City, the seven men gathered on the deck and decided to send an expedition for aid.

Atkinson, Bonbury and Larre were chosen to take the frail dory and make their way to shore. They said they took the dory through a high running sea for about 11 miles and then a wave caught the small craft and pitched the three men into the sea. Somehow they got together in the darkness, picked their direction and started the long swim for land.

Larre declared they had been swimming for eight hours before their feet touched bottom and they crawled up on the beach to faint from exhaustion.

German Air Pilots Receive Crowds Plaudits

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—Four German airmen received New York's acclaim today for their westward crossing of the Atlantic in a seaplane.

Captain Wolfgang Von Gronau and his aides, Eduard Zimmer, co-pilot, Franz Hack, mechanic, and Fritz Albrecht, radio operator, ended their nine-day air journey impressively by braving the Dornier-Walheraft down yesterday in the busy harbor after a six-hour flight from Halifax.

Thousands watched from shores and office buildings as the flying boat circled low around the Statue of Liberty and settled near the Battery after dodging car ferries and taxis plugging their way about the harbor.

The flight, which started from the Isle of Sylt in the North Sea and took the airmen over a 4,670 mile route by way of Iceland, Greenland, and Canada, was terminated by Von Gronau a training flight, but he hinted at the possibility of developing commercial lines over the route.

Minister To Canada Flies To New Office

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—Hansford MacNider left by airplane today for Ottawa to take up his duties as minister to Canada and to become the first American ever to fly to a foreign post.

MacNider took off from Bolling Field at 10 a. m., piloted by Capt. Ira C. Eaker, famous army flier who made the first solo flight in a broken ankle suffered last week in a parachute jump. Mrs. MacNider accompanied her husband.

Plans To Supply Funds For Seed Now Underway

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—A plan for furnishing feed and seed credit to farmers without interest, federal funds was being worked out today by a sub-committee of three bankers, members of the group here to cooperate with the federal drouth committee in drafting a program of financial relief for the drouth areas.

Henry M. Robinson of Los Angeles, member of the Davis reparations commission, is said to be the author of the plan, which later will be considered by the full conference of bankers.

The plan is understood to be a "Monday night railroad" reported to him that 665 carloads of feed had been moved into drouth states. Of this, 28 per cent went to West Virginia, 25 per cent to Virginia, 23 per cent to Maryland, 16 per cent to Ohio and 8 per cent to other states.

Industries Heading To Smaller Cities Declares Dr. Hyer

The last twenty years have seen a miracle wrought in America by the new application of gas and electricity to industry, said Dr. Gus Dyer, professor of political economy in Vanderbilt University, in a recent address before the Executive's Club of Chicago.

"It has destroyed isolation," he said. "It has brought all America out on the great highways of life. It is taking everything worth seeing and hearing from the cities and carrying it to remote sections. It is destroying the reasons why people should go to the cities to live."

"Industries are going back to the country and the small town. The cities have the greatest fight they have ever had if they are to hold their places under the new order. The small place has advantages for industry that the city can hardly meet. The cities have got to make a readjustment, recognize a new force."

A lot of thoughtful citizens hold that Dr. Dyer's prediction is well founded. In the great cities the congestion steadily grows worse, the dirt and noise become more oppressive, the wear and tear on human nerve-systems from congestion and dirt and noise harder to endure. In this day and time with the availability in practically every sizeable town of electricity and gas for power and fuel the large city has no outstanding advantage for industry and there has been a noticeable trend of large industrial concerns out to the quieter areas. The whole South has benefited from this trend, Texas and the Southwest being particular beneficiaries with their plentiful fuel and abundant power accessible in all directions.

Negro, Stabbed By Woman, Is Given Delicate Operation

HOUSTON, Tex., Aug. 27.—A delicate operation stayed the hand of death here today after Thornton Bass, negro truck driver, was stabbed close to the heart by a negro woman last night, robbed of \$40 and locked in a room.

Arteries were severed close to the heart and death seemed certain, but Dr. J. T. Darwin cut into the man's body, at Jefferson Davis Hospital, and tied together the artery ends. The negro was alive today.

Airplanes Bomb Chinese Base

PEIPING, China, Aug. 27.—Airplanes from the National Government base at Tsingtau bombed Peiping at 11 a. m. today.

The capital of the northern army was panic-stricken as the explosives wrecked houses and buildings. There were no casualties.

Four airplanes flew over the northern capital dropping bombs. Four bombs were dropped inside the former imperial palace court at Chungchi, once the residence of the Manchus. Three of the bombs landed in the Chungchi Lake and one wrecked a small palace.

The bombing planes also flew over the legation quarter, but avoided dropping explosives there.

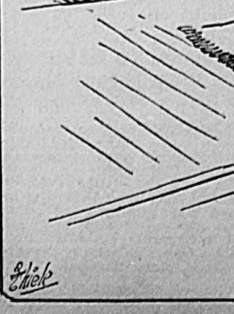

"Drinking Pro" Is Alabama Winner

COLUMBIA, S. C., Aug. 27.—United States Senator Cole L. Blease, who condones lynching and calls himself a "drinking prohibitionist," held a comfortable plurality today in tabulations of South Carolina's primary election vote.

Blease's nearest competitor was former Congressman James F. Byrnes, and it appeared virtually certain he would engage the senator in a runoff contest September 9 for the democratic senatorial nomination.

A count of 673 ballot boxes gave Blease 41,492 votes; Byrnes 31,672, and solicitor Leon W. Harris of Walhalla, 14,360.

California Elects Rolf As Governor

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27.—Returns pouring in from northern and San Francisco bay region counties early today brought Governor C. C. Young, the incumbent candidate to succeed himself, into second place in the republican gubernatorial primary race, passing district attorney Buron Fitts of Los Angeles.

Mayor James Rolph Jr., of San Francisco, materially increased his own lead over both candidates.

Returns from 5,912 out of the 10,283 state precincts gave Rolph 205,461; Young 155,642; Fitts 143,645.

TULSA, Ok., Aug. 27.—Legus Brown, an Indian, remained sullen and silent in jail here today where he is held as a suspect in the slaying of Alva Shanks, Bixby, Ok., farmer.

County Attorney W. L. Coffey said murder charges would be filed against Brown.

Brown surrendered to Sheriff Charles Price late yesterday after he had been sought since Monday when Shanks' mutilated body was found.

Brown was suffering from four knife wounds when he surrendered. Officers were investigating a report that the wounds were received in a quarrel with Shanks.

Borah Nominated As Idaho Senator

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho, Aug. 27.—William E. Borah, Idaho's republican senator, today held the republican senatorial nomination for the fifth time in his turbulent career.

The veteran solon was nominated late Tuesday at the republican state convention. With one exception, the decision was unanimous.

Franklin county's delegation insistently voted "no" Borah's failure to support the administration and his opposition to the tariff bill were cited as reasons.

Hoover To Open Celebration For Lindbergh Beacon

CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—President Hoover will press a button in the White House at Washington at 9 o'clock tonight to light the world's most brilliant air beacon, which towers nearly 700 feet above the ground on the roof of the Palmolive Building here.

Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, for whom the beacon has been named, was invited to take in the dedication ceremonies here, but it was unknown whether he would be present.

The principal beam will be visible for a distance of 200 miles from planes at an altitude of 3,000 feet.

The beacon is a gift from the late Dr. Elmer A. Sperry to commemorate Colonel Lindbergh's pioneer flight from New York to Paris.

Oklahoma Rains Relieve Suffering From Long Drouth

OKLAHOMA CITY, Ok., Aug. 27.—Recent rainfall has relieved drouth conditions in Oklahoma and the general morale of farmers is improved. D. P. Trent, extension director of the Oklahoma A. & M. College reported to the state drouth commission today. His report was based on a state-wide survey by county agents.

WOMEN GET DEATH THREAT FROM YOUTH

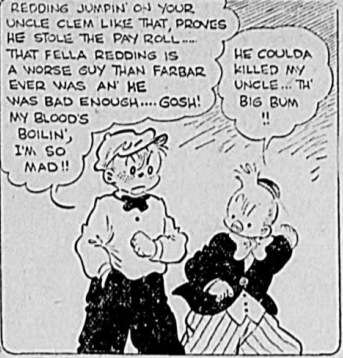

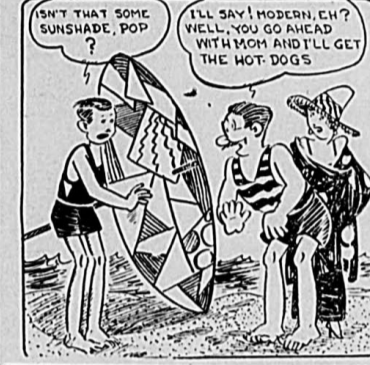
