## School Opens With 808 Enrollment

All schools opened in Eastland Monday, Aug. 23, whether students were ready or not. Everyone seemed to be very enthusiastic early Monday. Mr. Rayneal Baze, principal for the Elementary School, reported that he had 60 enrolled in the first grade, 67 in the second, 59 in the third, 52 in the fourth, 73 in the fifth, 75 in the sixth and 7 in Special Education. This makes a total for the Elementary School of 394 students.

Mr. Harold L. Price, principal for Junior High, reported he had enrolled 75 in the seventh and 56 in the eighth for a total of 131 in Jr High. Mr. Elvin Hill, principal for High School, reported that he had the following enrolled in high school classes: 9th, 72; 10th, 76; 11th, 76; and 12th, 59, a total of 283 in High School. The total Enrollment the first day of school was 808 for the Eastland Public Schools. The enrollment is only off 1 student from the end of school last year when the total was 807 students.

## Rev. Williams Gives Greece Trip Details

"It's really hard to tell where mythology ends and reality begins," stated Rev. Eugene Williams, at the Rotary meeting Monday, in the White Elephant, as he showed slides and gave details on his trip to Athens, Greece.

Two visitors were present at the 12:00 meeting, President, Saul Pullman, presided.

Rev. Williams and his family lived in Greece from July 1955 to June of 1957. At this time Rev. Williams was the first Airforce Chaplain to be assigned to Greece, and he established

the first chaplain program there. Rev. Williams commented, "Of all my military assignments to different countries overseas, this was definitely the most fascinating place I have ever had the privilege to live.

Rev. Eugene Williams presented and explained through slides, a pictorial trip to Greece, beginning on the island of Crete. The trip proceeded to the Mainland of Greece, to Mycenae, and then to Athens, the center point of the trip.

Pictures were shown of magnificent, beautifully sculptured ancient ruins of Acropolis as well as modern day architecture.

"One of the high points of my ministry," said Rev. Williams, "was when I conducted the Easter Sunrise service on Mars Hill." "This was the first service of this type these people had ever seen, on the resurrection."

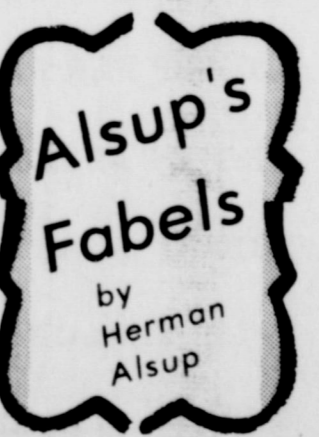
## 'Tell It Like It Is' Group To Perform For Richmond Prisoners

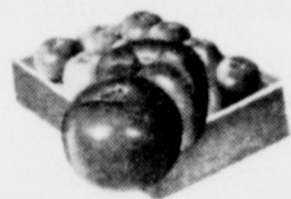

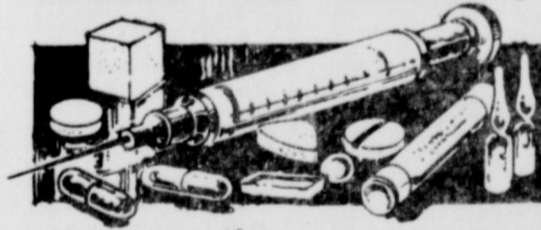

 ● The retention of one fully-feathered wing on dressed doves is required in those counties having a white-winged dove season when both mourning and white-winged doves may be taken. This requirement also applies when doves are imported from Mexico or any foreign country.  
 ● Shotguns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity and may not be larger than ten gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.  
 ● Area closed south and west of a line extending along U.S. Highway 83 from the Starr-Zapata County line to Mission, and from Mission to the north city limits of Hidalgo via FM 1016 and FM 1926 during the concurrent white-winged and mourning dove season.  
 ● In all counties under regulatory responsibility of the Parks and Wildlife Commission, no hunting is permitted on railroad right-of-ways (except in Uvalde County) and in State owned river beds.  
 ● A white-winged Dove Stamp for a \$3.00 fee is required of all persons who hunt white-winged doves. This stamp is required in addition to the valid hunting license.

# Attention Welfare Recipients-

As you know all money allotted for prescriptions will be taken out of your next check. Beginning Sept. 1, a new system will be started.

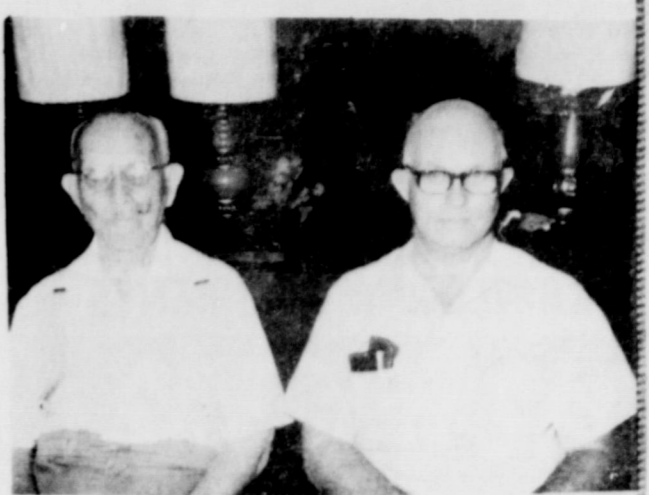
You will be allowed 2 Rx's. or \$12.00 a month, which ever comes first. Your doctor will be able to get authorization for more medication if he feels you are in need of it. But there are exceptions to this. For example, if you go to one doctor and get your two Rx's or \$12.00 for the month, then see that you need additional medication for the month and go to a different doctor, he will not be able to get you additional medication for the month. You will have to return to the first doctor and get him to authorize additional medication. for that month. So it will be to your advantage to go to one doctor for all your medical treatment.

You will get a small medical record book that you will carry with you each time you visit the doctor's office. He will record your visit each time in the book and make notations of each medication your taking at that time. Then you will bring your book with you new Rx to the drug store of your choice and the pharmacist will make an additional notation in your record book that he has filled the Rx.

You will get new eligibility cards each month. If the date on the card is not the date of the present month for which to Rx is to be filled you will not be able to get your Rx's.

Your doctor can only write a Rx for a one month's supply, and it may be refilled three times if he so indicated on the prescription. Then you must return to the doctors office and he must write a new Rx if he wants you to continue your present medication. You will not be able to call your doctor and have him call the drug store for new prescriptions. The doctor must make notations in your medical record book and he must sign each new Rx that he writes.

## Pecan Tree Weevils

Pecan growers in Eastland County are urged to check for infestations of pecan weevils. Emergence of adult weevils has occurred earlier this year than in the past few years reports County Agent De Gordon. Wet weather has prompted weevil emergence before reproduction can develop. Pecans must be past the "water stage" before immature pecan weevils can survive inside the developing nut. However, feeding punctures will cause developing pecans to drop from the tree.

The pecan weevil is a large weevil being brownish in color and about three-eighths of an inch in length. Males are somewhat smaller in size than females. Pecan weevils have a snout about as long as its body.

Adult feeding is done prior to hardening of the nut shell. After nut kernels have hardened, the female chews a hole in the shell and deposits her eggs in little pockets in the nut. The legless grub feeds from three to six weeks. When the grub reaches maturity, they chew a hole about one-eighth inch in diameter in the shell and emerge from the nut and overwinter in the ground. Early maturing varieties may be more severely attacked than later developing varieties.

When three or more weevils per tree are found, insecticides should be applied for pest reduction. Sevin that is labeled for pecan use is recommended at a rate of 3 pounds of 80-powder per 100 gallons of water for weevil control.
