Tid Bits

NINE INCHES of rain last week made news hereabouts and Eastlanders were thankful for the much-needed moisture. There have been other and bigger downpours, and here Mrs. T. E. Castleberry, well-known historian, tells about some she remembers.

BIG RAINS I REMEMBER

In my diary for 1955, I turn to May of that year and read: The 18th of May will long be remembered by the people of Eastland.

It had been threatening rain for several days. About 4:00 o'clock p. m. it began to sprinkle then to rain. Suddenly the bottom seemed to fall out of the clouds, the rain came down in torrents. I never saw rain fall faster.

Soon the streets were filled from curb to curb, with rivers of water rushing wildly down the street seeking its own level. The water tumbling down West Valley Street — was something to see, and it cost the city a pretty penny to repair the damage it did to the street.

After an hour or less the heavy rain slacked. My grandson Tom Castleberry was in town when the rain began. He said the water was backed up into the Man's Store, and also into the Corner Drug Store and other places.

All the lower parts of town were flooded and boats were sent out to rescue persons in the flooded areas, north of the railroad, and east and south.

Camera men got pictures of the rescue parties helping people into boats. The rain continued to fall at Cisco which kept the North Fork of the Leon on a rampage.

Next day, May 19, Tom went over to the spillway near the golf course. He was amazed. Said he'd never seen so much water in all his life before. Forgetting momentarily, I guess, that he grew up on the west coast!

Elnos Heusley had staked a pair of pretty gray horses on the bank of the Leon, where they could do down to the water and drink, come back upon the bank and graze the fresh green grass.

Mr. Hensley was out of town when the eleven inch rain came. Upon his return, when he came to the edge of the flood water north of the railroad, he knew the fate of his beautiful gray horses!

May 20th, I received a special delivery letter from Mrs. Best Roby of Phoenix, Arizona, Tom's other grandmother. She was concerned about the safety of Tom and me, after seeing the pictures on T. V. of the flood at Eastland, that showed the unfortunate people being rescued from the high waters.

No doubt there have been many times for short periods the only direction one could out of town on dry land was to go west.

But two stand out in my memory.

In 1907 we lived across the road west of the Gilbreath house on Gilbreath hill. An old concrete cistern curb is all there is to indicate a house stood there at one time.

It had rained some for a day or two. But imagine our surprise when we woke up one morning to see water nearly half way up the hill. The water stood two inches in one house. Boats were sent out to rescue those in danger. But bad as the 1907 flood was the one a year later was worse.

Eastland Man Discovered Dead In Stock Tank

Waite, J. Weathered, 71, was found dead in a stock tank on his farm one mile north of Eastland about 2 p.m. Friday, the death ruled a suicide. The body was found in six feet of water by Eastland Chief of Police Jhonnie Morren, after an extensive search by Constable Bill Hunter, Deputy Sheriff J. D. Clements and Sheriff Lefty Sublett.

Funeral services will be at 2:30 p. m. Sunday at the Church of Christ in Eastland, with Milton Underwood officiating.

Burial will be at Cross Roads Cemetery near Ranger, with Arrington Funeral Home in charge.

Justice of the Peace Wells Dalton ruled suicide by drowning. A note was found at the home earlier by Mrs. Weathered, who notified authorities. Mrs. Weathered told Constable Hunter that her husband had been in ill health recently.

Mr. Weathered was born Sept. 27, 1899, at Milford. He has lived in Eastland 2 1/2 years, moving from Hillsboro. He had been an employe of Dallas Transfer Co. 35 years, retiring in 1968. He was a member of the Eastland Church of Christ. He married Alatha Lemley Nov. 28, 1930, in Dallas.

Survivors are his wife; one sister, Mrs. O. Wells of Dallas; and several nieces and nephews.

CJC Extends Registration For Summer School Classes

Registration for summer school at Cisco Junior College has been extended through Friday, June 4, according to CJC Registrar Carroll Scott.

The late registration is being accepted due to the fact that many Big Country high schools are not finishing up their spring school terms until this week.

Scott said that any high school graduate would be welcome to enroll for the CJC summer school courses at any time Thursday or Friday during regular office hours of 8:00 to 12:00 and 1:00 to 4:00. Day classes, meeting one hour and fifteen minutes daily Monday through Friday, are being held in Biology, Government, English Literature, English Grammar and Composition, and History of the U. S. to 1865.

Evening classes that meet Monday, Wednesdays, and 2 Fridays for three hours each include English Grammar and Composition, Government, and Beginning and Advanced Typing.

Evening classes meeting Fridays are being held in College Algebra, History of the U. S. to 1865, English Literature, and Introduction to Economics. The first semester of summer school will last only five weeks with finals scheduled for June 30 and July 1, Scott said.

Former County Resident Is Press Association President

When Joe T. Cook, owner and publisher of the Winston County Journal in Louisville, Miss., was elevated to the presidency of the 105-year-old Mississippi Press Association on June 5, he became the only American weekly newspaper publisher in history with the distinction of serving as president of the National Newspaper Association and as president of two state press associations.

Cook, who is a fourth generation newspaper man, served in 1949-50 as the youngest president in the history of the National Newspaper Association at age 39, and in 1945-46 as one of the youngest Texas Press Association presidents in that organization's history.

Since purchasing his Mississippi newspaper, he has twice been awarded a Freedom's Foundation George Washington Honor Medal for meritorious editorial writing.

A native of Weatherford, Texas, and a 1932 graduate of the University of Texas, Cook says that he never had any

plan for a career other than to publish a weekly newspaper. Beginning as a carrier boy for the Eastland Daily Oil Belt News at the age of 12 in Eastland, Texas, where he graduated from high school, he learned to operate a Linotype machine and was thus able to partially finance his college training.

In his senior year at the University of Texas, Cook served as editor of the Daily Texan, the largest college daily in the South. He recalls that Lady Bird Johnson worked as one of his reporters on the Texan that year. Cook was graduated from the University

in June, 1932, with cum laude honors.

Upon graduation from the University, Cook borrowed \$200 and took his bride of a few weeks to Mission, Texas, where he became associated with The Mission Times as advertising salesman. The next year he was promoted to the position of editor and publisher.

During his 26 years as publisher of The Times, Cook built a spacious new building and what was recognized as the best-equipped newspaper and commercial printing plant in South Texas. Annual gross sales of the company grew from \$11,000 in 1944 to \$350,000 in 1968 when he sold his minority interest in the publishing firm to the majority stockholders and purchased the newspaper in Louisville, Miss.

Mr. Cook is married to the former Dorothy McCannies of Eastland and they have two children and four grandchildren. Dorothy's father is H. A. McCannies a resident of Cisco.

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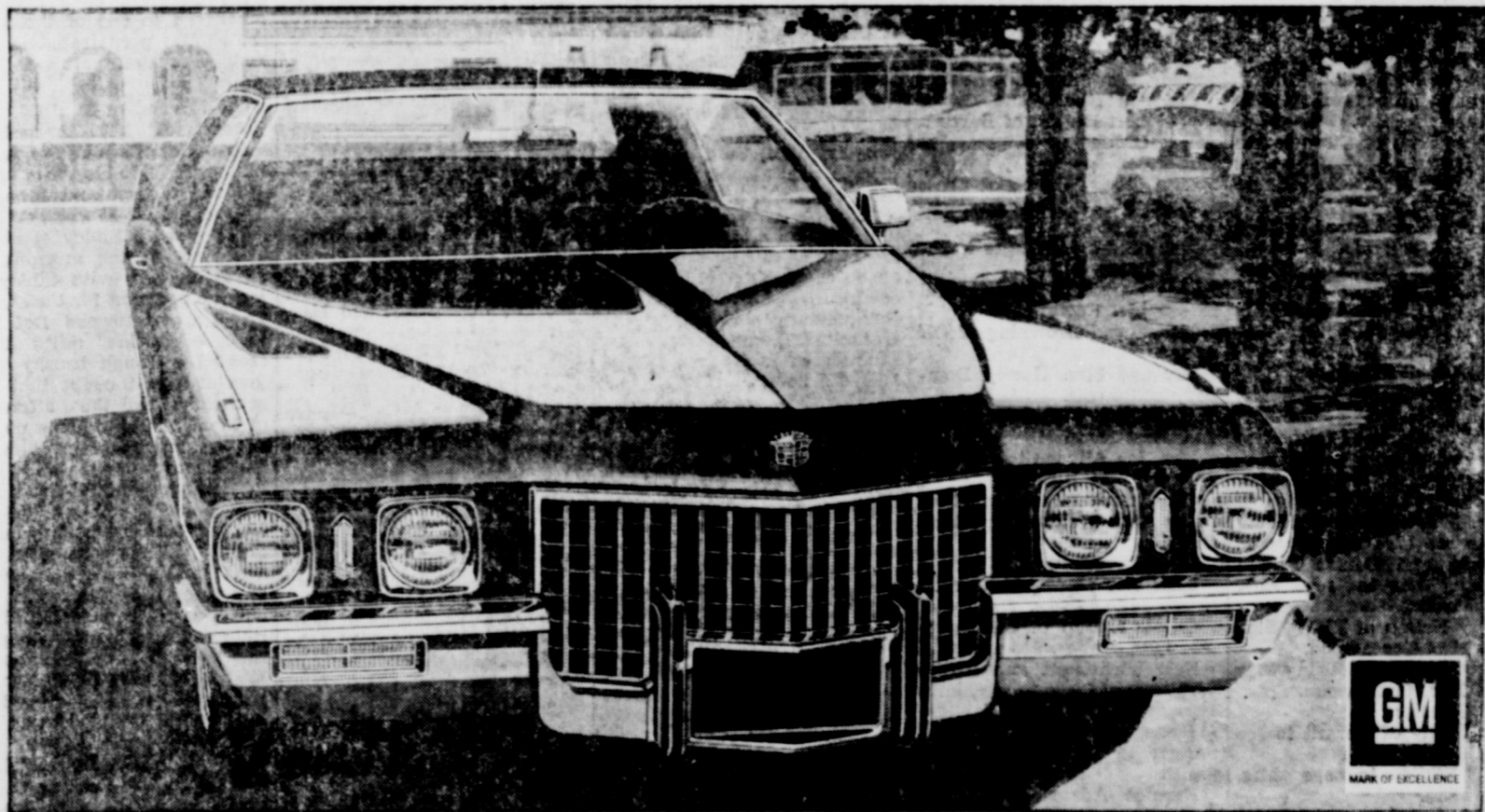

Old Scranton Academy Historical Marker Unveiling Slated Sunday

Dedication of a Texas Historical Association marker on the site of the early-day Scranton Academy will be a highlight Sunday, June 6, of the program at the annual reunion of Ex-Students of Scranton School, 12 miles southwest of Cisco.

Plans call for the reunion to begin with services at the Scranton Community Center at 10 a.m. Leo Purvis of Stephenville, native of Scranton, will be the speaker. Basket lunches will be spread at noon. Lee Starr of Scranton is president of the Exes and will preside during the program and an afternoon business meeting.

The Scranton Academy marker dedication will be held at 3:30 p.m. at the Community Center with Mike Collins of Eastland, chairman of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee, in charge.

In addition to the Academy marker, another marker will be unveiled to honor the "memory of Coach Clinton E. (Shorty) Adams and members of the basketball team of Scranton Academy for the year 1913-14." Team members named on the plaque are Lory Boyd, George Boyd, Earl Brown, Raymond Curry, Grayden Esmond, Ira McNeil, Otis Neill, Earl Ray, Tom (Potsy) Rippy, Clyde (Babe) Shaw, Oren Spiegler, Aubrey Sprawls, John Wallace and Bill Webster, mascot. The team had a 28-0 record for the season.

The historical marker honoring the Academy reads: "A private coeducational school organized to augment Scranton Public School (opened 1867). Scranton, a small farming-ranching community, was only 12 years old when citizens founded the Academy by public subscription. The school expanded rapidly, reaching an enrollment of 325 by 1910. At its peak all grade levels (then numbering 11) were taught. First president, O. C. Britton, presided 1903-1905. He was followed by W. W. Griffin (1909), S. P. Collins (1910-1911), and J. E. Temple Peters (1911-1915). Under Peters,

science program began, and a modern laboratory and library added. Later, presidents were J. W. Hawkins (1916), and L. E. Ratten (1917). Among early trustees were G. W. Bailey, F. G. Boyd, A. P. Planning Progress On Sabanna Is Reviewed At Gorman Public Hearing

Fifty two interested landowners and sponsors of the Sabanna Watershed attended a public meeting in Gorman High School Auditorium on May 14, 1971.

Ross Wilson, chairman of the Sabanna Watershed Association, gave the history of accomplishments in the watershed. In September, 1966, approximately 600 questionnaires were mailed to landowners to determine their interest in a watershed program of improvement. Over 60 percent of these questionnaires were returned representing a very high interest in the program. On September 26, 1966, a meeting of the various leaders and landowners was held with the project. An application for project approval was filed on February 17, 1967. A preliminary field examination was held in late October, 1967, by Soil Conservation Service personnel and representatives from the State Soil and Water Conservation Board. This proved to be a very favorable hearing. On November 16, 1967, the State Soil and Water Conservation Board approved the Associations application. On May 2, 1968, a public hearing was held to establish a project planning priority. Due to lack of sufficient land treatment on home farms and ranches a planning priority was not granted at this time. High interest was shown on the tour and some 600 people attended the barbecue and public hearing held in Gorman, on May 3, 1969.

IT HAS BEEN

Rock Springs, located in Southwest Texas, was the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Rolston in the early 1900's. They owned the hotel and grocery store on the corner of Well and Austin Streets.

The Rolstons sold their business interests in Rock Springs in 1893 and bought a ranch north of the town. A little later they bought another ranch and lived there until the tragic death of Mr. Rolston in 1906.

Mr. Rolston and B. A. Cauthorn, a wealthy cattleman from Del Rio, were brutally murdered in one of the foulest crimes perpetrated in the history of that part of the state.

On November 21, 1906, Mr. Rolston sold 2,400 sheep to a man under the name of A. R. Sibley. He left his three sons, Thomas, George and John, in charge of the sheep, got into a buggy with Sibley at about 8 o'clock in the morning to go to Del Rio with Sibley to receive payment for the sheep. They drove toward Del Rio for about nine miles then crossed a rough brushy hollow. It was thought that the grafter called the attention of Mr. Rolston to some object in the brush to get him to look that way, then shot him in the back of the head, the bullet came out under the left ear causing instant death. Sibley put a sack over the dead man's head to prevent any trace of blood, tied it securely with a stout cord around the neck and dragged the body back of the buggy for about three or four hundred yards, and covered it with rocks. The body was later located by following the signs made by dragging it.

Sibley went back to the camp where the Rolston boys were holding the sheep and spent several nights with them, telling them that the pasture he had been using had been sold and that he would have to get another one or sell the sheep. He also told them that their father had decided to go on to Kerrville on business and would come back home later.

The continued absence of Mr. Rolston caused his sons to become alarmed and on November 28, 1906, the oldest son, John, went to Rock Springs and called Kerville by telephone to see if his father had gone there as Sibley had said. He was told that his father had not been there. Then a call was placed to Del Rio, but he had not been there.

The price that Mr. Rolston would have received for the 2,400 ewes and lambs would have been \$7,000 but Sibley sold them to Mr. Cauthorn on November 30, for \$4,500. Cauthorn gave him a check and went to get the sheep, the Rolston boys refused to deliver the sheep under the circumstances and Mr. Cauthorn started back to report the fraud. He had only gone four

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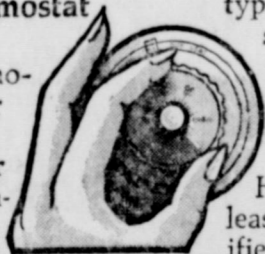

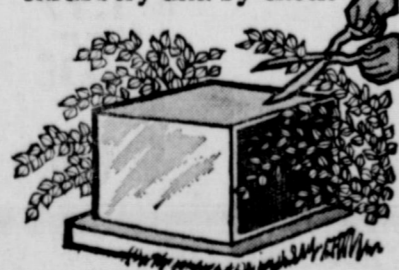

When the couple left for a honeymoon at a seaside resort, the bride wore a yellow skirt and vest with a white blouse and a daisy corsage.

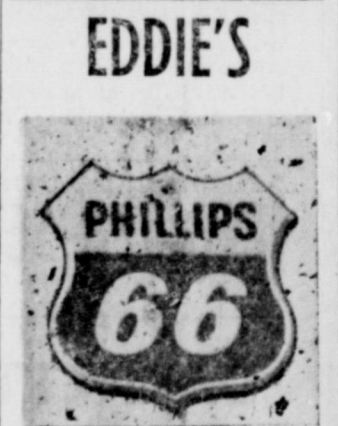

Drinking Driver Attacked in New Safety Bill

"The Texas Legislature's passage of a strong bill aimed at the abusive drinker-driver can save the lives of more than 500 Texans in the next two years," according to J. U. Parker, President of the Texas Safety Association.

Parker, a Houston safety consultant, made the prediction today in a release from the Austin headquarters of the statewide safety organization. As a part of the Governor's Traffic Safety Program, the legislature passed and sent to the Governor May 25, a bill establishing 0.10 percent blood-alcohol concentration as a presumption of being under the influence of intoxicating liquor while driving a motor vehicle.

"This measure will probably save more Texas lives in years to come than any other single piece of legislation enacted by the legislature this session if it is properly enforced throughout the state," Parker stated. The TSA president said that more than half of the fatalities last year in Texas highway crashes involved abusive drinkers, even though this group makes up only about 7 percent of the driving public.

"Texas has taken a great step forward in controlling its number one highway menace with the passage of this measure. The legislature, Governor Smith, and the people of Texas are to be commended for their vigorous efforts in securing this life-saving action," said Parker.

"High praise also needs to be paid to the news media of Texas for the part it played in informing Texans of the need for such legislation. The efforts of newspapers, radio and television stations, and magazines throughout the state provided factual information about the problem of the abusive drinker-driver," Parker commented.

Parker also commended the legislature for passage of a bill that made changes in the Texas Traffic Code which brings the state more nearly into compliance with the Uniform Traffic Code. The bill was signed into law by Governor Smith April 27th.
