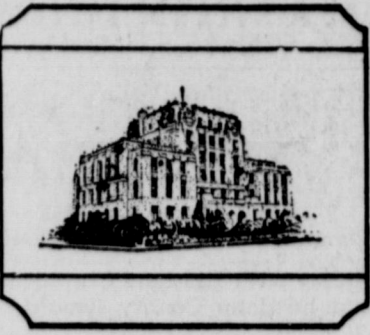

INDIANS UPSET MAVS 29-19 IN SHOCKER

For the first time this season the Eastland Mavericks experienced "the other side of the coin", losing to a re-vamped and re-vitalized Comanche Indian tribe, 29-19, Friday night.

The Mavericks, playing slightly below their usual high game, lead into the third period, but a Comanche TD and two more by the Indians in the fourth spelled the Name of the Game.

The way it stands right now, Comanche has charge; Granbury sits No. Two; and Eastland and Cisco, who meet next week in Cisco, are tied for third place.

Large Turn-Out Is Expected For General Election Here Nov. 5th

Eastland County voters will be confronted by an interesting ballot when they go to the polls Tuesday, Nov. 5, on General Election Day.

Absentee voting ended Friday and polls will open at eight o'clock in the county at 8 a. m. Tuesday.

Approximately three-fourths of the county's eligible voters are expected to turn out. There are 8,416 registered voters. Only about half (4,887) turned out for the Primaries in May. A total of 4,711 voted in the Democratic Primary (and 124 in the Demo absentee), with Republicans voting in 50 at one box and one absentee.

Of major interest, of course will be the candidates for United States President. The suit-sized ballot offers three political party representatives: Hubert H. Humphrey and Edmund S. Muskie of the Democratic Party; Richard M. Nixon and Spiro T. Agnew on the Republican Party; and George

C. Wallace and S. Marvin Griffith (stan-in listing for Curtis E. LeMay) on the American Party.

Republican candidates contest the usually Democratic state offices and one district office. There are no other American Party candidates

other than for president and vice president.

Elections judges are expecting some confusion on the ballot, and held a training session Friday afternoon for workers. Basis for the concern is the addition of voting information at the top of the ballot

which may only confuse voters. Purpose of the information is to offer the Two write-in efforts - 14 proposed Constitutional amendments add further to the ballot.

Assistant County Attorney Emory Walton first announced a write-in candidate for the office of County Attorney. The term of CA Pe Brown expires this year. He did not seek nomination re-election. No one else is for the nomination and Walton came to this county April 1. He was not eligible place his name for nomination. There are no candidates listed on the ballot for the list of county attorney. Walton is asking that voters write his name in the write-in column.

WHEN YOU VOTE NOV. 5th

(An Editorial)

Eastland County voters will take part Tuesday, Nov. 5th, in an important event -- a presidential year general election.

This year's ballot is a large one with several columns of party nominees plus an extra column for write-in votes. In addition, Texans will consider 14 proposed changes in their state constitution. It is easy to understand that important matters will be settled at the polls this year and that it is important for every voter to participate.

Those local voters who plan to cast a split ticket (vote for both Democrats and Republicans, for example) will want to remember that Texas can be a big loser if the Democratic Party nominees are not given support in some of the contested races. People like Preston Smith for governor, Ben Barnes for lieutenant governor, Crawford Martin for attorney general and Omar Burleson for 17th district congressman won places on the Democratic ballot as party nominees and their election is important to every Texan. Most of the Democratic Party nominees, particularly in races below state level, have no listed opponents.

In the last presidential election, some 74,000,000 Americans cast ballots but another 55,000,000 eligible voters stayed at home. This is an example of the type of apathy that threatens government of the people, by the people, and for the people.

The obligations of good citizenship include voting in all elections -- from precinct to national levels.

DIALING FOR CARBON

The new Carbon Exchange, all private line, telephone service will be cut into service by the first of the month. Company officials say that all last minute construction and equipment testing is nearing completion.

Prefix for Carbon numbers is 653. It is 653 for Olden and 654 for Eastland.

After hearing completion by Nov. 1, will be the nationwide direct distance dialing or DDD. The manager says that directions on dialing will be mailed to each subscriber in the regular monthly billing envelope.

The new systems are owned by the Comanche County Telephone Company, Inc. and upon their completion will be the most modern telephone plant in service today, in that no "party line" will be available. The private lines are run to each party in each exchange via buried cable. In this cable each person will be served all the way from the exchange building to their house on their own particular line. The company has in most cases made about a 20 percent overpull of pairs in the cable available for future needs.

For the first time, after Thursday night, the people in the Carbon Exchange can dial the Eastland Exchange by simply dialing the Eastland number all seven digits. The Olden Exchange had similar services made available on Oct. 1, 1968. They may now call Eastland and Eastland may dial them. Other Exchanges to receive new

service are Desdemona, by Dec 1, and De Leon, by Jan. 1, 1969.

Once again, says the manager, we truly appreciate the cooperative spirit and attitude of the people in the areas we serve. You have truly made yourselves a part of us in the unselfish way that all of you pulled back and made right-of-way available for your cable routes. It takes things like this to bring you the most modern communications so very valuable to you in your busy work days.

NIXON WINS IN LOCAL STRAW

The "presidential election" was held Thursday at Eastland Elementary School and Nixon won with 161 votes; Wallace was second with 134, and Humphrey received 78.

Mrs. Ruth Poe Herring, fifth grade teacher, prepared the election boxes. She drew up the South Precinct and the North Precinct for the wings of the building and each classroom had its own voting box. A first grader, actually seen voting three times, claimed the secrecy of the ballot box; it is not known whether he voted once for each candidate or three times for one candidate.

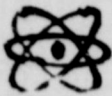

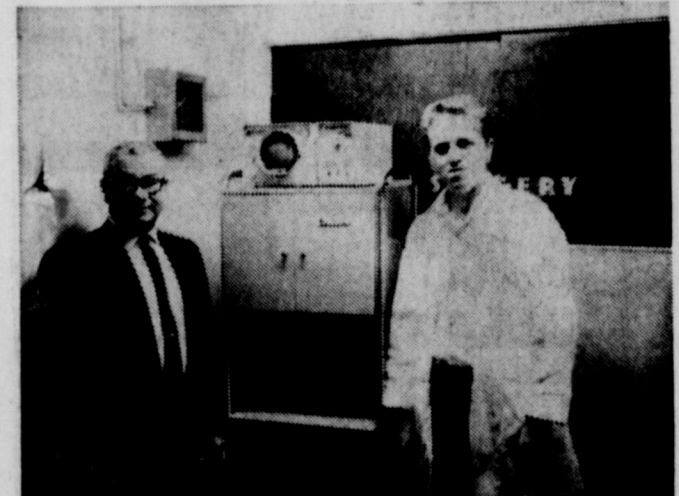

Truck Hits Bridge Dumps Peanuts

A truck loaded with several thousand pounds of peanuts hit a guard rail two miles north of Eastland on State Highway 6 about 5:30 a. m. Thursday, slightly injuring driver James Edward Smith of Gorman.

Smith had a tooth knocked out and was treated and released for bruises at Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Highway Patrolman Bob Rivers and Gary Brewer said the vehicle hit the rail and ran into a ditch but did not overturn. Several thousand pounds of peanuts had to be pushed into the ditches by Highway Department equipment to clear the roadway.

Brewer said most of the peanuts could be recovered but estimated damage at \$25,000 to the truck-tractor and semitrailer. Brewer said, "Seemingly, driver dozed and after hitting the guard rail was unable to get back to the road."

EVERY VOTE COUNTS

Eastland County has 8,416 registered voters and indications are that most of them will vote in the general election Tuesday, November 5.

County Clerk Johnson Smith announced that 377 voted in the absentee balloting which closed at 5 p. m. Friday. This is a record number. Absentee votes in the 1964 election were 336; in 1960, 324; in 1956, 216; and in 1952, 354.

Edgar Altom, tax collector, listed registered voters by precincts: Eastland, 1,934; Olden, 256; Ranger, 1,566; Desdemona, 187; Gorman, 852; Carbon, 247; Rising Star, 1,041; and Cisco, 2,333.

A presidential election has always created heavy voting in the County, although in 1964 more residents voted in the governor's race than in the national spot.

The 1962 election drew the largest number of voters in the last twenty years with 7,904. Totals for other years are, 6752 in 1964; 6443 in 1960; 6108 in 1956; 6665 in 1948.

The Republicans have won in the county three times out of the last five presidential elections. In 1952, Eisenhower drew 4518 votes against 3386 for Stevenson; in 1956, Eisenhower beat Stevenson 3580 to 2512.

In 1960, the county voted 3359 for Nixon and 3058 for Kennedy.

Truman took 5121 votes in 1948, however, against only 1,177 for Dewey. That year Strom Thurmond drew 326 votes, a county record for a third party candidate. Usually third parties have drawn from one to 26 votes.

In the last election, in 1964, Johnson got 4692 votes and Goldwater got 2049.

The sixth presidential election in twenty years will be held Tuesday. The number of voters Eastland County has depends upon you. The way the county goes depends upon you. VOTE TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 5.

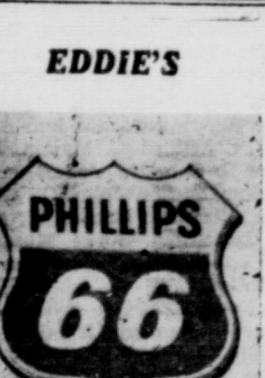

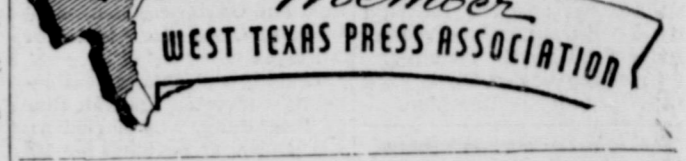

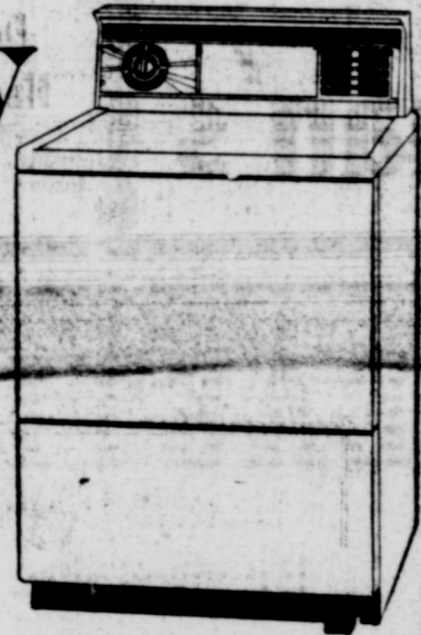

Can Be Made At
Abilene Office**

Social security beneficiaries in Eastland County who need to report changes of address or other events that affect the payment of their monthly benefits may now do so through the Abilene social security office, R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager, said today. Reports may be made by mail, telephone or personal visit.

Tuley said that up to now beneficiaries were asked to notify the Social Security Administration on postcard forms pre-addressed to one of six social security payment centers throughout the country. Beneficiaries received the postcard forms when they initially applied for monthly benefits. They should now line through that address on the cards and insert "Box 3258, Abilene, Texas 79604".

"This change in reporting methods will reduce the time needed to change addresses and process other information having an effect on payment of monthly benefits. This is now possible due to the increased capacity of social security district offices to transmit the information over high speed communications circuits to payment centers," Tuley added.

In addition to address changes, he said that other events that affect receipt of monthly social security checks include employment, dropping out of school between 18-22, marriage or remarriage in some instances, divorce, and death.

Kirk is not qualified under Section 7 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas and Article 1884, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, to be elected District Judge of the 91st District Court of Eastland County, Texas, at the general election to be held in said County in 1968"—which judgment has become a final judgment.

(The above rulings are of record in the office of the District Clerk of Eastland County, Texas in Cause No. 24,798.)

3. Article 1.05, Texas Election Code, provides — "No ineligible candidate shall ever be voted upon or have votes counted for him at any ... general or special election."

The office of the District Judge is a most important one, and the election for such office should not be taken lightly or capriciously.

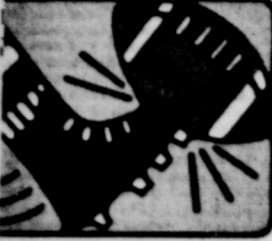

Explaining Amendment

AMENDMENT NO. 2
Increasing the amount which may be expended in one year from state funds for public assistance payments to needy aged, needy disabled, needy blind, and needy children to \$5,000,000.

This proposed amendment Section 51-a of Article III raises the ceiling on state funds used for financial assistance to the needy aged, needy disabled, needy blind, and needy children from \$60,000,000 to \$75,000,000 to assure

Texas recipients that they will not be disqualified from receiving the maximum amount permitted under the federal program simply through a deficiency of state funds to meet federal standards.

The proposed Amendment No. 2 does not make an appropriation but rather allows the legislature greater discretion in meeting the needs of all four classes of welfare recipients in the state by raising the ceiling on the use of state funds for this purpose from

\$6,000,000 to \$75,000,000. Texas consistently has been in the lowest percentiles of the nation with respect to welfare, ranking 50th in administrative cost per recipient for old age assistance, 44th in percent receiving old age assistance, 49th in assistance in aid to dependent children, and 45th in assistance in aid to permanently and totally disabled. Because aid for dependent children allotments are based on a family of four, the higher ceiling provided for the proposed amendment would make it possible for the legislature to have greater discretion in giving budgetary consideration to larger families. Further the proposed amendment would permit consideration to be given to last year's 4 per cent rise in the cost of living in budgeting for all four classes of recipients.

Against:
The large overall expenditure of state funds which this amendment would authorize would increase each recipient's income only a few dollars a month but would require \$15,000,000 in new funds at a time when the state is already hard pressed to meet existing financial obligations. Instead of encouraging dependency on public welfare, the state should begin to draw a line in combating growing socialism and the welfare state.

The Value of Scientific Grazing Demonstrated In County Project

Farmers and ranchers of today have long since realized that grazing management of their rangeland has become a technical science. A plan of operations is needed for forage and livestock production. This grazing management plan should have short term and long term objectives. Ways or methods to accomplish these objectives, methods for distribution of grazing, a forage and livestock inventory and deferred grazing. Some of the short term objectives might be to improve the present cover to control erosion. To obtain the greatest amount of use from lesser desirable species and improve the vigor of the more desirable species. Also to learn to judge the degree of grazing based on the key areas and key species.

Long term objectives should include plans to increase the amount of desirable forbs. To obtain a better balance be-

tween summer and winter forage. To change the overall vegetative composition from less palatable plants to ones higher on the ladder of plant succession. Also to improve all pastures to as near the original climax composition as possible. Ways to accomplish these objectives might be to concentrate goats at a rate of 3-6 per acre on oak in early spring, mid-summer and early fall to defoliate brush, and do not graze at any other time. By heavy use of spring annuals, and graze approximately 50 percent of the current seasons growth by weight. Distribution of grazing can be accomplished by fencing, watering facilities, salting and

supplemental feeding areas. These factors facilitate management and aid in better distribution of grazing by protecting from poisonous plants, permitting selective grazing of specific sites or species, better use of all species, and protecting heavily used or more accessible areas.

A forage and livestock inventory on the farm or ranch is basically the same principle as an "end-of-the-year" stock inventory made in a drug store, grocery store or any other business of this type. The inventory simply reflects the acres in each pasture or site, the condition of each site, the amount of forage available whether on the ground or in the barn, acres per animal unit, total animal units, important key species by which to judge degree of use and the best season of use by pastures.

Enough cannot be said about the value of "Deferred

Grazing." Deferred grazing is simply resting a pasture during the growing season. Utilization of Coastal bermudagrass pastures works beautifully in conjunction with rangeland in that the Coastal is being utilized from about May through October, the period that most native grasses need a rest to grow and make a seed crop. Some of the benefits of deferred grazing are to get the maximum benefits from brush control. Protect livestock from poisonous

plants, protect seeded and mairlain feed preserves dry years, and most important to increase vigor, establish a seed crop, and extend ground cover.
In order to adhere to principles of range management all grazing management plans must reflect: best season of use, kind livestock best suited, distribution of grazing use, proper degree of grazing use and should be realistic, flexible and
