The Gordon Spot

7 new families

When I left Eastland County to attend three weeks of school July 12 it was hot and dry. Crops were in need of rain and lawns were burned. I returned the first week of August to find everything green and the fields were wet. I hope no one thinks my absence had anything to do with the rain.

I appreciate the other extension agents and our secretary, Janice King, for taking care of our responsibilities while I was gone. One of the unexpected problems that came up was the threat of Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis. It appears that the vaccination program was handled most efficiently. The credit for such a good job goes to Drs. John Foster, Bill Cardwell, and Dick Hodges. Assistant Agent Paul Campbell helped by getting the information on the clinics to all horse owners through the news media.

Since mosquitoes are considered to be the prime vectors of the VEE disease, efforts should be made now to control the mosquitoes. You can help to destroy mosquitoes and possibly prevent the spread of Vee by eliminating mosquito breeding areas on or near your premises.

Mosquitoes cannot hatch unless they are in water, so all standing water should be eliminated. Mosquitoes frequently breed in commonly over looked containers such as old tires, tin cans, jars, tubs, birdbaths, unused fish ponds, evaporative coolers, or even on a flat roof where water accumulates. Also septic tanks and cisterns are ideal breeding places unless they are kept tightly covered. Such areas should be carefully eliminated. Standing puddles can be treated with a household insecticide or a diesel fuel, or a small quantity of kerosene, but avoid treating animals drinking water or utensils.

Spraying shrubbery, eaves of the house and around windows and doors with malathion to help control hiding mosquitoes and prevent them from entering homes.

If there are places around your home where mosquitoes breed, you may be raising the very mosquito which could bite you or your horse to transmit VEE.

While looking at peanut fields this week I found that peanuts were turning yellow especially in low areas of the fields. Several things could cause this condition, but I believe the main cause is wet soil. When the soil becomes waterlogged the roots do not get enough oxygen causing the leaves to turn yellow.

Start the applications of fungicide as soon as the first evidence of the disease is detected and continue on seven to fourteen day intervals, depending on weather conditions. Failure to do an adequate job of controlling leaf spot early makes it most difficult to control later.

Demonstrations have shown that good control of leaf spot can increase net returns as much as \$50 per acre over uncontrolled areas.

Ten teams with four players to a team made up the recent fun of playing in a golf scramble at the Lone Cedar Country Club.

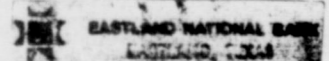

Crude Flow In County Hits 122 Million Since '17

Production of Texas crude oil last year again hit an all time high, while additions to reserves continued to lag,

according to the latest compilation of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

The state's oil fields produced 12 billion barrels of crude, bringing the total for the past 81 years of recorded production to

34.1 billion barrels. Eastland County, which has had recorded production since 1917, had a total crude oil output

of 122,518,065 barrels up to the beginning of 1971. Eastland County production in 1970 was 328,521 barrels at the rate of 900

Fifteen counties produced more than 25 million barrels, with Andrews and Ector topping the list.

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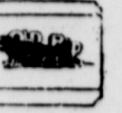

All were leading medical, social, or scientific minds. Dr. H. H. Reynolds of Baylor University related his experiences in studying a graduate student who had the record for taking the largest dose of LSD on record. Dr. Reynolds gave this case study to acquaint his audience with the phenomena and variety of experiences through which this student passed. The student used the university laboratory as his source and was treated in a Waco hospital.

One of the most positive lectures given was from Dr. Melvin Knisely, Chairman of the Department of Anatomy, Medical University of South Carolina. Under this man's direction are a corps of doctors and scientists studying the effects of alcohol on the brain. Dr. Knisely stated that alcohol definitely caused a blood condition which was responsible for the death of vital brain cells due to the lack of proper oxygen transmission.

Dr. W. R. Spence, Director of the Tulsa Rehabilitation Center, Tulsa, Okla., took the audience into his lecture by asking people to raise their hands if they were taking certain drugs which he named. The purpose for the drugs being taken was legitimate. In his comments on the drugs he pointed out dangers connected with the various drugs. One of the repeated points he made was the danger of mixing with beverage alcohol. His observation was that among the most common drug abusers is the modern housewife who fills her medicine chest with a variety of drugs to be used for chronic or daily symptoms. Her child sees such freedom in the use of household drugs that when the youngster is offered a

pill by a playmate or older person, the child is willing to take the drug, no questions asked.

From the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs in Washington D. C., came Ernest Caraballo. This man deals with the international scene and controls drugs that enter this country from abroad. Rather than present a flurry of statistics or a variety of gory case histories this man from Washington called for community and family support of Federal, State and local officers who put their lives on the line to apprehend abusers in the drug traffic.

The major thrust of the Thirteenth Annual Drug Education Workshop was not to rehabilitate the experienced addict, but the training of community personnel who could counsel with young people not yet on drugs of who have tried them once or twice due to curiosity or group pressure. Rehabilitation was referred to other agencies.
