\$99,000 Due In New N.Y.C. Work Program

A total of \$99,000 will be distributed this summer through the Eastland County School's Neighborhood Youth Corps Summer Work Training program — 90 per cent of which will go directly to young people.

The Summer program which goes into effect May 24, is the largest ever approved for this six-county area. Sponsor O. L. Stamey, County Superintendent, said. A total of 250 work training slots will be available in Eastland, Shackelford, Stephens, Young Palo Pinto and Throckmorton counties.

Each enrollee will be permitted to work a total of 210 hours at a rate of \$1.60 in school, city, county, federal or other non-profit organizations under the program. Project Director J. B. (Tip) Arther reports. Only about ten per cent of the total goes toward administration, he said.

Five adults, Mr. Arther and Mrs. Emma N. Morris of Cisco, secretary-bookkeeper, and three counselors will be in charge of the summer program. Each enrollee gets one hour per week of counseling.

The new program represents an increase over last year when 174 job slots were approved. This summer program, which ends Aug. 14, is almost equal in scope to the regular nine-month school term program.

Eastland County had 33 youngsters on the program last year: 7 in Eastland; 7 in Ranger; 9 in Cisco; 4 in Carbon; 3 in Gorman; and 5 in Rising Star. The program be-

Bell Adds 99 Customers During 1970

Southwestern Bell has 99 reasons to expect continued growth in Eastland during 1971.

According to John McGowan, local manager for the telephone company, that's the number of new telephones added during 1970 for a year-end total of 2,707 in service.

"By the end of the current year," he continued, "the company expects to add another 115 telephones to those already in service here.

"Use of telephones here also is rising," he noted, "with an annual total of 3.1 million local and long distance calls placed during 1970, an increase of 100,000 calls over 1969.

"This money is being spent in keeping with our commitment to provide every customer with the best possible telephone service, while facing ever-increasing demands for communications facilities," McGowan said. "And all indications for the 1970's point to unparalleled growth for the communications industry — in Texas and throughout the nation. That's why we are setting such large construction budgets — so we can stay ahead today and be ready for the demand of tomorrow."

Tri-City Industrial Foundation Is Suggested By Professional Planner

An Eastland County Industrial Foundation is the recommendation of a professional planner for this county at this time, and his report represents the thinking of a former resident, now in rehabilitation planning on a big level. As a former resident, he has first-hand knowledge of this area's history, problems and potential, and this material handed through his systematic approach, gives us an "at distant" analysis.

The writer prefers to remain anonymous at this time and herewith is his report and recommendation:

DISABILITY:

This Unit's disability has been diagnosed by observers, many of whom are recognized as experts in their fields, as being "anemic." While it is admitted that the Unit is not severely disabled—it is not functioning at full capacity. This diagnosis is substantiated by the fact that the Unit has been a gradual decrease in population over the years and

by the fact that several retail outlets have found it necessary to cease operations. In addition to obvious physical ailments, there seems to be a definite psychological involvement present, as indicated by an almost complete lack of cooperation within the Unit itself. Also, it would appear that the physical disablement is more of a result of psychological stress than physical limitations.

VOCATIONAL HANDICAP: The above disability constitutes a vocational handicap since it places severe limitations upon the Unit's ability to engage in any type of cooperative adventure. This condition also causing a gradual decline in population, number of retail outlets, and inhibiting the attraction of new industries.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATIONAL ASSETS:

It would take a complete diagnostic work-up to determine all the assets possessed by this Unit. However, there are obvious assets that would most certainly make the rehabilitation of this Unit feasible. It is centrally located—almost half-way between Abilene and the Fort Worth Dallas area with more than a million people within a 150 mile radius. In addition to its excellent location, there are two junior colleges within its boundaries. Other assets include plenty of space, the advantages of small town living, several small industries, and three strong newspapers. All the above, plus the fact that in the past this Unit has shown that it does have the ability to achieve, indicates that a rehabilitative program handled with care could be successful.

Personal Social History

The history of this Unit is of such an extraordinary nature that it is almost unbelievable. It would certainly make an exciting movie or perhaps a television series. All the details are not available at this time. However, we do have a few items of interest. One of the biggest oil discoveries of the industry occurred at Ranger making it, at the time, the largest city between Fort Worth and El Paso, where fortunes were made and lost within hours. Then, there is the story of "Old Rip" the

horn toad that lived for years entombed in the corner stone of the Eastland County Courthouse without food or water. The infamous Santa Clause robbery that occurred at Cisco. All the above stories, when told in their entirety make exciting reading. Less exciting, but more important, is the story of the people who stayed after the oil boom to make their towns a stable and progressive community. As was indicated, this history is not complete in detail, but with a little research the needed information could be gained.

ECONOMIC NEED: While experts have not been consulted—it would appear that this Unit does have adequate funds to provide for the rehabilitation plan, provided proper motivation is activated.

PLAN OF SERVICE: Since this Unit is hypersensitive, it is suggested that all services be initiated with extreme caution and perhaps more slowly than usual. The indirect method will be more successful in this case than the direct—leading by suggestion

Liquor-by-Drink 'No Problem' In This Area, ABC-Man Reports

Liquor-by-the-drink will be a problem in this area, and no counties in the area will be having elections in the special May 18 vote, it was reported this week.

D. J. Goetz, Assistant Area Supervisor for the Alcoholic Beverages Commission, Abilene, was speaker for members of the Eastland County Law Enforcement Officers at the regular Fourth-Friday meeting held at the White Elephant Restaurant.

All the counties in the Abilene district voted against L-B-D in the election last year, he said.

The Abilene district raised about \$50,000 last year in permits, licenses and taxes, while the entire ABC Division put approximately \$58 million into the state coffers.

President Bill Hunter presided and the Association unanimously adopted a resolution asking that the proposed penal code be postponed, and District-County Attorney E. Mory Walton was instructed to prepare petitions to be circulated and directed to House

and asking pertinent questions, thereby helping the Unit to move from within rather than by force from without. Thus, it will be necessary at first to steer away from the subjects of schools, hospitals, chambers of commerce, and etc. One area that all are concerned with and one that might not pose a threat is industrial growth.

Therefore, it is recommended that a tri-city industrial board be formed with the primary purpose of activating a cooperative effort to bring new industry to the Unit. If this effort is successful, then there will be other joint ventures that should combine the Unit into a real force that will work for the benefit of all.

Eastland County Included In Area Specified for Drouth Aid

President Nixon today announced that he was directing Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin and G. A. Lincoln, Director of the office of Emergency Preparedness, to provide emergency aid to farmers and ranchers in the drought stricken areas of West Texas.

The current drought which started in 1970 and which has extended over several southwestern states, has hit hard at dryland winter wheat and cattle ranchers. If the drought persists, severe damage is also anticipated by cotton growers and producers of other crops.

In announcing the Administration's concern about the effects of the drought the President instructed General Lincoln of OEP to provide funds for transportation of hay to the West Texas cattle ranchers threatened with the necessity of selling off livestock because of feed shortages. At the same time, the President requested Secretary Hardin of the USDA to administer technical aspects of the hay lift.

The White House announcement also listed several other programs to be administered by the Secretary of Agriculture. These include: Making available Commodity Credit Corporation owned feed grain for sale at reduced prices to eligible farmers and ranchers in 50 Texas counties. Permitting farmers and ranchers in 89 counties to graze livestock on cropland taken out of production under the Cropland Adjustment Program. Approving under the Rural Environmental Assistance Program emergency conservation practices, such as surface tillage. Designating emergency funds from the Farmers Home Administration to be used in

53 Texas counties to make loans to individuals to restore normal farming and ranching operations and pay for living expenses until their source of income is restored.

The drought has also caused farmers to fall behind in their spring planting operations. In Texas only 9 percent of the cotton has been planted to date and sorghum plantings are also lagging.

Eastland County is among those designated for haying and grazing privileges.

Phone Expansion To Add 440 New Customer Lines

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company will begin installation of additional call switching equipment in its "442" central office in Cisco in mid-April.

According to John McGowan, local manager for the company, the equipment will serve 440 more customer lines.

"This new equipment will help increase the call handling capacity of our central office in Cisco," he noted. "The company now serves an estimated 3,000 telephones here. Local customers used those phones to place some 10,185 local calls on the average business day during 1970—a sharp increase from the 4,690 placed on the average day of 1969. During 1971, the company expects to add 250 more phones to its service network here."

McGowan said this growth trend is the primary reason for the additional switching capacity in Cisco.

Preceding the luncheon tours of various industries in the Eastland area were conducted. First, the ladies toured Victor Cornelius' Company. Mr. Cornelius and Jack Germany showed the operations and new developments in the printing of menus which are used by restaurants around the world.

Next stop was the House of Webster Pottery Manufacturing Company. The group was met by Jimmy Little, company manager. Mr. Little and his assistant showed the group from beginning to end the making of pottery articles which includes some 26 different hand finishing skills that must be applied by

Willingness to Ease Rules On Drivers Seen

Jack Cozart, president of Eastland County Farm Bureau said, information had been received from the AFBF that the Department of Transportation has indicated a willingness to reopen the question of

issuing lightweight trucks including pickup trucks under proposed regulations. This came to light in a meeting April 1 between the DOT and agricultural organizations. The DOT scheduled the meeting after receiving AFBF's petition.

Dr. Robert Kaye, director of the Bureau of Motor Carrier Safety of the Department, indicated that the trucks under 10,000 lbs. gross weight could be exempted and asked for counsel on whether to institute this modification prior to consideration of the other controversial provisions.

In answering, Roger Fleming, AFBF secretary-treasurer, said "We believe it would be preferable to defer such action until a broader area of agreement has been developed. To take such limited action now would only result in confusing the issue by leading many affected people to believe that such limited revision of the driver qualification regulations was all that was contemplated by the Department."

Notary Public Application Dates Reported

County Clerk Johnson Smith announces that all qualified Notaries Public desiring appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1971 and ends June 1, 1973 must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with his office between May 1, 1971 and May 15, 1971, inclusive.

He further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term on June 1, 1971, should apply to the County Clerk before May 14, 1971. The required application forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.

Mr. Smith emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerk approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of State.

May 1 Final Date on Wheat

May 1 is the final date for growers to certify their wheat acreage for 1971, the Eastland County ASC committee has reminded.

Set aside requirements for 1971 will be stricter than ever before, the announcement said. All livestock must be taken off set-aside acreage from April 30 to October 1. Turn rows, drainage ditches, wet low-lying areas, droughty knobs or banks, and other areas which normally would not produce a crop will not be accepted as set aside acres. Land that is as good as that which is planted in feed grain must be used, or payment will be reduced.

Farmers Reminded That "Set Aside" Acreage Should Be Normal in Yield

Eastland County farmers enrolled in the feed grain, wheat or cotton programs are being reminded that the acreage set aside under each program should be as productive as the acreage normally used to produce the crop.

Robert G. Lyerla, chairman of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, suggested that producers check with the county ASC office as soon as possible if they have any doubt about their proposed set-aside acreage meeting the qualifications.

Mr. Lyerla pointed out that at the time producers come in to the County Office to certify their set-aside acreage, they must specify precisely where the set-aside acreage is located. Final dates for certification are: For a Wheat farm only—May 1. All other farms signing an inten-

tion—August 1. After a producer has certified, if a mistake is found in his set-aside acreage he could lose some or all of his farm program payment.

"A farmer who is not quite sure whether his set-aside meets all requirements would be well advised to check with the County ASC Office ahead of time. Also, he can request measurement service, which, if followed, will give him a guarantee that he has enough set-aside acreage. Measurement service is offered by the County ASC Office at a minimum cost," Lyerla said.

Producers in the voluntary feed grain, wheat and cotton programs for 1971 set aside a percentage of their land to conserving uses, and will also maintain their farm's conserving acreage. On the rest of their acreage they may plant

cotton or any other crops they choose, with the exception of quota crops. Quota crops include peanuts, tobacco, rice, extra long staple cotton and sugarcane which may be planted only on farms with allotments for these crops.

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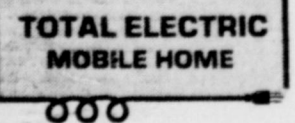
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
