## Animals, Exhibitors, Buyers Add Up To Successful County Show

The Eastland County Live-stock Show Champion Steer "Abraham" was purchased by the five banks of Eastland County for 50 cents per pound. The steer, owned by Lynne Phippen of Cisco, was sold at the stock show sale Saturday night. The five banks also purchased three champion market lambs, the champion market hog and reserve champion hog reported county agent DeMarquis Gordon. The Callahan County Cooperative out bid the banks on the champion medium wool lamb. Winfrey and Scott Cattle Co. of Rising

Star purchased Carter Hounsell's Reserve Champion steer for 45 cents per pound.

Owners of the champion and reserve champion market hogs were Teresa Browder and Hardy Browder, of Gorman. Exhibitors selling champion lambs were Keith Clark, J. V. Rhyne and Gary Kent, all of Cisco. J. V. Rhyne sold the champion fine wool cross and the champion Southdown lambs.

Gordon said the other buyers who purchased prime steer for 33 cents per pound were West Texas Utilities of Cisco, Thornton Feed Mill of Cisco, Rising Star Chamber of Commerce, Eastland Supply Co., and Boss Manufacturing Co. of Cisco.

Choice grade steers were purchased for 31 cents per pound by Perry Brothers of Eastland, Fullen Motor Co. of Eastland, West Texas Utilities of Cisco, Kay Chevrolet of Cisco, Rust Funeral Home of Cisco, City Drug of Cisco, Gardenhire Oil Co. of Cisco and S & M Supply of Cisco.

The good grade steers purchased for 30 cents per pound were sold to Arrington Hamner Funeral Home of Eastland, Eastland Chamber of Commerce, Safeway of Eastland and Garl Gorr Insurance of Cisco.

Others who bought prime lambs were Eastland Auto Parts, Hill Crest Food Market, Carl Warren Dairy Queen, Texas Electric, Coca-Cola, Eastland Chamber of Commerce, Southern TV, Eastland Grain and Seed Co., and Jack Gorman all of Eastland. **THE AZTEC CALENDAR** — Symbol of a mighty empire, and of Eastland County's newest industry, The Mobile Home Co., now under construction in Eastland. A large Aztec calendar has been hung at Eastland National Bank, courtesy of Mr. L. M. Blalock, owner and president of the new manufacturing firm here. The encyclopedia says this of the Aztecs:

A race of highly cultured peoples occupying Mex. at the time of the Sp. conquest. They were one of a number of tribes speaking the Nahua dialect. Migrating southward, they finally reached the site of the present Mex. City, there built the city of Tenochtitlan, 1325. After a cent. of paying tribute to stronger neighbors, they formed an alliance with Tezcuco and Tlacoapan, expanding the Aztec empire and in turn conquered and exacted tribute from weaker tribes. A complex civilization was developed by this people, based on a harsh religion involving human sacrifices. Remarkable engineering and architectural works were accomplished; irrigation was used as an aid to agriculture; sculpture, weaving, ornamental metal work were practiced; education was general. The decline of this empire began in the early 16th cent. with its defeat by northern tribes. Its history came to a close in 1520 with the conquest of Mex. by Cortez, his subjugation of the Aztec confederacy, and the death of its ruler Montezuma II.

## Rabbit, Black-Eyed Peas Are Introduced to Native Diets

Introduction of domestic rabbit and black-eyed peas to provide protein to the diet is among the major work being done in the field of medicine for under-developed natives in Rodesia, according to Dr. Bob Garrett, missionary home on leave in Eastland.

Speaking for members of the Eastland Lions Club at their Tuesday luncheon meeting, Dr. Garrett explained that malnutrition is a serious problem because of the native diet of "corn meal mush".

"We have both kinds of lions in Rodesia," he said, referring to Lions Club members and the four-footed kind, in the country roughly the size of New Mexico. In his first four-year tour, Dr. Garrett worked out of a central hospital with six clinics in the bush, reached by airplane. "We have a real nice climate — it froze last year for the first time in six years," he said, "and we have two seasons — the wet and dry. It rains about 40 inches in four months, the rest of the time it's dry."

English is the primary language (with some 165,000 whites), and the reason natives have low-protein diets (even with an abundance of game), is several fold: they are not allowed to own firearms, they won't eat cattle because cattle is wealth, and they just simply prefer the corn meal diet.

"Other missionaries have been working on the rabbit theory, and I introduced black-eyed peas. There's a lot of peanuts, too, but they won't eat them much," he said.

Harl O'Brien was program chairman and introduced Dr. Garrett. President E. O. Moore presided and guests introduced by Jeff Glazner included Hiram McCanlies of Cisco, Gen. Frost of Eastland and Sam Drindle of Fort Worth.

Ushers will be Scott and Phil Fry, Jeffrey Mahoney, Cliff Hallmark, Jeff Bakker, and Trey Hoffmann.

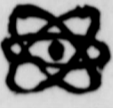

## 27 Residents of County Face Last Medicare Chance

The 1969 general enrollment period for the supplemental medical insurance under Medicare by some 27 Eastland County residents will close in a few days, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager. He cautioned that this will be the last chance for some people over 67 to ever be entitled to the doctor bill part of Medicare.

The supplemental medical insurance part of Medicare is financed through the participants paying \$4 a month and the Federal Government contributing \$4 a month from general revenues. Tuley stated that although over 95 per cent of those entitled to the hospital insurance have also taken the optional supplemental insurance, a few have turned it down in the past or have not said whether or not they want it.

Each year from January

through March there is a general enrollment period giving those already over 65 but not enrolled for the supplemental insurance a second chance to do so. One exception is that an individual who is not enrolled must do so within 3 years of his first opportunity. Those born October 1, 1901, or earlier fit this category; and if they have never been enrolled, they must do so by March 31, 1969. He noted that this group would not be able to apply next year in the general enrollment period since it will have been over 3 years since they could have first enrolled.

According to Tuley the general enrollment period does not apply to those now nearing age 65, as they should apply in the 3-month period before reaching 65.

# HEALTH COLUMN

AUSTIN — Ever heard of the Texas Interagency Council on Smoking and Health? If you haven't, you will because it's the nation's pace-setter in bringing smoking and health education to the state's youth and adults alike.

Here's the way the concept works to achieve a coordinated effort: The council is comprised of the Texas State Department of Health, Texas Education Agency, Texas Division of American Cancer Society, Texas Heart Association, Texas Tuberculosis and Respiratory

Diseases Association and Texas Medical Association. The Texas Parent-Teachers Association is a cooperating member. It coordinates the regional conferences in developing leadership within individual school districts, making available, to teachers and students special resource materials, consultants and activities relating to the hazards of smoking. The goal of the Council is to bring to the state an increasing awareness of the health

hazard of cigarette smoking with emphasis given to youth. And the goal is being rapidly reached in Texas. There are 20 regional education service centers over the state where 10 conferences on smoking and health have already been completed; and five more will be completed by spring. This will total 75% of the state. This is more in one state than in all other states combined. A special resource kit is pro-

vided those school district representatives who attend the conferences and they take the material directly back into their classrooms. This way, education starts immediately and is lost in further meetings with local personnel. Both national and state authorities in the education field are used as instructors at the conferences. Recently two noted authorities in the education field met with the Council in Austin to evaluate its progress and

stated that Texas is "by far the leader in this endeavor." What this means then, is that of all information concerning public health being brought to our students, the hazards of smoking are becoming uppermost in the curriculum. And again, Texas is leading the way. Lt. and Mrs. Robert F. Gragg of Wichita Falls visited her mother and brother, Mrs. Captola Woods and Bill, on Sunday.

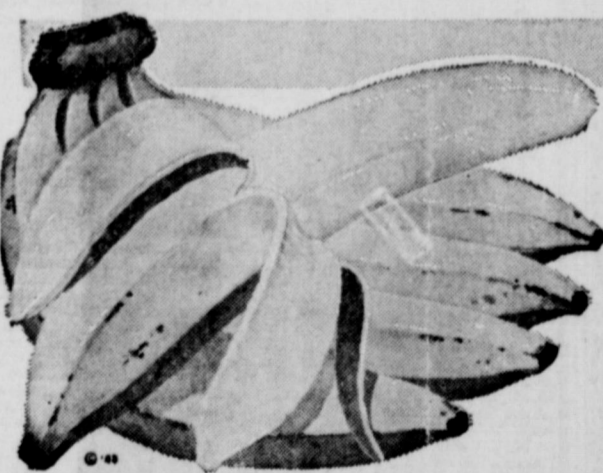
