City Buys Land For New Sewer Plant

WHERE DOES the right to free living end and responsibility, begin, or vice versa? Everyone believes in freedom of speech, freedom of choice and all kinds of freedoms, as guaranteed by our founding fathers.

Can one be too free?

It would seem so, judging by a telephone conversation this week from a distraught county mother, grandmother, who's looking for help in returning her son and family to society. In tears, the woman tells a sad, sad story: Her 29 year-old son, holder of a masters degree, and his wife of the same age, (daughter of another county family) who were childhood sweethearts in the county high high school where they graduated. They're now the parents of a nine-year-old girl and a five-year-old son.

It all sounds good up to this point, but the point is that this degree-holding countian chucked it all not long ago, left a job with a well-known corporation in the Dallas-Fort Worth area and moved his fa. 'y to the Ozarks of Arkansas to live in a commune, presumably to raise herbs commercially. Only there's no plows, and the living is hard.

Ths distraught grandmother went to the commune recently to hopefully bring her brood home. They didn't want to come. Leader of the commune is a Cuban known as Pete and the some 20 members of his clan are still called Dubies. They range in age from pre teens to full adults.

The grandmother found her son and his daughter in poor health; she suspects malnutrition and rickets, and she doesn't think they could survive a winter on that mountain. They live in tents and sleep on the ground--yet they don't want to leave.


The locals learned of the whereabouts of their kin when the nine-year-old girl slipped away a couple of months ago and called the grandmother. What's to be done, the mother wants to know.

Naturally, she wants her brood back to society, particularly the children, and the grandmother would like to see laws passed to prohibit such living. What's to do.

Seek legal counsel was our advice, and petition the legislators on such matters. Perhaps others feel strongly about this and would express themselves.

We read and hear about these things happening "somewhere else" but wehen the stories come from people you know, it's a different story all together.



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

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Sgt. Mathews Tells P-TO About Traffic Laws

Recent changes in traffic laws affectings youngsters were discussed by DPS Sgt. Jerry Mathews Tuesday for members of the Eastland Parent-Teachers Oganization. These included school bus laws, pedestrial law and the bcycle

He emphasized that any traffic law affects children, and pointed that the important thing is to remember what is required and what is allowed

for drivers.

about school bus changes, he said when the bud is stopped discharging or taking on passengers and the lights are on the bus, the law now requires vehicles passing or meeting the stopped bus to stop until the bus resume motion.

The new law includes control inside city limits as well as outside city limits. THere are three ways to pass a bus: if the bus is stopped and the lights are off; if the driver motions to go around; or when the bus resumes motion - then it's okay to pass, otherwise a vehicle cannot pass a bus that is stopped.

He also brought out that the buses in Eastland do not have the flashing red lights. Orange lights are used here.

Pedestrial law: requirements and allowancees are when a vehicle yielding to pedestrians other vehicles behind him must also stop.
