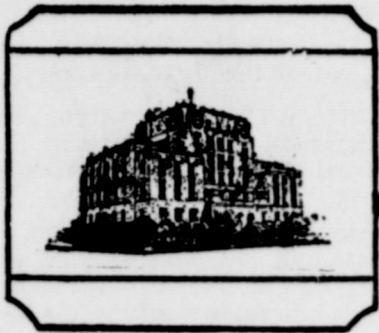

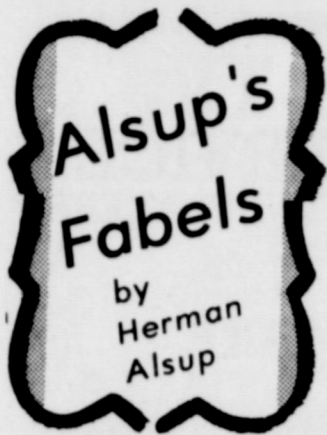

Water Corp. Has Thursday Meet

Members of the proposed Staff Water Supply Corporation Steering Committee held a meeting Thursday night at 7:30 p.m. in the Ranger Room of the First Federal Savings and Loan Association with the chairman Cecil Reeves presiding. Also present were a group from the LaCasa Community, a group from the Kokomo community, E. L. Foster, District Supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration, Leon Decker, P. E. of Abilene, and Dewey Cox, Jr., attorney of Ranger. Mr. Foster told the group that it could possibly be an advantage to combine the proposed three water systems into one corporation with Staff going ahead in the initial program and LaCasa and Kokomo phased out to be activated later.

It was reported that the Staff group now had 160 members signed up with their fee paid. LaCasa reported 55 had signed up and Kokomo reported 29 having signed.

A resolution was adopted by the Staff group to turn over their proposal to Leon Decker, professional Engineer, to work out feasibility routes, source tie-ins and other engineering details. Chairman Reeves stated that with the turning over the proposal to the engineer after approximately four years of work and planning treated water for the lake residents and are takes a long step toward becoming a reality.

Marcie Griffin, Richard and Larry Robinson of Eastland, members of the CJC Band and Belinda Herring, member of the Wrangler Belles Drill Team have received an invitation to perform in the nation's most prestigious annual parade, the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City, according to an announcement made at CJC today by Eris Ritchie, public Relations Director for the Cisco College. The invitation was acknowledged and accepted by Dr. Leland Willis, president of the college.

The Cisco band and drill team will join a very elite group of only approximately fifteen bands from the entire nation in the parade. Ritchie said that the CJC group would probably be the only organization featuring a girls' dance and drill team and the Belles will do a featured performance at Herald Square adjacent to Macy's that will be seen by millions on national television.

The school plans to charter a 707 jetliner to transport the group and their sponsors from Dallas to New York, and to house the students in the McAlpin Hotel, across the street from Macy's. Gordon Pot

The shortage of hay last winter and spring was a real problem for local livestock owners. There should be no shortage problems this year. I've never seen so much hay stacked on farms and ranches as I have seen during the past few weeks. Area Conservationist E. E. McAllister compares it to the 1951 hay crop. He says this year's crop is the largest since 1951.

Recent rains in the county have revived ranges and pasture and brought on lush growth again. These green grasses appeal not only to livestock to army worms as well. The army worm infestation has been worse in areas east of Eastland County, but we can expect considerable damage here.

Army worms generally appear in late summer and early fall where lush growth appears in grasses and forage crops. Small grains planted for fall and winter grazing are especially susceptible to damage. Plants can be stripped of their foliage in short order. Army worms reach a length of about 1 1/2 inches when mature. Young worms are less than one-half inch long. Their color ranges from pale green to almost black. The worms have two characteristic markings. Three parallel yellow lines extend along the back. A prominent white inverted "Y" also appears on the front of the worm's head.

Army worms can effectively be controlled if measures are taken soon as infestations

appear. Applying 1 1/2 pounds of Sevin (80 percent Wettable powder) per acre usually gives adequate control. Toxaphene at 3 pounds of actual material per acre is

Army worms are mainly night-feeders but are also active on cloudy days. Grass should be inspected frequently and carefully to detect army worm activity, especially during cool, wet weather.

It will soon be time to start shopping for landscape plants. When you do this, beware of bargains. A bargain is only a bargain if you get something that gives enough personal satisfaction to make you feel it was worth the money needed to purchase it.

Good bargains do exist within the retail nursery trade, and there are some guidelines for buying a bargain. The first rule is to always buy quality. Quality is the prime consideration of any bargain. Unless the nursery man has been quality conscious throughout his entire operation, the plant may not be a bargain at any price.

Plants will always cost you more than their actual purchase price. After making a purchase, planting is the next step. This involves more money for peat moss, topsoil, fertilizer, tools, and other materials. If a plant fails to survive because of poor production and handling before you bought it, then it is no bargain at any price. You actually lose money.

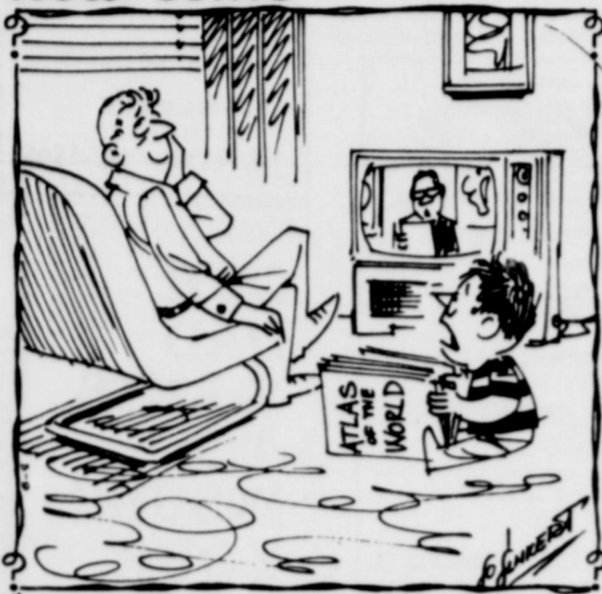

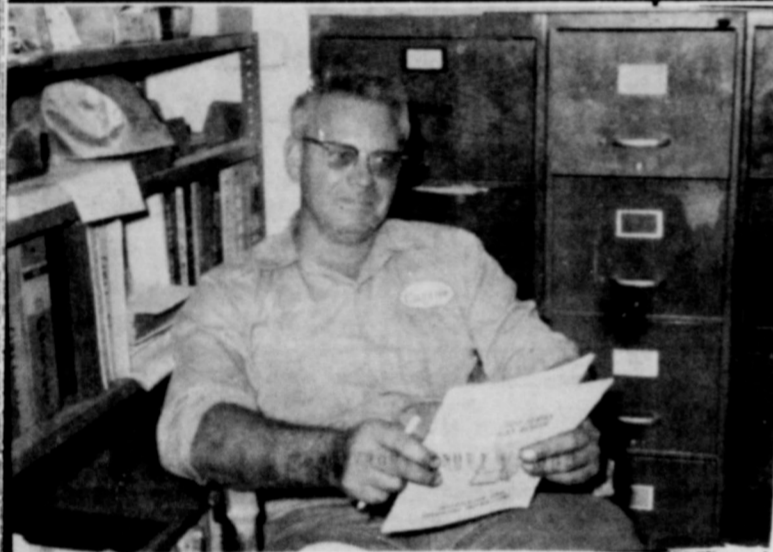

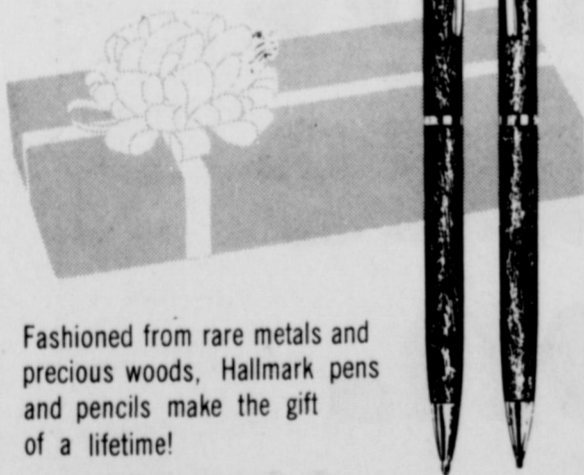

LEGAL NOTICE

AN ACT relating to the recording and rerecording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency.
BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties, each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been

previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act, all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have

any force or effect and after the expiration of six months, only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

(d) Immediately upon the taking effect of this Act, the county clerk of the county shall have this Act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days. The publication shall be paid for by the county out of the general county fund.

Sec. 2. All clerks in reregistering brands shall comply with Articles 6890

through 6899, inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, and with Section 1, Chapter 273, Acts of the 41st Legislature, 1929, as amended (Article 6899a, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes), and shall also be aware of and comply with Articles 1484, 1485, and 1486 of the Penal Code of Texas, 1925.

Sec. 3. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be reregistered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

Sec. 4. The importance of this legislation and the crowded

condition of the calendars in both Houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days

in each House be suspended, and this Rule is hereby suspended; and that this Act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

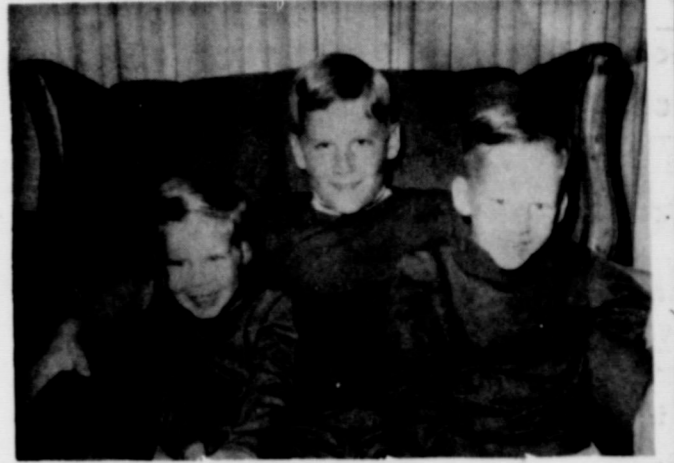

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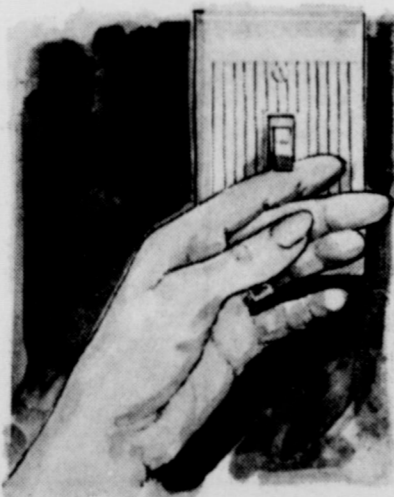

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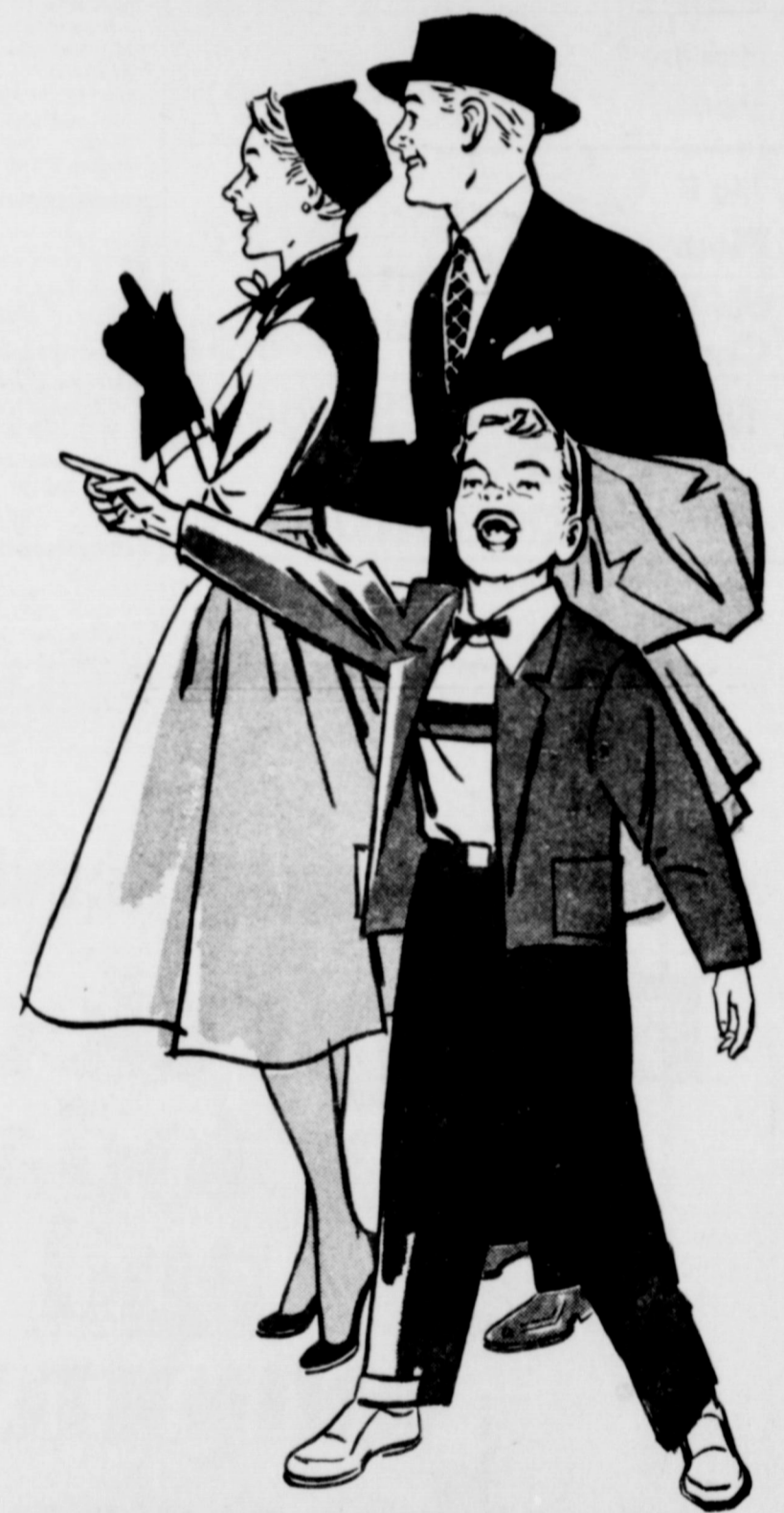
