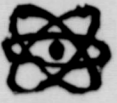

Three-Day County Stock Show Opens Thursday With 326 Entries

800-900 Athletes Expected For Saturday's Red Dog Relays

The annual Red Dog Relays will be held at the Ranger Junior College Saturday, March 15.

It is estimated between 800-900 high school athletes will participate.

There will be 13 Class 4-A and 3-A high schools represented in Division II with Brownwood, Graham and Eastern Hills of Fort Worth picked as favorites in this division.

Thirty-three Class B, A, and AA schools have entered the relays with Ranger, Ft. Worth Kirkpatrick, Seymour, Clarendon, Olney, and Comanche as favorites. Olney is the defending champion of Division I.

Schoolman 'Sees' Drastic Changes In Lions Talk

No one can know for sure what the results of pending education legislation will be, Supt. Wendell Siebert said, but there's one thing for sure, "The old pocket book is going to be hit in the years ahead."

Speaking in the two "sweeping" proposals before congress, Supt. Siebert explained that increased taxes to pay the bill are surely going to be in the offering. Speaker for the Eastland Lions Club at its luncheon meeting, Supt. Siebert said that he doubted that either of the two major pieces (one from the governor's committee on education or the watered-down version submitted for Texas State Teachers Association) would pass as they now stand, but certainly there's going to be some changes in the future.

Of primary interest to the taxpayer is the proposed change from districts paying taxes based on the old economic index (ability to pay), taxation on "market value".

The "assessed value" in the local district is now \$7,331,000, equal to some 27 per cent of the market value. The state report says that the market value of taxable property is presently \$27½ million, Siebert said.

Explaining what would happen "should" one of the major proposals pass, he said that Eastland County will become one district and that a board of trustees of seven men would be elected, each at large, on a place system. These seven "brave men" would have tremendous power, he said, and would decide the course for the schools in this county, whether there is to be one high school, one elementary school or what.



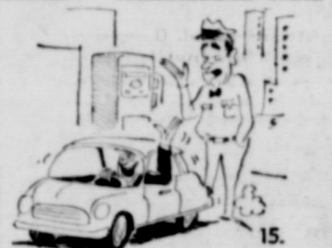

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO LONE STAR GAS COMPANY, A CORPORATION, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS A FRANCHISE TO FURNISH AND SUPPLY GAS TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC IN THE CITY OF EASTLAND, EASTLAND COUNTY TEXAS AND THE ENVIRONS THEREOF. PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF A FEE OR CHARGE FOR THE USE OF THE STREETS, ALLEYS AND PUBLIC WAYS, AND PROVIDING THAT IT SHALL BE IN LIEU OF OTHER FEES AND CHARGES, EXCEPTING AD VALOREM TAXES. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That the city of Eastland, Texas, hereinafter called "City," hereby grants to Lone Star Gas Company, hereinafter called "Company," its successors and assigns, consent to use and occupy the present and future streets, alleys, highways, public places, public thoroughfares and grounds of City for the purpose of laying, maintaining, constructing, operating and replacing therein and thereon pipelines and all other appurtenant equipment

before furnishing service, the execution of a contract therefor. Company shall have the right to contract with each customer with reference to the installation of, and payment for, any and all of the gas piping from the connection thereof with the Company's main in the streets or alleys to and throughout the consumer's premises. Company shall own, operate and maintain all service lines which are defined as the supply lines from the Company's main to the consumer's curb line when mains are located in the streets and to the consumer's property line when mains are located in the alleys. The consumer shall own, operate and maintain all yard lines and house piping. Yard lines are defined as the underground supply lines extending from the point of connection with Company's service line to the point of connection with consumer's house piping.

SECTION 2. Company shall lay, maintain, construct, operate and replace its pipes, mains, laterals and other equipment so as to interfere as little as possible with traffic and shall promptly clean up and restore to an approximate original condition, at its cost, all thoroughfares and other surfaces which it may disturb. The location of all mains, pipes, laterals and other appurtenant equipment shall be fixed under the supervision of the City Commission or an authorized committee or agent appointed by said Commission.

SECTION 3. When Company shall make or cause to be made excavations or shall place obstructions in any street, alley or other public place, the public shall be protected by barriers and lights placed, erected and maintained by Company; and in the event of injury to any person or damage to any property by reason of the construction, operation or maintenance of the gas distributing plant or system of Company, Company shall indemnify & keep harmless City from any and all liability in connection therewith. Company shall repair, clean up and restore to an approximate original condition all streets, alleys and sidewalks during the construction and repair of its gas distributing system.

SECTION 4. In addition to the rates charged for gas supplied, Company may make and enforce reasonable charges, rules and regulations for service rendered in the conduct of its business, including a charge for services rendered in the inauguration of natural gas service, and may require,

SECTION 5. Company shall not be required to extend mains on any street more than fifty (50) feet for any one consumer of gas.
SECTION 6. Company shall be entitled to require from each and every consumer of gas, before gas service is commenced, a deposit of twice the amount of an estimated average monthly bill, which said deposit may be retained by Company until service is discontinued and all bills therefor have been paid. Company shall then return deposit to the consumer, together with 6 percent (6%) interest thereon from the date of discontinuance of service. Company shall be entitled to apply said deposit with accrued interest, to any indebtedness owed Company by the consumer making the deposit.
SECTION 7. The rights, privileges and franchises granted by this ordinance are not to be considered exclusive, and City hereby expressly reserves the right to grant, at any time, like privileges, rights and franchises as it may see fit to any other person or corporation for the purpose of furnishing gas for light, heat and power to and for City and the inhabitants thereof.
SECTION 8. Company shall furnish reasonably adequate service to the public at reasonable rates and charges therefor; and Company shall maintain its property, equipment and appliances in good order and condition.
SECTION 9. Company, its successors and assigns, agrees to pay and City agrees to accept, on or before the 1st day of April, 1969, and on or before the same day of each succeeding year during the life of this franchise, up to and including the year 1994, a sum of money which shall be equivalent to 2 percent (2%) of the gross receipts received by Company from the sale of gas to its domestic and commercial consumers within the corporate limits of said city (expressly excluding, however, receipts derived from sales to industrial and governmental users and consumers in said City) for the preceding calendar year, which annual payment shall be for the rights & privileges herein granted to company, including expressly, without limitation, right to use the streets, alleys and public ways of said City. And it is also expressly agreed that the aforesaid annual

payment shall be in lieu of any and all other and additional occupation taxes, easement and franchise taxes, or charges (whether levied as an ad valorem, special or other character of tax or charge), in lieu of municipal license and inspection fees, street taxes and street or alley rental or charges, and all other and additional municipal taxes, charges, levies, fees and rentals of whatsoever kind and character which City may impose or hereafter be authorized to levy and collect, excepting only the usual general or special ad valorem taxes, which City is authorized to levy and impose upon real and personal property. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, it is expressly understood that the aforesaid payment shall be in lieu of and substitute for the provisions of a certain ordinance styled:

"AN ORDINANCE FIXING RENTALS TO BE PAID BY TELEGRAPH, TELEPHONE, ELECTRIC AND GAS COMPANIES, FOR THE PRIVILEGE OF USING WITH THEIR POLES, WIRES, CONDUITS, PIPES AND FIXTURES THE STREETS, PASSENGERS, AND ALLEYS AND OTHER PUBLIC WAYS WITHIN THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS, PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION, AND PROVIDING AN EMERGENCY."

passed and approved on August 15, 1941, and Ordinance No. 332, entitled: "AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF A CONTRACT AND AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF EASTLAND, EASTLAND COUNTY, TEXAS, AND LONE STAR GAS COMPANY, FIXING AND PRESCRIBING A REASONABLE RENTAL CHARGE OR COMPENSATION TO BE PAID BY COMPANY TO CITY FOR THE USE OF SAID CITY'S PUBLIC STREETS, ALLEYS AND THOROUGHFARES."

Should City not have the legal power to agree that the payment of the foregoing sums of money shall be in lieu of taxes, licenses, fees, street or alley rentals or charges, easement or franchise taxes or charges aforesaid, then City agrees that it will apply so much of said sums of money paid as may be necessary to satisfy Company's obligations, if any, to pay any such taxes, licenses, charges, fees, rentals, easement or franchise taxes or charges.

In order to determine the gross receipts received by Company from the sale of gas (expressly excluding the sale of gas to industrial and governmental consumers) within the corporate limits of City, Company agrees that on the same date that payments are made as provided in the preceding paragraph of this Section 9, it will file with the City Clerk a sworn report showing the gross receipts received from the sale of gas to its domestic and commercial consumers within said corporate limits for the calendar year preceding the date of payment. City may, if it sees fit, have the books and records of Company examined by a representative of said City to ascertain the correctness of the sworn reports agreed to be filed herein.

Receipts from sales to governmental users or consumers shall include all those receipts derived from the sale of gas to federal, state, county or city governments or branches and subdivisions thereof, school districts or other similar districts, it being the intention to include within the term "governmental users and consumers" all tax-supported institutions owned or operated directly or indirectly by said governments and branches or subdivisions thereof, such as schools, colleges, hospitals, eleemosynary institutions, army or training camps, airports, courthouses, city hall and other institutions of like or similar kind and character.

"Industrial users or consumers," as herein used, are those generally and commonly classified as such by Company.

The payment herein provided shall be for the period January 1 to December 31 of the respective year that the payment is made.

SECTION 10. Company shall file its written acceptance of this franchise ordinance within sixty (60) days after its final passage and approval by said City.

This ordinance shall be effective thirty (30) day after its final passage.

However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies. 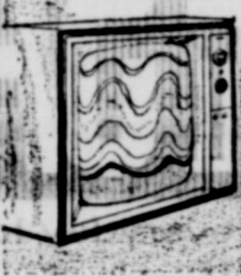

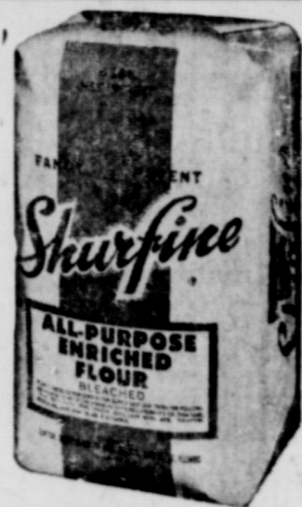

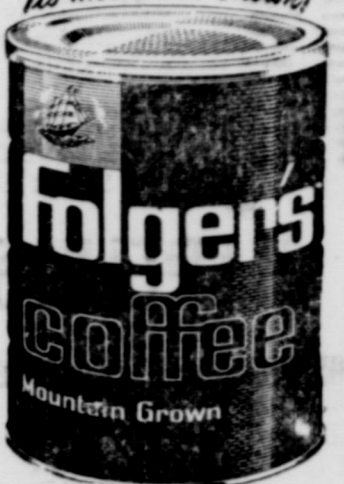

BE RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT:
1. That an election be held on April 1, 1969, in the Eastland County Water Supply District as created by House Bill No. 888, passed by the fifty-first Legislature, for the purpose of electing four directors of said District.

2. For the purpose of said election, the Eastland County Water Supply District is divided into two election precincts. 3-b. The election in the Eastland Precinct shall be held in the Eastland County Court house in the City of Eastland and Mr. E. E. Layton is hereby appointed election Judge for said election and he shall appoint such other clerks as he deems necessary to assist him in holding said election.

4. Only qualified voters residing in the Eastland County Water Supply District who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

5. H. G. Adams, E. F. Penn, H. T. Wilson and M. H. Perry have made application to have their name printed on the ballots and such applications are hereby granted. The ballots, however, shall be large enough to permit the writing in of other names.

6. The ballots for the Ranger Precinct shall have printed thereon the following:

M. H. Perry Director
Each voter shall leave on the ballots the names of the two candidates for whom he wishes to vote.
7. No person shall be elected a director unless he resides in and owns taxable property in the District. No member of the body of the City of Ranger or the City of Eastland and no employee of either of said Cities shall be elected a director.
8. Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in the Ranger Times and in the Eastland Telegram, newspapers of general circulation published within said District, one time, such publication to be at least ten (10) days before the date herein set for said election.

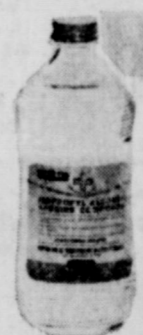
