Mr. Frost said that the addition of Mrs. G. W. Fields, R. N., to the staff in Eastland, brings that home to standard requirements.

The one-day meet, sponsored by the Texas Nursing Home Assoc. and the State Dept. of Public Welfare, dealt with the responsibilities of the nursing home and state welfare workers under this new program which became effective on Jan. 1, 1969.

"The new program is designed to place the patient in the nursing home that offers the level of specific care program that the individual need stated Mr. Frost and Carey.

Nursing homes and those recipients requiring nursing home care are now classified into three types: Skilled care, intermediate care III and intermediate care II. Skilled nursing homes serve patients requiring maximum nursing care. Intermediate III homes serve patients needing nursing care, but of a lesser degree. Intermediate II homes serve residents who do not require professional nurse care, but are incapable of indepen-

dent living. A welfare recipient classifi-ed as Skilled, Intermediate III or Intermediate II will be provided care in a nursing home of like classification, wher e possible.
