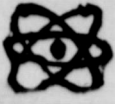

## MRS. VERNER IS HONORED BY HER ASSOCIATES AT CORNELIUS PLANT

Mrs. W. Q. (Thelma) Verner, secretary to Victor Cornelius for over 31 years until her retirement this month, was honored Thursday morning with a party given in the Cornelius printing plant by fellow employees.

She was presented by them with a pendant watch and a hand-painted covered serving bowl.

Mrs. Verner began working for Cornelius as a "temporary" employee in 1937, shortly after she and her husband moved to Eastland from Mineral Wells. At that time Cornelius operated a business employing 5 or 6 people in a frame structure behind his home on East Main St.

However, the "temporary" employee stayed on to have a

vital part in the company's growth, from the printing of "Nap-Ads" to a full scale operation for theatrical advertising and menu production.

She moved with the company from the East Main location to that on East Commerce in the building now occupied by Texas Electric. She watched these facilities become outgrown and moved with the company to her office in the firm's present location.

She will become the first employee to benefit from the firm's retirement plan instituted by Cornelius three years ago.

She plans to enjoy her greater leisure as a housewife in her home at 405 S. Oaklawn and expects to devote more time to the work of her church, The First Christian, particularly with the work of the circles.

She hopes to travel some with her husband, a salesman for Bruce Pipkin Motor Co. Especially, she says, she looks forward to making some Dallas trips with him, as Dallas (Lancaster) was her home originally.

She moved from there to Mineral Wells when she was 14. It was there she met and later married Verner.

## Current Affairs Program Series Begins With Vanocur Talk At CJC

### Event Scheduled For Wednesday

Sander Vanocur, NBC News correspondent, will open the Cisco Junior College Spring Current Affairs Series on Wednesday evening, Feb. 5, at 8 p. m. in the Harrell Fine Arts Auditorium on the CJC campus.

Mr. Vanocur is one of three well-known personalities who will appear in the series. Pierre Salinger will be at CJC on March 3 and Drew Pearson on April 1.

Individual program reserved seat tickets will go on sale Monday morning, Feb. 3, for the Vanocur program as well as for the Salinger and Pearson lectures. Season tickets have been on sale for the past two weeks, and CJC officials have reported that response to the season ticket sale has been quite good. Single-program reserved seats are \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for students, while season reserve seats, which include all three programs, sell for \$6.00 for adults and \$3.00 for students. Season tickets will remain on sale through Wednesday, February 5, if and as available.

Sander Vanocur's newest assignment with NBC News is that of anchorman of NBC's new monthly two-hour news magazine, "First Tuesday." The program premiered on January 7, and will be seen again on the evening prior to his Cisco appearance. The program is commercial television's first regularly-scheduled two-hour prime-time news program, and is colorcast on the NBC Television network.

The First Tuesday of every month. It contains six to eight stories of various lengths.

Mr. Vanocur brings to this assignment a wealth of experience, having covered a multitude of major stories since joining NBC News in 1957. He was one of the four NBC News TV floor reporters at the 1968 national political conventions, repeating a job he has done at both the 1960 and 1964 conventions. He reported the returns for the Senate races on Election Night this year.

Mr. Vanocur, who joined the "Huntley-Brinkley Report" as a contributing editor in 1967, covered the major 1968 Presidential primaries for NBC News from New Hampshire to California. He was also assigned to report on the

campaign of Senator Robert F. Kennedy who entered the primaries as a candidate for the Democratic nomination after the New Hampshire primary.

Mr. Vanocur was on the scene at the conclusion of the California primary when Senator Kennedy was shot and fatally wounded minutes after his victory speech. For the next four days Mr. Vanocur participated in NBC News' comprehensive coverage of tragic event.

Covering big stories is nothing new for Mr. Vanocur. He started reporting them when he went to work for NBC News in 1957. In his first post as Midwestern correspondent, he distinguished himself with coverage of the Our Lady of the Angels grammar school fire in Chicago, which killed 93 children. He also participated in NBC News' coverage of events after the assassination of President Kennedy.

In August, 1966, his exclusive NBC-TV "Huntley-Brinkley Report" interview with Tran Hoi Nam, a high official of the National Liberation Front, political arm of the Vietcong, won praise in the Congressional Record.

Mr. Vanocur was born Jan. 8, 1928, in Cleveland. After graduating from Northwestern University in 1950, he attended London School of Economics for a year. He served in the U. S. Army from 1952 to 1954, and then joined the staff of the Manchester Guardian in London.

His career in broadcasting news began almost as a sideline. While on the Guardian, he began doing a weekly news analysis program on radio for the North America Service of the British Broadcasting Corporation. This led to an assignment as a stringer for CBS News in London.

In 1955 Mr. Vanocur returned to the United States and joined the city staff of the New York Times. Two years later he joined NBC News.

Mr. Vanocur has received a Merit Award for his reportorial work from his alma mater, Northwestern, and a Broadcasting Leadership Award from the Yale Broadcasting Company. He and former White House Secretary Pierre Salinger, who will appear at CJC on March 3, co-edited "A Tribute to John F. Kennedy," a compilation of tributes written about the late President by notables around the world.

## Funeral Services Held Jan. 25 for Former Resident

Bobby Lewis Allen, a native of Ranger, died about noon Wednesday of an apparent heart attack suffered while playing golf near his home in Portland, Texas.

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. Friday at the Piper Funeral Home in Portland. Masonic graveside services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday in Longview.

Born April 20, 1936 in Ranger, he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Odie Allen of Longview, formerly of Olden and Ranger. He was the grandson of Mrs. Dessie Harper of Dallas, formerly of Ranger; and the late E. J. and Sallie Allen, longtime residents of Olden.

He was a graduate of Premont High School and married the former Miss Doris Cox in 1955 in Premont. He moved to Portland from Premont about three years ago.

## Matter Of Street Declaration Is Held Resolved

The matter of whether the extension of Plummer St. is in fact a street, apparently has been "resolved" and presumably, the city can now consider annexation of the 30-acre tract west of the city limits.

Both City Manager Lewis Tiner and Land Owner Mike Collins reported that the matter of the street has been satisfactorily determined by two Eastland attorneys who report that an instrument filed in 1927 contains a covenant declaring the 50-ft. strip is to remain open in case the city ever wants it for a street. It has not actually been dedicated as a street, one attorney said.

Collins offered the land to the city to determine the city father's interest in annexation at the last City Commission meeting. He was told later that he would have to resolve the matter of Plummer St. as access to the property. He reports that he has 14 prospective builders ready to start homes on the land.

# Store Burglary Suspects In Custody In Anson Jail

Arrests of two Sweetwater men has solved 15 burglaries in this area, including the burglary of the Safeway Store in Eastland, County Sheriff L. E. Sublett reports.

Charges of burglary have been filed in Justice of the Peace Wells Dalton's Court in Eastland, naming Jimmy Michael Croan, 26, and Donald Gene Richardson, 24, with the Friday, Jan. 17, burglary at Safeway. An attempt was made at that time to peel the store's safe — but the try was unsuccessful. However, approximately 90 cartons of cigarettes, 25 beef steaks and six boneless hams were taken in the break-in, the sheriff said.

Croan reportedly gave statement, but Richardson declined, stating that he wanted to wait until Friday, when his wife was to arrive to talk with him. Croan was reported by

Sheriff Sublett as having said, "We've been stealing together steadily since Dec. 27."

Authorities in Colorado City, Sweetwater, Anson, Roby, Barnhart, Meanard, Odessa, Haskell and Graham are reportedly talking with the two in the Jones County Jail where they are being held. They were arrested in Anson on Friday, Jan. 24.

The attempt at Safeway in Eastland was believed to have been their first try at cracking a safe. Sheriff Sublett said he said Croan had been through Eastland about a week earlier and had "cased" the Eastland store and the location of the safe. The two gained entry, Sublett said, by stacking empty crates from the trash pile in back, and climbing onto the roof, from which they gained entry through an air conditioning opening.

Croan remembered that they were in the store from about 1:30 to 3 a.m. They went out a back door, and carefully removed the crates, and placed all evidence of their entry. They still had some 41 cartons of cigarettes when they were arrested, Sublett

said, and had been getting \$2 a carton in Sweetwater.

Tools used in the attempted safe cracking included chisels, nail bars and hammers, was said.

Both are ex-convicts, the sheriff said.

The case will be among those considered when the grand jury convenes on Monday.
