Jury Selection Slow Creel Murder Trial

Selection of a jury in the murder trial of Airman James Duke Creel in 91st District Court proceeds slowly, as many of the prospective jurors are disqualified, chiefly on the death penalty questioning.

Mrs. Roy Gann of Eastland became the fourth jurymen selected Wednesday. The selection began Monday morning and Mrs. Quarrells of Cisco was the first selected on that day. Pace picked up a little Tuesday, with the acceptance by both state and defense of Mrs. Alfred Burcham of Rising Star and Calvin Ainsworth of Ranger.

Of the 26 persons examined by Tuesday's night recess, 13 had been excused by Presiding Judge Earl Conner Jr. because they said they did not believe in the death penalty, which the state is seeking.

Airman Creel is charged with the March 15 strangulation death of 10-year-old Tona Worthington of Abilene. The case was transferred here on a change of venue, and Judge Conner denied a defense motion in July to transfer the case again.

LIONS GET BEEES

A knowledge of birds may be lacking, but Eastland Lions are well-versed on bees, thanks to a thoroughly interesting discourse Tuesday noon by School Supt. Wendell Siebert.

Proving that a modern educator must be quick on the up-take, Supt. Siebert presented the program with zero notification, and condensed what is generally an hour's lecture into some 15 minutes, much to the delight of the fascinated club members.

A devotee to bee culture, Siebert explained the complex, and as he called it, "Almost unbelievable organized" social structure of the bee society. The study of bees surely proves the existence of a superior being who could put order into the affairs of such insects.

Describing the three types: queens, workers and drones, he explained the duties of each, and pointed out that a queen, once fertilized, remains so for life - perhaps up to two or three years - producing tremendous numbers of eggs regularly.

Mavericks Face Bulldogs Friday

Biggest team of the year is what the Eastland Mavericks will be coming up against Friday, when the Clyde Bulldogs come visiting.

Kickoff time at the Maverick Stadium for the District 8-AA duel will be 7:30 p.m. and a record turnout is expected.

The Bulldogs boast a defensive line averaging in excess of 200 pounds, and the visitors from Clyde are hungry. They've been set back on their

past two outings, and nothing would please them more than being the one to unseat the much-touted Mavericks.

Clyde lost to Winters, 7-6 and to Cisco last week, 15-13. Clyde is seen by Eastland Head Coach Shirley Frazier as having great potential and capable of upsets, which will undoubtedly figure in the final district results.

Gary Barr, 180 pound fullback, is one of the premier runners in the district. Frazier says, and End Gate Hawk was one of the leading receivers last year.

The Mavericks came out of the Comanche game in good physical condition, suffering only minor bruises to Howard King and to Ronald McCleskey.

Coaches Eddie Spiller and Mike Jones report that they were fairly well pleased with the efforts of their offensive line. The blocking as a whole was very sharp, they report.

TOP LINEMAN

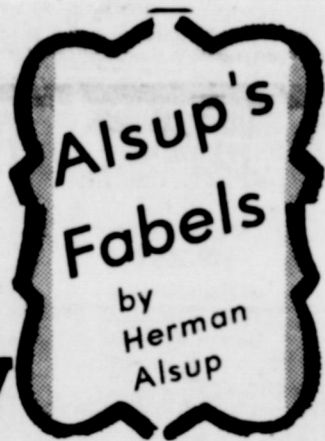
James Eidson received the offensive lineman of the week award.

LT. GOV. Ben Barnes will be among the distinguished guests attending the open house Sunday, Oct. 17 of our new offset printing plant. We hope you've marked your calendar and will visit for a look-see between the hours of 3 and 5. We'll have a press-run at 4, and will have all our people on hand to give you an idea of what it's like to get a paper out.

Of course in the case of this new plant, it's not "a paper" - it's many papers every week, which explains why we still have more errors in each than we'd like.

Naturally, every publisher is always looking for that errorless, perfect issue, and few, if any, have ever found it. In our case, what with learning the new equipment and techniques, we picked up a lot of usable material, and as we learn and apply new methods, we seem to be making progress. We hope you'll agree.

Ours is a bit unique. For instance during this week, there will be ten different issues printed in the new plant: three issues of the Cisco Press (Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday); two issues each of the Telegram and Ranger Times (Thursday and Sunday); an issue of the Rising Star; and one issue each of the Cisco Junior College student newspaper, and of the Ranger Junior College newspaper. There are press runs on at least four days: one on Tuesday; three on Wednesday; one Thursday; and three Saturday, plus scheduling the college papers in.

"Tidbits" usually has the most errors simply because it gets done on the busiest days and doesn't always get the closest proof-reading it needs, in the interest of getting the papers to you on time. (We're adding another keyboard to feed our always hungry typesetting computer,) which should improve the situation.) When we first cranked up this plant, it was pretty much "journalism in the raw" but day by day, it all seems to be falling into place. We know you're ready, and so are we.

School Immunization Set October 20 Here

Elementary school children and pre-schoolers will be participating in another of the School Immunization Clinic series to continue at the Elementary School here WEDNESDAY Oct 20th, sponsored by the Texas Department of Health. The program is in preparation for new state laws requiring that next year's new students and preschoolers be immunized against certain diseases described below.

All required protection is available in the series except smallpox. Most of the elementary children received both the Rubella and Measles vaccines last year and will not need additional immunizations against these two diseases, however.

An oral polio booster vaccine is available for those who have not had an oral booster in the last five years. The entire series will be available for

those who have never been immunized in this way against polio. It is recommended that those who received polio shots as infants take the more effective oral series.

Along with all the others, diphtheria-tetanus is also available.

Those ill with high fever or having vomiting or diarrhea the day of the campaign should not have the vaccines.

TEXAS law now requires that all children entering school must show that they have been immunized for diphtheria, tetanus, measles, polio, smallpox, and rubella (German Measles). Preschool children

must also be protected against pertussis (whooping cough). Exclusions from compliance with the law are allowable on an individualized basis for medical contraindications and religious conflicts. Signed affidavits must be submitted for children falling into these two categories as specified in the law.

The Texas State Department of Health will conduct a series of immunization clinics in the schools beginning this month in which your children can receive the vaccines free-of-charge, with the exception of smallpox vaccinations. No provisions will be made to give smallpox vaccinations at the school clinics.

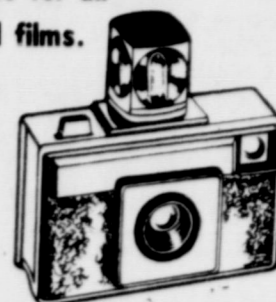
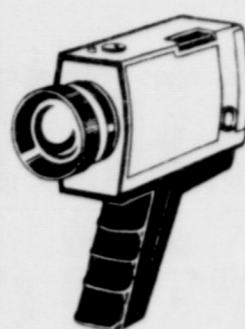

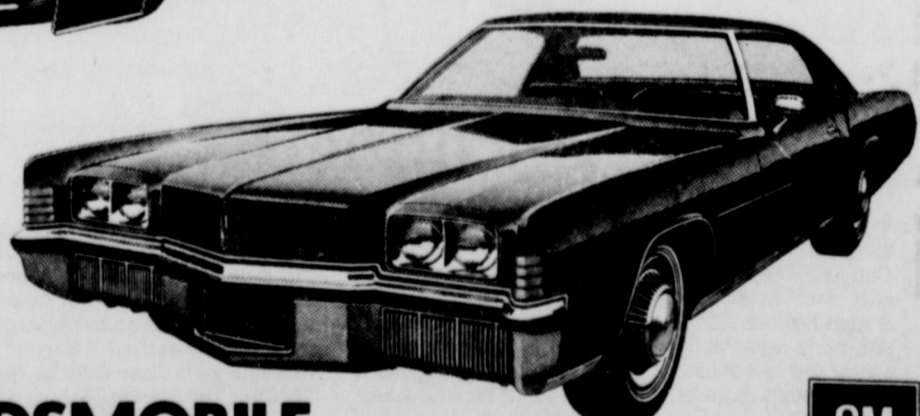

Pecans seem to be hulling and falling earlier this year than usual. When you pick your pecans up and put them aside to dry, don't forget to select 40 of the heaviest pecans to enter in

pot

the County Pecan show. The pecan show will be held in December in Eastland.

Looks like a real small pecan crop this year, but those pecans that are hulling now appear to be large and high in quality. Some growers report that all types of pecan insects caused more damage this year than in

any previous year.

Dan Childress, Pecan Growers Association president, said he counted six different kinds of insects eating on one small pecan tree last week. Many trees have been completely stripped of foliage. Some have asked if this will kill the trees. It probably won't kill the trees, but the longer the leaves remain on the tree the healthier it will be next spring. Trees aren't growing at this time of year, but food manufactured by the leaves is

being stored in the root system to provide growth next spring. That's why it's important to keep the foliage in good condition until frost.

Now is the time for the fall application of fertilizer for your lawn. The two types of fertilizers most often applied in the fall are 16-20-0 and 10-20-10. The grass roots need the nutrients to keep them growing throughout the winter. Your grass will green up much faster in the spring and you will have

a better turf if fertilizer is applied now.

Fall is also a very good time for producers to apply fertilizer—not only for fall-growing crops but also for crops to be planted next spring. Now is a good time to pull soil samples in order to have them tested for determining fertilizer needs.

Fall fertilization is a sound, economical management practice. Fields on which fall-planted or fall-growing crops

are located should be fertilized as necessary to get top production. And, since phosphate and potash do not leach, they can be applied in the fall for next spring's crops.

Fall application of phosphate and potash for spring-planted crops has several advantages. Weather conditions are usually better for getting spreaders on fields during fall, lessening the risk of compaction.

And, if you wait until spring to fertilize, adverse weather may cause delays. Perhaps the

greatest value, though, is the time you'll save next spring. Fall fertilization gets one job out of the way which would
