Traffic Caution Urged Here As School Nears End

Statistically, Eastland County is ahead of last year on traffic fatalities — but the worse days may be ahead, according to Sgt. Jerry Mathews of the Department of Public Safety here.

Through April, only three have been killed on the county highways and roads. There'd been four the same time last year. There's been a total of 79 accidents, compared to 86 last year.

The county had zero deaths in April this year, and one the same month last year.

With highway construction intensifying and the school-out, vacation season getting underway, the local DPS Sergeant urged all drivers to be especially careful, and certainly when approaching and going through construction areas — here and away.

April had four personal injury accidents; 13 property damage accidents; with six persons injured. So far this year, there have been 22 personal injury accidents; 54 property damage accidents; and 33 persons injured.

Police Chief John Morren joined in urging special caution within the city limits, and cited specifically, the need for care at unmarked intersections, and backing from driveways.

Kokomo Bows to Tira, Claims \$350 In Contest

Tira community in Hopkins County has won the Texas Community Improvement Program award of \$550 cash; and a silver tray for 1970-71, it was announced Friday.

Reagan Brown, sociologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and coordinator of the program, said 263 communities, involving some 40,000 families, took part. The program is sponsored by utility companies operating in Texas and conducted by the extension service.

The other state winners were:

The Flashing-Peggy community of Atascosa County, which scored with a communitywide beautification program for homes, highways and community projects, a community water system, and a fire control district.

Kokomo in Eastland County, in the heart of the peanut country, which scored with programs for soil and water conservation, improved peanut-producing practices, a new community center and a community leadership development program.

Era in Cooke County, for its wheat and dairy improvement programs and projects for youth and leadership development.

Flashing-Peggy gets a \$450 cash award, Kokomo \$350, and Era \$250. Each gets a silver tray.

Tira carried off the top prize with its programs in pasture and beef cattle improvement, with a program for youth, new homes and programs for the aged.

Brown said this has been the best year in the 17 during which he has been responsible for the extension service program.

Altogether 90 communities are sharing cash awards totaling approximately \$6,800.

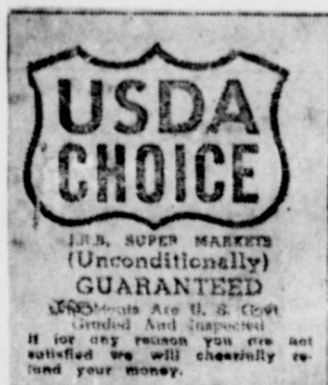

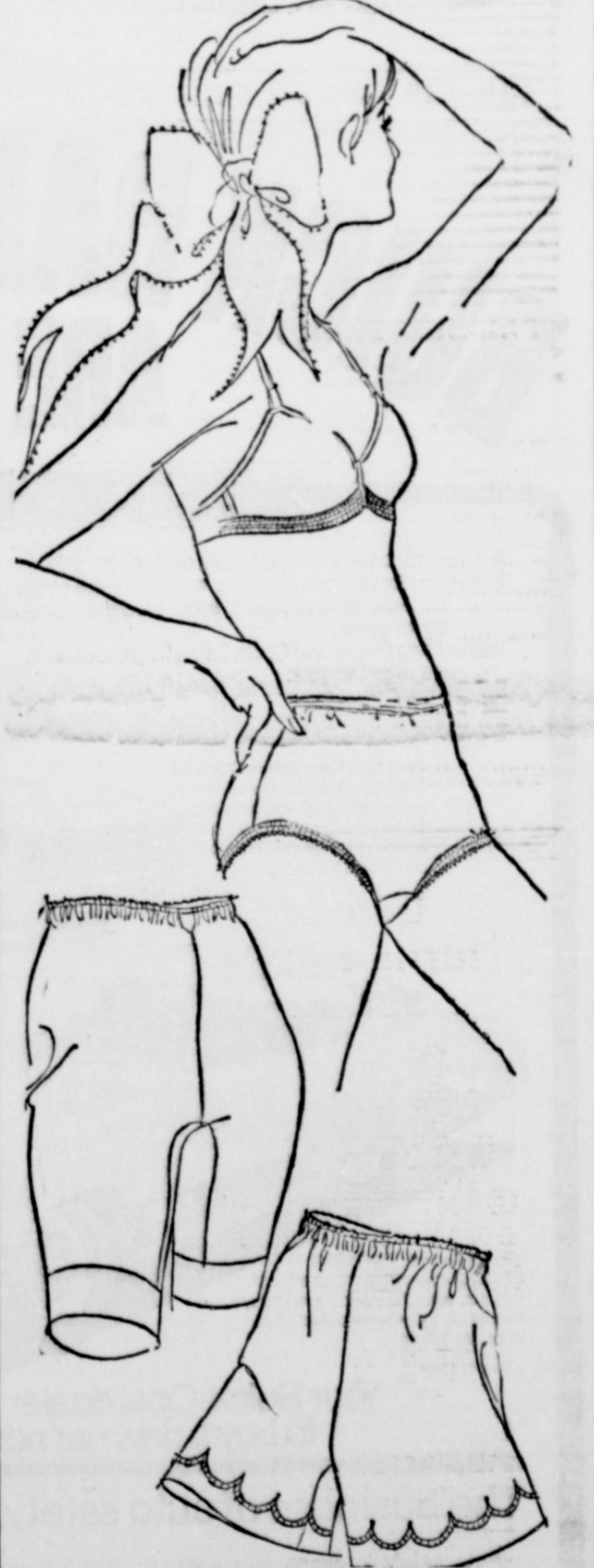
