Grass Fires Give Firemen, Truck Woe

Eastland Firemen had a not-so-pleasant Christmas Eve as two fires were reported within less than an hour of each other Wednesday afternoon, as well as the rural fire truck burning up at the second one.

Both fires were grass fires. The first one was reported at 1:50 p.m. near the end of North Virginia St. This fire was not serious, and was quickly brought under control.

The second fire was reported almost as soon as the first men had returned to the station. At 2:35 p.m., the fire department received a report of a large grass fire about three miles southwest of the city. Eastland's rural fire truck, the Olden firetruck, a Cisco fire truck, and a roadgrader were all sent to combat the fire. The blaze was successfully extinguished, but in the process, the Eastland rural truck blew up. When the truck blew up, the hot metal set the grass near the truck on fire, and the burning grass set the truck on fire.

However the truck was successfully extinguished and the damage was not thought to be fatal. In fact, it was hoped that the truck might be back in operation again by Monday.

Mavericks Seen For Second Place; 'Maybe' 8-AA 1st

In an area basketball roundup, Gary Stratton of the Abilene Reporter-News sees District 8-AA being won by Hamforecasts of District 8-AA Mavericks might be a surprise title winner.

The Mavericks "surprised" the Reporter in football action.

Eastland's Mavericks can put a cramp into the style of any other team, but gusses Eastland's On paper, Eastland looks to be like most any other AA team. But the Mavericks play better than average. As a matter of fact, the Mavericks could very easily slip into the championship spot.

Already the Mavericks have shown a tremendous offense and talented defense. Eastland has come away with a 93-point output while only allowing 7 points in one game. Even if Eastland was playing a junior high team, it would be an awesome task to allow only seven points—two in the first half and five in the second.

Considered top prospects for starting positions are 6-3 Randall Treadwell, 5-9 Daryl Thomas, 6-1 Craig Lund, 5-10 Ronald McClesky and 6-0 Danny Erod.

The pick is for a second place finish—but don't be surprised if the Mavericks represent 8-AA.

The other team in the 8-AA top three, Granbury, can also be considered a strong contender.

Although returning only two lettermen, Granbury's Pirates stand a strong chance of winning the marbles with four other players, three of them sophomores, ranging in height from 6-1 to 6-6.

Danny Reed, a 6-3 senior forward and Gary Caudle, a 6-0 junior guard, are the lettermen back Johnny Perkins, a 6-2 sophomore guard who hauled in rebounds at a 13.5 game on the Granbury "B" team last year should win a starting spot.

Other top prospects are 6-6 J. M. Cogdill, 6-2 Larry Price, 6-1 Ronnie Norman and 6-10 Rickey Miller.

But the bench strength and rebounding power still will not be enough. Experience is greatly needed. Thus the Pirates are a year away from the title.

The 1969-70 season for Clyde may be a hard pill to take. For the Bulldogs merely lost seven cagers down the graduation aisle, one of them all-area Murry Edwards, a 6-3 forward who scored 32 points a game.

Filling in as lettermen are 5-8 Terry Robinson, 5-8 Tim Copeland and 6-3 Johnny Pierce. Pierce and 6-2 David Edwards and 6-3 James O'Shields are the only six-footers. But Pierce has the only varsity experience of any degree.

The 69-70 season is definitely a rebuilding one for Coach Jim McDonald, in his first year with Clyde.

Two lettermen head Cisco's basketball squad—neither one a senior. Sophomore guard, Lanny Frazier 5-8 guard and junior guard Gary Tipton, 5-10, give Coach Delbert Schaffer a ground floor to work on. Experience is extremely short, but the Lobos should be able to get by Gornache to escape the cellar.

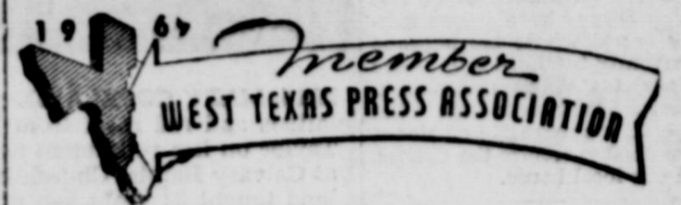

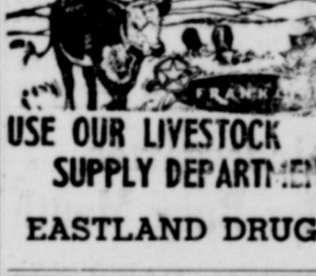

YOUR FLORIST TALKS ABOUT FLOWERS

A FLOWER THAT REALLY LASTS

The strawflower is one of the few blossoms that is almost dried out as when it first blooms.

The flowers are yellow, orange, red or white, and the plants will grow to heights of three feet, but the flower is small, only one and a half inches wide.
