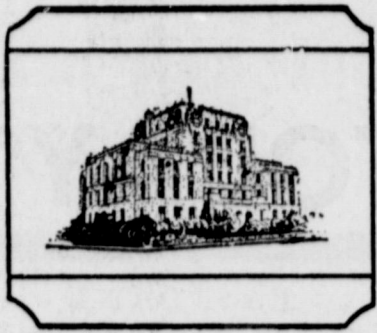

TORNADO TIME! -- what to do

In the previous article concerning tornadoes, published in Thursday's paper, May 6th, there was not enough space to cover the aspects involved, consequently, today's article concerns where to go, and what to do in case a tornado "alert" is given for your area.

Nobody who has lived through a tornado will ever underestimate its terrible potential for dealing death and destruction. I was a witness to the destructive tornado in Amarillo in 1949. I saw railroad boxcars hurled hundreds of yards into open fields, I saw a Greyhound bus left dangling from the top of a tall utility pole, and saw block after block of total devastation of homes with absolute nothing left visible but foundations and water pipes.

So, familiarity with the following safety rules may well mean the difference between life and death.

When you receive a tornado "alert", indicating that a tornado is imminent, or that one is approaching, seek inside shelter, preferably in a storm cellar, if one is available, or some other type of underground excavation, or a steel framed or reinforced concrete building.

In Eastland, there are several buildings that would fare fairly well during the actual onslaught of a tornado, among them, the high school (not the auditorium), the basement of the Eastland Nat'l Bank Building, the basement of the Exchange building, parts of the Village Hotel, and, the safest of all, the Courthouse, and particularly its basement. During a tornado alert it would be a convenience to a lot of people if the east and west basement doors of the Court-

house could be opened for those who would like to seek shelter.

If you should be caught in the open, away from the town and your chosen shelter, then seek cover in a ditch, depression, or nearby gully and lie flat, face down.

If you should be driving, and see a tornado approaching you at 180 degrees (directly in front or behind you), then make a turn at a right or left angle that will take you away from the direction the funnel is moving. And, if possible, seek shelter by crawling in a culvert under the highway, if one is available.

Above all, be aware of the impending weather situation and do not get caught in an open boat on the lake, or on a golf course. Many people are killed annually by being struck by lightning while in an open boat, or playing golf.

Here are some things to do during a tornado:
Stay away from windows. If you are in an office building, stand in an INTERIOR hallway, or basement;

Seek shelter in the center of the house under heavy furniture if you have no basement or storm cellar; keep some windows opened partially on the southwest part of the house, but stay away from them;

DO NOT stay in mobile home when an alert is sounded; In schools, children should be sent into interior hallways, or the basement, and avoid auditoriums or gymnasiums; and if you actually see a tornado, and communication lines are still intact, call your local

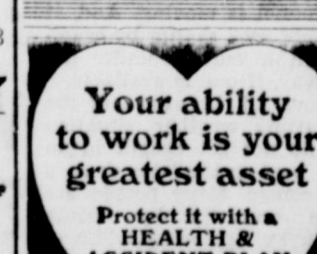

Judge McCloud Tells Rotarians Of Law School

Judge Austin McCloud was guest speaker at the Rotary Club meeting Monday at the White Elephant.

The Chief Justice of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals of Eastland is chairman of the Law Enforcement election of West Central Texas Council Government, and said, "Legislature has set standards for officers, wherein they have to earn certificates showing 142 hours of instructions on various phases of law enforcement."

The Council set up schools throughout the 22 county area to train these law enforcement officers. The instruction ranges from presiding judges to FBI agents.

He indicated that the council has done study of problems dealing with handling of juvenile offences.

The City is presently setting up schools in Abilene, in order that certain delegates, and so that they can be informed how to handle juvenile delinquent. Funds to operate the program are furnished by federal omnibus "crime and safe street" act.

These funds are delivered to the state which has set up boards to determine how and with what fashion the funds will be distributed. The board listens to committee reports and determines how Texas can best be benefited.

Judge McCloud concluded with the statement, "West Texas Council Government, of which Eastland County is a charter member, is attempting to provide trained law enforcement officers to its member counties."

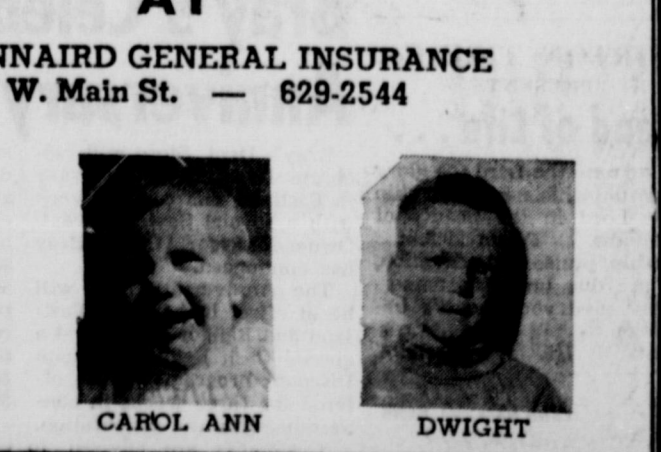

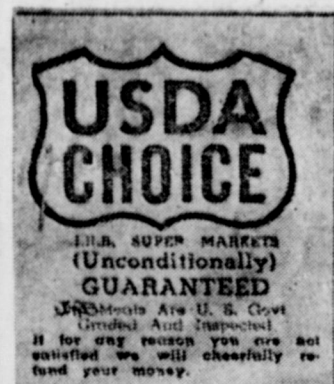

Volunteers Boast Colorful History

By Larry Marshall
America's first professional Volunteer Fire Department was organized in 1853. Virtually all fire fighters were volunteer and fire departments were private organizations.

Early day fire departments were formed and led by distinguished civic leaders. These companies became close knit social groups, then rival gangs and political powers. Boss Tweed formed the nucleus of his "Tweed Ring" political machine in New York City out of his fire department and the Tammany tiger was an emblem he borrowed from the decoration of its engine.

These companies decorated

their equipment excessively and interfered with each other at the scenes of fires. They also resisted the "threat" of new and better equipment. These rivalries began to die down about 1853, when the larger cities organized paid fire fighters.

Today, volunteers or call men together still outnumber full-time firemen by about 1 1/4 million to 250,000. Many towns with paid fire fighters reinforce their departments with volunteers.

Many famous early Americans were fire fighters, examples of these are: George Washington, Ben Franklin, John Hancock, Alexander Hamilton, Samuel Adams, Aaron Burr, and Paul Revere. Ben Franklin organized Philadelphia's first volunteer fire department. He coined the phrase "An Ounce of Prevention is Worth a Pound of Cure" to urge his city to adopt better fire prevention laws. He also formed the first successful fire insurance company. The company is still in business.

Taller buildings prompted the invention of better equipment. In 1799 the Philadelphia department developed a wagon with six ladders on it, one of which was 40 feet long. In the early 1800's several departments laid water mains of hollowed logs with wooden plugs which could be removed for fire fighting purposes.

One joke that came out of this period was: Q. Why does a fireman wear red, white and blue suspenders? A. To hold up his pants.

Fire alarms were usually sounded by tolling bells at

ing the day, usually pointed flages in the direction of the fire and at night put up lanterns.

The last hurrah for the last stronghold of volunteers came July 13, 1865. A fire broke out in Phineas T. Barnum's Museum of wild animals and circus acts. Animals were killed mercifully. A tiger jumped onto Broadway and a fireman killed him with one blow of the axe then ran into the building rescued a 400 pound fat lady, two midgets, and a bushy-haired Albino lady. This was the spectacular ending to this era. Six weeks later New York City volunteers passed out of existence by order of the state legislature. The era was then over.

Today's volunteers are a group that are paid very little compared to their worth. Many work long hard hours and use equipment that is in need of repair, but they do a job to be proud of. Remembering the recent fires in the Nimrod, Cisco, Eastland, Breckenridge, Moran, and Albany areas, the people of these communities as well as the firemen can be proud of their services.

State Center Objective of 4-H Candy Sale

Colorful Career Ended With Death Of J. A. Lawrence

A long and colorful career which contributed to the history of the "Boom Days" in the oilfield of Texas and Oklahoma ended on April 27 when Joe A. Lawrence, retired production foreman, died at his home in Eastland, Texas, of an apparent heart attack.

He was 83 years old.

Born in Bell County, Texas, January 1888, he was married to Velma S. Baker on July 5, 1908, and was employed by the Magnolia Oil Company, in 1918. In 1931 he moved to Oklahoma where he served the Yale oilfield district as field foreman and was a member of the Graham Baptist Church. Later he became foreman for the Graham, Oklahoma, Magnolia District.

In 1949 due to ill health he retired and moved back to reside in the Olden, Texas community. Then, in 1959, he settled in Eastland where, until his death, he spent his retirement years pursuing hobbies

that included fishing, boating and gardening. However, his friends and family remembered him best for his exceptional talent at composing poetry that was apropos for all occasions. Also he was a member of Eastland Masonic Lodge Number 467.

Funeral services were at 2 p. m. Friday in the Arrington Chapel with the Rev. K. C. Edmonds officiating. Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery.

He was preceded in death by one son Wilfred, in 1950.

Survivors include his wife, Velma, of the home; one son, Homer of Olden; one sister, Mrs. Lee Campbell of Leveland; one brother, Robert of Ardmore, Okla.; four grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.
