All three judges are with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University.

The public is invited out to Kokomo on Wednesday, May 19th to go on the State tour and see the many accomplishments. The tour will begin promptly at 10 a.m. and last until 2 p.m. Lunch will be served in the community during the noon hour.

Rainfall For Year 2.80 Inches

Turbulent weather so far this month has resulted in precious little rainfall for Eastland, according to official Weather Bureau records.

Through Wednesday noon, only .36 of an inch had been recorded this month. A quarter of an inch (.25) came on Saturday May 8, and .11 of an inch accompanied relatively soft hail on Monday, May 10. A trace of rain and some hail fell on Saturday, May 9, according to Weather Observer James Dabney.

Through April 30, his gauges had recorded 2.44 inches bringing the years total to date to 2.80 inches, far below average.

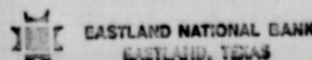
Water in tanks and lakes is down but presently there is no concern of a shortage for human consumption. Stock farmers would prefer to see more rain as would peanut farmers.

Maria was the subject of a fund drive several years ago sponsored by one of the Eastland Sororities, which raised money to buy her a television set. She later was given a used typewriter.

The television set is still in use in Maria's room at the nursing center on West Commerce St. Handle with her hands, even though they are partially paralyzed, Maria does beautiful embroidery, and is trying her skill at oil painting. Originals for the drive

THE GORDON SPOT

By County Agent DEE GORDON

4-H Club members in Eastland County as well as members all over the state will be selling 4-H chocolate candy during the next two weeks. The purpose of the candy sales is to raise money to buy a movie projector for the county 4-H program and help finance a state 4-H center to be built at Lake Brownwood. I hope you will help the boys and girls in this effort.

All swine producers have probably read or heard about the requirements of the hog quarantine which began May 3. The animal health inspectors have been very cooperative in helping producers get their hogs cleared for market. If you plan to sell hogs be sure to let me or the inspectors know a few days in advance. By doing this you can get your hogs to market with out any delays.

Swine producers are also concerned about the waste disposal and water quality laws that affect them. The producers of hogs are invited to attend a meeting on this subject to be held in the Vocational Agricultural Building in Comanche at 8:00 p.m. on May 17. W. S. Allen, Extension Agricultural Engineer, will present the program. A discussion of regulations of the Texas Water Quality Board will be included in the program. Any producers or other interested persons are urged to attend.

The use of additives in swine rations has enabled producers to increase feed utilization and the growth rate of pigs in addition to making today's production systems possible by controlling disease.

But, the use of additives is under real pressure and the final outcome rests largely with swine producers. All feeds containing antibiotics or additives must be labeled, showing the number of days the material or materials must be withdrawn before the hogs are sold for slaughter.

Producers should carefully read the warnings on the tag attached to each bag of feed or on the invoices that accompany each load of bulk feed. Then, make sure all feeding recommendations are closely followed.

The withdrawal is made necessary since some antibiotics and growth stimulants are deposited in the animal's body tissue. The withdrawal periods allow ample time for the excretion of these materials to the point that body tissue or meat will not contain levels above those accepted by the U. S. Food and Drug Administration.

The FDA has increased its surveillance of drug residue in meat and producers should make doubly sure the pork they produce has been fed in accordance with tagged recommendations.

Don't ruin your lawn by mowing too close. Mowing too close encourages a thinning of the turf and shallow rooting. This lowers the resistance of the lawn to drought and diseases, and gives weeds an opportunity to take over.

Because of the extended drought, most lawns are depending upon their owners to give them the water and plant food needed to keep up their good appearance. And this is no easy job. It will take the best management practices to keep the lawn beautiful and

is one of the important practices.

The lawn should be mowed often enough so no more than one-inch of the leaf tip is removed at any one clipping.

Proper mowing requires a sharp, well-adjusted mower. The mower should be sharp enough to cut the tips of leaves without crushing or bruising them. Most mowers can easily be adjusted to the correct cutting height. Bermuda lawns should be mowed at a height of one to one and a half inches and most other lawn grasses a half-inch higher.

The management practices used on the lawn during the current dry weather can well determine whether or not your lawn will survive.

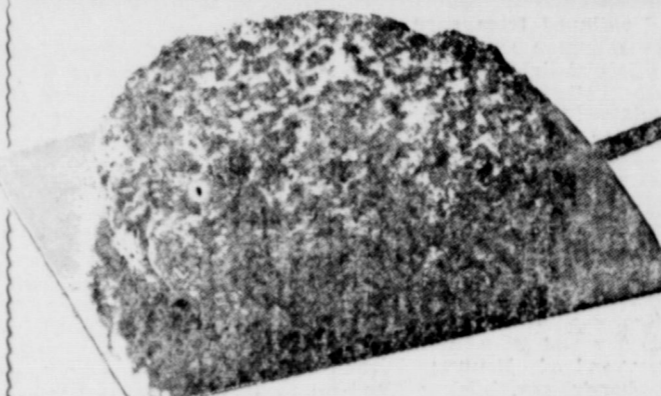
