Little Miss Eastland, '71 To Be Crowned Tuesday Evening

On the Eastland High School Auditorium stage, Tuesday, April 6, at 8 p.m., Miss Becky Gailey, 1970 "Little Miss Eastland," will relinquish her crown to one of the 24 three-to-five year old misses pictured on this page.

Luring her reign, Becky has represented Eastland in various functions, has ridden on a decorated car in the 1970 Peanut Bowl Parade, and helped with the presentation of the 1971 Texas State Peanut Queen during ceremonies of the Peanut Bowl game. Duties such as these and others will await her successor.

In addition to the parade of contestants, an evening of varied entertainment is in store for the audience as several special events have been planned and a few surprises may be forthcoming. Mike (Michael Henry) Martin, radio station KNIT in Abilene disc jockey, SSS International recording artist, and lead singer with "The Topics," will be on hand as master of ceremonies and will crown the 1971 "Little Miss Eastland" and sing the pageant song in her honor.

A portion of the Tarleton Troubadours, a musical group from Tarleton State College in Stephenville who made a Caribbean tour last summer and has performed in various functions over the state, will present entertainment during a break in judging. Members of the group to appear are dancers Jeanette Alsop and Seth Miller and pianist Wayne Ross.

Local entertainment will consist of singer-pianist Anna Ivory Edwards and a group of children who will sing several songs. The children include former "Little Miss Eastland's" -Melody Bond, 1965; Rhonda Rushing, 1967; Laurie Underwood, 1968; Sheri Mangum, 1969; and Becky Gailey, 1970—and the children of the members of Zeta Pi Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi sorority, sponsors of the pageant. They are Shawn Alsop, Sherry Brumbelow, Brad Freeman, Rusty Freeman, Kael Joiner, Koby Joiner, Amy Loudermilk, Cory Loudermilk, Scott Payne and Scott Terrell, Lou Ann Freeman is director of the children's choir. Mrs. Andy Taylor will accompany the children on their numbers and will also present background music for the contestants.

Measles Immunization Set Here April 6 by P-T-O

The Eastland Parent Teachers Organization in cooperation with the State Health Department is sponsoring a mass Measles Immunization Program for all Pre-school Children and those currently enrolled in Grades 1 through 6 on Eastland Elementary School. (This is not to be confused with the German or 3 day measles immunization received on February 12th.) This is a voluntary program and no charge will be made for the service which will be performed under the supervision of the State Health Department. All that is necessary for your child to receive the free vaccine will be for you to give permission by signing and returning the permission slip at the bottom of this page. The vaccine will be administered only to those students who return the signed permission to the school.

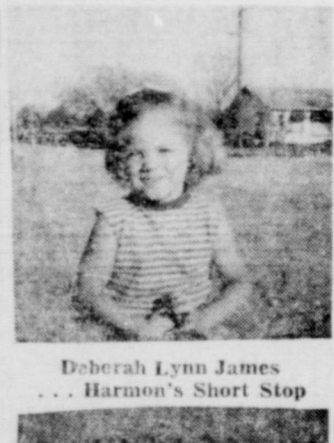

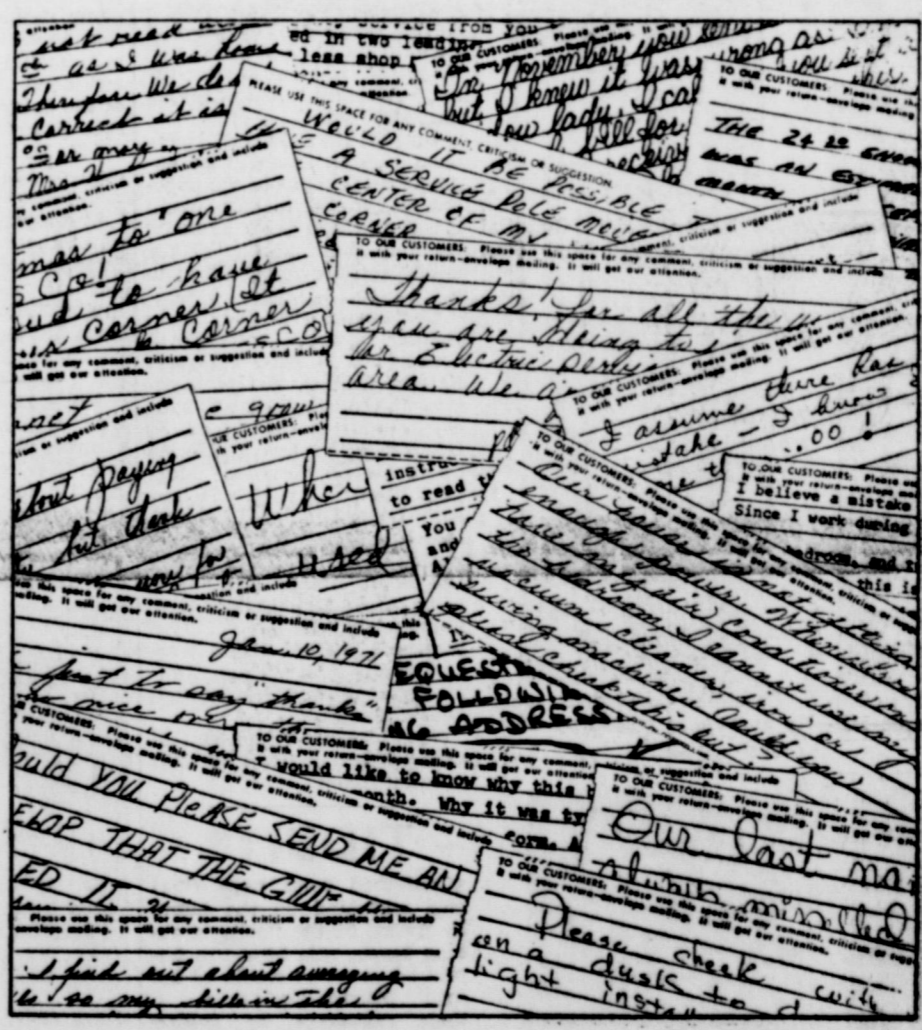

Report From Your Representative

This week has brought the largest influx of mail and people that we have had so far. Reasons for the deluge are two: daylight-savings time, and the proposal to let the county commissioners set the salaries of all county officials that are wholly paid by county funds.

By now you know that Texas will remain under daylight-savings time. Most of the urban areas were for remaining under the present system, while most of the rural areas were for standar time. One suggestion that failed to reach the floor for debate was to have daylight-savings time

begin June 1 and expire September 1. This would have kept the small children from being affected. It would have been a great help to those children who ride school buses for long distances.

Many people do not know that the legislature sets salaries of county officials. Actually, in most instances an exact amount was not set, but a ceiling was placed on salaries. This situation means that the salaries of officials of 254 counties must be con-

sidered, and you can imagine the number of bills this involves. Since the people in these offices are elected by the people and had to answer to them, the legislature felt that these salaries should be set by the county officials, and a bill has been approved to that affect.

The bill was amended in one respect. Instead of the county judge and the commissioners setting the salaries, a committee or panel, composed of the

county judge, sheriff, tax assessor-collector, treasurer, county clerk, district clerk and the county attorney or criminal district attorney, would form a board to set county salaries. If one man held any two of the above offices, he would have only one vote.

Along with the above matters, the question of an investigating committee by the House into the alleged wrong doings of some members has been under consideration.

Almost everyone agrees this should be done, and the only question has been, who will do it. Should it be the members, an agency, or perhaps even someone else? Regardless of how it will be taken care of, the investigation will take place. Hopefully, it will be done in a way that will get to the bottom of the situation and prove those involved were guilty of wrong-doing, or if not guilty, then prove to all of us, without a question there was no wrong-doing.

Restrictions On Shipments Of Hog Ordered

Dr. H. Q. Sibley, acting executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission has ordered a restriction on swine movements in Texas in order to bring the present hog cholera situation under control. This restriction is imposed to implement a quarantine order signed by Mr. Joe B. Finely, Jr., Chairman of the Texas Animal Health Commission on March 22, 1971.

Effective March 29, 1971, the movement of all feeder and breeder swine within Texas will be allowed only by permit issued after inspection of the herd from which they originate.

Under the restriction, slaughter swine may be consigned directly to livestock markets for sale to slaughter or directly to slaughtering establishments.

Texas regulatory officials have enlisted the cooperation of accredited practicing veterinarians, vocational agriculture teachers, and county extension agents to assist in on-farm inspection prior to show or sale of feeder pigs and breeder stock.

Special permission from the Texas Animal Health Commission must be obtained for exhibitions, shows and special feeder and breeder sales. Restriction sanitation requirements at such points of swine

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exposure to hog cholera. Prior inspection and permits for movement is required for any farm to farm movement of swine. Permits for movement may be obtained by contacting a representative of the Texas Animal Health Commission or a County Agricultural Extension Agent.

The restriction on swine movements will be in effect for 60 days and will allow the Texas Animal Health Commission in cooperation with the Animal Health Division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture to bring the current outbreak under control. The action has the support of the Texas swine industry and is being taken in the best interests of swine producers.

RJC Dean Is Rotary Speaker Here Monday

Bruce Golemon, Dean of Ranger Junior College, in Ranger was guest speaker at the Rotary Club meeting and luncheon, Monday at 12 in the White Elephant.

Prior to becoming dean at Ranger in 1966, Mr. Golemon held such positions as chairman of the Music Department at Cisco Jr. College, and Supervisor to Eastland County Schools. Since becoming Dean; he has held such honors as President of Eastland County Teachers Association; District Layman leader of Cisco; Chairman of Citizens Advisory committee, President of Ranger Lions Club, and a large number of others.

The Rotarians had guest from Cisco, and Colorado. Jana Rexroat was student guest.

R. B. Golemon, presented to Rotaries and guest a brief profile of Ranger Junior College, from past to present.

Ranger Junior College was organized in the summer of 1926 under the leadership of a group of public-spirited citizens. The school opened Sept. 12, 1926 with 44 students under the control of the College Council, composed of three members selected from the Ranger Board of Education (Public) School system under other Ranger citizens.

With the passage of the Junior College Act by the 11 Legislature (1929) Ranger Junior College was incorporated as a part of the Ranger (Public) School system under full control of the public school board.

The student population was 44 in 1926, and has now grown to the present 509 on campus. After World War II Ranger Junior College operated extension schools in Breckenridge and Abilene which enrolled a large number of part-time students.

State financial support has increased from none in 1929 to the \$575 per full-time student equivalent set by the legislature in 1969.

Ranger Junior College became fully integrated about 1958 and has since accepted students of any color, creed, sex, or national origin. The present makeup of the student body is 3% foreign, 16% black, 20% Latin American, and 61% Anglo American. Seventy-five per cent of the students come from families earning less than \$7,500 per year, so there are National Defense Student Loan, Economic Opportunity Grant, College Work-Study Program, Athletic Music, R. d. o. Schol-

arships, and Academic Scholarships.

The faculty is made up of 25 full-time teachers, and four part-time teachers. The total staff and faculty employed by the college is 50. Mr. Golemon said, "Our teachers are basically very good." "This is proven by the fact that we can't keep them over just a few years. Larger schools, that can afford better pay get them. There is a large turnover of about 90% a year."

"The basically philosophy of the college is to give every student who has the desire to attend college the chance to do so. We at Ranger Junior College try to afford them this opportunity," Dean Golemon said.
