95,000 acers in Eastland Coun-ches of clay loam; Presence ty last year by soil scientist of free lime, some soils high of the Soil Conservation Service. They covered many individual farms located throughout the county and Upper Leon Soil Conservation District. The survey of the entire county is planned for completion in 1971, according to Joe Moore and Fred Coburn.

Soil scientist examine the soil and associated land features and record the information on aerial photographs. They study landscape features, relief, vegetation and the materials from which the soils have formed. They walk over each field and dig holes deep enough to examine the underlying layers.

more readily. Many other characteristics are also noted, such as kind or underlying material; slope of the surface; degree of erosion; stoniness and evidences of poor drainage of flooding.

Other information needed by the users of the soil survey is included with the soils information on the aerial photo. The map shows drainage pattern position of lakes, ponds, rock outcrops, roads, farm houses, schools and churches.

soil, a blocky clay subsoil restricts root growth, holds mall small quantities of water and air, is difficult to irrigate, whereas, a less clayey or more crumbly type clay holds water well, takes in water adequately for irrigation, permits roots to penetrate deeply and release fertilizer elements. Landowners cooperat in g with the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District use the maps in planning how to treat the farms and ranches. Whether one plans to treat a field, dig a cellar, install a septic tank, field or build a road, the kind of soil is important. Soil characteristics greatly affect the cost and degree of success.






