

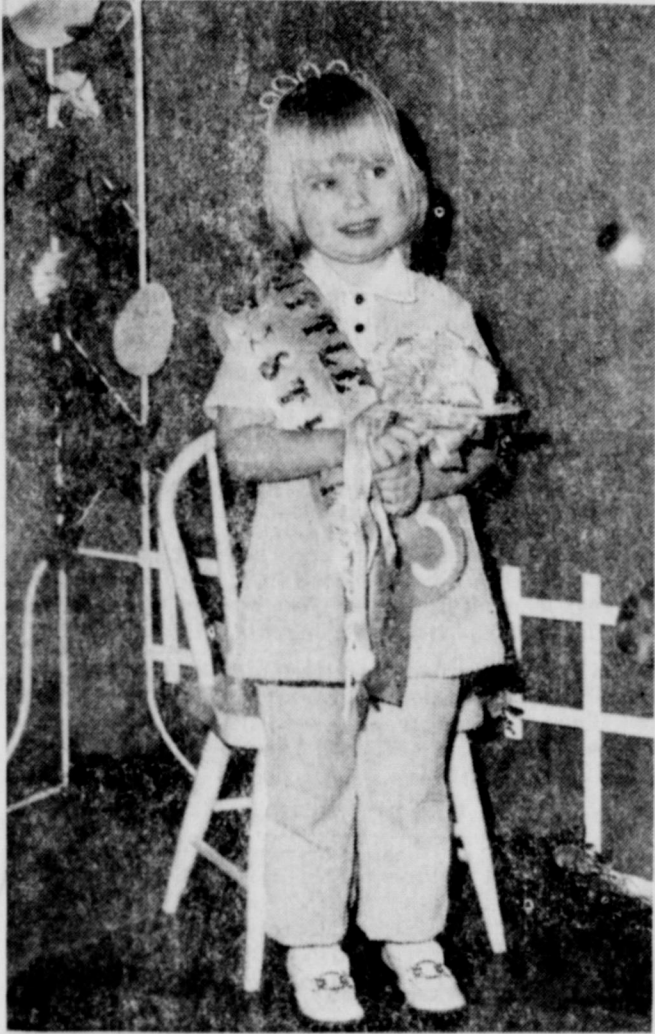

THE JERUSALEM Journal, Dated Sunday, April 11, A.D. 30, a simulation of what a modern newspaper might have looked like had it been printed on that day has been loaned us by Rev. Eugene Williams, pastor of First Christian Church.

Under a banner headline of "Tomb of Nazarene Discovered Empty!", there's some very interesting reading—JERUSALEM, Apr. 9, A.D. 30—Shaken to its foundations by news that the tomb of Jesus, crucified Nazarene prophet, has been found empty, this city today is seething with speculation.

Did the gentle teacher whose words and miraculous deeds have stirred Palestine for the past three years, actually "conquer death" as his disciples insistently claim? Or was his body spirited away, under Roman guard, as Governor Pilate and members of the Jewish Sanhedrin assert?

Jerusalem, filled with a record crowd of visitors attending the annual Passover celebration at the Temple, may be a long time finding the correct answer. But this fact remains: the tomb of Joseph of Arimathea is open and the body gone.

JESUS FORGIVES SLAYERS GOLGOTHA, Apr. 9, A. D. 30—This bleak suburb of Jerusalem, scene of the crucifixion of Jesus of Nazareth last Friday, became the center of excited interest today as reports of the Nazarene's alleged "resurrection" swept the Jewish capital.

Hordes of spectators, many of whom were present at the death of him who claimed to be the Jew's Messiah, roved curiously over Calvary Hill. They had come to view the wreckage left by the disaster.

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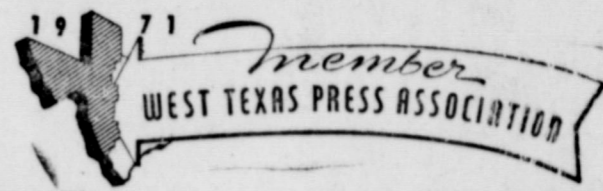

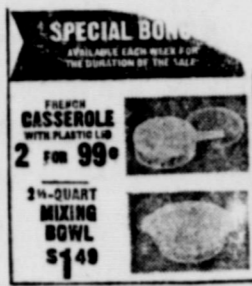

Speak Up On Proposed Farm Truck Driver Regulations Farmers Urged

Farmers and Ranchers are being urged by Jack Cozart of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, to let the federal government know how proposed farm truck driver regulations would effect their operations. Letters should be addressed to John A. Volpe, Secretary, U. S. Dept. of Transportation, Washington, D. C. 20515, Mr. Cozart said.

Proposed U. S. Dept. of Transportation regulations pertaining to farm truck driv-

effective on July 1st unless farmers and ranchers can convince the government that they should not be put into effect. The regulations were scheduled for last Jan. 1, but were postponed to permit Farm Bureau and other organizations to study the regulations and file statements.

The regulations would affect drivers of all farm trucks — including pickup trucks, Mr. Cozart said. Although the new regulations would be applicable to interstate commerce recent court decisions indicate that the interstate commerce clause applies to anything and everything which might at any time enter interstate commerce, Mr. Cozart said.

Proposed regulations would include the following requirements for drivers of farm trucks:

- (1) Be at least 21 years of age.
- (2) Carry a certificate, executed by a physician during the preceding 24 months, evidencing fitness to drive a truck.
- (3) Pass a road test in truck operation.
- (4) Take and pass an examination on the federal Motor Vehicle Safety regulations.
- (5) If driver is employee of farmer, he must supply the farmer with evidence of compliance with the four preceding requirements, plus an application for employment which shall disclose traffic violations and disposition there of, plus an annual supplementary statement relating to traffic violations.
- (6) A farmer who employs a driver would be required to "verify" the driver's driving record and to maintain for each driver a file containing items 1 to 5 above, plus a record of the employer's verification of the employee's driving record.

Mr. Cozart said letters to Secretary Volpe should include the farmer's personal appraisal of how his farm or ranch operation would be affected if the regulations were adopted. The local farm leader urged each farmer in the county to request that present exemptions for farm truck drivers be retained.

Also, he said, Congressman Omar Burleson and the two Texas Senators should be contacted and requested to intervene with Secretary Volpe in the matter of retaining present exemptions, or a least in modifying proposed regulations so that they will not be so damaging to agriculture.

Farm Bureau is requesting that present exemptions be retained, he said. In the event that this is impossible, the Farm Bureau is asking that the following recommendations be included in any regulations which are issued:

Reports Due On Earnings to SS

Social security beneficiaries, born in 1908 or later, who earned over \$1680 in 1970 are required to file a report of their earnings with the social Security Administration by April 15, 1971. This report is in addition to any Federal or State tax return and it must be filed with the Social Security Administration according to R. R. Tuley social security manager for Abilene.

People receiving disability benefits are not required to file the annual report of earnings, but should report immediately if they become self-employed or take a job. All other beneficiaries, including families of disabled persons, are under the retirement test and each must report his earnings annually, if more than \$1680.

He added that the purpose of social security benefits is to replace some of the earnings lost due to retirement, death, or disability. If an individual continues to earn a substantial amount — more than \$1680 — some adjustment must be made in the amount of his benefits. One dollar for every two dollars earned between \$1680 and \$2880, is withheld or recovered. If an individual earns over \$2880, he gives up a dollar for each dollar earned over \$2880 regardless of the amount of yearly earnings. A beneficiary is

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security check for any month in which he does not earn over \$140 and is not self-employed. The annual report will allow us to determine whether or not additional benefits are payable. Income from rents, royalties, dividends, interest, etc., are exempt from this report.

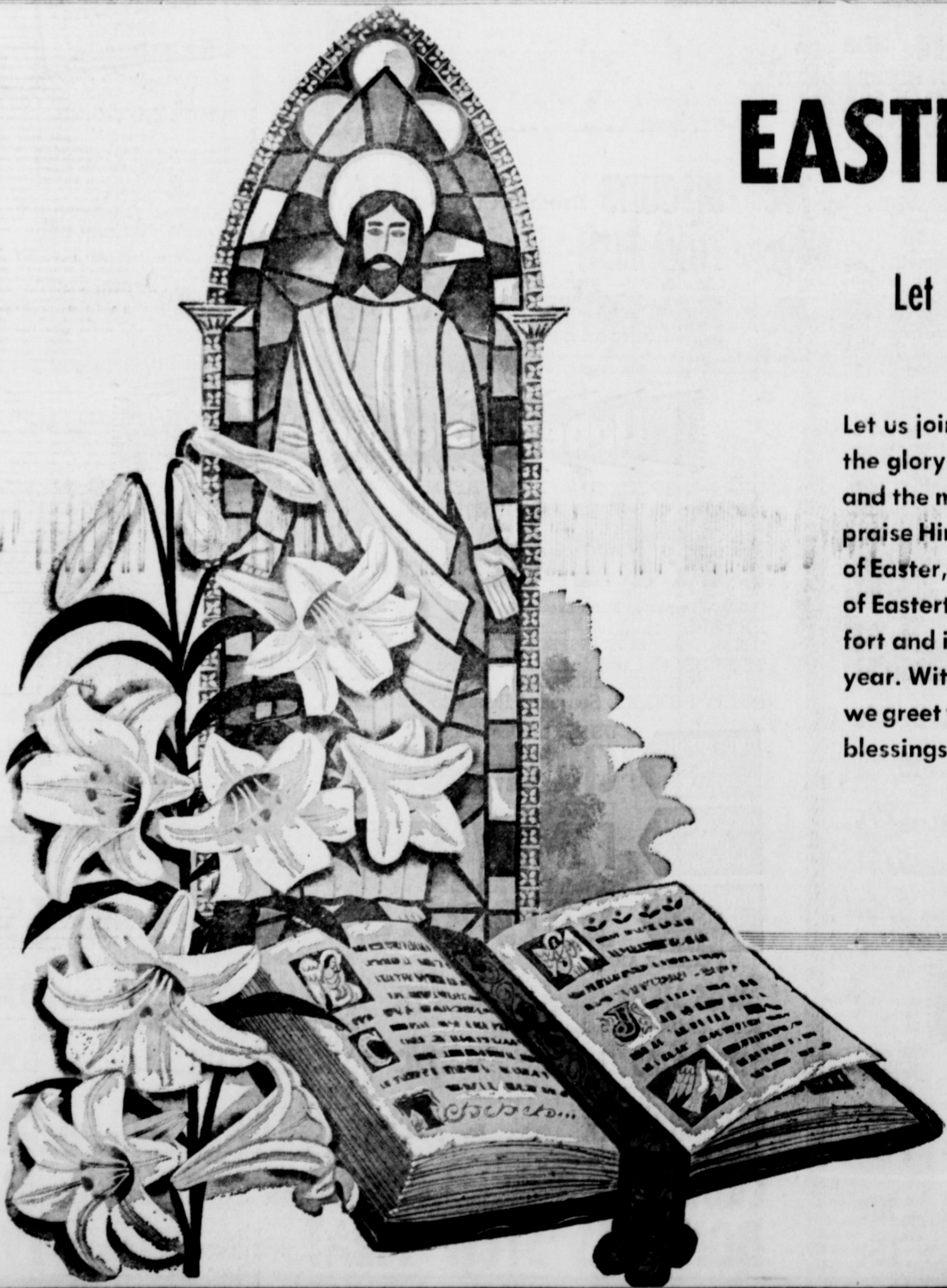

added a habitual misdemeanor or category so that a defendant with two or more prior convictions on a jailable misdemeanor could be sentenced up to six years, and have increased the penalties for trafficking in dangerous drugs, forcible rape and sexual abuse, some theft and robbery, distributing obscene materials to minors, and fondling a child.

The subcommittee recommended restoring the traveler's defense of present law, and excluding rifles and shotguns, whether loaded or not, from the proposed code's unlawful possession offense.

Peace officers would be justified in drawing their pistols to make an arrest for a suspected violent crime, another recommendation of the committee, and anyone would be justified in using deadly force to protect their property reasonably.

These are some important changes which were badly needed, and hopefully there will be additional changes.

We had a bomb scare last week. A call was received saying a bomb was set to go off, and this threat was emphasized later when a second caller stated there were two bombs, one in the west wing and other in the east wing.

The building was closed 2 1/2 hours while a search was conducted. Fortunately no bomb was found, but it would be difficult to estimate the cost to the state of such acts. This is the second such threat this session. None of these calls can be ignored, particularly since the National Capitol suffered its explosion.

The Speaker of the House appointed the General Investigating Committee, Wednesday. All of the members have served several terms, and Menton Murray of Harlingen, the chairman of the committee, has served the longest of any House member.

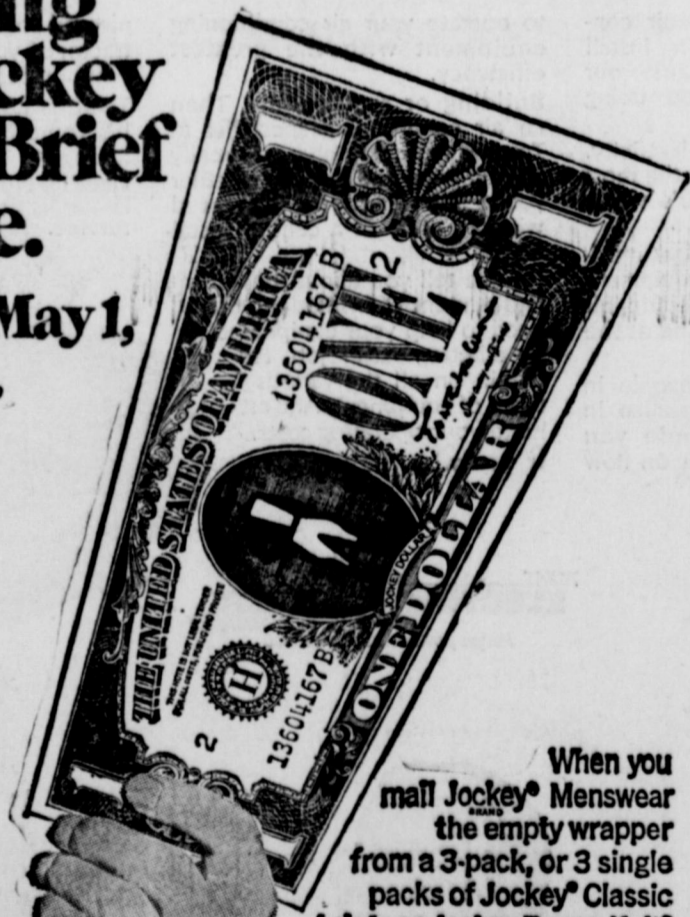
This committee will determine the proper action from the evidence produced by the several agencies appointed to investigate the Sharpstown transaction. Due to the very busy schedule that the House will follow in the 54 days left of this session, there will probably be no report until after the session is over.

JERUSALEM, Apr. 9, A.D. 30.—The unconfirmed rumour of the "resurrection" of the strange young teacher who was crucified last Friday has brought to mind certain mystifying statements he is reported to have made.

Receiving no encouragement in his "repentance," he cast the bloodmoney on the floor of the temple, causing great "embarrassment" to the ecclesiastics.

WIFE OF PILATE TELLS STORY OF DREAM

BETHANY, Apr. 8, A.D. 30.—Located late today at the Bethany Sanatorium, Claudia Procula, wife of Pilate the governor, was found under her physician's care in a state bordering on nervous collapse. Granted a brief interview, a reporter for the Daily News learned that Claudia's breakdown was occasioned by a strange dream which had come to her concerning the young Galilean prophet.

RELIGIOUS LEADERS REFUSE TO COMMENT

JERUSALEM, Apr. 9, A.D. 30.—The attitude of the Jewish priests and the members of the Sanhedrin when quizzed about the crucifixion and the reported resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth was characterized early today by a strict silence.

It was learned that late last Thursday night Jesus had been taken directly to the house of Annas.

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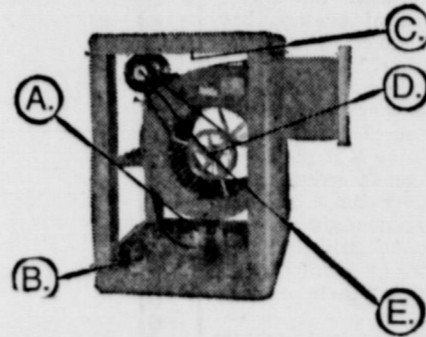

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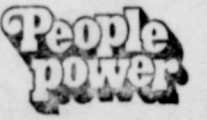
