Today, volunteers or men together still outnumber full-time firemen by about 1¼ million to 250,000. Many towns with paid fighters reinforce their departments with volunteers.

Many famous early Americans were fire fighters, examples of these are: George Washington, Ben Franklin, John Hancock, Alexander Hamilton, Samuel Adams, Aaron Burr, and Paul Revere. Ben Franklin organized Philadelphia's first volunteer fire department. He coined the phrase "An Ounce of Prevention is Worth a Pound of Cure" to urge his city to adopt better fire preventoion laws. He also formed the first successful fire insurance company. The company is still in

Taller buildings prompted the invention of better equipment. In 1799 the Philadelphia department developed a wagon with six ladders on it, one of which was 40 feet long. In the early 1800's several departments laid water mains of hollowed logs with wooden plugs which could be removed for fire fighting purposes.


