about 140.

Mayor Clint Britian of Carbon said that the realization of the water system will substantially help the economy in Carbon, and it is expected that the community's economy will stabilize and grow. "Maybe in time, we can begin to think about a sewer system too," he mayor said.

Signing the 130 \$1,000 bonds was System Secretary-Treasurer Collin Campbell, as plans were finalized in the offices of O. M. Boyle, County Supervisor for the FHA, who help chart the course for the government-insured water system. FHA District Supervisor E. L. Foster of Coleman was also on hand Monday for the signing.

Others present included Mack O. Johnson of the engineering firm of Johnson and Johnson of Palestine, Attorney Ben Sudderth of Comanche, and County FHA Committeemen O. B. Rone, a Carbon native.

Carbon Councilman Floyd Woods also attended.

The Carbon System will secure water from the City of Eastland at a site near Int. 20, south of Eastland.

Other members of the County FHA Committee are Claud Fuller of Gorman and Hulon Erwin of Rising Star.

Work on the project is expected to take some 120 days.

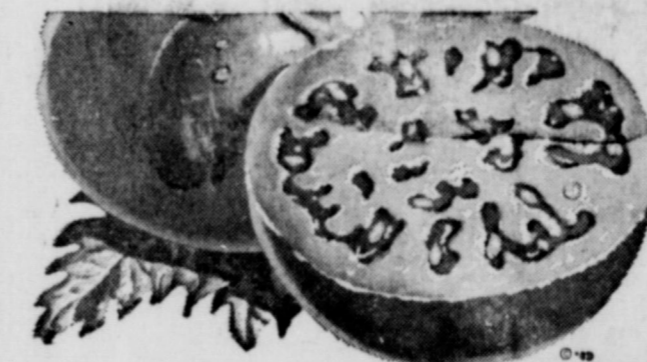
