## PEANUT REPORT GOES TO WORK

Copies of a study recently completed by Texas Electric Service Company of the peanut industry and the potential for manufacturing peanut products in this area were distributed to a group of civic leaders Monday by Frank Sayre, Division manager for the company.

"We hope this study will be helpful in attracting new industries to this area," Sayre said. "It points out some of the real opportunities for the profitable manufacturing of peanut products, such as candy, peanut butter and salted peanuts."

"This study is part of the company's Program for Economic Progress (PEP) intended to help communities served by the company in their economic and cultural improvement programs," he said.

James H. Harwell of Austin, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission, was present at the meeting Monday.

"This is a comprehensive study of peanut production and industry in this area," Harwell said. "Texas Electric Service Company is to be commended for making this report available."

The availability of all the resources — raw materials, markets, transportation and labor — that are essential for a profitable manufacturing operation in this area is described in the study. More than 97 million pounds of peanuts were produced in Eastland, Comanche and Erath Counties in 1967, the study shows, and a larger crop was estimated for 1968. This valuable raw material was exported from the area for processing into food products elsewhere.

The study further indicates that a new industry locating in this area could easily employ 300 workers in the first 12 months of operation and approximately the same number each year thereafter.

Latest figures available according to the study reveal that 4.7 pounds per person of shelled, edible peanuts were used in the production of peanut butter, salted peanuts and peanut candy in the U. S. in 1967. Of this, 2.5 pounds were used in making peanut butter, 1.2 pounds in salted peanuts and 1.0 pounds in peanut candy.

The population within a 200 mile radius of the Eastland-Comanche County area is about 4½ million people, providing a peanut butter market of more than 11 million pounds per year, a salted peanut market of more than 5 million pounds, and a peanut candy market of more than 85 million pounds. Enlarging the area to a 600-mile radius increases the market to six times these amounts.

The study even covers the possibility of making peanut brittle in the home and the amount of profit that could be made with pan, paddle and kitchen range.

Born Oct. 25, 1879, in Bosque County, Mr. Lane lived at 911 W. Commerce St. for approximately nine years. He moved to Eastland from Carbon and was a retired farmer and carpenter. A member of the Woodmen of the World, he was also a deacon in Bethel Baptist Church.

Mr. Lane was married to Many Minervia Staff Nov. 6, 1901, in Stephens County. She preceded him in death March 4, 1960.

Survivors include two sons, Jesse M. Lane of Midland and Roy L. Lane of Eastland; one daughter, Mrs. Lena Lane Black of Denton; one sister-in-law, Mrs. Estelle Lane of Eastland; 16 grandchildren; 35 great grandchildren and five great great grandchildren; a number of nieces and nephews.

## Citizens Petition Council For Better TV Reception

In a formal petition, 157 Eastland residents gave notice this week that they are not satisfied with the service and reception that they are getting from the cable television company that is serving this area.

In a formal petition filed with the Eastland City Commission, the citizens stated: "We the undersigned are not getting the service or reception from our cable television system that we expect, and hereby request that the city demand such reception and service or that a franchise be granted to another company."

A local resident appeared, stating that he preferred to voice his complaint in person rather than sign petitions, and said that the company is not living up to its contract in providing the service he is paying for.

The commission was sympathetic with the visitor and the petitioners, expressing the belief that something could and would be done. An out-of-town company has expressed interest in offering service in Eastland, and this possibility is to be studied it was agreed, as well as consulting the city attorney to determine what legal actions could and should be taken.

## Scallorn Due Here Thursday

Glen Scallorn, former Eastland resident, and now co-owner of Southern Television Systems Inc., which serves Eastland, Ranger and Cisco, was contacted by phone Tuesday afternoon at his Del Rio office, by this newspaper.

He stated that he will be in Eastland Thursday to discuss service and reception with the City Commissioners and interested local citizens.

"First of all," Mr. Scallorn said, "let me say that we are sorry for any less-than-perfect service or reception that patrons may have experienced, and secondly, that we appreciate the 157 petition signers who took the time to add their name to alist calling these inadequacies to our attention."

He said that he recently sent an outside engineer into Eastland to survey the system after receiving several complaints. "The engineer reported several trouble spots at that time, and we are now in the process of correcting these," Mr. Scallorn said. "He further suggested that many customers were undoubtedly upset recently when the microwave system was out of order in prime time for a couple of hours."

"Please convey our willingness to do whatever needs to be done to provide the type of service the people of Eastland deserve," Mr. Scallorn said.

Regarding the carrying of channels Four (CBS) and Five (NBC) out of Dallas, he said, "Our hands are tied on that. The Federal Communications Commission will not permit us to bring them to Eastland."

Concerning rates in Eastland, Mr. Scallorn said that rates are as low as possible and in line with the number of subscribers. "Naturally," he said, "in communities where population is greater and the number of subscribers is larger, the rates are some lower. We sincerely wish that the population of Eastland would increase, then our number of customers could increase and a lower rate could be offered."

"Southern Television Systems Corp. has always tried to be a good citizen of every community it serves, and we want to continue serving the good people of Eastland," he said.

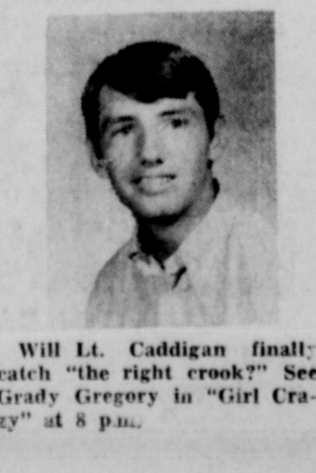

# Orient Trip Is Dream Come True For Ciscoan

As we neared Love Field, I became suddenly aware that what I had dreamed of, hoped for, and yes, even prayed for had matured into a reality. If someone had told me two months before our trip that I would be going to Taiwan, Hong Kong and Japan to spend Christmas, I wouldn't have believed him. But there I was leaving for a twenty-day visit to the Orient!

Flying from Dallas to Taipei, Taiwan with an hour or two lay over in L.A., Honolulu, and Tokyo took approximately nineteen hours, and left three tired "chickens." Rev. Michael Varro, Superintendent of the China Peniel Missionary Society in Taiwan, met Josephine Cleveland, her daughter, Carolyn and me at the airport in Taipei. As we left the airport with my head "swimming" we got our first veritable glimpse of the orient. Rev. Varro pointed out the places of interest, such as Chiang Kai-shek's winter home as we made our way around the city that is overly crowded with bicycles and motorcycles. Even though the city has built a special lane for this type of vehicle, the cyclist won't always use them.

well. But little did I realize how happy I would be and the spiritual growth that I would obtain before leaving Hong Kong.

The next ten days in Hong Kong were glorious! We made our way all around the border of the new territory. We viewed the communist border of Red China a mile away. We visited a market place where the people were selling everything from dog meat to snake medicine.

We were wondering why the crowd had gathered in one area of the market place. As I peered over the heads of the small Chinese people, to my stupefaction there were two men playing with a cobra and another deadly snake. When I saw what was going on, I didn't tarry long because one of those snakes was to close to me for comfort.

We went through Yuen Long and saw the Nixon library. (There's a very interesting story to its beginning.) At the Aberdeen harbor we saw thousands of houseboats and took a ride on a sampan to get a closer look at the homes of these boat people. It is really heartbreaking to see how some of the people live over there. Not only are they living in great poverty but also in darkness, spiritually speaking. The thought, "Americans are always looking on the materialistic side of things, but the only thing that really matters is the spiritual side", was really brought home to me while we were attending a boat wedding.

"All Americans are rich, aren't they?" We heard this in every country we visited. America is so far ahead of the Orient in some things and in others America is lagging far behind.

There is such a great contrast in Hong Kong. Over on the hill will be hundreds of little wooden refugee shacks and thirty yards away where the mountain has been cut away will be a twenty story, ultra modern apartment house.

Dr. David Chun, head of the China Peniel Missionary Society in Hong Kong, and his showing us around the island and the main land. The spiritual emphasis they added to our trip was wonderful.

We got to see how from one

man's obedience to God's calling eight churches in Hong Kong go through their start and how the work has flourished and has spread to Taiwan and Korea. That man is the Rev. A. K. Reiton of Cisco, Texas.

Japan, our next stop, had a new and different experience awaiting us, along with colder weather. We had scheduled a side tour of Nikko where there is a very large Buddhist temple. The night of December 31, the Buddhist have their big annual service in Nikko. What a fascinating, bewitching experience to view the service! The Buddhist people were throwing their sins in the fire, thinking it would save them. Someday, I hoped and prayed, someone would tell them about the one true God.

Boarding the plane to fly back to Dallas I prayed, "Don't let me ever forget the things I saw. Thank you so much, dear God, for all our wonderful new friends, but thank you most of all for making this trip possible for me."



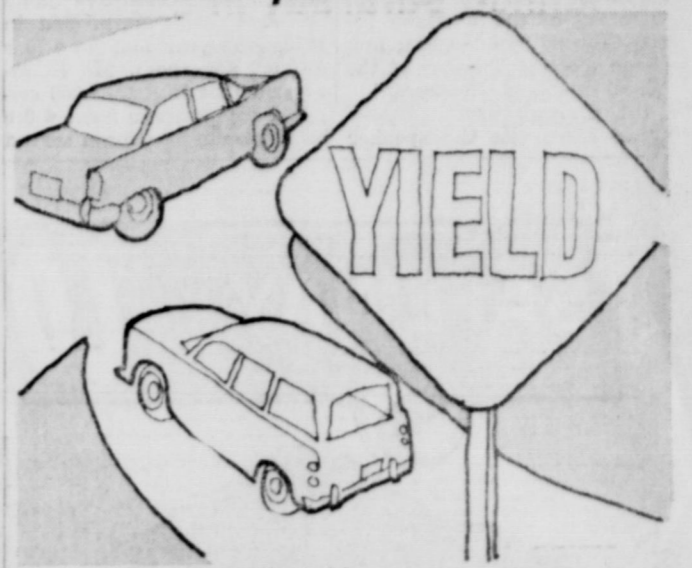

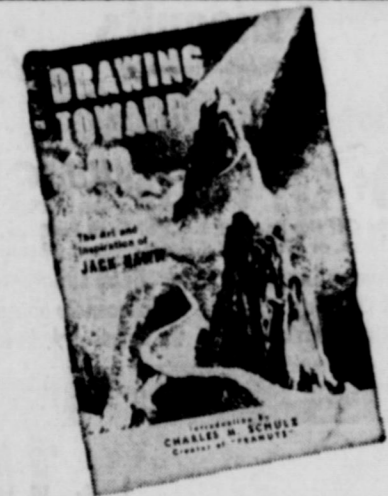

# Significance Of Lionism Is Tuesday Topic

The significance of Lionism was vividly outlined in a "co-operative" program effort for members of the Eastland Lions Club at their regular luncheon meeting Tuesday at the White Elephant Restaurant. Int. Counselor O. L. Stamey of Cisco was the speaker

and he was thoroughly introduced by Zone Chairman Marcus O'Neil, who had previously been introduced by Tip Arthur. The three had attended the mid-winter conference in Abilene, and were working together in giving the program. Speaking briefly of the Lion's Crippled Children's Camp at Kretzville, established in 1933, (the year that he was district governor), Mr. Stamey said that to date, 9,500 crippled children and some 600 blind people have been served at the camp.

Quoting the President Dave Evans who spoke at the Abilene event, Stamey stressed the importance of practicing the principals of Lionism in the "forging of world peace." He told briefly the Evans story of the two Lions who initiated a people-to-people exchange which is believed to have resulted in the release of the Pueblo crew from their North Korean captors. Stressing the importance of the membership gain, Stamey challenged the Eastland club to get its 10 per cent quota and guessed that it could double its membership.

The 55 seniors and 47 juniors did research projects of their choice of subjects from Texas to Alaska, a child's world to life following death. 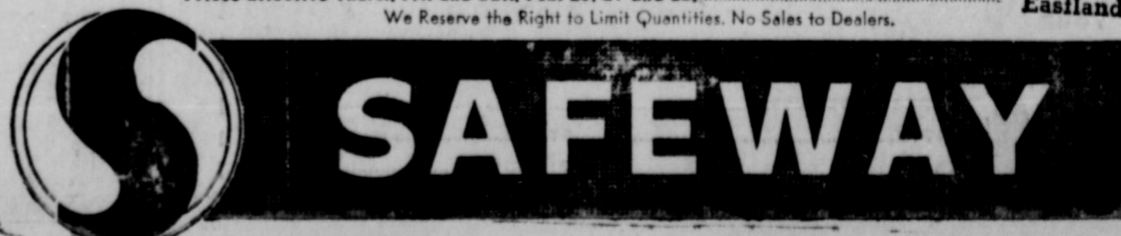

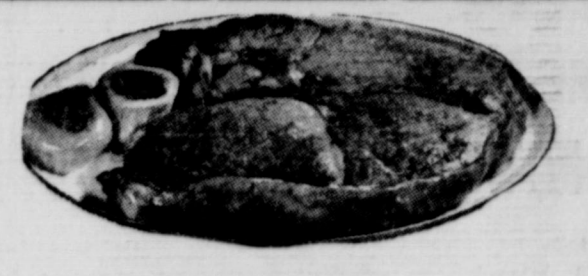

## Ranger Navyman Receives Purple Heart in Vietnam

With the Mobile Riverine Force in the Mekong Delta—A U. S. Navyman from Ranger, has been awarded the Purple Heart medal for wounds received in a battle between the Army-Navy Mobile Riverine Force (MRF) and Viet Cong guerrillas in the Mekong Delta of South Vietnam.

Engineman Second Class Joe W. Edwards, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Edwards Sr., of 923 Oddie St. in Ranger, was presented the award by Capt. J. G. Now, Deputy Commander of River Assault Flotilla One, in ceremonies held during a lull in the almost non-stop operation of the MRF. The assault flotilla is the Naval component of the unique striking force.

The ceremony took place aboard the USS Mercer (APB-39) as it was anchored in the Bassac River. The Mercer, a self-propelled barracks ship, and 10 other ships act as a mobile base for the flotilla's 170

assault boats, which support American & Vietnamese ground elements in search and sweep operations across the Delta swamplands.

In a typical operation, such as the one in which Edwards was wounded, the troops are transported into battle by Navy Armored Troop Carriers (ATCs), versatile 56-foot converted landing craft. Each of these boats is capable of carrying a platoon of 40 fully-equipped infantrymen through the intricate network of tawny waterways and green rice paddies that comprise the Mekong Delta.

Gunfire support is provided by other heavily armored craft including 60-foot Monitors, reminiscent of the ironclad of the same name that fought in Civil War days.

Petty Officer Edwards was graduated from Ranger High School before entering the Navy in February, 1966.

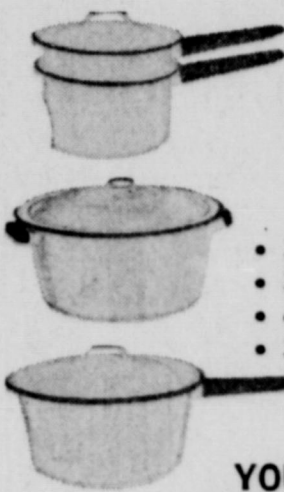

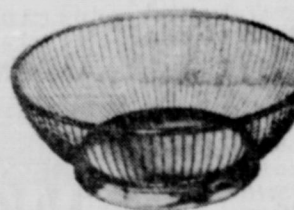
