Abilenian Tells His CofC— 'Let's Stand Behind Eastland'

Could it be that the unofficial, informal and voluntary economic boycott of Abilene business firms as a result of the most recent steal-try of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals, is bearing fruit?

It could be. Many Eastland Countians have been notifying their Abilene suppliers of local intentions, to do business only with those firms who treat us as good neighbors and not try to steal our institutions. Many have been giving notice and one medical firm in particular has gone to great expense and time to let their Abilene sup-

pliers know how they feel. Copies of a letter written by a major Abilene firm to the Abilene Chamber of Commerce have been received in Eastland this week. The Abilene businessmen, who appreciate the Eastland County business, and who could care less that Abilene attorneys have to drive 55 miles to try to case in the Appeals Court, apparently are helping us spread the word.

Note these quotes from the letter (to the Abilene Chamber of Commerce):

"Enclosed are clippings from a recent Eastland paper. I'm sure you have all ready seen these. I would like to say I believe the Chamber of Commerce should take active action now to put a stop to this once and for all. These people of Eastland are a part of the Big Country and if you don't think so, just see how much money they spend in Abilene in one year.

"Our customers in Eastland have spent \$12,353.94 with us from March, 1968, to March, 1969. Of this amount, they paid \$441.87 in city (Abilene) taxes.

"We are only one supplier, and over all of Abilene, I'm sure they spend up to \$100,000 in Abilene each year. I believe this business is worth saving and will bring more to Abilene than the 11th Court of Civil Appeals would.

"I believe Abilene should try to get all the business it can, but if the people of Eastland 'count us out,' all of Abilene and the rest of the Big Country will suffer.

"As businessmen of Abilene, let's stand behind Eastland."

This then, is an Eastland friend in Abilene. May their tribe increase.

HIGH! Your Public Library, How Does It Stack Up

Texans support their public libraries to the tune of \$1.24 per capita per year; in California the figure is \$3.89; in Massachusetts it's \$4.61. Illegal Pill Traffic Plugged In Spectacular Fly-In Here

A John Doe Citizen, deputized to fly shotgun, and a squadron of law enforcement officers severed a pipeline of illegal drug traffic from Mexico to Eastland County, in an exciting bit of intrigue here early Friday morning.

An Eastland County man has been charged with illegal

possession of dangerous drugs and is free on \$3,000 bond, and a Mineral Wells couple has been charged in United States Federal Court with illegal transportation.

Approximately \$80,000 in illegal drugs have been recovered as the result of long investigation, and culmination

of that investigative effort. Some 300,000 pills were turned up, officials said.

Wrap-up of the case shut down one of the major sources of illegal drugs in this area, County Sheriff L. E. Sublett says. The story begins two years ago when investigations by his department and federal narcotics agents got underway. The case began cracking when federal agents notified the sheriff Thursday at 9 p.m. to get ready for a showdown. A search warrant for a Cisco home was issued through District Attorney Emory Walton and Justice of the Peace Wells Dalton.

The agents' tip was that a plane, coming from Ciudad Acuna, Mexico, was scheduled to touch down on State Highway 206, south of Cisco at 4:30 a.m. Friday, and be met by the contact.

J. T. (Buddy) Carter, accountant for Texas Electric Service Co., and pilot-instructor, was called into the case at 2 a.m. Friday, deputized and given his role to play. Carter joined a force that included two Texas Rangers, the two federal narcotics agents, Sheriff Sublett, Deputy Loy Williams, Liquor Control Board Agent L. D. Adams, Game Warden Maurice Dry and Policemen in Cisco and Eastland.

Carter, with an agent and Williams, went up to look for the incoming plane as the time neared. A car with other officers was posted to tail the plane. (Continued on Page Six)

11 H-V Supervisors Receive Certificates

Eleven Hollywood - Vassarville supervisory and management personnel were presented certificates of achievement Friday in ceremonies at the plant in Eastland. The certificates were presented by Mr. Boyd Wollan, Production Manager, Bra and Girdle Division of Hollywood-Vassarville.

This group earned the certificates by completing a training program covering the basic elements of Methods Time Measurement or MTM. MTM is the method used in establishing piece-rates by which the machine operators are paid within the plant.

The training program is a part of the comprehensive in-plant training program. Hollywood-Vassarville is conducting in conjunction with the Maynard Research Council of Pittsburgh, Pa.

The training program utilizes a unique programmed training approach that allows each student to progress at his own pace. It also incorporates a synchronized slide - audio tape system and individual self-learning techniques. Eastland was selected as the pilot plant to begin this comprehensive and unique training approach. Results from the course were excellent, it was said.

Pecan Trees Behind Schedule Due to Late Spring Season

More than 150 persons from throughout this West Central Texas region attended sessions of the annual Eastland County Pecan School Friday at Cisco Junior College.

The program began with Anton White of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, presiding. Pecan men were welcomed in talks by Manager Jim Smothers of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and President Leland Willis of CJC.

Miss Mary Letha Hubbard of Rising Star, the current pecan queen of Eastland County, assisted in registering guests.

County Agent Dee Gordon opened the program with a report on orchard conditions. He noted that area pecan trees are behind their usual spring schedule due to a late spring and cold weather.

Most area pecan trees are beginning to bloom and a good crop outlook will depend on whether a big rain falls in the next two weeks or so, it was pointed out.

Dr. J. W. Worthington, area extension horticulturist at the Tarleton Station, used the morning school session to discuss "Propagating Pecans by Inlay Grafting." He used picture slides to illustrate his talk. He answered numerous questions from the floor.

Dr. Worthington covered all phases of grafting, noting that this work should not start before April 1 to 15. It can continue as long as the bark slips freely on tree limbs. He recommended the inlay of graft

as the best technique to use on pecan trees.

The visitors ate lunch at the CJC cafeteria.

After lunch, the pecan growers gathered at the orchard of Dr. Bill Cardwell, Cisco veterinarian, just west of Cisco to practice budding and grafting under the supervision of Dr. Worthington and Mr. Gordon.

Supplies of bud wood from several improved varieties were on hand for sale to visitors.

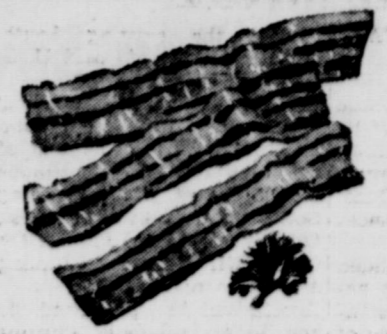

Jamie Fry, rancher at Cisco, has been named Eastland County chairman of the Brush Control and Range Improvement Association.

The association was formed last November by a group of Texas ranchers and producers. The immediate goal of the association is to raise from the landowners of Texas one cent an acre per year for five years. Businesses, foundations, city, state or federal governing bodies interested in the control of brush and land improvement will be contacted for donations and assistance.

The funds will be used to support research and education on brush control and range improvement.

Officials of the association say that nearly 80 per cent of the rangeland in Texas is infested with brush and weeds. The carrying capacity of nearly 100 million acres of land is being reduced by 50 per cent or more the association officials say.

John Matthews, an Abilene rancher, is state chairman of the association. Joe Fambro of Huckabee is chairman for this twenty county district.

Fry said a drive to raise funds in Eastland County will be undertaken in the near future.
